CNO releases Labor Day Safety Message

"Labor Day originated in 1882 as a 'day off for the working man,' and became a federal holiday in 1894. The original celebration of Labor Day was outlined in the first proposal of the holiday—a street parade to exhibit to the public 'the strength and esprit de corps of the trade and labor organizations,' followed by a festival for the workers and their families. The long Labor Day weekend also marks the unofficial end of summer. For some, this is the last chance to participate in summer outdoor activities and events before the warm weather draws to a close.

During this long holiday weekend, I ask that you be smart, safe, and use common sense. The great majority of past Labor Day mishaps occurred during recreational activities. Alcohol and off-duty recreation, both ashore and in the water, don't mix. Last year, 29 of 38 reportable mishaps across the Navy and Marine Corps involved off-duty recreation such as swimming, boating, and sports injuries. Don't try to pack all those summer activities into one weekend. 'Play to live and live to play.'

Many of you plan to travel, please remember the Navy has lost one Sailor to a private motor vehicle mishap during each Labor Day holiday over the past six years. Many more have been injured, some critically. If you will be traveling away from your duty station by car this weekend, fill out a Travel Risk Planning System (TRiPS) report. You can find TRiPS at www.nko.navy.mil. The online assessment will help you recognize possible risk factors in your trip and determine ways to mitigate those risks.

And finally, don't drink and drive. If your weekend activities involve alcohol, have a plan and arrange for a designated driver.

If you have been drinking and you need a ride home, do not get behind the wheel. Call a friend, relative, shipmate or taxi to get you home safely.

Let's stop the trend and shoot for zero fatalities this Labor Day weekend. I look forward to seeing all of you return to work on Tuesday morning. Take care of each other and have a safe, memorable, and enjoyable Labor Day weekend."

Naval IG Sexual Assault Study team visits NSA Naples

A Sexual Assault Study (SAS) team from the Office of the Naval Inspector General (IG), Washington, D.C., visited Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Aug. 26-28 to study incidences of sexual assault within the Department of the Navy, and determine the responsiveness of the Sexual Assault Victim Intervention (SAVI) program.

"We are touring bases around the world to hear people's honest opinions about what they know about the command's sexual assault prevention program and their opinions on any improvements that can be made to the program," said Cindy Stewart, Navy IG Sexual Assault Prevention Program Assessment team member.

During their visit, SAS team facilitated focus group discussions to gain more insight from a fleet perspective on command support during incidences of sexual assault.

Selection for the confidential focus groups was done randomly using the last digit of social security numbers. After the focus groups were determined, they were then divided by pay grade.

"It is important to randomly select our focus group members from different pay grades in order to get a broad cross section of the community and greater variety in the input," said Stewart.

While regular evaluations are done to NSA Naples' SAVI program, according to NSA Naples' Sexual Assault Response Coordinator Vicki Shepard, it is important to have an outside perspective.

"It's very important to have an outside look at base programs," said Shepard. "If you close yourself in, you will not benefit from an outside perspective or the experiences of others."

NSA Naples gets the gold for energy conservation

Naval Support Activity Naples has been awarded the Secretary of the Navy's (SECNAV) Energy and Water Management Award at the Gold Level for innovative energy management, successful use of energy, and superior awareness and energy conservation principles during fiscal year (FY) 2008.

The 2009 "Gold" level of achievement, which evaluates the performance during FY08, equates to a "very good to outstanding" level energy and water conservation program.

"We truly have done more with less than our CONUS counterparts. This is a very special award because no other overseas location has met this goal," said NSA Naples Energy Manager UT1 Paul Kuntz.

Energy saving personal choices include: repairing and maintaining defective equipment, keeping facility doors closed when air

conditioning is running, decreasing water use at home and at facilities, and reporting inoperative equipment or water leaks.

"Though, this is based on FY08 results prior to the BEM assignment, all of us on board who make securing the future of our planet a standard deserve credit. Thanks for all the hard work and dedication that all of you have shown," Said Kuntz.

The SECNAV awards are highly sought after by Navy and Marine Corps bases worldwide, and the scoring system for the award program is tightened each year to correspond to the Navy's ambitious goals for conservation in the near-term and in upcoming decades.

Orders negotiation window shrinking; Sailor involvement key

Under NAVADMIN 249/09, Sailors can expect a shortened orders-negotiation window beginning this fall.

