NSA Naples recognizes ombudsmen with photo board

Naval Support Activity Naples recognized their ombudsmen Monday with a ribbon cutting ceremony for a new photo board which will display a photo of each ombudsman, similar to chain of command boards found on quarterdecks around the fleet, at the Navy Exchange (NEX) on NSA Naples Support Site.

The ceremony follows Ombudsman Appreciation Day (Sept. 14) and in the same spirit of Ombudsman Appreciation Day, the photo board is meant to recognize the members of the ombudsmen within the Naples military community.

According to Cmdr. Stephen Schutt, NSA Naples executive officer, the purpose of the photo board is to give members of the military community in Naples an opportunity to get familiar with their ombudsman. The photo board not only serves as a point of reference for the members of the commu-

"Ombudsmen are an important part of any military community," said Schutt. "They provide a service to the whole community by offering support and programs for not only spouses, but the whole family. It is important for us as a military community to support and recognize our

ombudsmen."

Ombudsmen are the link between the commander of a command and its members.

"Having an ombudsman, in my experience, is very important," said Latamba Harris, ombudsman and Family Readiness Support assistant for the Army Element at Joint Forces Command. "The

program gives spouses and service members an opportunity for communication with the chain of command."

I would like to start off by saying "THANK YOU" to everyone who worked so hard putting together the Ombudsman Photo Board ribbon cutting ceremony. It is always important to recognize **OUR** hardworking Ombudsmen; they do so much for the commands and community behind the scenes. Also, Bravo Zulu to HT2 Nicholas Lauver for taking the time to build a spectacular photo board on display at the NEX.

In good XO fashion, I will dive right in to the details; **OUR** community has had quite a few incidents recently with young children on base without any adult supervision, walking around, at the High School football game, or just at a playground by themselves. I need to remind everyone the NSA Naples instruction 1752.3A contains the Child Supervision Grid which outlines supervision guidelines for **OUR** Naples community. In summary, no children, newborn to 8-years-old, should be unattended.

If you have been to the Navy Exchange or the Commissary lately, you have noticed the one-euro requirement to use a shopping cart. The one-euro is **refundable** as long as you return the cart. In the past, many of our shopping carts have gone astray throughout the Support Site. We attempted to remind folks to return them to the NEX/DECA Complex but they didn't seem to make it there. Due to this, the one-euro refundable fee helps us keep track of the carts and also makes the carts available when you need one! It isn't the NEX/DECA folks fault for reinstating the fee; I assume full responsibility for the return of the coin locks!

Remember that **OUR** pets are not allowed on DoDDS property or in front of the NEX/DECA Complex at any time. This includes sporting events, before and after school, or during Tent or Case Lot sales. These rules are for the safety of all of **OUR** community. Please visit the Pet Policy link on the NSA Naples Web Page for more info.

Finally my last two items, at both Capo and Support Site in **OUR** public locations we have designated smoking areas, **PLEASE** use them for smoking! In addition, the Trash/Recycling collection points on board Capo and Support Site are for those residences' **ONLY**. As a reminder, those of US living on the economy need to dispose of **OUR** trash in accordance with the towns and communes we live in, **DO NOT BRING IT ON TO THE BASE**. The Support Site is successfully managing **OUR** trash collections, and we cannot afford to add to it.

I wish **OUR** Naples High Schools teams the best of luck this coming weekend, and look forward to hearing **OUR** band's halftime show. Also, it's never too late to volunteer to assist in any of the numerous organizations throughout the community. **OUR** community needs your help and support; become a volunteer!

Naples Tiger Sharks make waves across Italy

Naples Tiger Sharks began their season by traveling to Sigonella over Labor Day weekend for their first competition, and more recently, the team competed Sept. 20 at Aviano. In both meets, more than 35 swimmers, ranging in ages from seven to 18, made the journey to swim against the clock and challenge their rival teams in the European Forces Swim League (EFSL) Southern Division.

The Sigonella Swordfish hosted the Naples Tiger Sharks Sept. 6 at the Naval Air Station's outdoor pool facility. A combination of abundant Sicilian sunshine, host team hospitality, the volunteer efforts of Sigonella's chief selects, and the thrill of competition made for a memorable season opener. Of the 42 Tiger Sharks that swam in Sigonella, over half took a first or second place in at least one individual event for their age group. Despite these outstanding personal performances and strong relay teams, the Swordfish enjoyed numerical superiority and fielded some impressive swimmers of their own, resulting in a defeat of Naples.

The Aviano Sea Dragons hosted the season's second meet Sept. 20. Competing teams included the Naples Tiger Sharks, Vicenza Mako Sharks, and a small con-

tingent of swimmers from the EFSL German Division. The 36 Tiger Sharks who traveled north made a strong showing, defeating both the Sea Dragons and Mako Sharks.

