## Borowy assumes command of NAVFAC EURAFSWA

Naval Facilities Engineering Command Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia (NAVFAC EURAFSWA) held a change of command and retirement ceremony Oct. 16 at Naval Support Activity Naples.

During the ceremony, Capt. F. F. Aucremanne turned over the reins of NAVFAC EURAFSWA to Capt. Jeffrey T. Borowy, and was then retired from the U.S. Navy with over 28 years of service.

During his tenure, Aucremanne led construction efforts throughout Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia.

Prior to his assignment with NAVFAC EURAFSWA in July 2007, Aucremanne served as commanding officer of the Center for Seabees and Facilities Engineering and Naval Civil Engineer Corps Officers School.

"Our military and civilian personnel take great pride in their work, and it shows every day in supporting the commands, commanders, and the Fleet throughout our vast region. It has been a privilege to serve as the commanding officer of NAVFAC Europe, Africa and Southwest Asia," said Aucremanne.

Aucremanne is a native of Clarksburg, W. Va.

Borowy, a native of Cuyahoga Heights, Ohio, brings his vast experience to NAVFAC EURAFSWA. His previous assignment was commodore of the 25th Naval

Construction Regiment, where he led the "Overlords" from their pre-commissioning through their first deployment to Kandahar, Afghanistan in support of U.S. Forces Afghanistan and NATO Regional Command South.

Rear Adm. David J. Mercer, commander Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia was the keynote speaker at the event.



## Italian News Briefs

### Rome exhibit showcases Michelangelo's 'Renaissance genius'

A new exhibition at the Rome's Capitoline Museum shows more than 100 designs of the Renaissance genius of Michelangelo. The exhibition focuses on the architectural artist's work in Rome. The autographed designs, drawings, prints, letters and three portraits of the artist were planned to map out a chronological route through his Roman architecture. Michelangelo worked on a multitude of buildings during his two long periods in Rome and the exhibition pays particular attention to the Capitoline Hill where he began to work in 1536. The place known as "The Campidoglio" was in such bad shape that Pope Paul III Farnese asked Michelangelo to design a new square, the Piazza del Campidoglio. He remodeled the surrounding buildings and moved the central piazza's orientation from the Roman forum to the new square facing the Vatican. A key element of Michelangelo's design was placing a statue at the center of the piazza instead of the sides, overturning centuries of classical traditions. The statue of Marcus Aurelius is a replica. The original can be found in the Palazzo Nuovo. He also designed the famous staircase known as the Cordonata. The exhibition is called "Michelangelo, architetto a Roma" and runs until Feb. 7.

### Former Olympian robs tourists in Rome

A man dressed as a policeman was arrested in Rome and charged with aggravated theft. The man, along with an accomplice, approached tourists in the Vatican area and asked them for information. The man, dressed as a policeman, approached the tourists and ordered them to hand over their wallets as he showed a fake police ID card. He was identified by Italian police as a former Romanian boxing champion who won the Olympic silver medal at the 1988 games held in Seoul and another silver medal in the lightweight division at the 1989 European Amateur Boxing Championships in Athens.

### Property seized in connection with organized crime

The Guardia di Finanza (Financial police) in Giugliano near Naples confiscated a real estate compound. Prosecutors officially notified thirty-eight people who were associated with a criminal organization, among them were mayors, public officials,

several entrepreneurs and building constructors. The real estate compound, included 98 apartments and a hotel valued at 40 million euros, is located inside the Parco Obelisco in the Giugliano Varcaturu area.

### Collapsed dormitory may be fault of construction workers

Twelve people were notified of criminal charges against them for their responsibility in the collapse of a university dormitory during the April 6 earthquake in L'Aquila. Eight students died inside when the building crumbled down during the quake which killed almost 300 people. Prosecutors were also looking at other buildings that collapsed to determine if any negligence was involved. They opened an investigation immediately after the quake, looking into both the construction work and materials used, amid allegations that sea sand was illegally mixed with cement, corroding and weakening it. A group of students who survived the destruction of their lodgings created a committee in order to present a formal complaint over the state of the building before the quake.

### Charity wants George Clooney's wedding tie

An Italian charity asked American actor George Clooney for his wedding tie, if he marries Italian actress Elisabetta Canalis, for their fundraiser. The charity wants to auction the tie to raise money for Telethon during this year's auction in December. The charity organization sent a letter to Clooney's villa asking for something worn during his wedding, preferably a tie. According to Italian rumors, Clooney gave his Italian girlfriend a diamond band but the wedding has yet to become official.