According to the NAVADMIN, the most relevant change is that the detailing window will be seven-to-nine months before one's projected rotation date (PRD), providing a three-month window to negotiate for orders before a Sailor is considered to be eligible for an involuntary "needs of the Navy" assignment.

Career Management System/Interactive Detailing (CMS/ID) is the tool for negotiating assignments. In July, the Web-based system introduced a Sailor self-apply option. While visually CMS/ID and the advertising mechanics stay the same, most changes will be apparent.

Currently Sailors negotiate from nine-to-five months prior to their PRD. If a billet isn't selected by the fourth month, "needs of the Navy" applies.

"This change encourages more aggressive participation by Sailors in negotiating orders. It also allows NPC better responsiveness to fleet demands and current Global War on Terror Support Assignment deadlines," said Rear Adm. Shoemaker, the head detailer at NPC.

One benefit is that Sailors placed into "needs of the Navy" assignments will know at the seven-month window where they are going instead of the five-month window. Assuming a stable PCS budget, another advantage is earlier issuance of orders, giving Navy families more time for PCS moves.

Sailors in their negotiation window now will not be disadvantaged by this change. Detailers are ensuring applicants have no less than three months to consider options:

- Sailors with a PRD between Aug. 2009 and Jan. 2010 are unaffected and should already be under orders or pending separation.
- Sailors with a PRD between Feb. 2010 and April 2010 will be managed as if their "needs of the Navy" window is Jan. 2010.
- Sailors with PRDs of May 2010 and beyond will fall under these new rules.

Planners built in a buffer zone of time so Sailors can react. They emphasize that Perform-to-Serve (PTS) and the CMS/ID process go together.

"Sailors will not be allowed to negotiate orders without Perform-to-Serve approval. We realize some Sailors don't get PTS approval until six months prior to their PRD, so they will negotiate directly with their rating detailer. They can negotiate in the green zone for one month, before entering the 'needs of the Navy' window.

"The key," said Randy Miller of BUPERS 3, "is for Sailors to put in their PTS applications 12-to-15 months prior to EAOS or PRD. Doing this will give them a full three months to negotiate."

To improve Sailor choice, CMS/ID will advertise more requisitions each cycle, displaying more priority readiness requisitions, mostly in the green zone. GSA requisitions will continue to show in the purple zone. The red zone will now display the most critical fills – billets that could directly degrade mission capability if unfilled.

"NPC will fill every red zone requisition every month. All Sailors in the negotiating window (PRD minus 9 months) will be considered eligible for assignment, perhaps involuntarily, to red zone requisitions." But red zone requisitions will not exceed two per rate (e.g., two YN3, two YN2, two YN1) for both sea and shore requisitions.

"Our goal is to make CMS/ID more agile, and responsive to new and changing fleet requirements," said head detailer, Shoemaker. "These initiatives bring advantages to both our Sailors and to the commands they serve, improving odds for success in Naval operations world-wide."

Proposed leave rule would provide for warrior care

Defense Department federal employees could receive up to 26 weeks of unpaid leave to care for a military family member injured in the line of duty if an Office of Personnel Management (OPM) proposal is adopted.

The proposal would allow eligible federal employees to take 26 "administrative work weeks" provided for under the Family and Medical Leave Act to care for a service member wounded in the line of duty, OPM officials explained during a telephone conference call.

The provision would extend to families of National Guard members or Reservists injured while on active duty, explained Jerry Mikowicz, OPM deputy associate director for pay and leave administration.

To qualify, the federal employee must be the spouse, child, parent or next of kin of the service member declared medically unfit to serve, he said.

The OPM proposal also would allow agencies to advance up to 30 days of sick leave to federal workers who care for wounded military family members.

OPM also has recommended other sick-leave regulation changes to help agencies better plan for outbreaks of pandemic influenza or other serious communicable diseases.

The proposed rule would allow for agencies to advance up to 13 days of sick leave to care for a family member who has been exposed to a serious communicable disease and who health authorities say would jeopardize others' health. Federal employees also could receive up to 30 days of advanced sick leave if they are exposed to or stricken by a communicable disease that could be further spread in the workplace, Mikowicz said.

The OPM proposals were published in the Aug. 26 Federal Register, and the public will have 60 days to comment on them.

OPM officials will review the comments before issuing a final rule, which will proceed through the regulatory process required before it is implemented, Mikowicz said.

FY10 SRB rewards critical skills, top performance

Selective Reenlistment Bonus (SRB) award levels were announced in NAVADMIN 250/09 for active duty and Reserve full time support Sailors which are scheduled to take effect Oct. 1.

