Italian employee retires after 38 years of dedicated service

Antonietta Mercaldo retired June 30 after completing nearly 40 years of service to the U.S. Navy.

Mercaldo began working for Allied Forces Southern Europe in Bagnoli, Naples in 1973 as a secretary. Later that same year, she was hired by the Navy Exchange at Naval Support Activity Naples as a procurement clerk.

In March 1979, she was hired by Naval Regional Contracting Detachment (NRCD) Naples, formerly called Naval Regional Procurement Office (NRPO), as a contract assistant. In October 1989, she was promoted to contract specialist and was assigned various high value contracts, such as Air Terminal Naples, husbanding service contracts for the French Riviera and all Sicilian ports, among many others, which were carried out in an extremely outstanding manner. In 2000, Mercaldo received a Special Act Award for the exemplary performance on processing two of the three largest contracts ever processed by the NRCD Naples.

Italian News Briefs

6th-century fresco discovered in Naples catacombs

During restoration work at the Catacombs of San Gennaro in Naples, a sixth-century fresco of Saint Paul came to light. Experts from the Pontifical Commission of Sacred Art described the finding as "sensational" and one of the most austere figures of late antiquity. The apostle Saint Paul is depicted with a long neck, thinning hair, big eyes and a slightly pink complexion. The saint is wearing a tunic with the letter "I" on the hem, which may stand for "Iesus," the Latin word for Jesus. According to experts, on the right side of the fresco there would have been an image of Saint Peter that has not survived the last 1,500 years.

Florence's petition for the Louvre's Mona Lisa

In Florence, a group of Italians are planning to gather 100,000 signatures to petition the Louvre to allow the Mona Lisa a visit to Florence in 2013. The loan would celebrate the anniversary of the work being found in Florence in 1913, two years after it had been stolen from the Louvre. The petition for the loan started after the Paris museum crushed Florence's hope of featuring the famous painting in an upcoming exhibition, saying that transporting it was unthinkable due to its fragility. The painting was stolen from the Louvre in 1911, and one of the thieves was an Italian man who tried to sell it in Florence two years later. After recovering the painting, it was briefly exhibited in Florence and Rome before it went back to the Louvre. Then, the painting traveled to the United States in 1962 and Japan and Moscow in the 1970s.

Tourism on the rise in Italy

Italy is attracting more tourists this summer. According to Federturismo (the Italian tourism board) the number of visitors has increased by 1.8 percent compared to last year. European visitors are expected to rise by 9.3 percent, while American tourists by 5.3 percent. Tuscany remains one of the top three destinations for international tour operators, and the other two most popular regions are the Veneto with Venice and Lazio with Rome. The high-

est records are expected in cruise travel, agriturismo (similar to a bed and breakfast on farm) stays and tourism related to health and fitness.

Woody Allen to receive award at Ischia Film Festival

Beginning Saturday, July 2, Ischia will host the Ischia Film Festival. New York-based film director Woody Allen will receive an award for choosing Italy as one of the locations for his new film as well as his love for the country and its culture. His new film, "The Bop Decameron," will be shot in Rome later this month and stars Alec Baldwin, Penelope Cruz and Roberto Benigni. The festival was founded in 2003 by Italian producer and entrepreneur Pascal Vicedomini, who also founded the Capri Hollywood Film Festival in 1995. The Ischia festival has become very popular, and this year, many foreign celebrities will attend, including directors Paul Haggis, Terry Gilliam and Tom Hooper.