### Window washers to face strict fines

Rome's city council passed an ordinance against window washers. This measure will be in force until June 30, 2010. It imposes a fine of €100, and the confiscation of their takings. Window washers found to be illegal immigrants will be sent to the nearest shelter for expulsion from Italy. Children found working on the streets will be entrusted to social services. The mayor of Rome signed previous ordinances against loitering, street vendors and prostitutes, and the next one on his agenda is against graffiti writers.

## Stay safe: Home security tips

Provided by NSA Naples Housing and Security Departments

- Secure all windows, doors and external security shutters prior to going to bed or when not at home. Conduct a visual inspection to ensure everything is closed/locked, and make sure shutter securing pins are fit snugly into their receivers.
- Those with an alarm system, make sure to arm it when in the house, and before departing, especially when going to bed.
- If the house does not have an alarm before it is rented, consider negotiating the installation of an alarm system before renting it. Additionally, request an alarm system which has internal sensors and sensors on the outside of the house. That way, if the house has motion sensors, those with pets can activate the external sensors.
- If going away for the weekend or on an extended trip, notify someone trustworthy of the trip and arrange for them to visit your house during your absence. Only notify neighbors or a landlord if they are trustworthy.
- Do not place names or any signs that indicate a foreigner lives in the home on mailboxes or anywhere on the external part of the house.
- Break habits such as leaving all important material like keys, remotes, cell phones, wallets, and money in the convenient dish just inside the door or foyer as thieves know this is a common practice amongst Americans.
- Do not proudly display possessions in open windows such as large screen TV's, China hutches, etc.
- Always stay vigilant and do not become complacent, the moment a person gets comfortable, is the moment when something may happen. Always be aware of things that do not look normal and report them. Things like moving trucks at a neighbor's house if unaware they were moving, cars with people sitting in them for no apparent reason, door-to-door solicitation that seems odd or the presence of workforce doing repairs where it seems none were needed may all be items of interest.

## Breaking the silence of teen dating violence

Parent send their teen to school, talk to them about drugs and sex, but do they talk to them about developing healthy dating relationships? Most parents would say they concentrate more on the discussion of drugs and sex. However, violence in a relationship normally starts in the dating phase. Teens can mistake violence for signs of love. This is not the way relationships are supposed to be. Most teens don't understand the signs so adults have to educate them on the signs of disrespect and violence in a relationship. Some of the signs of dating violence are the same signs found in adult abusive relationships, such as physical abuse, emotional abuse, and sexual abuse. In the case of teens, their school performance can become affected by the violence in the relationship.

Parents should ask themselves these questions to help identify if their teen may be in an abusive relationship:

Does he or she have unexplained injuries or wear long sleeved shirts or long pants in the summer?

Does he or she give up favorite hobbies or withdraw from family and friends?

Has he or she gained or lost a lot of weight?

Does he or she cry a lot or overact to minor problems?

Some warning signs that a partner may be abusive are as follows: They pressure their partner to get serious or have sex before they're ready.

They get jealous or possessive of their partner.

They can exhibit controlling behaviors.

They can get extremely angry and overreact.

They can have low self esteem.

They can have rigid ideas about gender roles in a relationship.

During an exhibition game between Naples and Juventus (team from Torino), more than four years ago, people from all over were jumping the walls and fences sneaking in. Diego Armando Maradona, who played with the Azzurri in the late 1980's, was making an appearance and a lot of the soccer world considers him to be the best player ever, or at least a close second behind Pele'. At that point, Naples hadn't had a winning team since his departure and just getting a glimpse of him roaming the stadium was all the city needed for one night to forget about everyday worries. That night, it was obvious the passion Naples soccer fans possess.

This article is meant to introduce the NSA Naples community to Azzurri soccer and to share information on how to go about spending an unforgettable day at the San Paolo in Fuorigrotta.

Azzurri Service in Fuorigrotta, adjacent to San Paolo Stadium, sells tickets to each home game starting on Tuesdays. Calling before going is suggested; their hours of operations fluctuate.

Purchasing tickets for "Tribuna" is also suggested. These are the only tickets that have respected assigned seating. "Distinti" or "Curva" tickets have numbered seating, but, it is really first come, first serve. Arrive at the stadium at least two hours before game time to get a good seat with Distinti or Curva tickets. Normally, tickets for the Tribuna are no more than 80 euro for a full price ticket. Visit the following Web site for estimated ticket prices: <http://www.stadium.it/en/default.asp>. The tickets cost a little less at Azzurri Service.