Approximately 18,000 Sailors holding 179 critical skills will be eligible to reenlist with SRB awards up to \$90,000 next year.

"We value Sailors with certain skill sets — critical skill sets — and recognize that they are in high demand throughout the workforce," said Rear Adm. Dan Holloway, director of personnel plans and policy. "The SRB program allows Navy to provide top performing Sailors with an additional incentive to stay Navy and advance mission success and their careers."

In addition to announcing SRB award levels, the NAVADMIN introduces enhancements designed to not only retain personnel with critical skills, but to reward top performers within those critical skill sets.

For the first time, Sailors who receive an "early promote" rating on their most recent regular evaluation may reenlist early for SRB anytime during the fiscal year (FY) of their end of active obligated service (EAOS).

"When a Sailor says, 'I've been recognized as a top performer, I want to reenlist for a bonus, but I'm not eligible until the third or fourth quarter; isn't there an option for me?' Now our answer is, 'yes,'" said Holloway.

In addition, three tiers have been established to formally prioritize and rank enlisted ratings/skills according to replacement costs, difficulty to replace, and existing manning shortfalls.

Enlisted community managers evaluated each skill and zone on individual manning requirements; how well reenlistment goals were achieved in FY09; prevailing market conditions; private sector competition and the costs of training; and replacing skilled Sailors. A comprehensive comparison using these criteria was balanced against the risk of not retaining enough Sailors in each skill in order to form the baseline of the three tier system.

Each tier contains a range of SRB award multiples and awards early reenlistment opportunities using different criteria. The SRB program as a whole also maintains several previous initiatives such as authorizing Sailors serving in combat zones to reenlist early at anytime during the FY of their EAOS.

Officials remind Sailors that SRB is a market-based incentive and will be monitored and strategically adjusted as retention needs dictate.

"We are going to continue to monitor the program closely next year to enhance our ability to size, shape and stabilize the force and ensure taxpayer dollars go where critical skills are needed to get the most bang for our buck," said Holloway.

H1N1 Flu Update

H1N1 has been identified in most communities in Europe. In the overwhelming majority of cases, the H1N1 is just like any other viral illness that is self limited and without major complications.

The symptoms for H1N1 are acting like a mild seasonal influenza (fever, body aches, runny nose, and sore throat). Should a person become sick with influenza like symptoms, the U.S. Naval Hospital (USNH) Naples asks that they stay at home and practice what is called social isolation, limiting the contact they have with other people.

All active duty service members must be seen in the USNH emergency department or in sick call if they have flu like illness. This will enable USNH to track medical readiness for commanders.

The below groups are considered higher risk populations. If you or a member of your household fit into one of these categories and are experiencing influenza symptoms USNH Naples recommends a visit to the emergency department for an evaluation.

- **Younger than age two or older than age 65**
- **Have a chronic illness that could compromise their immune system (i.e.: HIV, Diabetes, or Cancer with history of chemotherapy)**
- **Pregnant**
- **Obese**
- **Healthcare worker**

The best method of fighting this viral illness is prevention. As a reminder, always cover coughs and clean hands and shared surfaces with soap and water and/or use an alcohol based hand sanitizer often, especially after coughing and/or sneezing.

The health of everyone in the community is important to USNH. Social isolation is a key factor in helping prevent the spread of this virus in our community. While a few NGIS and Housing operations still co-exist, most NGIS operations are now a separate operation and maintain a separate front desk.

"Just look for the Navy Gateway Inns and Suites logo at a Navy installation to help you locate our

facilities," said Davis. "With more than 24,000 rooms at 77 facilities worldwide, NGIS is the primary lodging facility for travelers in a TDY status, but don't forget to check out space-available reservations for your leisure and vacation plans. Great prices and consistently great service will put NGIS at the top of the list for your lodging needs."

The "Navy Gateway Inns and Suites" program-wide branding initiative has been implemented at more than 40 percent of NGIS operations, with standardized furnishings, amenities and training that provide customers with quality services and accommodations.

Space-available reservations can be made 30 days in advance, and are based on availability. Military and civilian travelers may make reservations for NGIS operations by using the Web site at <http://www.dodlodging.net> or by calling 1-877-NAVYBED.

In Feb. 2008, NGIS collaborated with the Fleet and Family Readiness Training Branch to standardize NGIS employee development, such as performance and behavior, to align with the new NGIS brand.

