

Gates orders additional ship, eyes more capability for Haiti

Just hours before another earthquake hit Haiti early Wednesday morning, Defense Secretary Robert M. Gates said the Defense Department is sending a port-clearing ship and evaluating additional capabilities to assist the disaster relief effort.

Gates announced that he signed deployment orders Wednesday morning to send a port-clearing ship equipped with cranes to get the port operating within a week or two to speed up aid distribution.

"We are looking at a variety of other capabilities," he said. "We are trying to look at alternative routes there might be to get bulk food and bulk supplies in there."

Gates responded to a reporter's question during a news conference in New Delhi, where he met earlier Wednesday with Defense Minister A.K. Antony.

Shortly afterward, a magnitude 6.1 tremor struck northwest of the capital of Port-au-Prince, exacerbating difficulties already plaguing Haiti. The extent of the damage is unknown.

Getting around Port-au-Prince remains challenging, Gates said, expressing hope that more routes will be cleared within the next 24 to 48 hours so trucks can begin delivering more aid.

"You cannot fully meet the needs of over 2 million people using helicopters," he said.

Seeing trucks out on the road providing desperately needed supplies also will reduce the chance of people turning to violence out of desperation, he said.

Gates said he's pleased by cooperation between the U.N. peacekeeping force in Haiti, the Haitian government and U.S. commanders on the ground in supporting the relief effort.

"Everything I hear is that the three have established a good working relationship in terms of establishing priorities for what actually flows into the country," he said.

Americans should feel proud of the U.S. response, Gates said, noting the governmental agencies and non-governmental organizations working together to assist.

The U.S. Coast Guard was on site in Haiti "literally within hours after providing limited support," he said. "And with each passing hour, more and more American forces and ships and capability have flowed into the area."

While proud of the U.S. contribution in Haiti, Gates resisted saying he's satisfied with the response. "As long as 2 million people in Haiti are still struggling to get food and water, fuel and medical care, it would probably be a mistake for anyone to say they are satisfied with the level of effort," he said.

"That said," he continued, "It is hard for me to say what more the United States could make available or how we could make it available faster to deal with the tragedy there."

Italian News Briefs

Prehistoric dolphin skeleton found in Tuscany

A group of amateur paleontologists found a skeleton of a prehistoric dolphin in Tuscany. The skeleton's bone analysis showed that the dolphin was killed by a shark. Chemical and biological tests dated the animal to about 4.8 million years ago when Tuscany was mostly under the sea. In 2007 the group of paleontologists found the fossilized remains of a whale in the wine-growing soil of Montalcino near Siena.

Italy sends aircraft carrier to aid Haiti

Italy sent its newest aircraft carrier, the Cavour, Jan. 12 to Haiti. The Cavour entered service last June and has a crew of 530 but can host up to 1,200 people. She carries 20 helicopters and aircrafts. The Cavour's mission is a joint one with Brazil which will provide doctors and nurses for the ship's fully-equipped onboard hospital which has various operating rooms and wards for intensive care and first aid. The Italian Government has appointed 5.7 million Euros in aid for Haiti and intends to cancel the Haiti debt which is valued at more than 40 million Euros, according to Foreign Undersecretary Vincenzo Scotti. Italy also sent its military Carabinieri police who will be part of a European Union force for restoring order. A second Italian casualty from the earthquake in Haiti was confirmed Monday. At the moment, seven other Italians have not been found out of the 191 registered with the Italian consulate.

Japanese art show in Milan

Three centuries of Japanese art and culture are on display at Milan's Palazzo Reale until March 8. The exhibition includes 100 masterpieces which are 'Japanese national treasures.' The displays include stunning screens, beautiful paper and silk wall hangings, ceramic and lacquer creations, weapons,

fabrics and masks. The show covers the period 1568 to 1868 of the Japanese culture from medieval age to early modernity.

Ten arrested for illegal traffic of dangerous waste

Police arrested ten people in the Lombardy region Tuesday in connection with illegal traffic of dangerous waste. Six people were put under house arrest, and the other four were jailed in an operation that was part of an anti-mafia investigation. They are allegedly involved in illegal management and transport of waste. Forty-one people were under investigation including bank managers and meanwhile, police closed six offices and two waste management plants. Waste transport trucks and luxury cars were confiscated by police.

Posters give warning to mobsters

The city of Palermo was covered with dozens of posters, Tuesday, depicting photos of two Mafia leaders in handcuffs. The words on the posters were "You will all end like these." The message was addressed to mobsters who are still free. This initiative was taken by the "Young Italy" movement. The initiative was set as a "birthday present" to the judge Paolo Borsellino who would have turned 70, but was killed by the mafia in 1992.

