Open houses discuss final results of public health environmental study

This week, the Navy held open house information sessions for the conclusion of the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE), a three and a half year environmental study that evaluated potential health risks related to waste disposal for U.S. personnel living in the Naples area. Subject matter experts were on hand to discuss the findings of the study, answer questions, describe actions taken by Navy to protect health, and share health protective actions U.S. personnel should take while living in Naples.

Throughout the PHE, the Navy identified specific concerns and took action to protect the health of U.S. personnel and their families. Based on the final PHE report, health protective processes already in place as a result of 2008 findings will continue and new processes will be implemented for continued health protection.

introduced his relief, Capt. Scott Gray, an aviator who has most recently served as Plans Director at Navy Warfare Development Command in Norfolk, Va.

Capt. Rabuse gave the most exciting news of the evening—he has secured the funds required to create a dog run at the Support Site. But for those with small dogs, a gap under the fence will remain. There is not enough funding available to extend the fence to the ground. Contractors are currently working on a plan to adjust the force protection measures installed along the fence line.

Members of the audience then asked Capt. Rabuse the following questions:

Q: Will the grass at the Support Site be mowed more frequently now that it is summertime?

A: The mowing schedule is determined by length of grass. One of Mirabella's three mowers has been out of service recently. Given the fertile environment at the Support Site, there are areas that are well beyond both the Facilities and Housing specification. Mirabella will make every effort to catch up as soon as the

Italian News Briefs

Quorum reached for Italian referendum vote

Italians voters rejected four of the government's legislative proposals for the referendums held June 12 and 13. Officials confirmed Monday that enough people went out to vote; a quorum of 57 percent had been reached. Italians rejected the call to restart the nuclear program by 94 percent of those who voted. Italy's nuclear program was abandoned in the late 1980s soon after the Chernobyl disaster. Plus, 95 percent opposed the privatization of water, and 96 percent voted against water charges being proportionate to the investments made by the utility company. Electors counted a total of 95 percent of the votes to overturn a law that permits ministers to not attend trials because of scheduling conflicts with official business.

Female soldier among 11 arrested in mafia bust

Police arrested 11 people Tuesday on suspicion of association with the Naples crime syndicate. Among those arrested was a 25-year-old female soldier from Naples, who was arrested by her military barracks in Ascoli Piceno, in the central Marche region, where she was stationed. She allegedly worked as a driver for fugitive members of the Camorra's powerful Casalesi clan and delivered meals to their hide-outs. The arrested people will face charges of abetting Casalesi bosses and other Camorra fugitives.

Jousting tournament in Benevento province

Melizzano is a town located about 45 km northeast of Naples. This small town evokes medieval appeal in its architecture and narrow streets and alleys, making it the perfect stage for a unique week-long event. The Joust of the Quintana is a medieval event that starts with a big costume parade. Flag bearers, archers and musketeers lead the way to the

jousting tournament. Five districts (or "contrade") of the town select their best "knights" to compete as horsemen armed with spears, running on horses and throwing themselves against a figure representing a Saracen. They have to insert a ring that shrinks at each step. Many parties are organized within the town. Exhibitions, cultural events and walks along the nature trails on the Taburno Mountain abound. Tourists can enjoy guided tours of the medieval castle that overlooks the main piazza. Wineries open their doors and also offer tastings of olive oil, wine and desserts. The event starts Sunday, June 19 with the matching ceremony of the knights to the five districts, and it ends the following Sunday, June 26 with a medieval parade at 10 a.m., the opening of the taverns at 12:20 p.m., the medieval parade with the complete formation 5:30 p.m. and finally the much anticipated the Joust of the Quintana at 7 p.m. For more information, visit www.quintanastorica.it.

Cell phone tour guide

Barga is a small village of 800 inhabitants located in Lucca province in Tuscany. It is a casket of beauty and extraordinary flavors, and every year, Barga hosts a jazz festival. Now thanks to an Irish artist, visitors to the town can now unlock the town's history with just a wave of a cell phone. Bar codes have been installed at restaurants, coffee shops, churches, statues and places of interest around Barga. Just tap your cell phone on the bar code plaque to reveal the town's history in 10 languages. The idea came to an Irish painter and expert in technology who created the "iBarg code." Free software compatible with all types of smart phones and PCs is available online. The Irish expert also placed bar codes, which release poems by the famous Italian poet Giovanni Pascoli, in the woods of Barga.