"Standardized operating procedures for housekeeping, front desk and maintenance staff and other training initiatives have been developed," said Davis. "And, these training requirements will be incorporated into the NGIS accreditation process."

Most 'fall rollers' won't see orders until October

Nearly 14,000 Sailors who have negotiated permanent change of station (PCS) moves for the first quarter of fiscal year (FY) 2010 won't get a hard copy of their orders until after Oct. 1 as the Navy's current PCS funding account runs dry.

A policy change made last year, called the PCS Obligation Policy Change (POPC), is responsible for NPC's delay in issuing orders for PCS moves beyond October. Under the new policy, which was implemented across the services, funding must be provided at the time the PCS orders are written. Previously the Navy could issue orders once a PCS move was negotiated and supply funding when the move occurred.

Since the Navy's \$613.3 million FY-09 PCS funds are nearly depleted, NPC must wait until new funds are made available Oct. 1, before anymore PCS orders are issued.

Some Sailors who have negotiated PCS orders using Career Management System/Interactive Detailing (CMS/ID) or directly through their detailer may need to wait until the new fiscal year begins before they may initiate processes associated with PCS moves, like overseas screening, sea duty screening, special duty screening and scheduling household goods and vehicle shipments. These are processes that require Sailors to have PCS orders which contain a line of accounting data to pay for services associated with moves.

The financial constraints were acknowledged in NAVADMIN 236/09, but relief is being sought so Navy

families can move to their new locations.

"We are fully aware of the potential impacts," said Rear Adm. Don Quinn, deputy chief of naval personnel. "My staff is looking to apply any available end-of-year money to PCS. I thank you for your patience and support as we act to solve this challenging resource issue."

With all FY-09 fourth-quarter moves funded, NPC has been able to use the remaining funds to begin paying for FY-10 moves.

"Projections indicate that we will only be able to release orders in August and September for about 20 percent of first-quarter FY-10 rollers," said Capt. Rob Weitzman, who manages PCS funding accounts at NPC.

"We will do our best to provide Sailors and their families with as much information and lead time as possible, but the late receipt of orders will result in compressed PCS timelines with few options for relocating families early," Weitzman said.

The goal is to minimize impacts to fleet readiness, career timing and families. The priority moves are global war on terror support assignment rotations, career milestone billets and critical readiness fills, those that minimize gaps at sea for deployed units and working up to deploy, and keeping the training pipelines moving.

NPC issues approximately 88,000 sets of PCS orders annually with an average cost of \$8,861 per move.

A thorough and detailed accreditation process is mandatory for all NGIS operations, and includes unannounced validation visits by a CNIC accreditation team, as well as specific performance standards for facilities, services and fiscal management. The CNIC accreditation team visits each naval installation every two years to evaluate NGIS operations and determine the overall standards of service being provided to all customers.

APS arrives in Monrovia

High Speed Vessel Swift (HSV 2) arrived at the port of Monrovia, Liberia, Sept. 2, to conduct training and assistance programs as part of Africa Partnership Station (APS).

Through Sept. 15, APS will conduct primary care/health screenings, maternal and child services education, dental extraction, dental health services, dental education, eye examination and distribution of prescribed eyeglasses, veterinary services and education, biomedical repair education and services and advance lab education at several Liberian medical facilities, including the John F. Kennedy Medical Center and Redemption Hospital.

During this deployment, APS will also construct two medical wards at the Redemption Hospital and begin working on the Liberian Coast Guard pier. HSV 2 is carrying 144,000 meals provided by Kids Against

Hunger International and basic medical supplies, which will be handed over at a Sept. 4 ceremony at the John F. Kennedy Medical Center in Sinkor. Veterinary care and immunization will be provided at the Gibson School in Monrovia. Project Hope volunteers, along with U.S. military medical professionals, will engage in peer-to-peer training with local national care practitioners while providing care to local Liberians.

Utilizing HSV 2, the APS staff will provide medical and training visits for African nations as part of U.S. Africa Command outreach. Trainers will include both civilians and military from the U.S., European and African nations, including non-governmental organizations and other agencies of the U.S. government.

Swift, homeported in Norfolk, Va., is on a scheduled deployment to the U.S. 6th Fleet area of responsibility.

Two time Oscar-winning visual effects artist Hoyt Yeatman makes his feature directorial debut with this Jerry Bruckheimer-produced family film following a group of highly trained guinea pigs on their mission to prevent an evil billionaire from taking over the world. Naples Public Health Evaluation: a look forward

Last week, two important meetings took place to help move the Naples Public Health Evaluation (PHE) forward in forging new relationships with representatives of the Italian government, health and scientific community, and property owners.