Investigation uncovers false insane claims

Investigators and prosecutors brought to light cases of 400 people in Naples who, allegedly, falsely claimed to be insane. They all reside in the neighborhood of Chiaia. They submitted false certifications to obtain unduly disability pensions. Police found a scanner able to forge authentic signatures for submitting documents. Investigations are carried out by police and military Carabinieri who are still acquiring documents and records thinking there is one 'mind' behind this fraud.

Free online tutoring available for service members, families

Free and unlimited tutoring in a variety of subjects ranging from secondary education mathematics to resume writing is now available online for all service members and their families.

A new service provided by the Department of Defense matches youths and adults with certified, professional tutors at <http://www.tutor.com/military-programs>.

Tutors can assist students in more than 16 subjects — from kindergarten to college-level calculus, statistics and physics — as well as state standardized tests and the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT) and American College Testing (ACT) exams.

The Web site always matches one student with one tutor, an individual certified in the student's subject and level of education. Students and tutors will meet in an interactive workspace through a chat session. An uploaded book report, for example, can be opened in the workspace, allowing both student and tutor to review the material. Specialized workspaces for subjects such as math or chemistry include toolbars with functions for creating equations, charts and graphs.

Tutors won't give answers to a student or write a paper for them, instead providing guidance and resources. Tutors will also work with parents desiring instruction on effectively tutoring their children.

All of the sessions are anonymous and conducted by screened, certified tutors and career specialists who have all completed a third-party background check.

In addition to providing guidance on a variety of subjects, tutors can also assist students with college searches, but the program is not specific to educational pursuits. Adults can interface with career specialists for help with:

- Job search strategies
- Resume writing
- Cover letters
- Interview preparation
- Financial literacy
- Preparing for citizenship
- Preparing to take the General Educational Development test
- Returning to college
- College entrance exams

The service is free for all U.S. active duty service members, U.S. military reservists, U.S. National Guard personnel on active duty in a deployed status, U.S. military retirees, wounded warriors, Department of Defense (DoD) civilians assigned to DoD installations and their dependents.

The Tutor.com Web site will be widely used at Navy youth programs and by school liaison officers, who are scheduled to showcase the

Web site to Navy families and their children's teachers, said Chuck Clymer, Jr., Navy Child and Youth Education Program manager.

"It's a resource that is right in line with our core services," Clymer said. "It supports our mission to provide high quality educational programs for children and youth."

Navy youth programs will be using Tutor.com to augment their "Power Hour" and "Job Ready" education and career development programs.

Naval Base San Diego School Liaison Officer Kirsten Web, a Navy spouse with two children, described Tutor.com as an outstanding resource for the whole family.

"My son didn't need a full-time tutor, but occasionally needs assistance with high level math," Webb said. "Tutor.com was the perfect

solution. Now he uses it for SAT prep and for assistance with his writing."

Tutors are available globally 24-hours daily at <http://www.tutor.com/navy>. To access the site, eligible personnel must first sign in to Navy Knowledge Online at <https://www.nko.navy.mil/portal/home/> and click on the "Reference" tab, found on the right side of the page. Here, there are links for the tutoring site.

Survey helps improve customer experience

As part of the Customer Oriented Enterprise (COE) initiative, a team of trained data collectors interviewed nearly 200 patrons this fall about their experiences with the Child and Youth Programs (CYP) Naples Youth Sports. The team compiled 185 actionable data points that were handed over to a Customer Oriented Service Improvement Team (COSIT), consisting of both Fleet & Family Readiness staff and patrons. The team met regularly to determine how these customer comments and suggestions could be implemented to increase customer satisfaction.

Eighty-two percent of customers interviewed stated that the program either met or exceeded their expectations and a total of 206 positive comments were recorded. Customers were mainly asking for better equipment, better trained coaches, better scheduling, improved communication and more program variety.

Since the team launched, new sports equipment for all offered youth sports has been purchased to meet these requests. The program has improved communication by adding "count down to the season" posters to remind players and parents about upcoming registrations and deadlines. A CYP Youth Sports Face Book group (naplesyouthsports@yahoo.com) has also been created, where coaches, parents, children and staff can communicate, exchange ideas and network. A parent information meeting is hosted at the beginning of the season and all parents are highly recommended to attend as it is an excellent opportunity to establish a rapport with the coaches and other parents. A Family, Fun and Fitness Day at Carney Park has also been implemented. To support the coaches and help them better their skills, regular training seminars are being held as well as the National Youth Sports Coaches Association (NYSCA) online training. To encourage more volunteers to coach, a waiver of their child's registration fee is offered, as well as invites to pizza parties, free jerseys etc. Staff will also implement a "coach of the season" award in the coming season.

