

## Energy conservation

From Department of the Navy Energy Program

**MYTH:** We don't need to turn off office equipment at night, since no energy is consumed if no one uses the equipment.

**REALITY:** Many people are unaware of the "phantom" loads that lurk in the office and the home. Equipment such as computers, printers and photocopiers consume energy when turned on and left in the standby mode. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is sponsoring an Energy Star program to encourage equipment manufacturers to produce equipment that go into "sleep" mode when left idle for a certain period of time. This "sleep" mode consumes far less energy than in the conventional "idle" mode, but powers up almost instantly when the user wants to use the equipment. So unless your office equipment is Energy Star compliant, turning it off when not in use can save a considerable amount of energy.

# Italian News Briefs

## Vatican library reopens

After a three-year renovation, the Vatican's Apostolic Library will reopen its doors to scholars Sept. 20. The renovation cost €9 million and improved security and cataloging measures. Pope Nicholas V in 1450s started the collection with 350 Latin manuscripts and by 1455 when he died, the collection had about 1,500 codices and was the largest in Europe. Every year, 4,000 to 5,000 scholars are granted permission to conduct research in the library. The access is restricted to post-graduate level research and nothing can be checked out. In the manuscript reading room scholars have to submit to strict rules: no pens, food or mineral water are allowed. Today, the Vatican Library has about 150,000 manuscripts, as well as the "Codex B"—the oldest known complete Bible. Researchers will now find improved communications and elevator access to the Vatican's vast collections, as well as a new tower inside the Vatican's Belvedere Courtyard to ferry manuscripts from their bomb-proof bunker to climate-controlled consultation rooms. Inside the bunker itself, fire-proof and dust-proof floors and walls were installed to further protect the manuscripts.

## Police seize assets worth \$1.9 billion from Mafia businessman

Police seized Mafia-linked assets worth \$1.9 billion in Sicily and in southern Calabria regions in an operation revealing the crime group was trying to launder money through alternative energy companies. The seized assets included more than 40 companies, buildings, factories, bank accounts and luxury yachts. Interior Minister Roberto Maroni said the operation was the largest seizure ever made against the Mafia.

## Italy triumphant at Praemium Imperiale Global Art Awards

Three of five of Japan's prestigious Praemium Imperiale awards went to Italians. The Praemium Imperiale was established in 1988 to mark the 100th

anniversary of the Japan Art Association and to honor the late Prince Takamatsu, who was the association's honorary patron for 58 years. The awards recognize lifetime achievement in categories not covered by the Nobels. Sophia Loren won the theater/film category—she was the first actress to win in its 22-year history; Maurizio Pollini, classical pianist, won the music prize; and Enrico Castellani won the award for painting—the first Italian to win in this category. Loren, Pollini and Castellani will each receive prizes of 15 million yen (approximately €140,000).

## 10 stolen motorcycles found and returned to owners

A Neapolitan citizen reported to police that a motorcycle was parked inside a condominium parking lot in Fuorigrotta. After investigating, police found 10 motorcycles parked behind cars within the lot near a school. The motorcycles are valued at €40,000 and were all confiscated by police. Ten motorcycles were stolen outside the Naples' soccer stadium during the Naples-Bari soccer match. Police tracked down the owners, and all motorcycles were returned to the astonished owners thanks to the awareness of a citizen.

## Runaway horse kills bus driver and injures five passengers

A tragic accident happened on the Domitiana near Castel Volturno Tuesday night. A frightened horse crossed the road and collided with a bus, killing the bus driver and the horse instantly, and injuring five of the six passengers onboard. The driver swerved to dodge the animal, and the bus ended up in a river. The passengers were rescued from the half-submerged vehicle. Five passengers reported no serious injuries. The horse is believed to have escaped from a stud farm, and police are working to identify its owner.