The following steps will make for a smooth trip on a Sunday afternoon for a three o'clock game:  
If traveling by the metro, purchase a "giornaliero"

ticket from the Coffee Bar on base at the Support Site or most tabacchi shops. This ticket is good for the train station and any bus. Depart from Aversa Train Station at 10:48 a.m. on the Intercity Sunday morning. Make a transfer at Napoli Centrale station. Trains leave from Napoli Central about every 10 minutes heading to Campi Flegrei Train Station in Fuorigrotta. The train should arrive at Campi Flegrei around noon. After exiting the station, the stadium will be straight ahead. The gates are labeled according to what the tickets say. Pay close attention to the section, row, and seat number. Get assistance from stadium officials, if needed, once entering the seating area.

If traveling by car, try to be on the Tangenziale by twelve o'clock to avoid the rush hour traffic. Exit off the Fuorigrotta exit on the Tangenziale and turn left after the toll booth. The stadium will be straight ahead. Some parking garages in the area are listed below. Expect to pay anywhere from 10 to 30 euro depending on car size and location of the garage.



If traveling by metro after the game, depart from Campi Flegrei at 5:53 p.m. or 7:53 p.m. on the Regionale. Make a transfer at Villa Literno Train Station at 6:49 p.m. or 8:50 p.m. respectively, and arrive at Aversa Train Station either at 7 p.m. or 9 p.m.

If traveling by car, wait until about two hours after the game ends to avoid rush hour traffic. This would be the perfect opportunity to grab an ice cream or café macchiato.

# Naples Public Health Evaluation

## Water holding tank disinfection

### What tenants need to know

This time a year ago, American newcomers to Naples were experiencing a much more complicated process of renting houses on the economy. Because the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE) had discovered volatile organic compounds (VOCs) in tap water in several homes and bacteriological contamination in the tap water of other homes scattered throughout Campania, Navy leadership decided to begin testing each rental home for tap water contamination before personnel signed a lease. Leadership also implemented several other mitigation measures to safeguard the health of Navy personnel and their families. By Dec. 2008, these mitigation measures were in full effect and NSA Naples Housing Office no longer had to screen each house with pre-lease water tests, thereby streamlining the leasing process. However, tenants are encouraged to follow the other mitigation measures and ensure their landlord adheres to the new lease requirements.

One such lease clause requires landlords to regularly disinfect the home's water supply system (piping, tanks, components). In Italy, water holding tanks are commonly used to deal with low water pressure. Although the lease clause mostly concerns landlords, tenants need to be aware of the lease requirement and the general cleaning process the landlord should be using.

The clause in NSA Naples Housing leases reads as follows:

#### 32) WATER TANK CLEANING

Landlord will clean supplemental tanks twice a year in accordance with instructions provided by NSA Naples Housing. Landlord will provide a written statement of such cleaning to the tenant.

Tenant is held responsible to make sure landlord performs this maintenance and seeks Housing assistance if he does not proceed accordingly to lease.

Water holding tanks need to be disinfected because over time organic material such as bacteria, algae and silt may build up. This can create a bad odor in the water, unacceptable taste, and in some cases bacteria that may be harmful to a person's health.

Israel Melendez, deputy director of NSA Naples Housing said, "I would recommend that the tenant conduct a visual inspection of the supplemental tank to ensure internal cleanliness and appearance of the water."

Start by checking to see whether the water tank is in good condition and secure. For example, look

to see whether the tank cover is kept locked; check for corrosion or leakage (rust streaks may indicate leakage); and make sure that connections and screens are in good condition.

Regular tank inspections help ensure early detection of needed repairs and can save the landlord a significant amount of money. Most importantly for the tenant, inspections may prevent the buildup of a variety of microorganisms that can cause illness.

#### Mitigation Measures:

- Issuing a bottled water advisory for drinking, cooking/food preparation, making ice, brushing teeth and for pets
- Leasing only homes on city water, or proof that a private well is legal
- Requiring landlords to provide a Navy-approved containerized water service
- Requiring landlords to disinfect the home's water supply system before a tenant moves in and every six months thereafter
- Creating New Lease Suspension Zones - areas where tap water, or soil gas, had unacceptable risks, and
- Planning to implement a long-term, random tap water monitoring program for bacteria for rental homes on the Housing list.



