New temporary parking near Capo West Garage

A temporary parking lot near the West Garage (front gate) at Capo will open Monday, July 11. This should provide significant parking relief until the West Garage construction is complete, and the 150 parking spaces in that facility are brought back online. When the full parking capacity is reinstated at the West Garage, the temporary parking area will revert back to its planned purpose as a Public Works heavy vehicle lot.

As parking at Capo remains a problem due to ongoing construction, it is important for anyone who commutes from the Support Site to Capo to consider using the shuttle bus. On average, there are around 80 open seats each morning. If you are in a position to utilize this resource, please help yourself and your shipmates by taking the bus.

We are working hard to find ways to increase the parking at Capo, please be patient and thank you for your patience.

NPC reminds sailors to register dependents in DEERS, keep enrollments current

Navy Personnel Command (NPC) reminded sailors to enroll new spouses in the Defense Enrollment Eligibility Reporting System (DEERS).

In addition to marriage, sailors must update DEERS within 60 days of any other life-changing event such as divorce, birth of a child or adoption and death of a dependant. Failure to do so could result in breaks in eligibility for family members.

"DEERS is an automated information system which maintains critical data on service members

and dependents, that is used to determine eligibility for military benefits and entitlements," said Kathy Wardlaw, records management and benefits division director, NPC.

DEERS maintains more than 23 million personnel-and-benefits records for active-duty, Reservists, retired military, DoD contractors and civil service personnel and their families.

The system is also responsible for producing DoD identification (ID) cards, including common access cards, and supports delivery of medical, dental, educational and life insurance benefits.

Captain's Corner

I would like to start by thanking our event sponsors, MWR, Security and all the community organizations and volunteers who helped make the 4th of July celebration at Carney Park a huge success. Special thanks to Kristina Douglas for her coordination of the event. Being a new member in the community, I was very impressed with everyone who helped put on this amazing event. For those of you who missed it, you sure missed a fantastic 4th of July, and we hope to see you there next year.

Inevitably, living in a small, close-knit community such as Naples, there are various issues that arise. We are all part of this great community, and it takes a sense of ownership and community-mindedness to keep things running smoothly. Remember the Golden Rule, "Do unto others as you would have others do unto you." That means treat others the way we would like to be treated, be a good neighbor, watch out for the safety of the children in our community, clean up after our pets, obey traffic rules, dispose of trash properly, respect others' property and privacy, and in general, be civil. If you have an issue with your neighbors, talk to them and work it out. Chances are they are unaware of the problem and will be happy to make adjustments. If things cannot be resolved amicably between neighbors, then report issues to the appropriate office/authorities for intervention. Part of being a good neighbor is looking out for one another. Remember what it was like when you first arrived and lend a helping hand to those who are just getting acclimated to a new environment and a foreign culture.

Here are some issues I would like to highlight:

- We are still in the 101 Critical Days of Summer—remain vigilant and be mindful of your safety and the safety of those around you. I urge everyone to use common sense and Operational Risk Management (ORM) before undertaking risky activities. Ask yourself, "Is this a good idea and what are the potential consequences if things go wrong?". Always have a plan BEFORE you start drinking alcohol. I have never met anyone who received a DUI who hadn't wished they had paid the 30 Euro cab fare home instead of having to deal with the consequences of a very bad decision to drink and drive.
- You've heard it before and you'll start to hear it, see it and read it more and more in the next few weeks, but I'd like to remind you again that if you are a victim of a crime REPORT IT! Call the dispatch number, 081-568-5638. Our number one weapon against crime is not to be a target. I'd like to urge extra vigilance as you lock up your houses at night, before leaving for a trip, or just going away for an hour or two. A home alarm does no good if it is not armed and on. Unfortunately, most of the home break-ins reported to NSA occurred in homes that had alarms but were not utilized. Be a hard target for crime, and the criminals will look elsewhere. Don't wear expensive jewelry when going downtown, don't leave inside your vehicle items visible that will tempt criminals to break in to your car. Fly below the radar.
- I have noticed bicycle racks at the Support Site are very full with what appear to be abandoned bicycles. Perhaps they were left by families who have since moved away as some look like they have been there for a while. I have asked Housing to organize a "bicycle roundup" in the coming weeks to dispose of those old and unwanted bikes in order to make the racks easily accessible and available to current residents. We will get the word out on how we will conduct the event and request your assistance in identifying and clearing out the abandoned bikes.
- I know that parking at Capodichino has been difficult, and we are working to mitigate the parking shortage. The parking shortage is a result of many factors, including ongoing operations, construction at the West Garage that has temporarily closed 150 spaces, and individuals parking at Capo while on leave (which has historically not been a problem and is a great benefit for our personnel). Starting Monday, July 11, NSA will open a temporary parking area near the West Garage. This should provide significant relief for parking until construction is complete. Additionally, NSA is conducting a parking review in order to identify opportunities to create additional parking spaces. When possible, please encourage your personnel to utilize the buses from the Support Site. It is a great way to save some money, ease the parking congestion at Capo and avoid the hassles of driving.