# Four generations climb Mt. Vesuvius

Four generations of the Flannery family have climbed Mount Vesuvius since Sean Flannery, a Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station (NCTS) employee, arrived in Naples over 10 years ago. Sean Patrick, 7, of Dublin, Ireland, was the youngest Flannery to make the hike. His great grandfather Eddy Flannery, now 89, also from Dublin, Ireland, made the climb nine years earlier (at age 80)

using a walking stick that he engraved to commemorate the event. Each successive generation who completed the climb used and engraved the same stick. Sean Flannery, little Sean Patrick's grandfather, made the ascent numerous times, as has his son Eddy Flannery. It'll take all the courage Dave can muster to survive his training, save the city and get the girl as he becomes "The Sorcerer's Apprentice."

**INCEPTION,** PG-13 for sequences of violence and action throughout. Action/Adventure, Drama, Science Fiction/Fantasy and Thriller, 148 min. Dom Cobb is a skilled thief—the absolute best in the dangerous art of extraction, stealing valuable secrets from deep within the subconscious during the dream state when the mind is at its most vulnerable. Spain's Vice Adm. Tortosa prevailed over Italy's Vice Adm. Maurizio Gemignani and the U.S. Marine Corps' Brig. Gen. John Love.

Junior members of NNYC also had a chance to test their skills during the Optimist-class Regatta. Andrea D'Ambrosio fought hard to prevail over Charlie Carty.

The Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) sponsored Tae Kwon Do class, held at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Support Site, is helping military members and their dependents get in shape and have fun.

"I think that this course is great for people physically and mentally," said Brandon Tuxbury, class participant and second degree brown belt. "I started practicing Tae Kwon Do at an early age. I have been training in Tae Kwon Do for 10 years. I would say definitely come out, if you haven't tried it—it's worth it."

Classes led by professional instructors take place Tuesday and Thursday evenings at 4:30 p.m. for 4 to 6 year olds; 5:20 p.m. for 7 to 9 year olds; and 6:25 p.m. for ages 8 to adult. Sparring begins at 7:30 p.m. and provides an opportunity to practice moves learned in class on other students.

Tae Kwon Do's method is primarily kicking, although various blows by hand, head, foot, knee and elbow are also taught. According to head instructor and fourth degree black belt Marino Pascucci, who has been teaching Tae Kwon Do through MWR for the last 20 years, "What we are studying here is Olympic-style Tae Kwon Do focusing on defense. We also teach the use of the baton and nunchakus."

In addition to learning baton and nunchakus techniques, students train together and gain respect for each other, their teachers and themselves. "My son is going to this class and I think that it's perfect," said Shlomo Dor, an Israeli liaison officer to NATO and parent of one of the participants enrolled in the class. "Both of the teachers give a lot of themselves. They are very helpful and they care about the kids. I think that this is a good opportunity and the kids love it."

## Barbecue safety tips



Every year approximately 600 fires/explosions occur with gas grills, causing injuries or even death. Many of the accidents happen the first time a grill is ignited or after the grill's gas container is refilled and reattached. Almost every home on Support Site has a grill and remembering barbecue safety is the key to an enjoyable event.

*Before you plan your next barbecue, review these safety tips:*

- Check grill hoses for cracking, brittleness, holes and leaks. Make sure there are no sharp bends in the hose or tubing.
- Make sure your grill's propane tank has a three-prong gas valve handle. As of April 1, 2002, the three-prong design replaced a five-prong handle as the safety standard.
- Move gas hoses away from hot surfaces and dripping hot grease.
- Always keep propane gas containers upright.
- Never store a spare gas container under or near the grill or indoors.
- Never store or use flammable liquids, like gasoline, near the grill.
- Never store the cylinders inside the home.
- Never keep a filled container in a hot car or car trunk. Heat will cause the gas pressure to increase and it may explode.
- Make sure your spark igniter is consistently generating a spark to create a flame and burn the propane gas. If the flame is not visible, the heavier-than-air propane gas may be escaping and could cause an explosion.
- When using grills on decks or patios always ensure you are away from any eaves or overhangs; never cook under your sun shades.
- During special functions, maintain 15 ft from any canopies or pavilions when cooking.
- Never use lighter fluid to boost your charcoal fire.
- Dispose of coals by first applying water, ensuring all coals are extinguished. Place coals in a water-filled bag and dispose properly.
- Never leave grills unattended.
- Never use the grill near the main gas line of the home.
- Always keep children and pets away from grills.
- Always have a serviceable Dry Chemical ABC Fire Extinguisher while cooking and remember P.A.S.S.: Pull, aim, squeeze and sweep.