A daytrip to the Cuma ruins

Cuma was once a thriving Greek city, located just northwest of Naples. It was the first Greek settlement on mainland Italy and is thought to have been founded in the early eighth century B.C.

Cuma came under Roman rule in 338 B.C. after Rome's intervention during the Samnite Wars five years earlier. The people of Cuma were granted *civitas sine suffragio* (citizenship without voting rights). During World War II, the seaward side of Cuma's rise was employed as a strategic bunker and gun emplacement by the Germans.

Ancient Cuma's archeological ruins are still standing and open to the public. Most notably,

the Sanctuary of the Sybil, discovered in 1932, is on the grounds. Sybil, Apollo's prophetess, admitted worshippers and prophesied there. The cave is 131 meters long and wonderfully preserved—it's sure to be the highlight of any visit. Among the many ruins, the Temple of Zeus is also accessible to visitors. Open fields are perfect for afternoon picnics, and the site offers panoramic views of the Mediterranean Sea, Ischia and Pozzuoli. The Cuma ruins open daily at 9 a.m. and close an hour before sunset. Tickets cost €4.

Access the site from the Tangenziale (north from Capodichino), exit Lago d'Averno. Follow the road past the lake, left at the statue of Jesus and through the Arco Felice. Continue down the road and turn right when you reach the intersecting street. The ruins will be on your left. The address is Pozzuoli, via Monte di Cuma 3, and GPS coordinates are 40°50'55"N 14°03'13"E.

Grape adventures Campanian whites

Many historians point to the islands of Ischia and Capri as the first landing places of Greek explorers, with the city of Neapolis (Napoli) not far behind. Several of the grape varieties found here are unknown or not grown in other parts of the wine world, and most, if not all, were probably brought by the Greeks. Native, or autochthonous (awe-TOCK-ton-us), grapes in Campania are still the primary components of many of today's local wines. Let's begin with local whites, perfect for summer, with light, fresh seafood dishes and balmy evenings.

Fiano (FEE-anno) is a white grape of great antiquity. The modern name is a variation on *Vitis Apiana*, or wine of the bees, since the grapes were well known for attracting the insects. Today, Fiano is often made into a

dry wine, known for its nuttiness (think hazel and pine nuts), and flavors of crisp apple. Fiano is grown throughout Campania, where it can be classified as a DOC wine. However, Fiano di Avellino is a DOCG wine whose zone occupies a small area in the mountains near the city of Avellino. Fiano di Avellino is characterized by elegance, spice and intense, fruity aromas.

Falanghina (Fall-un-GHEE-na), whose name derives from the Latin noun "falangae," or stakes used to support growing vines, is the most widely grown white grape in and around Naples and Caserta. The grape is extremely popular with growers due to its naturally high acidity and hardy nature. Still, sparkling, and dessert wines are made with Falanghina grapes. Many local wines are made without exposure to oak barrels, but it is possible to find wines in which a percentage of production has been barrel aged or fermented to produce a wine with slightly more body and finesse. Common flavors found in Falanghina are apples, subtle spices, fresh minerality, and a pleasant floral finish.

Greco (GRAY-co) is another of the Campanian wine grapes of Greek origin, hence the name "Greco." Famous even in antiquity, we find it in a Pompeian fresco, "You are truly cold, Bytis, made of ice, if last night not even greco wine could warm you up." Today, Greco is grown on the islands of Ischia and Capri, as well as being one of the components of the white blend



Lacyrma Christi. Greco di Tufo DOCG is a wine produced from Greco grapes grown in the villages of Tufo and seven others in the surrounding hillsides near Avellino. Both a still white and a sparkling white are permitted, although the still wine is far more popular. The vineyard soils, known as Tufa, are composed of volcanic ash and rocks. The wine is known for its perfume, complexity, and minerality, with aromatic notes of lemons, pears, toasted almonds and lingering, mineral finish.