New World Heritage Sites announced

The UNESCO World Heritage Commission named the Church of Santa Sofia in Benevento, located 50 kilometers northeast of Naples, a UNESCO World Heritage Site at a meeting in Paris Monday. The church dates from the German Lombard civilization of the sixth through eighth centuries. The Lombards of Longobards migrated from northern Europe to Italy and influenced architectural style. Seven groups of important buildings, including fortresses, churches and monasteries, represent Lombard architecture in Italy, and they were added to the list of World Heritage Sites. Three sites are located in northern Italy with the Santa Giulia monastery in Brescia, the tower at Castelseprio near Varese and a collection of restored ruins at Cividale del Friuli, which was the first Lombard city in Italy; two sites are in Umbria with the Church of San Salvatore in Spoleto and the Tempietto at the Campello sul Clitunno. In the south, besides Benevento, there is the shrine of Saint Michele at Monte Sant'Angelo near Foggia, in Puglia Region. Italy currently has 46 UNESCO World Heritage Sites—more than any other country in the world.

Patrons and their guests are encouraged to arrive early or to ride the MWR bus as traffic gets heavy, especially between 8 to 9:30 p.m. each night. The last entry to the park is at 10 p.m.

Increased force protection

Naval Support Activity Naples will increase force protection measures, not only at Carney Park, but all bases. Vehicle and bag checks may be in effect. Expect increased DUI checkpoints. No pets will be allowed in Carney Park past 11 a.m. July 2 and not at all July 3.

Fireworks policy

The detonation and/or possession of any fireworks (for sale, storage or use) is prohibited on any base, except for command controlled displays. This restric-

tion also applies to government housing. The following fireworks are illegal in Italy: Bottle Rockets, M-80's, Cherry Bombs and all shells/mortars.

Guest access to the Star Spangled Celebration

The following individuals do not require entry bracelets (wristbands) or guest access passes to enter the event:

- U.S. ID card holders and their dependent ID card holders,
- Local national (LN) employees,
- JFC Carney Park Privilege card holders,
- JFC NATO ID card holders,
- NSA local contractors,
- Children under the age of 4.

All others require a guest access pass and entry bracelet (wristband) to enter the event (including house guests and extended family). Guests must have their access passes and wrist bands in their possession at all times for both days. Entry bracelets are good both days. No new access passes will be issued Sunday. July 4th safety

July 4th is the day we celebrate our nation's independence. It is one of the three holidays we observe during the period commonly referred to as the "101 Critical Days of Summer," which begins with Memorial Day and runs through Labor Day in September. Unfortunately, great weather combined with the long weekends typically associated with these holidays mean that several members of our community will take to the roadways, get involved in some form of celebratory activity, or both. This July 4th is no exception.

Remember the old adage, "Accidents never take a holiday"?

During the July 4th weekend last year, across the Navy one sailor was killed in a traffic related mishap. Obviously, that was one too many. For the Naples community we had four reported automobile accidents; fortunately no one was seriously injured. Just this past Memorial Day weekend, across the Navy there were four fatalities: three of them traffic related, while the fourth was off-duty recreation related. For the fiscal year, the NSA Naples community has seen a total of 10 DUIs, three of which have occurred since the Summer Safety Stand Down, which was held just prior to Memorial Day.

This weekend, many celebrations will include alcohol. Prepare your sailors and employees by talking to them about the many alternatives to alcoholic beverages. If you plan on hosting a party, ensure your guests are provided alternatives. You should also establish at the beginning of the night, while everyone is still sober or close to it, what plans they have for getting home.

It is incumbent upon each one of us as leaders and supervisors to know our people and know what plans they have in place as the weekend approaches should they decide to get on the road. Here at NSA Naples, the use of TRiPS is mandatory for all military personnel traveling 250 miles or more. Do you know where your drivers plan on going? It is imperative that you ensure your people are using this tool prior to submitting any request or leave chits to you that involve travel by automobile.

We owe it to subordinates, their families and the Navy to ensure that we prepare them for success—defined as a mishap-free weekend. Quite often, it is the innocent who are more adversely affected by drunk driving. You may do everything right, but could still be involved in an alcohol-related accident.

How then, do you spot a drunk driver? The following clues provide some dead giveaways:

- Trouble staying in the correct position in lane of traffic;
- Irregular braking and accelerating;
- Drunk drivers do not pay attention and easily lose situational awareness;



- Demonstrate poor decision making skills on the road.