## NSA Naples energy conservation

*Tips to save with small appliances:*

- **Cook with small appliances** such as toaster ovens, electric skillets and slow cookers for specialized jobs, rather than the range. Small appliances use less energy.
- **Use the microwave.** Microwave ovens shorten cooking times, which saves energy.
- **Clean or replace air filters.** Replace filters on exhaust hoods, humidifiers, vacuums, etc. Clogged filters impair performance and cause the units to run longer.
- **Run cold water for disposal.** Hot water requires energy to warm the water. Cold water saves energy and solidifies grease, moving it more easily through the garbage disposal and pipes.

## SECNAV outlines five 'ambitious' energy goals

Saying he was committing "the Navy and Marine Corps to meet bold, ambitious goals," Secretary of the Navy Ray Mabus announced five energy targets to the audience of more than 750 gathered Oct. 14-15 at the Naval Energy Forum in McLean, Va.

Those targets, the Navy secretary said on day one of the two-day conference, include changing the way the Navy and Marine Corps award contracts during the acquisition process to consider the lifetime energy cost of the system; by 2012, creating a "Green Strike Group" composed of nuclear vessels and ships powered by biofuels and deploying that fleet by 2016; by 2015, reducing petroleum use in its 50,000 commercial vehicle fleet by 50 percent by phasing in hybrid fuel and electric vehicles; producing at least half the shore-based energy requirements from renewable sources, such as solar, wind and ocean generated by the base; and by 2020, ensuring at least 40 percent of the Navy's total energy consumption comes from alternative sources.

"Leading change is not new for the Department of the Navy," said Mabus. "We are a better Navy and a better Marine Corps for innovation. We have led the world in the adoption of new energy strategies in the past. This is our legacy."

The forum, hosted by the Office of Naval Research and the Navy's Task Force Energy, was organized to introduce the Department of Navy emerging energy strategy and initiatives, and gain insight from dialogues with participants, event organizers said. It was focused around three key themes tied to energy—security, efficiency and environmental stewardship.

With multiple opportunities to exchange information and dialogue, the main event was a plenary room that featured senior keynote presenters and interactive panel discussions around the key themes. Breakout rooms showcased energy-related Navy programs, hybrid and alternative fuel technologies and opportunities for one-on-one collaborations.

In addition to Mabus, Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Gary Roughead also shared his vision of the Navy's energy strategy with the cross-section of representatives from federal government agencies, academic institutions, small business and the defense industry.

The Department of Defense is the largest government and individual petroleum user in the United States, guzzling about 330,000 barrels of oil per day, according to military officials. The Department of the Navy is the second largest fuel user in the DoD, consuming about 100,000 barrels a day. About 75 percent of all fuel products are transported by sea, much of it passing through vulnerable points protected by U.S. naval forces, officials said.

"For all of you in here, it comes as no surprise that energy powers our way of life," Roughead said during his speech. "I also think that as we go forward, the Navy can continue to be a great steward of our environment. The initiatives that we are going to explore here, and things that we are doing with Task Force Energy and Task Force Climate Change, allow us to be able to continue that reputation of stewardship."

Highlighting the importance of science and technology as the Navy plots its energy strategy, Roughead said, "Everything doesn't have to be game-changing technology, even though I've challenged (the Office of Naval Research) to find 'the next big thing.'"

The Navy and Marine Corps' science and technology provider, the Office of Naval Research (ONR) invests in a wide range of energy science and technology projects. Dr. Larry Schuette, ONR's director of innovation, participated in the "Pitch a Principal" program where interested parties discussed funding opportunities with ONR. He said the forum was a great platform to exchange ideas.

"This was the perfect opportunity for industry and our warfighter partners to meet a broad range of subject matter experts one-on-one," Schuette said.

Other participants also praised the forum.

Jeff Voth, president of Herron Associates, an engineering and management consulting company, called the event "very impressive. By the show of senior leadership attendance and the delivery of an aggressive naval energy strategy, the Navy is taking the lead and raising the bar for industry to achieve more."

When Madea, America's favorite pistol-packing grandma, catches sixteen-year-old Jennifer and her two younger brothers looting her home, she decides to take matters into her own hands and delivers the young delinquents to the only relative they have: their aunt April. A heavy-drinking nightclub singer who lives off of Raymond, her married boyfriend, April wants nothing to do with the kids. But her attitude begins to change when Sandino, a handsome Mexican immigrant looking for work, moves into April's basement room. Making amends for his own troubled past, Sandino challenges April to open her heart. And April soon realizes she must make the biggest choice of her life: between her old ways with Raymond and the new possibilities of family, faith... and even true love.