Be safe this summer. There are many great things to do in the local area and throughout Europe. Take advantage of the services on base and make the most of this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity to see Italy and Europe.

West Garage entrance temporarily closed

The north entrance to the West Parking Garage will be closed to traffic for the next two weeks to facilitate crane operations currently underway. The east entrance will remain open to traffic.

Crane operations at Capo through Aug. 15

During crane operations, while the crane is in the lifting mode, traffic will be stopped from exiting the West Gate for approximately 3 to 4 minutes for each lift. As soon as the structural steel members are lifted above the garage structure, traffic will be allowed to exit. In addition, when the perimeter steel members are being placed on the roof (near the back road) of the garage, incoming traffic will also be stopped until the steel member is bolted and secured to the base plate. Once again, this stoppage should only be for a few minutes.

These operations will occur three to four times per hour from 9:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Remembering Naples...

April 6th 2011

Dear Sir,

I recently clicked on to the website for U.S. Naval Support Activity in Naples. How very different it is now then when we were stationed there in 1951.

My late husband, Lawrence Dizon, was Chief Steward to the Admiral Robert Carney, who resided at The Villa Nike, near Via Orazio. With my three young children, I arrived in Naples to join my husband, aboard the USNS George W. Goethels on November 2nd 1951. It is hard to believe that was nearly 60 years ago.

The military members and their dependants who are now stationed in Naples probably have no idea what it was like in those very early days. There was no Commissary or Exchange, and no Medical or Dental Clinics. At first many items had to be bought on the local economy, then a makeshift store was set up in the grounds of San Elmo Hotel in Vomero. This was open one day a week and you stood in line to buy Navy issue cans of food, plus frozen milk, meat, chicken and bread. Supplies were strictly

limited, which was just as well because at that time very few dependants had refrigerators, let alone freezers. After some months a Commissary and Exchange opened near the Esso compound on the outskirts of Naples.

Until a small Medical/Dental Clinic was opened, if you needed medical attention you had to go aboard the USS Adirondack which was anchored in the harbour. Facilities at the Medical Clinic were limited and when my eldest son needed an x-ray on his leg, it had to be taken with a dental x-ray machine as the regular machine had not yet been installed. In May of 1952 my youngest son sustained a serious head injury, as the Clinic closed early he had to be taken aboard the Adirondack where he needed 12 stitches in his head, this was without the benefit of anesthetic, due to his age of only 18 months. A Naval Hospital later opened in Afragola, a little distance from Naples, my daughter Janice was one of the first babies born

there in August 1952.

Despite all the disadvantages endured way back then, I loved Naples and the Italian people and look back upon the two years stationed there as among the happiest of my life. We left Naples in August 1953 for duty in London, England, from where I originated. My husband retired here in 1960 after 32 years service in the U.S. Navy, he died in 1993.

I hope you do not mind me writing to you but finding your website brought back many happy memories of my time spent in Naples so very long ago.

Mafia bar seized by police

A popular coffee bar, located across from the prime minister's residence in the center of Rome, was impounded Monday by Italian anti-mafia investigative forces on suspicion that it was a front for laundering money. The coffee bar and other assets valued at €20 million were confiscated as part of an operation targeting the Calabrian criminal organization, 'Ndrangheta, which is expanding aggressively on both national and international levels with unlimited financial resources. The Italian government has made the fight against 'Ndrangheta a priority and has set up a national mafia assets seizure agency in Reggio Calabria.

