

Out and About in Yokosuka!

Oogusu Mountain Hiking Courses

At 242 meters Oogusu mountain is the highest peak on the Miura Peninsula. The observation deck at the summit offers a 360° view. On a clear day, you can see all the way to Mt. Fuji and Tokyo Skytree. There is a small shop at the observation deck that sells instant noodles, snacks, and juice. Down below the mountain is a field that fills with rapeseed blossoms in the spring and cosmos flowers in the fall. Hiking trails are very popular among hikers. Each course has its own characteristics.

There are **two trails** leading to the top of Oogusu Mountain. One trail, **Oogusu ashinaguchi Hiking Course**, is accessible from Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop and the other, **Maedabashi Hiking Course**, is accessible from the Maedabashi bus stop. It is possible to connect the two courses to make a continuous route.



Course 1: Oogusu ashinaguchi Hiking Course

This course is accessible from the Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop
Getting There: To Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop from Keikyu Yokosuka Chuo Bus terminal

By bus: From **Keikyu Yokosuka Chuo bus station** take **bus No. 4** from terminal 5 bound for **Oogusu ashinaguchi** and get off at the final stop, **Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop**. It will take about 50min to get to Oogusu ashinaguchi from Yokosukachuo.

The Hiking Course:

From the bus stop walk northeast up the street passing Keikyu Store on your right and a convenience store on your left. There will be a sign (in Japanese) pointing to Oogusu Mountain on your left. Follow the street to the left, it leads to the trail head and peak. From Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop to Oogusu mountain peak by Oogusu ashinaguchi trail takes about 60minutes.



Course 2: Maedabashi Hiking Course

This course is accessible from the Maedabashi bus stop

Getting There: Maedabashi Bus stop from Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop

By bus: Transfer at **Oogusu ashinaguchi bus stop** for next bus bound for Zushi. Go three stops and get off at Maedabashi bus stop.

On foot: Walk ten minutes toward Zushi until Maedabashi bus stop.

The Hiking Course:

From the bus stop cross the street and begin walking toward Oogusu Mountain. Before crossing a bridge there is a sign pointing to the trail on the right which follows the river. Follow until the top of the Oogusu Mountain. It will take about 70 minutes. Depending on the season or weather, the river trail may be flooded. In this case continue on the road as this will bypass the river and re-join the Maedabashi Hiking Course.

Oogusu Mountain View House

At the top of Oogusu Mountain there is an observation deck and small shop. Time of operation is from 9:00-16:00 daily. The shop may be closed on days of inclement weather and other days as well. Only snacks and a few kinds of beverages are sold. If you plan to have lunch at the top you should plan to bring your own food.



Please note

- There are no garbage cans at the top. Everyone must pack out their own trash, left over food, and litter.
- The toilet at the top is a Japanese style "washiki toilet". A western style toilet is not available.
- Barbecuing is not allowed on the trails or top of Oogusu Mountain
- Camping is not permitted on Oogusu Mountain




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Tsukuihama Tourist Farm Information

Enjoy picking the taste of each season at the Tsukuihama Tourist Farm. Locally produced vegetables, jam, and tsukemono pickles are available at the farm's information center.

 Sep. - Nov. Sweet potato digging

 Oct. - Nov. Tangerine picking

How to get to Tsukuihama Tourist Farm

1. By Train

From Yokosuka chuo station or Shioiri station Keihin Kyuko Line to **Tsukuihama station** bound for Misakiguchi.

20min. walk from **Tsukuihama station** or take the **free shuttle bus** to the farm from **Tsukuihama station**.



2. By Car

Starting from Route 16 **Honcho 1 chome stop light** take **route 26** toward **Kinugasa**.

Follow **route 26** and pass through **Kinugasa jyujiro stoplight**. Keep going straight on **route 26** until **Kinugasa Inter Iriguchi stoplight**. Turn left at the **Kinugasa Inter Iriguchi stoplight** and go straight until **Sahara Kosaten stop light**. At the **Sahara Kosaten stop light** a right on to **route 27**.

Continue on **route 27** to **Shimada Koen stop light** then take a left. Go straight until **route 134** and take a right at **Nobieki iriguchi stop light**. Continue on **route 134** and turn right at **Tsukuihamaeki iriguchi stop light** then continue on until reaching the farm.

Strawberry Picking * Reservations are not accepted

Savor the sweetness of fresh-picked red strawberries.

Kinugasa yama Koen (Kinugasa Mountain Park)

Kinugasa yama Koen (park) was chosen as one of the top 100 cherry blossom spots in Japan. With approximately 2000 cherry trees, many people come to the Kinugasa Cherry Blossom Festival each spring. The park has much to offer at any time of the year. Visitors can enjoy playing in the woods and water, watching fireflies, and having picnics in the park. Children love searching for sculptures made of withered branches and tree stumps that are located throughout the park. There is also a playground area. This is a great park for nature walks as well as watching distant ships passing through Tokyo Bay. Kinugasa yama Park offers a diversity of things to see and continues to rise in popularity. Why not make it your next destination while out and about in Yokosuka?

Getting there

The park entrance is an approximate 750m walk from the Kinugasa koen bus stop.

By Bus: From **Keikyū Yokosuka Chuo bus station** take **bus No.6** from **terminal 4** bound for **Misaki higashigaoka** and get off at **Kinugasa koen bus stop**. The bus station is in front of the AVE super market. It will take about 20min to get to Kinugasa koen from Yokosukachuo.

To the park entrance from the bus stop:

From the Kinugasa koen bus stop take the crosswalk across Route 26 and you will see a large sign (in Japanese) for Kinugasa yama koen (Photo 1). The arrow on the sign points in the direction of the park entrance. Follow the road until you reach a second, much smaller sign with English (Photo 2). Take a right at the second sign and follow the road up the hill. On your left you will see, and pass, Kinugasa Shrine. Continue up the road and you will reach the park entrance.

Please Note

- This park is accessible by car however parking is very limited. There is **NO** parking during the Cherry Blossom season. Please use public transportation at all times.
- There are no shops selling food in the park. Food stalls (yatai) are set up **only** during the cherry blossom festival. Plan to bring your own snacks and drinks when visiting.
- Show your respect for Yokosuka parks and leave no trace. Plan to pack out your own trash, left over food and litter. Barbecuing and fires are not permitted at the park.
- Trees in the park have historical significance. Tree climbing, slacklines, hammocks, etc. are not permitted.



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