Another staple of any 4th of July celebration is fireworks. I cannot emphasize enough the need to practice firework safety. Do not throw fireworks or light them in the grass. Do not put them in your pockets and have water available close by when handling. As with driving, do not mix alcohol and fireworks.

How do we as an organization work to prevent anyone from becoming a statistic? We do so by getting involved, and staying engaged throughout the chain. We should make sure we educate and provide mentorship to those over whom we exercise supervision. This is even more critical in this prime PCS season when many members may not be familiar with local laws and instructions. Re-emphasize to all inbound personnel that the local tolerance for BAC is .05 and NOT the .08, which is the norm back in the U.S. Additionally, as of August 2010 the BAC in Italy, for anyone under 21 years, or who has been driving for less than 3 years, is .00. That is, drinking absolutely no alcohol prior to getting behind the wheel. Finally, each one of us, down to the most junior member, needs to be responsible and hold ourselves accountable.

Have a safe and happy 4th of July, no matter how you decide to spend it!

Safety precautions imperative when traveling

When you travel abroad, the odds are you will have a safe and incident-free trip. Travelers can, however, become victims of crime and violence. When traveling throughout the European Theater for official or unofficial travel, travelers need to practice the basic personal security measures outlined below.

Ensure you receive an area of responsibility (AOR)-specific threat briefing from the antiterrorism (AT) office prior to traveling. This briefing is mandatory for certain locations and must be completed prior to travel.

Safety begins when you pack. To help avoid becoming a target, keep a low profile. Dress, conduct and mannerisms should not attract attention. Try to be inconspicuous when using public transportation and facilities.

As much as possible, stay in larger hotels that have more elaborate security. Safety experts recommend booking a room from the second to seventh floors above ground level—high enough to deter easy entry from outside, but low enough for fire equipment to reach.

Travel in small groups as much as possible and vary movements so as not to be predictable. Stay away from civil disturbances and demonstrations. Do not be curious about spontaneous gatherings or demonstrations, avoid them. Stay away from known trouble, disreputable places or other high-risk areas; visit only reputable establishments, but don't frequent the same locations (in particu-

lar, known U.S.-associated locales). Use the same common sense traveling overseas that you would at home. Be especially cautious in areas where you may be more easily victimized. These include crowded subways, train stations, elevators, tourist sites, market places, festivals and crime-ridden neighborhoods.

If you think you are being followed, go to a pre-selected secure area, such as a military base or police station. Immediately report the incident to the military police, security forces or law enforcement agencies.

Know emergency numbers and how to use the local telephone system. Ensure family members have a sanitized list of phone numbers they can carry with them at all times. (List should not be too specific, but should be usable during an emergency). Do not discuss travel plans, detailed family issues or office plans over the telephone.

It is a good idea to sign up for the Smart Traveler Enrollment Program—think of it as checking in—so that you may be contacted if need be, whether because of a family emergency in the U.S. or a crisis in the area in which you are traveling. It is a free service provided by the State Department, and is available online at <https://travelregistration.state.gov>.

A day (or overnight) trip to Matera

Just a three-hour drive from Naples, the ancient—and fascinating—city of Matera is a must see during your time in Italy.

Matera gained international acclaim for its ancient town center, the "sassi di Matera" (stones of Matera). The sassi, often compared to cave-like dwellings, originated from a prehistoric settlement and are thought to be some of the first human settlements in Italy.

However, in the late 1950s, about 15,000 inhabitants were forcibly relocated to new government housing projects in the modern area of the city. This was due in large part to high infant mortality rates within the sassi, questionable construction and international publicity. Today, many of the sassi have been convert-

ed to museums, hotels, shops and private homes. Matera may be the only place in the world where people can boast to be living in the same houses of their ancestors of 9,000 years ago.

Visitors to this town should pack their walking shoes to negotiate the same stone roadways and stairways that have been utilized for thousands of years. Some of these walk-

ways are actually located on the tops of other houses.

