## 50 Years of Training Excellence

# SECNAV Announces Five New Principles for Navy Acquisitions

NATIONAL HARBOR, Md. (NNS) -- Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced five governing principles for Navy and Marine Corps acquisitions at the Navy League's annual Sea, Air, Space symposium May 5.

Designed to address the affordability of procurement programs, these principles are also intended to empower program managers to seek cost-savings, establish baseline performance parameters for Navy and Marine Corps programs, and support development of the acquisition workforce.

Similar to the Navy and Marine Corps' five energy goals outlined in October, Mabus outlined the acquisition principles the Navy plans to execute: clearly identify the requirements; raise the bar on performance; rebuild the acquisition workforce; support the industrial base; and "make every dollar count."

Mabus did, however, draw a clear distinction between the five energy goals and the acquisition principles, stating "These are not goals, these are imperatives, these are have to's. In order to build the fleet that we need – the Navy, the Marine Corps and our industry partners – we have to do all these things."

Discussing the first principle, Mabus said the Navy would put all programs through a formal Gate Review Process. This process will allow acquisition teams to properly analyze the requirements before granting a contract. "We're going to be doing this analysis on everything," the Secretary said, including the future SSBN, the Ohio-class replacement submarine and other initiatives.

Turning to the second principle, Mabus vowed to raise the bar on performance by holding both industry and the

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## Adopt-A-Veteran Program Participants Help Local WWII Vet

Military Appreciation Month usually involves local communities expressing their "thanks" for the efforts and sacrifices of military personnel. However, May 8, some Sailors from Training Air Wing FIVE and Naval Air Station Whiting Field showed their appreciation for the sacrifice of a local World War II veteran through some volunteer work on his home.

This was the second Adopt-A-Veteran project done this year in a partnership with the Santa Rosa County Veterans Services Center. Navy Counselor First Class Gwendolyn King and Aviation Boatswain's Mate First Class Shane Ammons coordinated the volunteers to help 85-year old Charles Locke - a Pearl Harbor survivor.

# TRICARE Notes

## WAIVING ACCESS TO CARE STANDARDS

*Access to care (ATC) standards help ensure that you can obtain primary care close to home. TRICARE Prime enrollees should seek primary care within a 30-minute drive and specialty care within a one-hour drive of your home. However, depending on location and military treatment facility (MTF) capability, you may be able to remain enrolled at your MTF even if you live more than 30 minutes away. Take the following actions to ensure continuous TRICARE coverage.*

**1. Keep DEERS information accurate. Regularly update your DEERS record. TRICARE uses your DEERS information, including addresses and phone numbers, to contact you regarding enrollment and coverage and to calculate your MTF drive time.**

**2. Submit an Access to Care Waiver Statement (DD Form 2876). If you live more than 30 minutes travel but fewer than 100 miles from your MTF, you may be able to enroll to the MTF, pending approval from your MTF.**

**3. Waive ATC standards in advance. Sign the waiver in advance to prevent enrollment delays**

Navy - Marine Corps acquisition team more accountable for what they do. "Quality has to improve, man hours have to come down, and budgets and milestones have to be met. That's the bar," he said.

In line with the second principle, Mabus also announced a new aviation and shipbuilding change-order policy that requires leadership review "to ensure that both unit cost and total ownership costs are considered before a change-order is approved." He said the Navy would redefine acquisition standards to allow for more industry collaboration.

Citing the third principle and current education programs in place, Mabus said, "the Navy and Marine Corps are creating wonderful opportunities for the future of America [that] will bring some very lasting benefits to our country." The secretary challenged his acquisition team to enhance these efforts with a plan "to double the Department of Navy's science, technology and engineering outreach" by 2015.

Mabus addressed the fourth principle by announcing establishment of an Industrial Base Council that will begin meeting later this year. The Council is intended to bring together representatives from major shipbuilding and aircraft firms and will be "an opportunity for [the Navy and Marine Corps] to be more informed about industry concerns," he said.

Mabus also encouraged top performing companies to improve performance so that they will qualify to join a Preferred Provider Program, expected to be released for comment in the Federal Register later this month. Through this program, the Navy would reward contractors with favorable contract terms, conditions and payment schedules "in return for consistent and exemplary contract performance." Mabus mentioned that energy efficient products and manufacturing capabilities would be part of entry criteria.

Mabus also said the Navy will turn to fixed-price contracts to "make every dollar count." Cost-plus contracts will only be used for high risk, first-of-class ships and other high-risk systems.

Mabus closed by saying "The Navy and the Marine Corps are the most formidable expeditionary fighting force the world has ever known. There has never been a force like the fleet we put to sea and the Marines that ride with that fleet and fight ashore. Building an effective partnership between industry and the Navy will reduce costs and will lead us to the fleet that we need. We owe that to America and we owe that to the generations that will follow us."

If everyone in North America cooked exclusively with a microwave for a year (not that you would ever do that), we'd save as much energy as the entire continent of Africa consumes during that same time.***

# Walsh Achieves AEM Certification

James Walsh, Naval Air Station’s Emergency Manager is one of six candidates approved by the IAEM Certification Commission to receive the Associate Emergency Manager (AEM) credential. The AEM designates a high honor of professional achievement available from the International Association of Emergency Managers (IAEM), which has in its membership more than 4,500 emergency managers representing local, state, and federal government; private industry; and military emergency managers. The new class of AEM’s joins over 1,480 other emergency managers who have been recognized for certification by IAEM since Jan. 1993.

IAEM administers the program for the profession, and policy decisions and judgments are made by a Commission of 19 respected professionals in the field. The Commission met Apr. 6-9 and approved applicants who successfully completed an extensive credentials package to include references, emergency and general management training, a management essay and a written examination. The management essay requires respondents to submit a response to a scenario they might face while fulfilling emergency management responsibilities.

To maintain certification, AEM recipients must submit additional training and contributions to the professional every five years. The AEM program was developed over the last several years by IAEM with funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and guidance from an advisory board which included professionals from a variety of disciplines and representatives of key groups with a stake in emergency management.

There are two tour routes available: the Adults Only Redlight Tour which includes the ghosts of the old bars and brothels and the Family Friendly Seville Tour which takes you through the Seville Square area. Tours run every 30 minutes between 7 and 8:30 p.m. and last one hour.

Tours are only \$10 for adults and children 12 and under are \$5. VISA, MASTERCARD, and Discover cards accepted. Walk-up tickets are available only during the summer due to the instability of the weather in Pensacola. Purchase your tickets at the Pensacola Historical Museum, 115 East Zaragoza Street. No refunds are available.
