Commander, Naval Air Forces visit includes facility briefs, all hands call

The Navy's Air Boss paid a visit to NAS Kingsville April 13. The stop in Kingsville was part of a 3-day visit to South Texas Navy commands for Vice Adm. Allen Myers, Commander of Naval Air Forces. Rear Adm. William Sizemore, Chief of Naval Air Training, hosted the visit.

Myers, who was joined by his wife Judy, a retired Navy Captain, and staff members arrived in Corpus Christi April 11. Their itinerary included an afternoon visit to the Corpus Christi Army Depot, followed by a full day on board NAS Corpus Christi on April 12, and a full day on board NAS Kingsville April 13.

At NAS Corpus Christi, Myers took an orientation flight in a T-6B Texan, toured the T-34, T-44 and TC-12 simulators, and met with NAS Corpus Christi and CNATRA leadership during a working lunch at CNA-

TRA headquarters.

Mrs. Myers also had a busy day, visiting the NAS Corpus Christi Child Development Center, base housing and the Naval Health Clinic. That afternoon, Mrs. Myers hosted a roundtable discussion with Junior Officer's spouses at the NASCC Bay Club.

The following day, Vice Adm. Myers was joined by NAS Kingsville Commanding Officer Capt. Mark McLaughlin for an early morning orientation flight in a T-44C. The flight plan included a trip through the NAS Corpus Christi operating area and a fly over of potential wind farm construction sites. The flight concluded with a landing at NAS Kingsville.

Myers' schedule on board NAS Kingsville was also jam-packed. It began with windshield tour of the flight line and squadron hangar followed by a flight brief and ori-

25 receive Wings of Gold at largest TW-2 winging ceremony in years

Training Air Wing Two (TW-2) held its largest winging ceremony in several years Friday, April 8 as 25 student pilots received their wings of Gold and were designated Naval Aviators. More than 400 people attended the ceremony, held in the main ballroom of the Captain's Club. TW-2 Commander Capt. Mark Brooks presided over the ceremony, along with VT-21 Executive Officer Cmdr. Quino Alonzo and VT-22 Skipper Lt. Col. Terrence Latorre.

Guest speaker for the ceremony was retired Navy Capt. W. Scott Gureck, executive director of communications and marketing for the U.S. Naval Institute (USNI), one of the oldest professional military associations in the United States. Since 1873 USNI – with 50,000 members – has nurtured creative thinkers who responsibly raise their voices on matters relating to national defense.

The son of a career naval officer, Gureck served more than 23 years in the Navy, retiring at the rank of Captain. His most recent active duty assignment was director of public affairs for the Commander, U.S. Pacific

Fleet. Prior to that assignment he was selected as the start-up director of the office of Navy community outreach (NAVCO), the national headquarters tasked to coordinate and align the Navy image, awareness and image branding efforts.

Gureck's active duty career began in aviation, as he earned his designation as a Naval Flight Officer and Electronic Countermeasures Officer, qualified in the EA-6B Prowler carrier-based electronic attack aircraft. While assigned on board USS Dwight D. Eisenhower (CVN 69), Gureck logged more than 150 arrested landings and made two deployments in support of Operations Desert Shield and Desert Storm.

The winging ceremony marked the end of nearly 14 months of undergraduate jet/strike training at NAS Kingsville for the students. With two years of aviation training in total, they will now move on to Navy and Marine Corps Fleet Replacement Squadrons (FRS) to learn their selected aircraft prior to reporting to their first fleet assignments.

The Security Officer position is no easy task. For over three and a half decades, Cesar has been instrumental in developing the air station's security plans and standard operating procedures, conducting drills and designing improvements to procedures and infrastructure, all in an effort to keep everyone and everything on this base safe. He performed superbly!

Cesar retired from the U.S. Army service in April 1991, after serving faithfully for 24 years in his military capacity and earning the rank of 1st Sgt. (E-8). With his six years of active duty time and 36 years as a DoD Security Officer, Cesar has dedicated 42 years of faithful service to the United States.