These are only three of the local white grapes of Campania, but they are the most common, both here and as U.S. imports. Aspirinio, Biancolella, Coda di Volpe—these wines await us for another time, or another dinner table. Salute!

Morale Welfare and Recreation (MWR)'s Child and Youth Programs (CYP) will offer soccer and flag football summer camps for kids ages 9 to 14.

The soccer camps take place from July 6 to July 8, and again from Aug. 3 to Aug. 5. The flag football camps take place from July 13 to July 15, and again from Aug. 10 to Aug. 12. All camps occur from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. at the Support Site, with the exception of the first soccer camp, which takes place at Carney Park.

"These camps are great for those families still in town during the summer vacation months," said CYP Naples Youth Sports Coordinator Geraldo Troiano. "For three days, your child can learn about these sports under the supervision of a talented, certified staff member."

Troiano also said the summer camps are a great way to prepare for participation in the same sports during the fall. "If you're planning on having your

child enroll in soccer or flag football later on in the fall season, these camps are great for keeping kids ready," said Troiano.

CYP Program Assistant Aaron Donville believes parents should encourage their kids to get outside and be active. "Kids who have never experienced a sport are trained by our youth sports program, which follows guidelines that help develop a positive experience."

These guidelines, Troiano explained, stress the concepts of participation, learning, teamwork, and fun, more so than winning and competition. He also said each camp participant gets a jersey to wear; red ones

Leaving kids home alone

It's summertime and school is out! As a parent you may be trying to decide if your child is old enough to be left unsupervised

and for how long a period of time. To assist you in your decision making, the installation has released an installation instruction entitled "Supervision of Minor Children," or NAVSUP-PACT NAPLES INST 1754.7.

Parents and guardians have primary responsibility for appropriate and adequate supervision of their minor family members and guests at all time, whether on or off base, to ensure they are safe and they pose no danger to themselves, others or

the public peace by their actions. This instruction provides general guidance on restrictions that apply to all children. As a parent you should assess your child's developmental and maturity levels, and if necessary raise the minimum age limits listed in this instruction to ensure your child's safety and well-being. The chart below provides a quick reference for parents; however you are encouraged to read the instruction in its entirety.

Parents are responsible for the behavior, safety, proper discipline and well being of their children, regardless of age. Parents should assess their child's developmental and maturity levels, and if necessary raise the minimum age limits outlined below.

**Children under 12 years of age will not babysit other children, including their siblings. Baby sitters 12 to 15 years of age may supervise until 12 a.m. but are not allowed to sit all night. Adolescents 14 and 15 years of age who have completed the Red Cross babysitting course are eligible to babysit until 2 a.m.


for flag football and green ones for soccer.



Health protective processes already implemented and will remain in place include:

- **Bottled water advisory.** Implemented in July 2008, U.S. personnel living off-base are advised to use bottled water for drinking, cooking, food preparation, brushing teeth, making ice and for pets.
- **Health protective lease clauses for off-base rentals.** Implemented in November 2008, landlords are required to provide bottled water service from a Navy approved vendor, clean and disinfect the home's water holding tank twice per year, and connect the home to municipal water supply or permitted drinking water well and disconnect from nonpermitted wells.
- **New Lease Suspension Zones.** Established in November 2008, the three areas off limits for new rentals will remain in place.
- **Online Health Information Updates.** For the most up-to-date information visit the Naples Community Health Awareness website at <http://www.cnic.navy.mil/Naples/About/HealthAwareness>.
- **Education and Counseling at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples Environmental Health Information Center (EHIC).** Additional measures under development include:
 - More robust health risk education programs for U.S. personnel living in Naples.
 - Modifications to Housing's database system to distribute reminders to residents and landlords about cleaning and disinfecting the home's water holding tank every six months.
 - U.S. Naval Hospital Naples will continue the monitoring of Italian environmental and health-related information and public health information available to U.S. personnel.

