The USO Naples Sesame Room at the Capodichino Air Terminal opened May 11 to an audience of military personnel, civilians and USO volunteers as Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Commanding Officer Capt. Robert Rabuse and USO Europe Volunteer of the Quarter MSCN Jessica Shepherd did the honors. Together, they cut the ribbon to reveal a brightly decorated playroom adorned with the beloved characters of Sesame Street.

Dedicated service members, who volunteered their time and energy afterhours, painted the walls and decorated room with Sesame Muppets, alphabet letters, art supplies, toys and books. They transformed the space into a place where military families can bring their

children to play and learn.

"Thanks to the generosity of Sesame Street, the support of NSA Naples and the committed effort of the members of the USO Naples Volunteer Committee, children in transit have a very special place to spend their transit time," said Sabrina Pullido, area director USO Naples and Rome.

In 2009, Sesame Workshop delivered a "room-in-a-box" to 35 locations across the United States—sending Sesame's Muppet characters to spread their furry, familiar cheer and brighten the children's spaces in military hospitals, libraries, child care centers and family support centers. The project was so well received that Sesame decided to roll out a second round of rooms.

NSA Naples was chosen to be the recipient of a Sesame

Room—this was the only installation in Europe chosen. Since over 20,000 passengers—many of them military families with small children—pass through the Capodichino Air Terminal each year, the location was a natural home for a Sesame Room.

The USO Naples Sesame Room is an extension of Sesame's ongoing partnership with the USO to provide support for America's military children through their "Talk, Listen, Connect" (TLC) program for military families.

Sesame Workshop's TLC program addresses the very difficult issues faced by military families—deployment, homecomings and changes. Military families visiting the USO Naples Sesame Room will be able to obtain a free copy of Sesame's TLC DVD.

## NSA Naples observes Holocaust Remembrance Week

Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples observed Holocaust Remembrance Week at the Support Site Reel Times 2 Cinema May 6.

The multi-media event, which was planned and conducted by the Combined Multicultural Heritage Committee (CMCHC), consisted of static visual display boards featuring stories and information about the Holocaust, and was followed up by a free screening of the film "The Boy in the Striped Pajamas."

Committee members designed information boards to depict a different aspect of the Holocaust. Posters covered everything from Anne Frank and Nazi and Allied propaganda to concentration camps and the symbolism used by both sides during the conflict. The film provided an opportunity for participants to learn more about the Holocaust in a realistic way and visually delve into the terrible events that took place during World War II.

"Studying the history of the Holocaust has opened my mind and changed my whole perspective on that event. I find it hard to believe that so many people perished under such brutal and harsh circumstances," said Intelligence Specialist 2nd Class Ashley Shaw, president of the combined multicultural committee.

The CMCHC program featured multiple perspectives on the Holocaust event to help ensure maximum impact on the Naples-area military members and families who attended the event.

"I'm glad we were able to help everyone come together to acknowledge and the people who lost their lives and those who stood up for the victims of this human tragedy," said Shaw. "It is my hope that everyone took something meaningful away from our remembrance of those lives shamelessly taken."

## NEX A-OK Student Rewards

The Navy Exchange (NEX) wants to help its customers pay for their children's college education through its A-OK Student Reward program. Four times per school year, four students will be the recipients of a \$5,000, \$3,000 \$2,000 or \$1,000 U.S. savings bond, and denominations at maturity. The next drawing will be held at the end of this month.

Any eligible full-time student who has a B-grade point average equivalent or better, as determined by their school system, may enter the drawing. Eligible students include dependent children of active duty military members, reservists and military retirees enrolled in first through 12th grade. Dependent children without an individual Dependent ID must be accompanied by their sponsor to submit their entry. Each student may enter only once each grading period and must re-enter with each qualifying report card. To enter the drawing, stop by the NEX with a current report card and have a NEX associate verify the minimum grade average. Then fill out an entry card and obtain an A-OK ID, which entitles the student to discount coupons for NEX products and services.