The United Services Military Apprenticeship Program (USMAP) is provided to service members to record hours on the job to count towards an apprenticeship program. Sailors should take advantage of this great program. It requires no cost and is very simple to complete.

While serving on active duty, service members simply log onto <https://usmap.cnet.navy.mil> to enroll, track and record progress.

This helps Sailors to obtain a certificate in the specific area of expertise. USMAP enhances your job skills and shows your motivation for more challenging military assignments.

Having a Department of Labor (DOL) Certificate of Completion is a definite advantage in getting better civilian jobs since employers know the value of apprenticeships.

DoD launches new Helpline to support victims of sexual assault

The Department of Defense today launched its newest initiative to support victims of sexual assault. Using DoD Safe Helpline, service members can "click, call or text" for victim support services for themselves or others.


The free, anonymous and confidential resource can be accessed worldwide, 24-hours a day, every day, to connect with live sexual assault support professionals.

In addition to improving victim care, secure and confidential access to Safe Helpline was developed to encourage victims to come forward when they might not otherwise.

"The under-reporting of sexual assault poses a serious challenge to military readiness," said Clifford L. Stanley, under secretary of defense for personnel and readiness. "We believe the Safe Helpline will provide DoD sexual assault victims with a variety of support outlets, which will lead victims to report sexual assault, seek needed information, and receive care."

Safe Helpline offers three access options designed for service members. Users can log on to <http://www.SafeHelpline.org> to receive live, one-on-one confidential help with a trained professional through a secure instant-messaging format.

The website also provides vital information about recovering from and reporting sexual assault. A second option is to call the telephone hotline at 877-995-5247 to speak



with Safe Helpline staff for personalized advice and support.

Safe Helpline staff can also transfer callers to installation-based sexual assault response coordinators (SARC), on-call victim advocates, civilian rape crisis centers, or to the Suicide Prevention Lifeline. The third option is for users to text their location to 55247 inside the United States or 202-470-5546 outside of the United States to receive automated contact information for the SARC at their installation or base.

Federal Long Term Care Insurance program Open Season underway

The U.S. Office of Personnel Management (OPM) launched the Federal Long Term Care Insurance Program (FLTCIP) Open Season which will run from April 4 to June 24.

This is the first FLTCIP Open Season since 2002.

"The Federal Long Term Care Insurance Program gives enrollees security and peace of mind as they plan for the coast of long term care," said OPM Director John Berry. "I encourage current Federal and postal service employees, uniformed personnel, and their qualified relatives to learn about this important benefit."

During the FLTCIP Open Season, all current Federal and U.S. Postal Service employees and active members of the uniformed services and their spouses will have the opportunity to apply for coverage with abbreviated underwriting, which means that a minimal number of health questions will be asked during the application process.

This is an option not offered during year-round enrollment. In keeping with President Obama's June 17, 2009, memorandum Federal Benefits and Non-Discrimination, same-sex domestic partners of Federal and USPS employees can also apply with abbreviated underwriting.

The FLTCIP is the largest employer-

sponsored long term care program in the country, with over 225,000 current enrollees.

Please note, certain medical conditions, or combinations of conditions, will prevent some people from being approved for coverage. If accepted into the program, employees pay 100 percent of the cost.

Now through June 24, you can download or complete an online FLTCIP Open Season application on the Web at <http://www.ltcfeds.com/index.html> under the "Apply" tab.

On or after 1 March 2011 you can request that a FLTCIP Open Season application be mailed to you by using the online information request form at https://www.ltcfeds.com/ltcWeb/do/enrollment_request_package/requestforpackageinitial.

You may receive a hard copy brochure from your Activity that includes a mail-in request form for an information kit and application.