Reclusive billionaire Ken Castle has created the controversial form of entertainment, "Slayers," a hugely popular game that allows millions to act out their innermost desires and fantasies -- online -- in front of a global audience. Gaming has evolved into a terrifying new dimension--mind control-manipulation-people playing people. At the center is Kable, the superstar and cult hero of "Slayers," the savage, ultra-violent first person shooter game. Kable is controlled by Simon, a young gamer with rock star status who continues to defy all odds by guiding Kable to victory each week. Taken from his family, imprisoned and forced to fight against his will, the modern day gladiator must survive long enough to escape the game to free his family, regain his identity and to save mankind from Castle's ruthless technology.

A group of hardened Nazi-killers stalk their prey in Nazi-occupied France as a Jewish cinema owner plots to take down top-ranking SS officers during the official premiere of a high-profile German propaganda film. As far as Lt. Aldo Raine (aka Aldo the Apache) (Brad Pitt) is concerned, the only good Nazi is a dead Nazi.

His mission is to strike fear into the heart of Adolph Hitler by brutally murdering as many goose-steppers as possible, or die trying. In order to accomplish that goal, Lt. Raine recruits a ruthless team of cold-blooded killers known as "The Basterds" which includes baseball bat-wielding Bostonian Sgt. Donnie Donowitz (aka The Bear Jew) (Eli Roth) and steely psychopath Sgt. Hugo Stiglitz (Til Schweiger), among others. When The Basterds' secret rendezvous with turncoat German actress Bridget von Hammersmark (Diane Kruger) goes awry, they learn that the Nazi's will be staging the French premiere of "The Nation's Pride," a rousing propaganda film based on the exploits of German hero Fredrick Zoller (Daniel Brühl), at a modest theater owned by Jewish cinemaphile Shoshanna Dreyfus (Mélanie Laurent), posing as French under the brutal murder of her family by the ruthless Col. Hans Landa (Christopher Waltz). As The Basterds hatch an explosive plan to take out as many Nazis as possible at the premiere, they remain completely oblivious to the fact that Shoshanna, too, longs to bring the Third Reich to its knees, and that she's willing to sacrifice her beloved theater in the process.

Nora Ephron adapts Julie Powell's autobiographical book Julie and Julia: 365 Days, 524 Recipes, 1 Tiny Apartment Kitchen with this Columbia Pictures production starring Amy Adams as an amateur chef who decides to cook every recipe in a cookbook from acclaimed celebrity chef Julia Child (played by Meryl Streep) in order to chronicle it in a blog over the course of a year. Streep's Devil Wears Prada co-star Stanley Tucci re-teams with the actress as Child's husband.

**THE FINAL DESTINATION,** R, for strong violent/gruesome accidents, language and a scene of sexuality, Science Fiction/Fantasy and Suspense/Horror 81 min. Cast: Bobby Campo, Shantel VanSanten, Nick Zano, Haley Webb, Mykelti Williamson. On what should have been a fun-filled day at the races, Nick O'Bannon has a horrific premonition in which a bizarre sequence of events causes multiple race cars to crash, sending flaming debris into the stands, brutally killing his friends and causing the upper deck of the stands to collapse on him. But that doesn't stop Tom from going after her, again and again, like a modern Don Quixote, with all his might and courage. Suddenly, Tom is in love not just with a lovely, witty, intelligent woman -- but with the very idea of Summer, the very idea of a love that still has the power to shock the heart and stop the world. The fuse is lit on Day 1 when Tom, a would-be architect turned sappy greeting card writer, encounters Summer, his boss's breezy, beautiful new secretary, fresh off the plane from Michigan. Johan de Witt, a Royal Dutch Naval vessel, is the first European-led APS platform and is augmented by staff from Belgium, Portugal and the United States. APS, originally a U.S. Navy initiative, is now an international effort aimed at improving maritime safety and security for the continent of Africa through training and other collaborative activities with African partner countries.

## APS, Seabees bolster Liberia's Coast Guard

U.S. Navy Seabee equipment came ashore Oct. 17 in Monrovia, Liberia from amphibious landing craft attached to the Dutch Africa Partnership Station (APS) platform HNLMS Johan de Witt (L 801).

A team of 20 Seabees from Naval Mobile Construction Battalion Three, stationed in Rota, Spain, will utilize the newly arrived equipment to rebuild portions of a Liberian Coast Guard base that were destroyed by factional groups in the country's civil war, which ended in 2003.