## Name, rank and smiling number!

Almost anyone who has cared for a child often asks, "What can I do to make this child behave, do his chores, feel better about herself, feel loved? How can I manage situations better? How can I manage my child or children better?"

Of course, we all wish we had a magic wand to make everything right. Unfortunately, it takes a little more from us than that, but we certainly can take small steps toward those same goals. It may take a shift from being reactive caregivers, teachers and parents to being proactive...but it is worth the effort.

The first thing you need to do is have a relationship with your child. Keep it simple. It can be boiled down to *name, rank and smiling number*. Let's look at each one of these a little more carefully.

For example, saying a child's name in a pleasant tone is an important and powerful tool in managing a child's behavior. A child needs to feel identified, needs to hear his name to feel connected to his surroundings. Often times, a child will hear her name when she's done something wrong, especially in settings where there are multiple children. It's also important to identify a child when he is just being. When your child is in a neutral state—neither seeking attention in a good or bad way—try saying his name to make some conversational connection. This small talk will make your child feel seen, connected and important. Engage him in

conversation, show interest in what he says or is trying to say.

This will give the child a sense that he is appreciated even when he is not necessarily doing anything particularly remarkable. The child is seen and important just because.

Of course, when you "catch" your child behaving, say your child's name to identify the good action, "Wow! Great job cleaning up, Hannah!" So spend a few minutes a day focusing on your child and say her name to make those little social connections at both good and neutral times.

What is meant by "rank" in the context of helping children grow and managing behavior? Frankly, you won't find the term "rank" in behavior modification books. For our purposes, rank simply refers to giving a child some type of role in his environment. It doesn't have to be the same, constant role, but one she can consistently contribute to in her environment. Try saying things like, "I need extra special help with arranging the block area, or wiping the tables, or can you help your friend get his or her coat. I need someone who can jump to show our other friends how to do it." When you give a child a role that assists another child or children, it goes a long way toward fostering and developing stronger peer relations and identifying with the community.

The child's name and our interactions should also come with a smile. Smiling at a child actually can be like waving a magic wand. Look at each child like she is your favorite

present under a Christmas tree. A child can tell when someone likes her. When we smile our eyes tend to beam and that helps a child feel good inside. Not every child tugs at our hearts the same way, but it's our job to make each child think she does. Some people say "fake it until you make it." You may be surprised what a positive effect it begins to have on you and your own perspective. When you really make an effort with a child who may be particularly challenging to your patience, suddenly you'll find those emotional connections getting stronger. The child will begin to feel differently around you, like she matters, and her behavior will actually begin to alter.

The same is true in reverse. If a child is behaving in an undesirable way, don't say his name or smile at him. You may want to use planned ignoring, redirection or a variety of other behavior modification techniques, but that would bring us into the area of planned reactive measures, and perhaps that would be better talked about at another time, or in another article. Ultimately, we want to use proactive measures to eliminate the need for the reactive.





## Navy Actions to Protect the Health of U.S. Military and Civilian Families in Naples



### The Navy has taken action to minimize potential health risks:

- ▶ Issued a bottled water advisory to use only bottled water for drinking, food preparation, cooking, brushing teeth, making ice, and for pets.
- ▶ Distributed free bottled water to families residing in off-base homes. New leases now require landlords to provide bottled water from an approved source.
- ▶ Established the Environmental Health Information Center as a resource for U.S. military and civilian families.
- ▶ Relocated families to other homes due to unacceptable health risks and relocated those who were concerned about their health.
- ▶ Further investigated areas surrounding homes with unacceptable risks to determine if other families were also at risk.
- ▶ Established New Lease Suspension Zones.