SAPR committee hosts awareness luncheon

In recognition of Sexual Awareness Month, Naval Air Station (NAS) Kingsville Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) Team and volunteers organized and held the first annual Sexual Assault Prevention Month luncheon on Apr. 15, recognizing this year's theme "Hurts one, affects all."

SAPR team members wore T-shirts with the SAPR logo on the front and this year's theme on the back donated by the NASK wardroom. This was the second of two successful events the SAPR team conducted as fund-raisers for the Women's Shelter of South Texas.

After the welcome and opening remarks by Capt. Mark McLaughlin, Commanding Officer, and Command Master Chief Charlie Ratliff, AC2 Mary Greenwood-drumheller read a Presidential Proclamation for National Sexual Assault Prevention Month from President Barack Obama.

There are always at least three perspectives to any scenario, and with this particular subject there is the victim, the accused and everyone else.

Guest Speaker Elizabeth Lyman, a former Marine and assault victim, who is now assisting others as a victim advocate, shared her experience as a victim. Her emotional presentation highlighted the importance of what "hurts one affects all" truly means.

Lyman told of what she experienced and how the help of a Marine victim advocate got her through the ordeal. That one volunteer changed Lyman's approach to handling her personal crises, which in turn inspired her to come to the aid of others in similar situations.

The next speaker, Efrain Franco Jr., from Family Planning of the Coastal Bend/Male Central Clinic in Corpus Christi, offered a unique insight into what is considered the accepted display of emotion by males versus females in society. He spoke of the way males are taught from childhood that it is important the male to hide his true emotions and not openly share humiliating

experiences. Franco shared his experiences and opinions of one who works with male victims of sexual abuse.

"Franco put out some really good points I think most people are not aware of or consider," said IC1 (SW) Bernardino Martinez, a SAPR victim advocate. "He spoke of how the 'macho image' is considered to mean tough, strong and without vulnerability.

"Men should be able to protect themselves, and fight back, so it's thought to be unacceptable to believe a male has been victimized. This type of belief is completely misleading in reality," Martinez continued, "men are just as likely to be a victim as anyone else, because sexual abuse is not about the sex of the person; it is about power."

Once the presentations were complete, CS1 (SW) Erasmo Guerrero and FC2 (SW) Natascha Josey presented the guests with plaques in appreciation of their contribution to the program. The plaques were donated by Ground Electronics.

When asked why was it important for the SAPR Team to do an event like this, Frank Firmatura, director of the NASK Fleet and Family Support Center responded: "For too long sexual assault reporting has been a hush-hush subject.

"If you don't talk about it, then it is easy to convince yourself that it did not occur. That attitude has kept society from addressing the problem and coming up with solutions to end sexual abuse."

The NASK SAPR team used this venue to highlight one, that as a team, we are here to provide help to victims and two, we all have responsibilities to report sexual assault and take action to help prevent it from occurring in the future."

Thanks to the generosity of the SAPR Team, and other volunteers the attendees and guests were treated to some food and desserts.

All were well-fed and Rosa Balderas, FFSC Counseling and Advocacy Counselor, closed the event with a benediction.

Forfeited land sale

On Tuesday, April 26, the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB) will offer forfeited land tracts to eligible Texas veterans in a sealed-bid sale.

The one-year Residency Requirement has been eliminated. If you are a veteran living in Texas, regardless of when you moved here, you can qualify for a loan.

All winning bids financed through the VLB will be originated as a mortgage loan with a Note and Deed of Trust. Winning bidders must meet VLB credit requirements if obtaining VLB financing.

Closing costs and a down payment of not less than 5% of the minimum bid listed will be required at closing. The VLB can only finance 95% of the minimum bid listed up to \$80,000.00. In addition, any amount you bid over the minimum listed must be paid at closing, if you are obtaining VLB financing.

Type II Tracts (tracts that did not sell

through our sealed-bid sale) that have been on our website more than six months are now being marketed and sold by a private auction company, Hudson & Marshall. For more information, visit Hudson & Marshall's website at: www.txlandauction.com <<http://www.txlandauction.com>>.