PHE team members met with key members of the National Institute for Environmental Protection and Research (ISPRA) Aug. 26 in downtown Naples. After a detailed briefing on the PHE's history and findings of Phase I data as well as the current 1,500-foot Step-Out investigation in Casal di Principe, Italian leadership suggested an Italian working group be established to interact jointly with the Navy.

A meeting for landlords from the area was held August 28 at NSA Naples Housing office. The purpose was to inform

landlords from the Casal di Principe area about the 1,500-foot Step-Out groundwater investigation and subsequent relocation of Navy families, the New Lease Suspension Zones, and to answer their questions and concerns. Landlords were told of the Aug. 26 meeting with Italian representatives and were encouraged to talk to their local environmental and public health authorities.

Both meetings represent a major push forward in securing the collaboration and support of Italian authorities and to help dispel misconceptions held by many Italian landlords and property owners.

To date, the PHE has sampled air, soil, soil gas and water of approximately 400 off-base and on-base residences. Completion of the PHE will provide Navy leadership with a comprehensive health risk evaluation by the Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center (NMCPHC). The PHE Phase II report will be available for review in spring 2010.



This historical timeline of the Naples PHE shows the sequence of events from inception to the present.

2007

- June 2007** Commander, Navy Region Europe (now CNREURAFSWA) requests assistance from NMCPHC to assist with evaluation of the potential health risks associated with illegal dumping and inadequate garbage collection.
- July 2007** Health evaluation representative from NMCPHC visits Naples, Italy for initial consultation with CNREURAFSWA, U.S. Consulate (Naples) and American Embassy (Rome) officials to discuss public health issues of concern and to request permission to work with Italian public health counterparts.
- Nov. 2007** CNREURAFSWA and Italian authorities in Rome meet and agree to work together to identify potential health risks that may be associated with illegal dumping and inadequate garbage collection.
- Dec. 2007** CNREURAFSWA requests assistance from the Navy and Marine Corps Public Health Center to conduct a Public Health Evaluation (PHE) in the greater Naples area. The PHE will be comprised of epidemiological studies on asthma, cancer and birth defects; analysis of air, water, soil and soil gas samples; and risk evaluation of sample testing results.

2008

- Jan. 2008** Representatives from NMCPHC arrive in Naples.
- Feb. 2008** NMCPHC representatives meet CNREURAFSWA to discuss ongoing and completed Italian health studies, to request available data, and to determine the next steps to be taken. The health risks associated with living in Naples, Italy as a result of uncollected trash, burning of trash and historical waste disposal practices are unknown.
- March 2008** Navy leadership contracts Tetra Tech to perform environmental sampling and analysis of air, tap water, soil and soil gases.
- April 2008** A pilot study is launched by sampling soil gas and tap water at seven off-base residences.
- May 2008** Pilot test completed. Navy officials mail 1800 letters and questionnaires to off-base residents announcing the commencement of PHE Phase I.
- June 2008** Phase I begins by sampling soil, soil gas and water of 166 homes. Seven pilot study homes test positive for volatile organic compounds (VOCs).
- JULY 2008** NSA and Region leadership recommend use of bottled water to all off-base residents. Nine regional air monitoring stations set up for one-year.
- Aug. 2008** Forty-eight homes test positive for coliform bacteria and three residences identified with high VOC concentrations from PHE Phase I water sampling results.
- Sept. 2008** As an interim solution, NSA Naples begins distributing free bottled water to all U.S. personnel living off-base.
- Oct. 2008** Asthma report indicates no significant association between exposure to Naples environment and asthma severity over the period of study (October 2006 - June 2008).
- Nov. 2008** Additional homes identified with high VOC concentrations. Phase I results and Italian environmental reports prompt Navy leadership to establish three "New Lease Suspension Zones" and to relocate 17 families whose homes have unacceptable levels of VOCs in tap water. PHE Phase II begins.
- Dec. 2008** NSA Housing drops pre-lease water sampling requirement following PHE Phase I mitigation actions.