Swimmers can compete in up to three individual events and two relays in each meet. The center will provide a faster response to students' College Level Examination Program (CLEP) tests and Dantes Subject Standardized Test (DSST). It is equipped with computer modules that can process a student's exam and give an almost immediate response, where in the past, it would take six to eight weeks to get results.

"Instead of waiting weeks to find out results and then wait to determine what course to sign up for, now students can come in, take their test and get immediate results," said Capt. John Picker, commanding officer of the Center for Personal and Professional Development.

During the ribbon cutting ceremony Cmdr. Stephen Schutt, NSA Naples executive officer; Dr. Allan Berg, PhD, JD, vice president and director of UMUC Europe; and members of the UMUC staff as well as students were in attendance. The ceremony concluded with refreshments supplied by UMUC, which provided an opportunity for the staff members and students to talk about the services the Navy College Office offers.

NAPLES PHE cancer study released

The cancer epidemiological study, titled "Analysis of Environmental Exposures and Cancer Risk for U.S. Navy and Marine Corps Active Duty and Family Members Located in Naples, Italy," is one of three epidemiological studies conducted as part of the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE). The cancer study was completed in Sept. 2009 and is now posted on the Naples Community Health Awareness Web site. The other epidemiological studies, also posted on the Web site, are asthma and birth defects.

The cancer epidemiological study, conducted by the Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center, was designed to investigate whether exposure to contaminants due to inadequate trash collection, the burning of trash, and improper waste disposal would increase the incidence rate of


cancer in U.S. Navy personnel and dependents living in Naples.

To select the cancers to be evaluated in the study, Navy epidemiologists reviewed the chemicals that were detected in Phase I tap water, soil and air samples above U.S. Environmental Protection Agency health-protective screening levels. Information about the chemicals was then researched in medical literature to determine whether the chemical could be potentially associated with an increase in cancer, and if so, which types of cancer could result from that exposure. From the list of resulting cancers, epidemiologists considered the cancer's latency period, which is the time elapsed from the start of the cancer process to the time that the cancer can be clinically detected. For a cancer to be included in the study, it must have been capable of developing within the study period (1997-2009) so that a change in cancer rate would have the potential to be observed. Non-melanoma skin cancer, malignant melanoma and acute myelogenous leukemia (AML) were the

three cancers that met the study criteria: (1) the cancer was associated with chemicals detected in the Navy's environmental samples above health-protective screening levels; and (2) the cancer had a short enough latency period that exposure and diagnosis can occur during the study period.

The number of cases of melanoma and AML for the cancer study was less than five cases for either cancer; too low to calculate incidence rates with any statistical validity. Five cases is the accepted minimum number of cases to reliably calculate incidence rates. Incidence rates are calculated and allow comparisons with other populations.

The incidence rate of non-melanoma skin cancer found in the study population was 14.4 cases per 100,000 person-years. This incidence rate is lower than the incidence for skin cancer in the U.S. population, but not statistically different. Most cancer rates are expressed as the

number of cases per 100,000 person-years so that comparisons can be made between populations of different sizes.

Overall, the findings do not suggest an excess of cancer and are consistent with cancer rates observed in populations with an average age of less than 50 years.

It is important to remember that an epidemiological study looks at effects on populations, not individuals. Therefore, any military personnel or members of their families who have a concern about their health should not hesitate to consult their health care provider.

Staff members at the Environmental Health Information Center are available to explain the study methodology and findings. When the Naples Public Health Evaluation is completed, the Navy will review the final list of chemicals to determine whether a follow-up cancer study will be required.

Ergonomics guards against injuries

Musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs) are injuries and illnesses affecting the body's muscles, tendons, ligaments, joints, or spinal disks. Ergonomics is the main weapon in preventing MSDs. It is the science of fitting jobs to the people who do them. An ergonomics program is intended to reduce MSDs in workers who must reach, bend over, lift heavy objects, use continuous force, work with vibrating equipment, or do repetitive motions as part of their work. MSDs can lead to loss of strength, loss of range of motion, loss of muscle function, and loss of ability to do ordinary tasks.

Common symptoms of MSDs include:

- Painful joints
- Pain, tingling, numbness in hands or feet
- Shooting or stabbing pains in the arms or legs
- Swelling or inflammation
- Burning sensation
- Pain in the wrists, shoulders, forearms or knees
- Fingers or toes turning white
- Back or neck pain
- Stiffness

Preventing MSDs:

Employees and their supervisors can work together to improve work environments to help prevent problems such as back injuries and repetitive strain injuries.

- **Adjust work stations.** This might mean raising or lowering a chair, changing the level of a work bench

or obtaining a platform to stand on. Adjusting the angle of a drafting board or repositioning a computer screen can greatly improve comfort and performance. Lighting can also be rearranged so work can be seen without having to lean forward.