## Italian News Briefs

### Italians head to polls this weekend

Italians will go the polls to elect representatives to their local councils Sunday from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Monday from 7 a.m. to 3 p.m. Elections will be held in several Italian regions to elect the president and the provincial council of nine provinces; and to elect the mayor and the municipal council of 1,177 municipalities, including 23 provincial capitals like Milan, Bologna, Naples, Caserta, etc. Ballot counting will start Monday as soon as the poll closes. If there is a second ballot for the election of the president of provinces and mayors, the vote will take place May 29 and 30. On June 12 and 13, a referendum has been called to abrogate four different legal provisions. Voters will express their opinions on the following matters: public local services contracting and management; water management; nuclear power plants; and the legitimate impediment allowing the prime minister and ministers under investigation to delay court appearances if they clash with their official commitments.

### 14<sup>th</sup>-century fresco uncovered in Capri's oldest church

A local priest announced that a 14<sup>th</sup>-century fresco was found in the oldest church on the island of Capri. Sant'Anna was the main parish church in Capri until 1595, and it is located in a small building in the medieval borgo. Last summer during maintenance, the first piece of the fresco came to light when workers were buttressing a wall and a piece fell away. Recently, the wall covering the fresco was completely removed under the supervision of a Capri heritage expert, preservationist and architect from the arts superintendence in Naples. The fresco shows a crucifixion, and also features late-Gothic decorations and geometrical designs from the same period. Experts said it is of considerable artistic value. When the restoration will be completed, the work will be immediately shown off to visitors.

### Earn a degree in gelato

The Carpigiani Gelato University in Bologna is offering scholarships to foreigners who want to learn how to make ice cream in a four-week course. The 10 most talented and motivated students at the end of the course will be reimbursed for the entire course and

they will have seven days' experience in a gelato shop. The Carpigiani University was founded in 2003 as a training division of the Carpigiani group, which produces 70 percent of the world's ice cream machines. The course was first aimed at Italians, but it is now promoting one of Italy's favorite foods around the world. The university has large cooking laboratories equipped with 40 of the latest machines and offers courses in 10 languages. An international consulting and training company is involved in the project and will help graduates who want to open their own gelato shop anywhere in the world. The university has 20 experts and students travel from the United States, Australia, China, Lebanon and Africa to take part in its programs. The university runs six courses from beginner to advance.

### Police arrest Camorra boss

Police arrested a suspected Neapolitan Mafia clan boss in Naples and seized €600 million (\$858 million) of assets, including 300 apartments in Rome. Six other suspects were taken into custody. The Camorra clan started the construction business around Rome, controlling the entire economic sector—from coffee production to betting shops, distribution of beverages and pharmaceutical—in the northern Campania region and the southern Lazio region.

### Italy's Blue Flag beaches

The environmental body, Blue Flag, who works with the United Nations' environment program analyzed more than 3,000 beaches and marinas in 41 countries from Europe to South Africa. The Blue Flag program is owned and run by the independent non-profit Foundation for Environmental Education (FEE). In its 2010 review of 233 Italian beaches, the FEE found 17 beaches in the Liguria region that deserved its Blue Flag designation for high quality, cleanliness and respect for the environment. Tuscany and Marche each had 16 quality beaches, Abruzzo reached 14 beaches. Lazio region scored four Blue Flags while Sardinia scored five and Sicily six. The organization recognized 12 beaches around Campania, such as Massa Lubrense (Napoli); Positano, Agropoli, Castellabate, Montecorice-Agnone e Capitulo, Pollica-Acciaroli Pioppi, Casal Velino, Ascea, Pisciotta, Centola-Palinuro, Vibonati-Villammare, Sapri (Salerno).

## Grape adventures The perfect summer wine

As the weather heats up and thoughts turn to special occasions, outdoor celebrations and fireworks, the search is on for a wine to fill your glass. How about a light white wine with delicate and enticing aromatics to perk up your next barbecue? Even better if there is some sort of sparkle to it, you say, for warm nights filled with fireworks and friends? Your answer is, of course, Prosecco!

This light bubbly is made in the Veneto provinces of Conegliano and Valdobbiadene, and contrary to tradition is not named after either area (thank goodness!) but rather after the grape itself, Prosecco. The region tends to have cold winters, so in the past the wines slowly fermented in the cellar, leaving an end product with a bit of both CO<sub>2</sub> and residual sugar. Today, the wines are most often finished dry, and with over 28 million bottles a year, it is Italy's second most

popular "spumante" (sparkling) wine after Asti.