### The Navy has established long-term solutions for minimizing potential health risks:

- ▶ Improved all new leases by requiring landlords to:
  - Connect the rental property to the public drinking water system;
  - Clean and disinfect the home's water holding tank twice a year; and
  - Provide containerized water service from a Navy-approved vendor.
- ▶ Provided potable water at Carney Park.
- ▶ Completed installation of water treatment system at NCTS Lago Patria.
- ▶ Installed a vapor intrusion mitigation system, as a precautionary measure, at the Capodichino Child Development Center.
- ▶ Installed a Water Distribution Point at Capodichino to provide free drinking water to U.S. personnel living off-base.
- ▶ Posted bilingual irrigation water "non-potable" signs where necessary.
- ▶ Per COMNAVREGEUR Instruction 11330.1 (30 July 2007), NSA Naples established the Drinking Water Management Board, which ensures compliance with safe drinking water standards on base, and
  - Published Drinking Water Consumer Confidence Reports, which document the quality of drinking water provided on base.
- ▶ Continued to work with Navy Leadership to improve overseas public health policies.



The Navy provided weekly updates in the Panorama.

### The Navy has broadly shared information:

- ▶ Developed extensive informational materials to inform and educate U.S. military and civilian personnel and their families.
- ▶ Communicated study findings to medical professionals so they are aware of any possible risks to their patients and are prepared to answer health questions.
- ▶ Encouraged and provided opportunities to U.S. personnel for one-on-one consultations with appropriate project team members.
- ▶ Conducted All Hands meetings and distributed updates via All Hands e-mails and Panorama.
- ▶ Conducted small group meetings with all residents whose homes were sampled to share results and also provided results to landlords.
- ▶ Shared findings with Italian government officials and encouraged appropriate actions.

## Ombudsman program enters its 40th year

Sept. 14 marked the 40th anniversary of the Navy's Ombudsman program. Whether assisting families moving to a new area or providing support during a deployment, Navy spouses have been volunteering as ombudsmen for almost four decades. "When families respond to the challenges of deployments, natural disasters or family emergencies, ombudsmen are there to provide guidance and to help them regain a sense of normalcy. They help families find the answers to their questions, promoting their resiliency and self reliance," said Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (SS/SW) Rick D. West in a recorded statement recognizing the contribution of the ombudsmen. "Mission readiness is directly tied to family readiness, and family readiness is directly tied to the selfless dedication of our extraordinary ombudsman," said West. The Ombudsman Program was introduced to the U.S. Navy Sept.

14, 1970, by then-Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Elmo Zumwalt. Zumwalt adapted the program from a 19th century Scandinavian custom originally established to give private citizens an avenue to express their concerns to high government officials. "The program started on a small and informal scale and has since moved to a very formal, standardized training," said Kathy Rock, Ombudsman program manager for Commander, Naval Installations Command (CNIC). "The policies and instructions are constantly being revised to meet the needs of the Navy family at a set period of time." There are presently more than 4,000 ombudsmen worldwide. The Navy requires there be at least one ombudsman per 250 service members. Services provided by the Ombudsman program are designed to steer families in the right direction so that issues can be resolved and families can be self-sustaining. Don't forget to give thanks to your ombudsman, who works tirelessly to improve the lives of our sailors

and Navy families. "It is important to recognize ombudsmen because they are the direct line between the command and the command families," Riddle said. "A lot of times they deal with issues that are very personal and very emotional and they have to help those family members at that time of need and yet still be able to maintain their own professionalism and care for their own families." This year, the Navy has already saved nearly \$1 million by having volunteer ombudsman. In 2009, the Navy saved an estimated \$1.4 million based on if the service had to pay the volunteers a wage of \$18.77 an hour. "Each ombudsman spends about 800 hours a year through volunteering which calculates out to an equated savings of about \$15,000 per ombudsman," said Riddle. "Having an ombudsman allows the service member to focus on their job while they are away because they know their families are being taken care of," said Riddle.

The final Phase II report will be ready for public release in the fall of 2010. Enduring processes will continue and many of the actions taken as a result of the Phase I report will be repeated upon the release of the final report.
