The U.S. Navy's Twenty-First Century Sailor Office was awarded two platinum level Marketing and Communications (MarCom) Awards Nov. 26 for excellence and creativity of the Navy's flagship responsible drinking campaign, "Keep What You've Earned," and its associated mobile application game.

we received from Sailors during the campaign's development," said Rear Adm. Sean Buck, director of the Twenty-First Century Sailor Office. "It is a true testament to the thoughtful planning, creativity, innovation, and hard work our Sailors and Navy personnel put into this campaign."

Legal: Collecting on a small claims judgement

Did you get a court judgment against someone you sued, but he or she still refuses to pay you? How can you get your money back?

Collections is still one of the more difficult areas of the law. The short answer to the questions above is to hire an attorney, whether the defaulting party lives in your state or in another state. Collecting on a judgment when the debtor refuses to pay voluntarily is much more complicated than the small claims case itself was. In most jurisdictions there are not sufficient resources to allow you to pursue your collections case without the professional help of an attorney.

If you sued someone who has no money, collecting from them when he or she refuses to pay voluntarily can be like trying to squeeze blood from a penny. If they had money, they may not have put you through the trouble of the small claims case to begin with! If you sued a person or a business with the means to pay you but simply refuses to, below are some of the options available to you:

Wage Garnishment. Almost all courts will allow you collect your judgment from the wages of the person you sued. This is provided that the person you sued has a job, you know where they work, and they don't quit that job after the judgment

against them has been issued. To collect from someone's wages, you will need a court order from the judge directing that the debtor's employer garnish the wages of their employee until the judgment is satisfied and turn the money over to you.

Bank Garnishment. You can also try to collect your judgment from the bank account of the person you sued. This requires that the person have a bank account, you know where they have an account, and they don't change banks once they figure out you might try to collect in this way. To find out where their bank account is, you will have to file a motion in the court to force the other party to disclose this information to you. To collect from someone's bank account, you will need a court order from the judge directing that the debtor's employer deduct the amount of the judgment from the bank account and turn the money over to you.

Personal or Real Property Liens. Another way to collect on your judgment is to get a court order to place a lien against any non-exempt personal or real property owned by the person you sued. If the person you sued is not a person of means, they are not likely to have any personal or real property that is non-exempt. In other words, you cannot take away the house that the person lives in, their only car, or the furniture they sit on. You could

force the sale of their boat or their 4-wheeler, in some cases, however. To find out what assets the other party has, you will have to file a motion with the court to force the other party to disclose this information to you. You could get a court order to place a lien against the property, allowing the sheriff to seize the property and sell it at a sheriff's sale, with the proceeds of the sale going to you to satisfy the judgment.

All of the remedies above require new court filings, following the judgment you received when you won your small claims case. Our society no longer believes it is prudent to imprison people simply because they cannot afford to pay their debts. There are more appropriate consequences, however, like placing the judgment against the other party's credit, getting liens against their property, and notifying their employer and their bank of their legal troubles. These remedies are best handled by an experienced attorney.

Applicants wanted for an exciting and challenging career with NCIS

Have you ever been curious about joining the Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS)? Do you have what it takes?

For those interested in joining, the requirements are: a four year bachelor's degree, be 21 to 37 years old and have 20/20 corrected vision. The prospective agent must be also willing to travel all over the world and be comfortable with carrying a weapon.

NCIS on board NCBC is responsible for investigating felony level crimes involving military personnel and their families attached to NCBC.

NCIS evolved from the Office of Naval Intelligence (ONI) during World War I, and later the Naval Investigative Service (NIS). ONI was established to investigate espionage, sabotage and any other threats to the U.S.

NIS was organized in 1966, and in the early 90s NCIS was formed. During 2000, Congress granted NCIS civilian special agents the authority to execute civilian warrants and arrests.

The purpose of NCIS is to investigate crimes, such as assault, sexual assault and homicides. NCIS has jurisdiction to conduct criminal investigations on and off of NCBC and other military installations.

NCIS also manages the Navy's Master-at-Arms (MAA) programs and oversees 8,800 MAAs, as well as the Military Working dog pro-

gram. There are 18 field offices and more than 165 independent offices all over the world. The NCIS office on board NCBC Gulfport is located on Barry Avenue, and is supervised by Supervisory Special Agent Brian Swords, who also manages NCIS offices in Pascagoula, New Orleans and Meridian.

Swords recommends that anyone with information regarding a crime that would like to remain unknown use the anonymous text tip line.

"Any suspicious activity people would like to bring to us, they can

text NCIS plus their information to 274637 (CRIMES)," said Swords. "It is completely anonymous. The tips are received by a company outside the U.S. They send us your tip only."

According to Swords, the majority of crimes investigated on board NCBC Gulfport involve alcohol, and he urges everyone to monitor their consumption.