Although program manager, Gerry Troiano only has two other staff members, they manage to accommodate more than 600 children per season and the positive comments received reflect their hard work. Eighty people commented on the program availability and great quality, 33 people acknowledged the great work and dedication of the volunteer coaches, 47 people commended the program staff on their good organizational skills and program variety and an additional 19 people commented on how wonderful the staff were in general.

The data collector team is currently interviewing customers about their experiences with NSA Naples ITT offices and Strikers Bowling Center. The COSIT teams for these programs will launch in February. Naples Public Health Evaluation

What are Nitrates?

Last week, we looked at the chemical known as tetrachloroethene, or PCE, a manmade substance believed to be a carcinogen. But a chemical doesn't have to be manmade to be dangerous to human health. As part of the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE), Navy technicians tested tap water samples at off-base rental homes in the Campania region for a wide variety of substances, one of which is nitrate. At the Support Site and Capodichino, Navy officials test for nitrates and nitrites monthly in accordance with the 2008 Final Governing Standards for Italy.

Nitrate (NO₃) is a chemical compound of nitrogen and oxygen found in many food items of a person's everyday diet. Generally, the concentration of nitrate in drinking-water is low and is essential to all life. Plants use nitrates from the soil to satisfy nutrient requirements and may accumulate nitrate in their leaves and stems. Due to its high mobility, nitrate also can leach into groundwater. Most adults take in nitrate from food rather than from water. Vegetables such as spinach, lettuce, beets and carrots contain significant amounts of nitrate.

Although low levels of nitrates may occur naturally in water, sometimes higher levels are found. Nitrate contamination of drinking water usually results from runoff of agricultural fertilizers or from human or animal wastes, such as livestock feedlots or faulty septic systems. When nitrates are released to the environment, they can easily migrate to groundwater since they do not bind to soils. Because they do not evaporate, nitrates are likely to remain in water until consumed by plants or other organisms.

During Phase I of the Naples PHE, nitrate was detected at concentrations exceeding levels set by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (USEPA) at 32 of the 130 off-base rental homes.

In most of these cases, the homes used private wells, which is one of the reasons the NSA Naples Housing Office now requires all its rental homes to be connected to municipal water systems.

The health effects of too much nitrate can be serious. Short-term health effects from excessive levels of nitrate in drinking water may cause serious illness and even death. The condition is more serious for infants than for older children and adults because as the body matures, it can consume higher levels of nitrate thanks to a fully developed digestive system.


In the long-term, a lifetime exposure to nitrates above the USEPA regulatory standard has the potential to cause the following effects:

- Diuresis, which is an increased formation of urine by the kidney;
- Increased starch deposits; and
- Hemorrhaging of the spleen.

The best way to avoid nitrates in drinking water is to follow the All Hands Bottled Water Advisory issued in 2008 by Commander, Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia to use only bottled water for drinking, cooking, food preparation, brushing teeth and making ice, unless otherwise directed.

Working in cold weather

For many people, working or playing in cold weather can be a positive experience. They may feel invigorated by the bracing air and feel like doing their work with more physical energy than usual. When it comes to leisure, cold weather offers many enjoyable activities whether it's skiing, skating, snowmobiling or ice fishing.

Unfortunately, all the enjoyable aspects of working or playing out in cold weather can turn negative if individuals are not dressed warmly or dry enough.

Over exposure to cold and dampness can cause body temperature to lower. This condition is called hypothermia. A person may have it when they start to shiver and experience chills, or find themselves unable to think or speak clearly. They may lose their coordination and quite possibly their consciousness.

They could also get frostbite which is when body tissue freezes. Frostbite happens most frequently to the extremities like feet and toes, fingers, face and nose. Symptoms include numbness and a white and waxy appearance to the skin.

There are many things that can be done to dress properly for the cold:

Dress in layers so they can be removed or put on according to the temperature.

Always wear a warm hat. The head is the part of the body that loses heat the fastest. There are also liners that can be worn under a hard hat or other kinds of protective head gear to keep the head warm. Consider wearing a knitted face mask to deflect cold and wind chill.

Wear waterproof, insulated boots with several layers of socks, preferably cotton ones under wool. They enable the feet to breathe. When socks or boot liners become wet, remove and replace them.