"It's a shared responsibility for those of us stationed here in Naples," said Cmdr.(Dr.) Tim Halenkamp, director of public health at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples. "We at the EHIC are always available to educate residents and meet with them to discuss individual risk and mitigation actions they can take. We, as residents, and I include myself in that group since I live here too, have to educate ourselves and implement the recommendations that will help us avoid some of the risks identified in this study."

Three open house sessions were held this past Wednesday and Thursday, at Capodichino and the Support Site. A fourth session will be held today from 10 a.m. to noon at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples. Subject matter experts from CNREURAFSWA, NSA Naples, U.S. Naval Hospital Naples, and Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center are available to discuss the study and specific findings on tap water, soil, soil gas, air, food, health and epidemiological studies, and housing. If you are unable to attend an open house session, staff at the EHIC, located at U.S. Naval Hospital Naples, will be available to provide information about the study and discuss your health-related questions. EHIC can be reached at 081-811-6299.

Katy Makee, a resident living in Succivo, came to the Wednesday open house to get the details of the PHE. "I've gotten a lot of reassurance from the measures put in place," she said. "It's a very comprehensive study." She also said that she thought it was important for people to take the time to read up on it and educate themselves about the findings of the study.

On June 7 and 8 meetings were held for tenants that had their off-base rental home sampled during Phase II of the PHE (Nov. 2008 to Oct. 2009). Tenants were invited to attend the meetings to review the results of the sam-

pling conducted at their home and to receive an overview of the study. Tenants who had their home sampled received an e-mail with a link to download a report containing their individual sampling results. Phase II tenants who need assistance with downloading and reviewing their report should contact EHIC at 081-811-6299.

Launched in 2008 and completed in June 2011, the Naples Public Health Evaluation was designed to evaluate the potential health risks associated with living in the Naples area as a result of inadequate trash collection, uncontrolled open burning of uncollected trash, and dumping of uncategorized waste. The Navy conducted environmental sampling of tap water, irrigation water, soil, soil gas and air from 395 square miles of the Campania Region. The Navy also conducted specialized studies, including epidemiological studies on asthma, birth defects, cancer; a food study; and a vapor intrusion study at Capodichino and Support Site. Strain equals pain



Cumulative trauma disorders (CTDs) are injuries that affect the muscles, tendons and nerves around the joints of the body. They can be caused by the strain of doing the same task repeatedly. Also known as repetitive motion injury, CTDs often occur in the neck, shoulders, back, elbows, wrists, hands and knees.

Some of the occupations most likely affected are painters, cashiers, keypunch operators, assembly workers, welders, hairdressers, mechanics and telephone operators; however, there are many other professions equally affected.

Some leading factors resulting in CTDs:

- CTDs are more likely to occur if your work requires you to do the same motion repeatedly. Injury to muscles, tendons or nerves may occur over time due to overuse.
- Another risk factor which may result in a CTD is using excessive force. When you exert extra force or pressure to perform the work, strain and stress result on a specific part of the body.
- Working in an awkward and unnatural position can also lead to a CTD. Prolonged overhead work is a common example.
- Working with vibrating tools or equipment is another risk factor for a CTD.
- Working in a cold environment slows circulation and decreases flexibility which can contribute to a CTD.

Here are some suggestions to prevent a CTD:

- Beware of the hazards in your job. Examine the manner in which you do your work. Look for repetitive motion, awkward postures, exposure to cold and vibrating tools and equipment.
- Find safe ways to change your work habits to reduce these risks. Seek help when lifting objects. Take the time to position tools correctly before using them. Find the comfort zone for your work.
- Arrange your work station to minimize bending, stretching and twisting movements.
- Use padded tools, padded gloves and other items to reduce exposure to vibration.
- Grip objects with your whole hand and your finger. Avoid picking up items with your thumb and fingers only. If you use a tool so that its end is in the palm of your hand, you are subjecting your hand to unnecessary force.
- Pay attention to warning signs from your body. If you are developing aches in your joints, figure out what motions are causing them and find a different way to work. Inform your supervisor of the symptoms, and speak with your doctor promptly.

Find ways to work that minimize stresses and strains. Get treatment right away if you are experiencing prolonged symptoms. Remember your Safety Office can also provide ergonomics training!