2009

- March 2009** Birth Defects study released. The study looked at infants born from January 2000 through December 2005 whose mothers were enrolled to an overseas MTF or clinic during the month prior to conception and the following three months. Study concluded that the risk of a birth defect in children conceived overseas and in Naples were both lower than the overall Navy rate during the study period.
- April 2009** Phase I Report released.
- May 2009** Phase I Open Houses held.
- July 2009** Low levels of PCE found in indoor air of the Child Development Center at Capodichino. Even though levels are considered acceptable, Navy leadership takes precautionary measures to mitigate potential for vapor intrusion (VI). A temporary "off the shelf" VI mitigation will be installed by the end of August while a permanent system is designed and constructed.
- Aug. 2009** New sampling results from 1500-foot Step-Out Investigation lead to the ordered relocation of 21 more families from Casal di Principe area. As was the case with 17 other families from the Step-Out area, the testing found unacceptable levels of tetrachloroethene (PCE) largely from active soil gas sampling. Since there is no real way for the U.S. Navy to mitigate vapor intrusion of PCE in private Italian rental homes, relocation is the only effective recourse.

Officials with Navy & Marine Corps Public Health Center meet with leaders of Istituto Superiore per la Protezione e la Ricerca Ambientale (ISPRA) to discuss the Naples PHE and report on Phase I findings and status of Phase II testing as well as the completed Navy epidemiological Studies (Asthma and Birth Defects).

Representatives from NSA Naples Housing office meet with 48 landlords from Casal di Principe to answer questions and concerns about the New Lease Suspension Zones and the 1500' Step-Out Investigation and subsequent relocation of 38 Navy families. Landlords were encouraged to talk to their local environmental health authorities.

The PHE team will continue to keep everyone posted on any new developments in the PHE by disseminating All Hands messages, weekly articles in Panorama and the Naples Community Health Awareness Web site at <https://www.cnrc.navy.mil/Naples/Programs/HealthAwareness/index.htm>

Traditions, eno-gastronomy fests, Mozart concert welcome September

Anyone who has just arrived in Naples and wishes to learn the city's significant events involving saints and food can begin with those showcased this month. They should save the dates below to make a difference in their Neapolitan sojourns and experiences.

Traditional Festivals

Madonna di Piedigrotta feted on Sept. 8

Pageantry and songs dominate the Madonna di Piedigrotta (St. Mary at the Foot of the Grotto) Festival. Her worship is believed to have pagan origins with the ancient cults taking place inside the Roman grotto beneath the Posillipo hill known as Crypta napoletana.

Until its suspension in 1985 for varied reasons, the festival had been for centuries the largest happening in the city, highlighted by a lavish religious procession that the Neapolitan royalty patronized. In the mid-19th century, a

canzone napoletane competition was integrated into the festivities, resulting in the birth of well-known tunes - Funiculi, Funicula and O' Sole mio, among others. Due to popular demand, the festival returned in 2007 with a float parade and musical shows.

The 10-day 2009 celebrations have already begun and continue until the 13th. Tomorrow and next Saturday, a float parade is slated at 7 p.m. from the Royal Palace. It will then pass via Santa Lucia, via Caracciolo, the Piedigrotta Shrine and Rotonda Diaz across from the U.S. Consulate. A large fireworks display will cap off events at midnight. Will San Gennaro's blood liquefy in 2009?

A million dollar question as Neapolitans roll out the red carpet for their beloved protector Sept. 19 and await news on the miraculous liquefaction of his blood. In 305 AD, the Romans beheaded the bishop from Benevento in Pozzuoli for his Christian belief. Tradition holds the miracle renders Naples disaster-free.

A celebratory Mass begins the day in the Naples' cathedral (where the vial of the saint's blood is kept) as well as in the saint's cozy namesake church in Pozzuoli. Legendarily, the saint was decapitated on the hill above the tiny church, and the stone on which the saint's head came to rest is kept in the reliquary of the church. Evening festivities organized by church members usually include band music, food stands and fireworks.

Wine, Food Fests

Campi Flegrei cuisine steps back onto red carpet

Dozens of restaurants and wine producers in Pozzuoli, Quarto, Bacoli e Monte di Procida will participate in the third edition of the Campi Flegrei Table Association's eno-gastronomical "Malazè - Crater of Taste" initiative Sept. 4-15. Derived from the Pozzuoli dialect, "malazè" means the site where fishermen stored their nets, ate and rested. The Campania Region leads a number of event patrons including the Campi Flegrei communes, the Pozzuoli tourism office and the Campania Slow Food Association.

Aimed towards showcasing Campi Flegrei's culinary traditions and culture, restaurants will serve a fixed-price "malazè menu" with typical dishes and wines as falanghina and piedirosso.