Matera, which was designated as a UNESCO World Heritage Site in 1993 and used as the setting for Mel Gibson's "Passion of the Christ" (2004), is located in the Basilicata Region. Its GPS coordinates are 40.668°N, 16.601°E.

6. Don't be fearful to say, "I usually give choices, but not this time."
7. If your child does not choose within 10 seconds, choose for him/her.

techniques with "Love and Logic" principles.

Love and Logic parenting is an approach to raising kids that provides loving support from parents while at the same time expecting kids to be respectful and responsible.

Love and Logic parenting is not a course about what is wrong with parents. It is a course on things that parents can do to make their lives with their children easier.

Energy conservation Save money while running the A/C

During these hot, summer days, the air conditioning unit is one of the most used appliances in our homes. Here are some tips to help you run the air conditioning and save some cash at the same time.

1. Close doors of rooms that are not often used (e.g., walk-in closet, storage room, bathroom) to avoid cooling these areas.
2. Close blinds and curtains during the day to keep your house cool.
3. Turn off unnecessary lights and appliances; these generate extra heat.
4. Use a fan to circulate the air rather than opening doors and windows. Opening doors and windows lets cool air escape making the A/C work twice as hard.
5. Set the thermostat between 24 and 26 degrees Celsius (75 to 79 degrees Fahrenheit). Each degree you increase the temperature lowers your utility cost by approximately 15 percent.
6. Make sure your A/C unit is properly maintained. Change replaceable filters every three months; dust or vacuum permanent filters as needed. To perform maintenance in government housing units, call the Housing Trouble Desk at 081-811-4285.

Naples Public Health Evaluation


The U.S. Navy is committed to ensuring our families are safe while serving our country at home or overseas. The following information is provided as part of a wide-ranging effort to understand the health risks of our personnel and families living in Naples, Italy. Recently completed, the comprehensive Public Health Evaluation (PHE) assessed potential short- and long-term health risks associated with living in the Naples area.

Health protective processes, like the Bottled Water Advisory explained below, have been implemented and will remain in place to ensure continued health protection beyond the life of the study. Typically, bottled water advisories are issued when authorities have determined, through microbiological testing or during emergency conditions (i.e., floods, storms, earthquakes), that the drinking water supply has been or has a high potential of being contaminated.

As part of the Naples Public Health Evaluation, the U.S. Navy sampled tap water. Tap water samples at some residences in the Naples area revealed coliform bacteria in the tap water (fecal coliform and/or total coliform, defined below). The presence of these bacteria indicates that the tap water may be contaminated with wastes containing microbes that can cause illness.

As a health protective measure, the Navy issued a Bottled Water Advisory in July 2008. Personnel living off base should use bottled water for drinking, cooking, food preparation, brushing teeth, making ice, and for pets. The Navy recommends that in addition to using bottled water, residents disconnect any filtering device and any device that is directly connected to the home's water supply. If residents are ever notified that the Bottled Water Advisory has been lifted and their tap water is safe to drink, these devices should be cleaned and sanitized according to the manufacturer's instructions before reusing.

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active-duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.

Partnership links military spouses with employers

The Defense Department has launched a new partnership that's intended to expand job opportunities for military spouses by connecting them with employers actively seeking to hire them.

Microsoft, Home Depot, Starbucks and the Navy Federal Credit Union are just a few of the nearly 60 corporations and companies that have signed on with the DoD partnership, said Robert L. Gordon III, deputy assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy. The partnership is based on memorandum of agreement to hire military spouses, Gordon explained.

"The design of this program is to bring together those spouses who want to work with a web portal where companies that would like to employ our military spouses can find them," he said.

That web portal is Military OneSource—located at <http://www.militaryonesource.com>—which also offers job-seeking resources such as résumé building.

"Military spouses bring a lot to the table," Gordon said. "They've volunteered and lead different activities on and off our installations. They are skilled, diverse, and know how to operate in a team environment."

