TW-2 resumes flight training following T-45 Goshawk crash

Training Air Wing TWO resumed flight training at NAS Kingsville Nov. 3, a day after a T-45 Goshawk from VT-21 crashed in a heavily wooded area south of airfield runways. Two pilots on board the aircraft safely ejected before the crash. Both were treated for minor injuries at the scene and then taken to Christus-Spohn Hospital-Kleberg for further evaluation and later released.

The pilots were conducting a routine training flight at the time of the accident. The Naval Air Training Command has not released the names of the pilots involved in the crash.

Recognized were Lt. Michael Galdieri, an instructor pilot from Training Squadron 21, as Junior Officer Volunteer of the Year; IC1(SW) Bernardino Martinez, of NAS Kingsville, as Enlisted Volunteer of the Year; and Joy Alonzo, wife of Cmdr. Quino Alonzo, commanding officer of VT-21, as Military Spouse of the Year.

Galdieri, a native of Allentown, Pa., received the award for devoting many hours in and outside the squadron to serve his local community. During the past year, he has taken time out of a very demanding flight schedule and time away on detachment to benefit and support the community.

"Lt. Galdieri is an exceptional Naval officer, aviator and mentor," said Cmdr. Alonzo. "His behind-the-scenes volunteer work has gone largely unnoticed except by those close to him and this is a wonderful opportunity to honor him for his outreach to the community. He is definitely deserving of this distinctive award."

Galdieri founded operationpower.us, a nonprofit organization to raise money for the Wounded Warrior Project; regularly volunteers with the Junior League of Corpus Christi where he recently supported a successful reading outreach program; supports the Boys and Girls Club where he recently hosted their end of summer party; mentors college students; volunteers at the annual King Ranch Hand Breakfast; and hosted two Pilot For a Day children from Driscoll Children's Hospital.

Galdieri told everyone assembled that he tries to live his life by the motto, "For

Greetings Team Kingsville,

After driving across the western United States this past weekend to get back to Texas, it dawned on me to share some of the fall/winter driving safety tips that are suitable for South Texas.

To begin with the basics, when was the last time you really had your vehicle inspected for winter driving conditions? If you haven't done so, please visit our Auto Skills shop and Bill Boswell will give your vehicle a look-over and let you know any areas of concern.

Additionally, there are always nighttime animal hazards that can be very dangerous to you while driving, those include hogs and deer.

With the rut about to hit full swing for whitetail deer, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDoT) recommends that you slow your speeds, if you're driving at night, and use high beam headlights to the maximum extent without causing a safety hazard to oncoming drivers. If you see the eyes of deer along the roadway, assume there are more deer there.

Lastly and obviously, the most severe scenario is an imminent collision with an animal. Again, TxDoT recommends you do not "swerve to avoid," for that creates an even larger issue where you may lose control or even rollover your vehicle. Instead, it's recommended to maintain control of your vehicle, apply maximum braking and hope for the best as God has done the math on whether you will collide or not.

Please be careful as the holidays approach and you drive to many points of interest.

Plan your route, let your supervisors know where you are going and utilize the daylight as much as possible.

Stay safe and don't drive fatigued.

Pass & ID staff changes require modification in service hours

This may not directly affect you, but if you or your command/activity have vendors, contractors, suppliers or service providers who routinely access NAS Kingsville, please pass on this information.

Due to the reduction of Pass and ID manpower, and in order to be in compliance with HQ policy (CNIC 5530.1), the following changes regarding Pass and ID services went into effect Nov. 7.

New Pass & ID service hours will be

from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., Monday through Friday.

The Pass & ID office will no longer issue the NAS Kingsville 30 Day RapidGate (Pending) temporary ID cards to vendors, contractors, suppliers and service providers who have enrolled in the EID/RapidGATE (NCAC) program, awaiting credential arrival. Instead, we will issue a temporary pass (paper) validated for 28 days or until the applicant's RapidGate account is approved.

Note: As a reminder, please submit your Applications for Activity Access and Request for Employee Access (CNRSE 5200 Forms 1 and 2) in person at the Pass & ID office from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Please be reminded that NAS Kingsville has “zero” control of RapidGate’s application process. From the time of registration, it should take only 15 to 21 days to process an applicant’s account approval, to include the background check. Keep in mind, 15 to 21 days to process is reserved for normal routine applicants. If there is an issue with an applicant’s background, then the process can take longer.

cue and Security personnel responded to the crash site within minutes Nov. 2. The firefighters located the aircraft and extinguished the fire while Security personnel secured the crash site.

An Aircraft Mishap Board (AMB) from Training Air Wing TWO began an investigation into the cause of the crash almost immediately. The AMB completed their investigation of the crash site Nov. 6 and the wreckage was removed from the site and taken to a secure location for further evaluation as the investigation into the cause of the crash continues. The crash site was turned over to the NAS Kingsville environmental services team Nov. 7.

"The crash site was turned over to our environmental team a few days after the crash so we could do our job of assessing the site for environmental contamination," said Sheri Fox, supervisory environmental

engineer and environmental services officer for the NAS Kingsville public works department.

"Once we finish assessing the site, we will contract with an outside agency to come

in and do the work that is required by State of Texas to clean-up and restore the site to pre-crash conditions. So we'll have to do some sampling and soil removal dependent upon how much contamination we find."

Fox added that the on-site clean-up could take several weeks, followed by back-filling the land and restoring the site. The site is then inspected to ensure the clean-up is in line with state requirements.

Routine Monitoring Violation Total Coliform Rule

NAS Kingsville received two violation notices from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) for the August-September time frame. According to Naval Facilities (NAVFAC) Southeast-Detachment NAS Kingsville environmental protection specialist Roberto Castellano, the violation was a result of an administrative error in the paperwork submitted to TCEQ. Castellano stated that proper bacteriological testing was performed during August and September, and the results were within TCEQ standards. The following notices are required by TCEQ to inform you of these violations.

Public Notice:

NAS Kingsville/PWS 1370003 failed to collect the required number of bacteriological samples for coliform monitoring of the water distribution system during August and September 2011. This monitoring is required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's "Drinking Water Standards" and the federal "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 95-523.

Bacteriological samples are used to monitor water quality and indicate if the water is free of coliform bacteria. NAS Kingsville's water system is required to submit two bacteriological samples each month. Failure to collect all required bacteriological samples is a violation of the Texas state monitoring requirements and we are required to notify you of this violation.

In addition, Orange Grove Navy Auxiliary Landing Field /PWS 1250029 was cited for failing to collect the required number of bacteriological samples for coliform monitoring of the water distribution system during August and September 2011. This monitoring is required by the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality's "Drinking Water Standards" and the federal "Safe Drinking Water Act," Public Law 95-523.

Bacteriological samples are used to monitor water quality and indicate if the water is free of coliform bacteria. NAS Kingsville's water system is required to submit one bacteriological sample each month. Failure to collect all required bacteriological samples is a violation of Texas state monitoring requirements and it is required by the State that these violations be published.

As mentioned above, Castellano stated the violation was a result of an administrative error in the paperwork submitted to TCEQ. Castellano added that proper bacteriological testing was performed during August and September and the results were within TCEQ standards.