There are two main categories of sparkling wine production, and both require a second fermentation to create the beloved CO<sub>2</sub> bubbles. The classical method, often called either the "methode champenoise" or "methode traditional," involves a second fermentation in the sealed bottle itself, and often leads to a wine of more structure and complexity due to months of ageing. In contrast, the Charmat method involves a sealed, pressurized stainless steel tank. When the order comes in for more Prosecco, the winemaker will draw some of the still wine into the pressurized tank and induce a secondary fermentation, producing the CO<sub>2</sub> needed for bubbly.

The Charmat method marries well with the straw-colored Prosecco, helping to keep its aromas of melon, lemon, honey and toasted almonds intact. Another upside to the Charmat method is the relatively low cost of production, meaning that most bottles are in the affordable, daily-drinking price range. Prosecco is a versatile wine, pairing well with almost any food from pizza to sushi to burgers on the grill.

Prosecco flows freely in the afternoons in Venice, where it is considered an "ombrette" or pick-me-up. It is also the base for the city's signature cocktail, the "Bellini," a mix of Prosecco and fresh white peach puree. In Europe, the name Prosecco is protected under EU law, carries DOCG recognition, and is restricted to wines made from Prosecco grapes grown in the Conegliano or Valdobbiadene regions.

A time to scatter stones and a time to gather them,

A time for war and a time for peace.*

*What does the worker gain from his toil? I have seen the burden God has laid on men. He has made everything beautiful in its time. He has also set eternity in the hearts of men; yet they cannot fathom what God has done from beginning to end. (Ecclesiastes 3: 1-11, NIV)*

These words were penned in biblical times by the great King Solomon, who was considered to be among the wealthiest—and definitely the wisest—of all the kings in the world. As King Solomon reflected on all of the circumstances of life—and on all of the various circumstances that he had observed in the lives of others—he made an amazing discovery: Many of the things in life that did not seem to make sense at the time—when they were actually happening—made perfect sense to him now. 

# Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active-duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

**NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.**

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.

**GIVE IT A REST.** Use the ENERGY STAR power management settings on

your computer and monitor so they go into save mode when not in use. Also use a power strip as a central "turn off" point to completely disconnect equipment from the power supply.

**UNPLUG IT.** Unplug electronics such as cell phones and laptops once they are charged. Adapters plugged into outlets use energy even if they are not charging.

**LIGHT UP YOUR WORKLIFE.** Replace the light bulb in your desk lamp with an ENERGY STAR bulb, which will last up to 10 times longer and use 75 percent less energy. Turn off the lights when you leave, especially at the end of the day.

**LET IT FLOW.** Keep air vents clear of paper files and office supplies. It takes as much as 25 percent more energy to pump air into the workspace if vents are blocked.

**TEAM UP.** Create a green team with your co-workers and help build support for energy efficiency in your workplace.

# TRICARE Young Adult Program

The TRICARE Young Adult (TYA) program is a premium-based health care plan available for purchase by qualified dependents. TYA offers TRICARE Standard coverage worldwide, and TRICARE Prime coverage will be available for purchase at a later date. TYA includes medical and pharmacy benefits, but excludes dental coverage.

## Who is eligible?

If you are an adult-age dependent, you may purchase TYA coverage based on the eligibility established by your uniformed service sponsor and where you live. **Note:** Special eligibility conditions may exist.

You may purchase TYA coverage if you are *all* of the following:

- A dependent of an eligible uniformed service sponsor,
- Unmarried,
- At least age 21 (or age 23 if enrolled in a full-time course of study at an approved institution of higher learning and if the sponsor provides at least 50 percent of the financial support), but have not yet reached age 26,
- Not eligible to enroll in an employer-sponsored health plan as defined in TYA regulations,
- Not otherwise eligible for TRICARE program coverage.

*If you are an adult child of a non-activated member of the Selected Reserve of the Ready Reserve or of the Retired Reserve, your sponsor must be enrolled in TRICARE Reserve Select or TRICARE Retired Reserve for you to be eligible to purchase TYA coverage.*

## Purchasing TRICARE Young Adult

TYA offers open enrollment, so if you qualify, you may purchase coverage at any time. The TRICARE Young Adult Application is available at [www.tricare.mil/tya](http://www.tricare.mil/tya). When applying, you must verify that you are not married and not eligible to enroll in an employer-sponsored health plan.