Their sense of team focus and strong work ethic

are some of the attributes and characteristics employers are looking for in a 21st century work force, he added.

Military spouses have been hit hard by the job market, Gordon acknowledged, and face an unemployment rate of 28 percent.

Of the military's 1.2 million spouses, he said, 80 percent want to work, but have been held back by multiple moves and deployments. Additionally, a 25-percent wage gap divides military spouses and their civilian counterparts, he added.

Because of those factors, the partnership pinpointed organizations that could offer telework options and portable jobs, he said.

In the course of setting up the program's framework, Gordon has asked spouses what they would like to see in such a partnership.

"One of them said, 'Don't over-engineer things. We want to look for jobs. We want to be empowered.' And that's what we've done," he said. "We've devised a program that will bring spouses together with employers who are looking for their skills."

The partnership is aligned with the White House's government-wide approach to military family support that involves an inter-agency effort to strengthen families and enhance their well-being and quality of life.

E-leave eases leave routing

With the July 4 holiday right around the corner and summer travel season underway, Navy officials reminded sailors about the ease of using the electronic leave (E-leave) system.

"The best thing about E-leave is that you can track it easily," said Personnel Specialist 1st Class Lacey Burns, career progression department, Navy Personnel Command (NPC). "I've had a lot of paper leave chits lost at previous commands, or had trouble finding out where they were in the approval process, and then had to route a new one. With E-leave, you don't have to worry about any of that."

E-leave allows sailors to electronically submit leave requests through their chain-of-command for approval, replacing the traditional paper leave form, and has significantly reduced the timeframe for routing a leave request.

"It's a much faster process," said Personnel Specialist 2nd Class LeAnne Millious, full-time support and Selected Reserves conversion desk case worker at NPC. "I had to take emergency leave when a family member passed away and I was able to get the request routed in less than an hour through E-leave."

As directed by NAVADMIN 252/10, shore commands and submarine forces began using E-leave to process leave requests by Aug. 1 and Oct. 1, 2010, respectively.

"E-leave ensures pay and entitlements are properly accounted for with the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS)," said John Courtney, Navy electronic leave program manager. "Commands have full visibility in the system to identify the status of any sailor's request and can easily track and account for all sailors on leave."

Sailors, reviewers and approvers have access to E-leave through common access card (CAC) log-in on the Navy Standard Integrated Personnel System (NSIPS) website at <https://nsips.nmci.navy.mil>.

The Protestant Cemetery – One of Rome’s hidden gems

In the south of Rome, in the shadow of the ancient Aurelian Wall, lies one of the Eternal City’s hidden gems—the Protestant Cemetery. This is a quiet and peaceful place, an oasis of tranquility in the hustle and bustle of the city, set amid towering cypress trees and well-tended gardens. It is here that about 4,000 of Rome’s non-Catholic inhabitants are at rest. This is a beautiful and interesting place to spend a few hours musing among the moldering monuments and headstones.

The cemetery’s most famous res-

idents are the English Romantic poets John Keats and Percy Shelley, both of whom died young in tragic circumstances. Keats died of tuberculosis in Rome in 1821, in a friend’s house (now the Keats-Shelley Memorial House, a nice little museum) next to the Spanish Steps. He was only 25. He had come to Rome in the hope of finding a cure for his illness in the warm Mediterranean sun. Unfortunately, he found little enjoyment during his stay in the city, calling it a “posthumous life.”