Art of bell-making still alive in Molise

Just about 100 kilometers from Naples in Molise Region, there is a small town called Agnone. The pretty town is located in a wonderful position on a hill surrounded by green woods, where ruins of pre-Roman settlements are evident. This town is famous for the construction of bells. Expert bell makers have passed down the secret to creating the local craft from generation-to-generation since the year 1000. Marinelli Papal Bell is the only surviving factory of those that were once in this area. The stages of metal casting the bells can take up to 90 days and bell makers follow the exact same steps their ancestors did 1,000 years ago: beginning with a brick core, which is then covered with three layers of clay, worked with precision and decorated with artistic

skill to create a false bell; then molten bronze is poured into the cast. Today it is still possible to see a bell being cast. The thousand-year-old history of bell-making is told in the Museo Storico della Campana Giovanni Paolo II. Other points of interest are the Church of S. Emidio, where a group of 13 17th-century wooden statues representing the Last Supper are displayed, and the 12th-century Church of S. Marco Evangelista with a precious Byzantine-style silver ostensory. The village lanes are also charming and are enriched with decorations of shield-bearing lions, cornices and medallions.

Vatican to reveal Secret Archives in 2012 exhibit

An unprecedented exhibition at Rome's Capitoline Museums, scheduled from February to September next year, will unveil—for the first time—the Vatican Secret Archives outside the Vatican vaults. The archives, which date back more than 1,000 years, will show 100 priceless documents dating from the 8th to 20th century, including the codex of the heresy trial of Galileo Galilei, whose scientific theories attracted the hostility of the Catholic Church in the early 17th century, and an appeal from the House of Lords in England to Pope Clement VII asking for King Henry VIII's marriage to Catherine of Aragon to be annulled. The exhibition will commemorate the 400th anniversary of the establishment of the Secret Archives.

Previously, DEERS could be accessed through the myDODbenefits Portal on the Defense Manpower Data Center (DMDC) Website. The online system has been upgraded and can now be accessed through the Website milConnect. Sponsors and eligible beneficiaries can still access DEERS through the DMDC Website under "Beneficiaries" or users can go directly to the new milConnect Website, <http://milconnect.dmdc.mil/>.

Sponsors, spouses and eligible beneficiaries over 18 years old are able to perform the following functions on milConnect: update contact information in DEERS instantly, view current health care eligibility, manage TRICARE enrollments, locate the nearest military ID card issuing facility, view personnel information, transfer post-9/11 G.I. Bill benefits to eligible family members, update civilian employment information, view Service members' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) information, obtain proof of insurance if currently in a TRICARE-managed program, find answers to frequently asked questions about health care eligibility and more.

"Most sailors assume that changing their Record of Emergency Data (Page 2) will automatically update their DEERS status, but they are two separate data systems," said Wardlaw. "The Page 2 is a Navy data input into the Navy personnel system and DEERS is the official DoD repository for family member information."

Contact information in DEERS can be updated online, in-person, by phone, fax or mail. Two secure online options are either the new milConnect Website or TRICARE Beneficiary Web Enrollment Website. Both are available to people who have an active Defense Finance and Accounting Services (DFAS)-issued myPay personal identification number.

For those who would like to update their DEERS information in person, the Real-time Automated Personnel Identification System (RAPIDS) site locator online allows service members and beneficiaries to locate RAPIDS site nearest to them. More than 900 RAPIDS sites in 23 different countries use DEERS data to provide ID cards or related personnel support to eligible persons.

ShipShape begins July 11



Welcome to ShipShape! What is it, you ask? ShipShape is an eight-week program (one-hour session one day per week) that

reflects the current state of knowledge on weight loss.

The program represents a healthy and permanent approach to weight loss and is designed for all adults who are overweight. It is specifically designed to assist active-duty members in meeting the body composition standards set forth by the Department of the Navy. However, don't let the name fool you. ShipShape is also an appropriate intervention for family members and retirees who exceed healthy body weight or have weight-related health issues.