All sealed bids must be received by 4:30 p.m. on Monday, April 25, the day before the sale. No walk-in bids will be accepted on the day of the sale.

There is a limit on the number of bids you may submit. You may bid on a total of six tracts in the Forfeited Land Sale and you must list your choice preferences on each bid.

The sale will be available for viewing via webcast. Live viewing is not guaranteed as we have a limited number of connections. The webcast will be archived and available on our web site approximately 24 hours after the sale.

Energy Facts: Did You Know?

- If you reduce the temperature setting of your water heater from 140o F to 120o F, you could save over 18% of the energy that was used at the higher setting. Even reducing the setting 10o F will save more than 6% in water-heating energy.

- If every American home installed low-flow aerators on all faucets, 250 million gallons of water would be saved every day.

- A dripping faucet can waste up to 20 gallons of water a day; a leaking toilet can waste up to 200 gallons of water a day.

- A new model refrigerator uses about a third the energy to operate as a similarly sized refrigerator from the early 1970s.

If you replace an older 18 cubic foot refrigerator with an energy-efficient model of the same size, each year you would save over 1,000 kWh of electricity and reduce emissions of carbon dioxide, a greenhouse gas, by over a ton and emissions of sulfur dioxide, the leading cause of acid rain, by over 20 pounds.

- Fluorescent lights convert electricity to visible light up to 5 times more efficiently than incandescent lights and last up to 20 times longer.

- The incandescent light is the most common lighting source in U.S. homes. It also wastes the most energy. Ninety percent of the energy consumed by an incandescent light is given off as heat rather than visible light.

- Replacing an incandescent bulb with a compact fluorescent will save the energy equivalent of 46 gallons of oil as well as one-half ton of carbon dioxide emissions over the lifetime of the bulb.

- One gallon of used motor oil when recycled yields the same amount of refined lubricating oil - 2.5 quarts - as 42 gallons of crude oil. Recycle used motor oil!



AUSTIN, Texas — First Lady Anita Perry will join the Texas Historical Commission (THC) for the Texas Main Street Program's First Lady's Tour. The tour is an annual event celebrating Texas Main Street Cities. The tour will welcome the new Texas Main Street cities of Uvalde and Vernon and also Kingsville, which is re-entering the program.

The schedule includes stops on Wednesday, April 27 in Kingsville from 10:15 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and on Friday, April 29 in Uvalde from 10:15 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and Vernon from 1:30 p.m. to 2:45 p.m. Each city will also host a brief media reception with the First Lady at the close of her visit.

"Growing up in a small town, I know the vital role downtown plays in a community," said Perry. "Being a Main Street city means citizens recognize that downtown is still the heart and soul of their community."

The Independent Bankers Association of Texas (IBAT) sponsors the 2011 First Lady's Tour. "For the past 17 years, IBAT has been proud to sponsor the First Lady's Main Street Tour. We are proud of our community banks, the Main Street banks, that help our local communities and Main Street businesses thrive and prosper," said IBAT President and CEO Chris Williston.

Mrs. Perry will give the keynote address at each celebration and a public reception follows the ceremony.

Each First Lady of Texas since the Texas Main Street Program's founding in 1981 has participated in this event, which has become a traditional honor for new Main Street cities.

The THC's Texas Main Street Program is a revitalization program for historic downtown and neighborhood commercial districts. Today, there are 87 official Texas Main Street programs. The programs are in cities and commercial neighborhood districts of all sizes, ranging from less than 2,000 to more than 220,000 in population, and in all areas of Texas.

Over time, Texas Main Street communities have realized more than \$2.3 billion in economic reinvestment, the creation of more than 26,000 local jobs and the expansion or creation of almost 7,000 businesses in their Main Street districts.

These reinvestments show that significant economic development impact can be realized through historic preservation.