- **Adapt tools.** Adjustments to tools such as longer, padded, or angled handles can lessen repetitive strain. Avoid handles which cut into the hand. Use tools designed to keep hands, arms and back in a comfortable, natural position while working.
- **Arrange work.** Lay out materials so they can be reached without excessive stretching, twisting or bending. When assembling materials, arrange them so they can be picked up with a minimum of reaching. Avoid arrangements where leaning forward and reaching at an angle are necessary. Store materials on a shelf rather than on the floor to minimize lifting.
- **Take a break.** Organize work to allow switching from one task to another. This will help avoid back strain and repetitive strain. Take advantage of scheduled breaks to stretch and move around.
- **Be aware.** Everyone should pay attention to how they feel while they are working. They should make adjustments in their work area to prevent strain on their muscles.

Changing the way a workstation is arranged, or modifying a work procedure may be all it takes to prevent an MSD. This will help to increase safety, health, productivity, and comfort. Ergonomics is for everyone.

6th Fleet Sailor dies in motorcycle accident

His previous duty assignments include EODMU 2 in Little Creek, Va.; Assault Craft Unit 2 in Norfolk, Va.; USS Gunston Hall (LSD 44), home ported in Little Creek, Va.; USS Clark (FFG 11), home ported in Norfolk, Va.; USS Shiloh (CG 67), home ported in Yokosuka, Japan, along with multiple schools and training commands.

His personal awards include the Army Commendation Medal with "V" device, Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal, Army Achievement Medal, Navy Good Conduct Medal, National Defense Service Medal, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal, Southwest Asia Service Medal, Iraq Campaign Medal and the Global War on Terrorism Service Medal.

Campanian October treats: first Italian Antarctic expedition exhibit, concerts, harvest fests, more

As might be expected with the season change, museums unveil new exhibits while music venues program numerous concerts. Italian sagre or produce fests, along with golden leaves and blossoms, abound with the crisp October air. Taking a break from daily routine means celebrating farmers' fruits of labor with lots of treats rather than tricks: food, wine, music and vibrant entertainment, make it a great and colorful time to check out the local scene.

New exhibits

Bagnoli's Museo del Mare showcases Italian Antarctic explorer, Giovanni Ajmone Cat until Nov. 26

Now at the museum located just a few minutes drive from JFC-NATO, the riveting photo documentary exhibit, "Viaggio in Antartide di Giovanni Ajmone Cat" ("Giovanni Ajmone Cat's Journey to Antarctica") is definitely for adventurers at heart and sailing enthusiasts. Why see the exhibit? For the inspiring story of an intrepid, determined and religious ground-breaker whose passion for the sea ushered the way to explore an inhospitable, remote continent with two goals: to fulfill his dream of hoisting the Italian flag where no one had ever done so and to check into the possible formation of an Italian Antarctic Research Center there. Ajmone Cat with three crew members was the first Italian to venture towards Antarctica and land on Deception Island, according to a voyage companion. He added, they visited the continent's U.S. base Palmer Station for geological studies and hydrographic surveys.

Born in Rome in 1934 to Gen. Mario Ajmone Cat, a former Italian Air Force chief of staff, Giovanni grew up reading stories on great explorers. He then developed his sailing skills on his first boat "San Giuseppe I" in Anzio and

Como, where he died in 2007.


Giovanni's wife, Esme Lucas Havens, described the captain as "a remarkable traditional seaman" who "felt that he was the last of the 'Heroic Age' of Antarctic exploration, that is before the advent of GPS and other modern aids." According to Havens, Giovanni's achievement was Italy's "first and so it was really going off into the unknown." Havens cited that although the captain came from a non-seafaring family, "he had an instinctive feeling, built in gift and passion for the sea, for the winds, the currents and the weather ... he was gifted too, as a navigator using traditional instruments, sextant, compass, chronometer and log." Lastly, Giovanni's knowledge prompted the Marine University of Naples, to ask Giovanni "to do research for them comparing the nautical sextant with the bubble sextant as used by aircraft."

The display highlights the Captain's 1969 and 1973 voyages from Anzio to Antarctica on "San Giuseppe II", a Torre del Greco-built, 16 mt (50+ ft) lateen-rigged motorsailer. The first voyage lasted two and a half years and the other less than two years. Numerous photographs (routes, seaports, landscapes) as well as the documentary film, "The Tricolor in the South Seas" by Dario Trentin (Giovanni's friend and voyage companion) recount the joys and challenges of both voyages. Worth examining are the models of both "San Giuseppe" boats; the Captain's personal effects (books on explorers, Homer's classics, maps, polar wear, sleeping gear, and souvenir ship models) plus sailing equipment (radio, propeller, anchor and ropes). Soon to be published will be Cat's travel diary which, according to its editor, Ferruccio Russo, will be accompanied by amazing photographs.