Shelley, like his friend Keats, was a consumptive who left England for Italy in an attempt to improve his failing health. Ironically, a month before turning 30, he drowned while swimming off the coast of Tuscany in 1822. His friends cremated his body on the beach, and only his heart lies buried in the cemetery. Hence the Latin inscription “Cor Cordium” (Heart of Hearts) is inscribed on his marble grave stone along with a fitting passage from Shakespeare’s “The Tempest,” which reads:

*Nothing of him that doth fade
But doth suffer a sea-change
Into something rich and strange.*

Keats’ grave stone also contains an interesting epitaph, but his name is not anywhere on it. The epitaph reads:

This grave contains all that was mortal of a young English poet, who, on his death bed, in the bitterness of his heart, at the malicious power of his enemies, desired these words to be engraven on his tomb stone: Here lies one

*whose name was writ in water.
Feb 24th 1821*

On the cemetery wall nearby, a plaque bearing Keats’ profile adds to his epitaph. It reads:

Keats! if thy name be “writ in water”

Each drop has fallen from some mourner’s cheek;

A sacred tribute; such as heroes seek,

Though oft in vain - for dazzling deeds of slaughter.

Sleep on! Not honoured less for Epitaph so meek!

In the preface to his famous work, “Adonais,” his elegy on the death of his friend Keats, Shelley wrote, “The Cemetery is an open space among the ruins, covered in winter with violets and daisies. It might make one in love with death to know that one should be buried in so sweet a place.”

Today, entirely enclosed by walls, the Protestant Cemetery is a place of haunting charm and beauty befitting the poetic works of the Romantic poets. Built in 1738, it is located on via Caio Cestio, across the street from the Piramide metro station and next to the Pyramid of Caius Cestius, itself a most unusual sight among the grand monuments of ancient Rome. About 90 feet high, the

small-scale Egyptian-style pyramid was built in about 12 B.C. as a tomb for a Roman nobleman. It was later incorporated into the Aurelian Wall, Rome’s second city wall that was built between 270-275 A.D.

Cat lovers may also find this cemetery of special interest. Since

about 1850, it has been home to a colony of about 80 stray cats, which are fed and cared for by volunteers. The cats wander freely around the ground at home among the trees and grave stones. Their presence adds an additional touch of charm and appeal to a very unique place.

American Red Cross gives military families easier access to emergency communication services

Military members and their families now need just one phone number for emergency communications

As part of an ongoing effort to better serve the military community, the American Red Cross’ emergency communication services can now be reached by dialing a single telephone number.

All military members and their families can dial 877-272-7337 (U.S. toll free) to send an urgent message to a service member.

The change means that all military members and their families can use this single number to initiate emergency communication, regardless of where they live. In the past, community-based military or families living outside an installation needed to remember the phone number for their local Red Cross chapters for emergency communications, while those living on a military installation used the 877-272-7337 number.

“An emergency situation can be a very stressful time for a military family, and having just one common telephone number to remember can make a difficult situation a little easier,” said Sherri Brown, senior vice president for Service to the Armed Forces. “U.S. military personnel and their families can remain confident that the Red Cross will be there to keep them connected when there is a crisis at home.”

A call to 877-272-7337 allows Red Cross emergency communications services to put military personnel in touch with their families following the death or serious illness of an immediate family member, the birth of a service member’s child or grandchild or when a family faces other emergencies. Additional Red Cross services such as case management and emergency financial assistance also are available. For those stationed overseas, the three options for calling will remain the same: calling 877-272-7337 direct, accessing the number through a military operator, or calling the local Red Cross station.

“The Red Cross has always been there for us,” said

Mr. Robert L. Gordon III, deputy assistant secretary of defense for military community and family policy. “It’s critically important to our men and women serving away from home that their families know whom to call in the event of an emergency. The Red Cross is now making it even easier to make that call.”

The Red Cross Service to the Armed Forces program provides assistance to more than 2 million service members and many of the nation’s 24 million veterans. The Red Cross provides emergency communications linking service members with their families during time of crisis; comfort and care in military and veterans medical facilities; access to financial assistance in partnership with the military aid societies; information and referral and assistance to veterans.

“As always our Naples Red Cross is here to provide many services to our community,” said Jacquie Mack, station manager of the Naples chapter of the Red Cross. “We currently have courses in health and safety, disaster preparedness and volunteer services, and for sign up and further information, please give us a call at 081-568-4788.”