Your completed application must include the first three months of premium payments, paid by personal check, cashier's check, money order, or credit/debit card. After the initial three-month payment, premiums must be paid in advance by monthly automated payment.

Drop off your completed application and initial premium payment to a TRICARE Service Center, or mail or fax it to your regional contractor. **Note:** If you are not already in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS), your sponsor must add you to the system before starting the application process.

## Enrollment in TRICARE Young Adult

After enrolling in TYA, you and your sponsor will need to visit a uniformed services identification (ID) card issuing facility to obtain an ID card for you. You must bring two forms of ID—one must be an unexpired government-issued ID card containing a picture. After your application and payment are received, TRICARE Standard coverage will begin the first day of the following month.

## Retroactive coverage

You may purchase TRICARE Standard coverage retroactively back to Jan. 1, 2011, or back to the date you became eligible for coverage. All premiums must be paid back to that date in order to be reimbursed. Beneficiaries who may want to purchase retroactive coverage should keep receipts for care received to get reimbursed for covered services. The opportunity to purchase retroactive coverage ends Sept. 30, 2011. **Note:** Retroactive coverage is limited to the TRICARE Standard benefit only.

## Covered services

At first, the TYA benefit only includes TRICARE Standard. The TYA benefit will expand to other TRICARE programs (e.g., TRICARE Prime) at a later date. TYA coverage includes medical and pharmacy, but excludes dental. TYA enrollees are eligible for care at military treatment facilities on a space-available basis. TYA is only available for individuals and is not offered as a family plan. For more information, visit [www.tricare.mil/coveredservices](http://www.tricare.mil/coveredservices).

## Ending TRICARE Young Adult coverage

### Choosing to End Coverage

You may choose to end TYA coverage at any time by completing the fields related to terminating coverage on the TRICARE Young Adult Application and submitting it to your regional contractor. If you decide to end TYA coverage, you will be locked out from purchasing TYA coverage for one year from the date of termination. There will be no lockout if the coverage is terminated because you gain access to employer-sponsored coverage.

### Nonpayment

Your premium payment is due no later than the last day of the month for the next month's coverage. Failure to pay total premium amounts due and any insufficient fund fees owed will result in a termination of coverage. A 12-month TYA purchase lockout will go into effect.

### Change in status

Your sponsor must always report all family and status changes to DEERS.

Your TYA coverage ends when any of the following occurs:

- You reach age 26,
- You get married,
- You become eligible for an employer-sponsored health plan as defined in TYA regulations,
- You gain other TRICARE coverage,
- You lose eligibility because your sponsor ends TRICARE coverage.

## CPO 365 helps mentor first class petty officers

Chief Petty Officer (CPO) 365 is a year-long mentoring program, created by the Master Chief Petty Officer of Navy, to guide first class petty officers on their journey to becoming chief petty officers.

"This is a team-building and training evolution that the Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy started to help perspective chief petty officers," said Chief Operations Specialist (SW) Marvin Barnes, an instructor for CPO 365. "What we are trying to do here is make sure that our first class petty officers have the tools so that when they step into the goat locker, they will be effective leaders."

CPO 365, a three-phase program, develops leadership skills within first class petty officers. Phase one provides the foundation of the program and includes mentoring in some of key components of being a chief petty officer, such as teamwork, naval history and physical training.


Phase two begins when the board-eligible results are released and builds upon what was started in phase one. In this phase, board-eligible first class petty officers are

further prepared to cross into being a productive member of the CPO Mess.

"I believe that this is a good tool and that it will help us grow as sailors and become better leaders," said Information Systems Technician 1st Class (IDW/SW) Allen Green, an attendee of the CPO 365 training session at Naval Support Activity Naples. "This course has helped me to identify the things that I need to improve on to help myself and my junior sailors."

Barnes added that the new approach will help to alleviate some of the time constraints that were presented in the past and open up more opportunities for networking. "Weekly lesson plans have also been incorporated to include topics ranging from professionalism, leadership, naval heritage, character and loyalty to help broaden the knowledge and scope of the PCPOs [prospective chief petty officers] so that they will be better prepared when they enter phase three," said Barnes.

Phase three begins when CPO-selectees are announced. This phase, the actual chief induction season, is the final training period and culminates in the pinning of gold-fouled anchors during Chief Induction.