"People get intoxicated and do regretful things," said Swords.

months since its launch," said Dorice Favorite, director of NADAP. "Thousands of campaign supporters have downloaded our campaign materials, viewed our public service announcements, and engaged with us on social media."

Favorite attributes the true success story to the Sailors themselves. "We saw a 51 percent decrease in alcohol incidents from Memorial Day through Labor Day compared to the same period last year," said Favorite. "Sailors are making responsible drinking choices. The achievement is theirs."

The overall Keep What You've Earned campaign was awarded at the platinum level against competitors in the category for integrated marketing campaigns, and Pier Pressure won platinum in the category for mobile apps. The app is set to launch in app stores later this year.

Visitor Unescorted Access:

Note: Per CNRSEINST 5530.1 visits must be escorted by their sponsor at all times while on board NCBC Gulfport.

Sponsors seeking visitor unescorted access must submit a request letter to the Pass and ID office. The request must:

- Identify the person(s) needing unescorted access
- Specify the start date and duration the person requires access
- Explain why unescorted access is required
- Be endorsed by the sponsor's command

The visitor must complete a criminal background form a minimum of three days prior to the visit.

The background form is available at and must be returned to the Pass and ID office. After all is approved, unescorted base access may be provided.

All contractors/vendors must complete the criminal background form a minimum of five business days before beginning work aboard CBC Gulfport. Additionally, a request from the sponsor must be submitted to the Pass and ID Office a minimum of three days in advance.

All of the above is subject to change based upon heightened security or increased Force Protection Conditions.

He shows us the right way to do it, demonstrates it clearly and makes sure each student understands before he moves on," explained Builder Petty Officer Second Class Nathan Darnell.

"BUC Chamberlin's instruction and facilitation style along with his military experience make him a well-rounded role model for his students to emulate," replied NCTC Command Master Chief Martin Laurie when asked what makes Chamberlin stand out as a Naval instructor.

"If a Sailor has the opportunity to become an instructor at a training command, either at an A-School, a C-School, or at Recruit Training Command, they should take it. We have a responsibility to train our reliefs." Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) (AW/NAC) Mike D. Stevens



Did You Know? RSV Infections and TRICARE authorized Emergency Rooms

Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV)

RSV is a respiratory viral infection that affects the lungs and respiration.

Symptoms of RSV usually last less than two weeks and is the common cause of bronchiolitis and pneumonia in children less than 1 year of age. People affected with RSV are usually contagious for 8 days or less.

RSV can be transmitted by droplets through the air by coughing and sneezing. Frequent hand washing and cleaning hard surfaces with a disinfectant cleaner will help stop the transmission of RSV.

TRICARE authorized Urgent Care solutions
If you seek care outside

of a military hospital or clinic, you should familiarize yourself with TRICARE-authorized freestanding emergency rooms or urgent care facilities (ERs), which are separate structures from hospitals and provide walk-in emergency care to the public.

Check the TRICARE provider status of a freestanding ER before you need emergency care. Some freestanding ERs may not be TRICARE-authorized. That means TRICARE will not cover facility fees and you will pay out of pocket for emergency care services.



January Fire Safety Message

From NCBC Gulfport Fire and Emergency Services

As the temperatures have plunged to record lows the past few weeks, we are reminded that it is very important to take precautions when using space heaters and generators. Consider the following when using supplemental heating sources:

- Plug your electric powered space heater into an outlet with sufficient capacity and NEVER into an extension cord.
- When buying a new space heater, make sure it carries the mark of an independent testing laboratory and is legal for use in your community; i.e. Underwriters Laboratory (UL).
- Install your stationary (fixed) space heater according to manufacturer's



instructions or applicable codes or better yet, have it installed by a professional.

- Keep things that can burn, such as paper, bedding or furniture, at least three feet away from heating equipment.
- Do not hang wet clothes on heater to dry.
- Ensure that space heaters have the tip over shutoff device.
- Remember to check the batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors.



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Suzuki Motor of America, Inc., Sport Bike Safety Recall

From NCBC Safety

Suzuki Motor Corporation has recalled 2004-2013 GSX-R600, 2004-2013 GSX-R750 and 2005-2013 GSX-R1000 Suzuki sport bike motorcycles due to a possible Master Cylinder issue.

After a long-term service life of the motorcycle without changing the brake fluid, the brake fluid can deteriorate and absorb moisture. The brake

piston inside the front brake master cylinder of some motorcycles may not have uniform surface treatment. This combination of conditions can lead to corrosion of the brake piston. Corrosion of the brake piston generates gas, which may not be adequately purged from the master cylinder due to the side position location of the reservoir port. Gas remaining in the master cylinder can affect braking power by reducing proper fluid pres-

sure transmission to the front brake. Over time, as gas continues to slowly accumulate above the reservoir port, the front brake lever may develop a "spongy" feel and stopping distances may be extended, increasing the risk of a crash.