The program provides basic information on nutrition, stress management, physical activity and behavior modification techniques to lower and maintain a healthy body weight. There are a number of different approaches you may select for weight loss. The strategies and techniques presented in the ShipShape program provide you with all the tools for healthy and permanent weight loss. Participants keep food

journals, take a tour of commissary that highlights all the healthy food choices available, get physical training tips from a certified trainer, listen to a psychologist lecture on emotional eating, get advice from a dietician regarding food labels, learn how to eat and shop healthy on the economy, and set realistic goals for both weight loss and physical activity.

Joining the program means you will become a partner in your weight loss program and actively practice numerous behavioral changing techniques. The instructors provide you with essential information, guide you as you readjust your lifestyle, and work with you to tailor a plan for permanent weight management. This process is not quick or easy. Let's be honest—if it was, two-thirds of Americans would not be overweight. You did not gain the weight overnight, so you will not lose it overnight. With the right tools and your positive commitment, you will lose the weight!

About your newspaper

For nearly 55 years, "Panorama" has reported the news and publicized events—and for a couple of decades, event featured glamour photographs of young women—to the military community stationed in Naples and the surrounding area. Though you won't find pin-up girls gracing the pages of today's newspaper, much of the content remains the same: jobs, movies, notices from clubs and organizations, places to see in Italy and across Europe, Navy news and information from local commands.

"Panorama" is one of a shrinking number of command-sponsored, U.S. military print newspapers remaining in Europe.

Our current editorial staff is listed on the masthead (a section describing the newspaper and its policies, always at the bottom of Page 2). Other contributors include community members from Naples, Gaeta and NATO, and mass communications specialists, who as sailors have multiple duties for the public affairs officer (PAO), their command and the Navy.

A commercial enterprise venture between the U.S. Navy and Italian publishing company Stampa Generale, "Panorama" has been in print in for over 50 years, and published by Stampa for more than 36. Three of Stampa's four Naples staff members have been with the paper for 25 years or more. "Pano" represents both a long partnership with a small, family-run Italian company and a U.S. Navy tradition in Italy.

As per contract with Stampa, which handles all paid advertising, typesetting, printing and delivery/distribution, "Panorama" is printed in Rome 48 times a year with a print run of about 9,000, and a much higher readership. Fifty percent of the space of each 16-page issue is reserved for paid advertising—without which "Pano" would not exist. What you see on the eight pages allotted to NSA Naples for "news" each week is a function of space, quantity and quality of submissions from staff and community members, and command and Navy directives.

"Panorama" is a community effort. The articles within each issue connect us to our nation's mission, our neighborhood, our organizations and our host nation.

Would you like to see other types of "news" in

the paper? We invite you to share a story or other information.

Before sending your queries or submittals, please take a few minutes to read our publication and submission guidelines below. We look forward to hearing from you.

Getting started

Pick a topic that interests you or an event of which you are a part. Tell us how an issue has affected your life, your school or the community. Think about what you want readers to learn by reading your article. Write a descriptive story to show how you have experienced the news or event first hand.

Tips for creating good content

Content includes the text and pictures/photographs/graphics that you see in the paper. We're looking for colorful stories written in a journalistic style that follow a few guidelines:

- 1) Make clear what you want your audience to know by the end of your story.
- 2) The most important structural element of a story is the lead. The lead is usually the first sentence or two and answers most or all of the five Ws (who, what, where, when, why).
- 3) Stories should contain enough background information so that someone unfamiliar with the topic will understand it by the end of the story.
- 4) A story without a source is prose or opinion (sometimes both). Stories with only one source are one-sided. Use information from two to four sources. Quoting too many sources in a story may make it confusing.
- 5) Keep your audience in mind as you tell the story. We are a diverse community of military personnel, civilians, spouses, children and Italians. "Panorama" is published for NATO and NSA Naples and Gaeta. It is also posted online. Anyone can read your article.

How to take better photos

As we all know, the beauty of taking photographs with a digital camera is that you can take lots of pictures without incurring any additional expenses. Shoot, shoot and shoot some more to get to know your camera and all of its features. Only practice will improve your photography.