"At the request of the U.S. Ambassador to Liberia, the Seabees were brought in to do several construction projects, to include the reconstruction of the children's hospital wing at Redemption Clinic and the rebuilding of the Liberian Coast Guard base, which will include the construction of a pier and boat ramp," said U.S. Coast Guard Cmdr. Jennifer Ketchum, maritime advisor in the Office of Security Cooperation within the U.S. Embassy in Liberia. "The overall goal is for Liberia to rebuild its maritime interdiction capability in order for the country to know what is going on in its territorial waters and enforce their laws."

"Maritime domain awareness is currently non-existent in my country," said Chea K. Klogba,

Liberia's Coast Guard planning officer. "Illegal fishing and drug and human trafficking is occurring in our waters, and we can do nothing about it. With the Coast Guard being reestablished, now we can fight these illegal activities. This will provide a source of revenue for my country and offer protection of our territorial waters."

Increasing maritime safety and security for the continent of Africa through training and other collaborative activities with African partner countries are the main purpose of APS.

While in Monrovia, Johan de Witt will also continue in the training of 46 African maritime professionals from Ghana, Senegal and Sierra Leone who are currently deployed on board the Dutch ship receiving instruction in courses such as maritime law enforcement, small boat operations, boat maintenance and repair, medical procedures, damage control, and computer operations.

Also, a combined team of U.S. and Dutch hydrographers will survey the harbors of and approaches to Monrovia to allow for safer navigation and better access to port facilities.

APS focuses on building cooperative partnerships with regional maritime services in order to achieve common, international goals such as stability and security.

The APS Johan de Witt deployment began in September and will run through November. Port visits encompass stops in Cape Verde, Ghana, Liberia, Senegal and Sierra Leone.

If a parent suspects their teen is involved in an abusive relationship, listen to them without being judgmental. Help them develop a safety plan for ending the violence in their relationship. Be supportive of them by listening and offering to take them to counseling if they are open to clinical counseling. If the teen is in fear of their safety, then legal action is another form of intervention. The police or base security would have to be notified to file a report. The courts can also issue restraining orders to help limit contact between the alleged offender and victim. It's important to remember that violence is not a normal part of a healthy relationship. Anyone in need of help should contact the Naples Fleet & Family Service Center.

## Fall protection safety guidelines

### Where is "fall protection" needed?

These include, but are not limited to, ramps, runways, and other walkways; excavations; hoist areas; holes; formwork and reinforcing steel; leading edge work; precast concrete erection; wall openings; residential construction; and other walking/working surfaces. The rule sets a uniform threshold height of six feet (1.8 meters), thereby providing consistent protection. This means that construction employers must protect their employees from fall hazards and falling objects whenever an affected employee is six feet (1.8 meters) or more above a lower level; and, in accordance with 29 CFR 1910.23 (c)(1), every open-sided floor or platform four feet or more above adjacent floor or ground level shall be equipped by a standard railing. Protection must also be provided for construction workers who are exposed to the hazard of falling into dangerous equipment. Fall protection generally can be provided through the use of guardrail systems, safety net systems, personal fall arrest systems, positioning device systems, and warning line systems, among others.

The OSHA rule clarifies what an employer must do to provide fall protection for employees, such as identifying and evaluating fall hazards and providing specific training. Requirements to provide fall protection for workers on scaffolds and ladders and for workers engaged in steel erection of buildings are covered in other subparts of OSHA regulations.

Employers are required to assess the workplace to determine if the walking/working surfaces on which employees are to work have the strength and structural integrity to safely support workers. Employees are not permitted to work on those surfaces until it has been determined that the surfaces have the requisite strength and structural integrity to support the workers. Once employers have determined that the surface is safe for employees to work on, the employer must select one of the options listed for the work operation if a fall hazard is present. For example, if an employee is exposed to an area where falling six feet (1.8 meters) or more from an unprotected side or edge is possible, the employer must select a guardrail system, safety net system, or personal fall arrest system to protect the worker.

In the construction industry in the U.S., falls are the leading cause of worker fatalities. Each year, on average, between 150 and 200 workers are killed and more than 100,000 are injured as a result of falls at construction sites. The standard for fall protection deals with both the human and equipment-related issues in protecting workers from fall hazards. For example, employers and employees need to do the following:

- Where protection is required, select fall protection systems appropriate for given situations.
- Use proper construction and installation of safety systems.
- Supervise employees properly.
- Use safe work procedures.
- Train workers in the proper selection, use, and maintenance of all protection systems