Bagnoli's Museo del Mare, now under the direction of Prof. Antonio Mussari, is part of the Istituto Tecnico Nautico Duca degli Abruzzi

Gaeta gets spill response ready

A three-day Facility Response Team course was held August 18-20 at the NSA Naples Gaeta Port. The goal of the exercise was to provide spill response training to Port Ops personnel who are the first responders in an on-water oil spill emergency.

The first day was dedicated to a classroom review of oil spill response guidelines, various types of spill equipment used for on-water responses, and a discussion of on-water oil recovery procedures. The following days were spent on the water carrying out exercises involving the use of the equipment and practicing spill response drills.

Two types of oil recovery exercises were practiced. The first drill, known as the U-tow configuration, required two boats to coordinate and work together to deploy the containment boom, circle the oil spill, and direct the contained oil to a recovery skimmer. The second method used only one boat to deploy the boom and capture the oil.

The class instructor, Bill "Woody" Woodward stated, "Making an oil spill go where you want it to is not rocket science. You just have to be smarter than the oil."

Woodward commended the team for their ability to

work well together and use problem solving skills to determine the best way to accomplish the tasks. He pointed out that while there are general procedures that were taught in the class, it is also critical that any facility response team possess the skills to develop site-specific solutions to oil recovery. The team demonstrated those skills and showed outstanding interest and dedication.

The exercise was deemed a success thanks to EN2 Rosalio Gallegos, BM2 Paul Supnet, BM2 Dion Patterson, EN2 Nicholas Dearing, BM2 Steven Burke, Pietro D'Alessandro, Sebastian Guercia, Alfredo Del Regno, Vincent Lustro De Quiroz, Bruno Ciufu, Luigi Conte, Paolo Mansi, Carmine Giaquinto, Giovanni Valente, Antonio Trano, Ciro Bisbiglio, Patrizio Vezza, Vincenzo Filosa, Bruno Annunziata and Mario Paolino, of Port Ops Gaeta; BM2 Jason Funk, EN2 Dennis Young and BM2 Steven Baker of Port Ops Naples; and PO1 Raffaele Miraglia, PO2 Emanuele Zona, PO2 Liberato Serra, PO2 Salvatore Boiano and PO2, Giovanni Volpe of the Italian Navy.

The team plans to have on-water exercises every two months to improve their response skills and practice different scenarios.

NCO development changes gears for EPC 09

U.S. 6th Fleet personnel provided non-commissioned officer (NCO) development sessions during Eurasia Partnership Capstone 2009 (EPC 09) Sept. 24, at the NATO Maritime Interdiction Operation Training Center (NMIOTC) in Souda Bay, Greece.

The Participation of 11 senior officers and six senior enlisted advisers from Bulgaria, Georgia, Lithuania, and Ukraine make this the first year NCO development is taught to senior leadership.

"Throughout the entire theater, U.S. Army, Navy and Air Force personnel are teaching NCO development courses to junior NCOs from other nations and they are getting it," said Cmdr. Lawrence Ollice, lead planning officer for EPC 09. "However, their officers and their senior leadership have not been trained. We realized last year, in order to take this to the next step, we must train the officers."

The students are taught values and points of view that are foundational to NCO development through open discussions, role playing and lectures.

"I gave them examples of shipboard life. I utilized some of my past experiences to help them understand where the [U.S.] Navy is and how the [U.S.] Navy relies on their NCOs a little bit more than other services in the U.S. military," said Master Chief Petty Officer (SW) John Taylor, instructor for EPC 09 and command master chief aboard USS Mount Whitney (LCC/JCC 20). "All countries have NCOs, but not all countries know how to utilize them, and we can give them

a better idea of how we fit as senior NCOs in the Navy."

In a role-playing scenario, students were presented with situations where they had to mentor or lecture a junior Sailor or officer in front of the entire class. After they completed their task, the instructors critiqued the students in an open forum discussion.

Due to the high number of Ukrainian students, they were able to participate in many of the role-playing scenarios. Ukraine sent nine officers and two master chief petty officers to the NCO Development course.

"We really got to see how true professionals work and share their experience," said Ukrainian Navy Capt. Serhiy Shevtsov, deputy director of naval personnel for Ukraine. "This training has taught me that we need to realize the role of the master sergeant [U.S. Navy master chief petty officer equivalent] and implement it in our system. That way, before my officers and I set a task, we know what we can expect from our NCOs."

Shevtsov also added that he plans on building his NCO corps based on the example that the U.S. chief petty officer instructors presented.

EPC is an annual conference hosted by the U.S. Navy, where military and civilian personnel participate in non-formal workshops and seminars aimed at increasing maritime safety and security. This is accomplished through the building of long term relationships at the junior officer and non-commissioned officer level with open and transparent sharing of information.