Always wear warm gloves or mitts. Some gloves have liners which, if wet, should be removed and replaced.

In addition to dressing properly for cold conditions, it's important to eat regularly when out in the cold, especially foods high in carbohydrates and fats. The body requires an enormous number of calories to shiver and keep warm. Avoid alcohol, contrary to the popular image of the St. Bernard dog delivering brandy to warm a frozen victim.

Try to keep moving while in the cold; don't be still. This helps to keep body temperature up and circulation moving.

Anyone who thinks they are experiencing symptoms of hypothermia or frostbite should get to a shelter right away and seek medical help.

When working or playing in the cold, it is a good idea to have a companion, in case of injury or over-exposure to the cold.

Remember: People working or playing in cold weather can have a positive experience when they are dressed warmly and use common sense about protecting themselves.



Be prepared for emergencies

Here's the way it happens. A family is at home watching television or having dinner or maybe everyone is asleep.

They hear it; the earsplitting, hair-raising noise of the smoke detector. What do they do? Get everyone safely out of the house and wait for the Fire Department to arrive, right?

Not quite. Getting everyone out of harm's way is exactly the right thing to do; however, the smoke detectors and common area pull stations are not central alarms. They do not send a signal to 911 or the Fire Department. They are there to alert everyone in the area to get to safety fast. Once that is done, someone needs to call 911 and report the problem. During this call, the person needs to give their name, the reason they are calling and the exact address where the Fire Department needs to go. They should not hang up after that. They need to stay on the line so the dispatcher can quickly get any additional information and to also let the dispatcher know if the situation changes. That gives the Fire Department a better idea of what needs to be done before they get there.

Parents need to have their name, housing address (on-base or off) and contact telephone numbers where the entire family can see it. The refrigerator is a good place to post this information. Make it clear and keep it easy to see because during an emergency, the simplest facts are the first things to be forgotten.

Are the base Emergency Dispatch telephone numbers programmed into everyone's cell phones and the home phone? Now is a good time to do this. List it under 'AAA HELP' so it's the first thing on the directory. (On-base telephones: 911. Off-base or cellular telephones: 081-568-4911)

Let children know that false fire alarms are not just dangerous, they are a federal crime. More firefighters are injured or killed trying to respond to an emergency than getting the emergency under control.

Test the smoke detector every month to make sure they work and everyone recognizes the sound.

Check the expiration date on smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. If the date is past or the expiration label is missing, call the Housing Office immediately for a new replacement.

Does everyone in the family know the escape plan? Practice getting out of the house fast in case of fire or smoke or a natural gas leak. Remind older children to make sure younger ones are out of the house quickly in case parents are busy or not at home. Grab keys and once out, stay out. The firefighters will let everyone know when it's safe to go back into the building. Wait for them to check everything first.

Those with pets should keep leashes next to the door, so if there's an emergency they can grab and go.

Here are Fire and Escape Safety Tips to help everyone remember:

Every building on base has an evacuation plan posted in an easy to see spot. Stop and look as to know where to go. Pay attention during fire drills. Everyone should do these things, so when there is a real emergency, they will not have to think about what to do, they will know.

Know where all the exits are. Everyone needs to count the number of doorways to the emergency exit or staircase. They might have to find their way outside through a dark or smoky building.

If smoke in a building is between someone and their exit, they shouldn't run, but crawl and keep their head less than two feet above the floor. This is the best place to find air.

Is it safe to open that door? Check first by using the back of the hand on doorknobs and areas around the

door. If it's hot, better not. If it's warm, there might be harm. If it's cool, here's the rule. Open slowly. If smoke comes in slam the door and keep moving.

Always use the stairs and never an elevator if there might be a fire. A person's legs will get them moving even if the electricity shuts off. They don't know what will come into the elevator when the door opens.

What should a person do if they can't find an exit because of fire, heat or smoke? They should stay where they are and try to let rescuers know. Seal gaps in the room to keep smoke and heat out. Stuff towels or clothes under doors if they can. Soaking them in water will help even more. Use a telephone, make noise, hang something from an outside window to signal that someone is in the building.

Are there windows? Open them a little at the top and bottom, if possible, but close them if smoke comes in.

Don't be afraid of fire sprinkler systems. They protect the immediate area by extinguishing or containing fire. The building won't turn into a swimming pool.

Easy ways to avoid fires in the home:

If using candles is permitted in the building, keep them out of children and pet landing areas. Don't leave candles or any source of flame unattended and never walk away from cooking. Unsupervised cooking is a recipe for disaster.