AFN Europe moving to new satellite

AFN's satellite delivery platform is changing, requiring viewers who have an AFN decoder and satellite dish in their home to make some changes by July 31 to continue to get AFN TV.

"We know this change will inconvenience folks," says AFN Europe Commander Bill Bigelow. "But we're doing all we can to help viewers make the necessary adjustments. We've set up a toll-free help desk, on-line manuals, and how-to videos to try and facilitate a smooth transition to the new satellite."

The AFN Help Desk will be manned Tuesday through Friday from 1 to 9 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. (Central European Time). Viewers from Germany, Italy, Belgium, the U.K. and most other European countries will be able to call the toll-free number: 00800-2362683662 (00800-afnantenna).

Since the process of setting up a dish and re-adjusting a decoder varies according to decoder model, location and other variables, the help desk and on-line materials are especially critical. AFN Europe has posted manuals and how-to-videos in English, German and Italian at www.afneurope.net. Click on the Eurobird 9A icon for the manuals and videos.

Direct-to-home viewers will need to reconfigure their home decoder and realign their satellite dish from the current satellite Hotbird 6/9 at 13 degrees East, to the new satellite, Eurobird 9A (EB9A) at 9 degrees East.



Places to See Geneva—Scenic city on the shore of Lac Léman

If you're looking for a quick and easy vacation getaway, Geneva, Switzerland is a great place to go. It's an attractive and clean city, with plenty of things to see and do; and it's an interesting and convenient place to explore on foot.

Surrounded by the Jura Mountains and the Alps, Geneva is located around the southwestern corner of Lac Léman (Lake Geneva), where the Rhône River exits the lake for its journey through France. Bordered on three sides by France, with French as the main language, the city's style and character are distinctly French.

A global city and worldwide financial center, Geneva is the second most populous city in Switzerland after Zurich. It is also the center of the Swiss watch industry, and all of the major Swiss watchmakers—like Rolex, Omega and Tissot—have headquarters there. There are thousands of watches and other timepieces on display in dozens of impressive showrooms and stores throughout the city center. In the northern section of the city is the Palais des Nations complex, the headquarters of the

European United Nations. Nearby is the headquarters building of the International Red Cross.

Among the highlights of my visit was a climb up the bell tower of the Saint Pierre Cathedral, where I enjoyed spectacular panoramic views over the city and lake. From the tower, I could see the Jet d'Eau (Water Jet), an impressive fountain that shoots a stream of water to a height of about 460 feet above the lake. Located on a small jetty off the southern shore of the lake, it was first installed in 1886, but the present fountain dates to 1951. Since 2003, the fountain operates every day, except in very cold or windy weather. It pumps 132 gallons of lake water per second, and there are about 1850 gallons of water in the air at any given moment. Pedestrians can walk out close to the fountain but risk getting soaked if the wind direction shifts.

The cathedral dates to the 12th century and was the home church

of John Calvin, one of the key leaders of the Protestant Reformation. It was built on a hill above the lake over the ruins of thousands of years of history. The area beneath the cathedral has been excavated, and the ruins that have been revealed date

back to Roman times. The ruins are now part of a small museum. Another landmark of the city is the Wall of the Reformers, an international monument to the Protestant Reformation. The wall, built in 1909-17, is 325 feet long and 30 feet high. The impressive 16-foot statues of

William Farel, John Calvin, Theodore Beza and John Knox—four key Protestant reformers who were together in Geneva in 1559—form the centerpiece of the wall.

I enjoyed long walks along the lake shore, through scenic parks and a picturesque botanical garden. The city center is also a great place to explore, and I followed a history trail that took me down cobblestone streets past many historic buildings and landmarks. On the Island of the Tower in the middle of the Rhône, I saw a bronze plaque commemorating Julius Caesar's visit to Geneva in 58 B.C. during his Gallic Wars. On the Island of Rousseau, there is a statue of that famous 18th century philosopher-writer, who was born in Geneva.

So, if you're looking for an interesting and easy place to spend a few days, Geneva is a good choice. It's only a 90-minute flight from Naples, and a train will take you from the airport to the city center in about 15 minutes.