Questions to consider while you're shooting photos

- 1) What story am I telling? Why am I taking this shot? Is it purely a way to record a moment or are you trying to capture the emotion of a moment? Is it part of a larger series of photos? These important questions will help you make a number of decisions in terms of composition, framing, exposure, etc.
- 2) What is in the background and foreground? One of most common distractions in digital photography is the background of your shots. Run your eyes over the space behind your subject to see what else is in the image (do the same for the foreground).
- 3) What is the main source of light? Where is it coming from? Is there enough light or do you need a flash?
- 4) How would holding the camera differently (vertical vs. horizontal) change this shot?
- 5) Lastly, remember to shoot the entire event: beginning, middle and end.

Please understand that by submitting your materials to "Panorama," you are granting "Panorama" the non-exclusive right to use your story and photos in any way we see fit.

FFSC tip of the week: Social media and families

With summer break underway, you might find it challenging to keep your kids occupied. There's always the temptation of letting technology fill the void, but technology isn't the best babysitter.

Kids' online usage increases over the summer and so does the risk of cyber threats. Parents play an integral role in their children's digital lives. It's never too early to start establishing media guidelines for your family. Use the advice below, provided by the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC), to start a conversation with your kids about how to safely surf the internet.

A recent survey by security software maker AVG shows that more children between the ages of two and five know how to operate a Smartphone application than know how to tie their shoes. To teach smart media habits, use media devices together and talk about what you see, hear, and read.

Even if you choose to use an internet filter, help kids find positive and safe sites online. There are many Websites designed specifically for

school age children that incorporate strong safety features in order to facilitate safe play free from inappropriate content or contact. Ensure that any social media sites your school-age child does frequent offer flexible parental controls that allow you to set limits on whom they contact and when.

Start a conversation about Facebook. Encourage your teen to use strong privacy settings and remind them to only "friend" people online they would "friend" in real life—even a private post can be forwarded by an unscrupulous online acquaintance. Set rules about what's appropriate to post, both for photos and other updates. Ask your teen to reflect on how others, both now and in the future, will view their online life.

If you wouldn't let children have an unsupervised play date, they aren't ready to be online by themselves. The skills they bring to online worlds are the same ones they have in real life. Remind your younger children that online rules of conduct are the same as real life rules: if it's not OK to say to someone's face, it's not OK in cyberspace.

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active-duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAF-SWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.

A daytrip to Solfatara



Though a daytrip to Solfatara may not be the most pleasant smelling excursion, visitors will be amazed by the steaming hot ground and the bubbling mud.

Though it may not be the most pleasant smelling excursion, a trip to the Solfatara Volcano Park is something that won't soon be forgotten.

As part of the Campi Flegrei (Phlegraean Fields) volcanic area, Solfatara is a dormant volcano that still emits jets of steam with sulfurous fumes. It was formed around 4,000 years ago and last erupted in 1198.

The Ancient Greeks considered Solfatara an entrance to Hades. Strabo, an ancient Greek philosopher, referred to the site as "Forum Vulcani," which translates as "dwelling of the god Vulcano, entrance to Hades."

Over time, people looked beyond the mythology of Solfatara and discovered the health benefits it offered. Renowned for its mineral waters, natural saunas and mud baths, Solfatara was used as a spa until the 1800s.

Solfatara opened to visitors in 1900 and still remains a popular park. Tourists and local enjoy the fangaia (bubbling mud), the stufe (ancient saunas) and the bocca grande (large mouth). From this "large mouth," you can see and hear the powerful steam exiting through hundreds of fumarole, or tiny vents.

If you can get past the stench, the Solfatara Volcano Park can be a wonderful experience! It is open everyday from 8:30 a.m. until one hour before dusk. Tickets are €6 for adults, €4.50 for children ages 4-12 and free for children under 4. Visit <http://www.solfatara.it/> for more info.

The park is centrally located at the top of Pozzuoli in the Solfatara area. By car, exit the Tangenziale at Agnano (#11) and follow signs toward Pozzuoli. When you reach via Solfatara, follow it up the hill and take a left on via Costa di Agnano. The park will be on your right. GPS coordinates are: 40.827N, 14.135E.
