

NSA Naples holds chief pinning ceremony

Twenty-two sailors received their gold anchors and combination cover for the first time during the chief petty officer pinning ceremony held at the NSA Naples Support Site theater, Sept. 16.

The pinning ceremony marked the 118th anniversary of the chief petty officer pinning, and was marked by a speech from Adm. Samuel J. Locklear, the guest speaker.

"The core values of honor, courage and commitment remain the same throughout our careers, but the perspective on those values change when you attain the rank of chief petty officer," said Locklear. "Your influence as a chief will influence everyone from new seaman recruits to junior officers, because their success depends on the leadership of the chief."

The ceremony was the culmination of the six-week chief petty officer induction process the new chiefs participated in. During their training, they learned about the history and traditions of the Navy chief, leadership principles and the new responsibilities they would uphold with their new

Captain's Corner

This week, I would like to solicit community support for several of our on-base establishments. Over the life of the Support Site, keeping a restaurant in the Village Forum has been a challenge. There have been several failed enterprises, the last of which resulted in a long period without any restaurant at all. Following that absence and as a result of overwhelming demand from the community, the base, in conjunction with the NEX, worked very hard to get Bambusa up and running. As a result of the desire to get an establishment up and running to serve the community, Bambusa was forced to open their doors early and before they were fully prepared. Because of this and due to no fault of their own, they got off to a rough start. Since then, they have come a long way and worked very hard to overcome that early hurdle by adding new menu items, adjusting their hours, adding a happy hour, adding a kids menu and listening to your suggestions. If you haven't been lately, I think you will be surprised and very pleased at what you'll find. Like most amenities on the Support Site, if they can not sustain themselves through profits, they will go away. I ask for your support and patronage of these facilities to preserve them for the entire community.

This brings me to the base movie theater. It is losing money, has been red-flagged for potential closure, and we have a year to turn it around. We have already taken some actions which will improve performance, but additional actions are required and will be forthcoming. We will likely see a reasonable price increase and some adjustment to the hours of operation. There are potentially some great things available as well, like upgrades to the sound system and 3D, but we have to rectify the losses in the near term. Additionally, we are exploring other money-making opportunities that will increase revenues. Like Bambusa, I encourage your continued patronage and support. I am confident we can get back to profitability and preserve the theater with your help. So the next time you are looking for something to do as a family, try dinner and a movie; it is a really great deal!

You have spoken and we have listened. As of 01 October, there will be a late evening bus that runs from the Support Site to Capodichino. Now sailors living at Capo will be able to take advantage of Support Site amenities after work...like dinner and a movie. Updated schedules can be found at the TLA, NGIS, libraries, bus stops, or by calling 081-568-6866. This is a trial service and if it is not utilized, it will eventually be eliminated. Therefore, I encourage all to take advantage and utilize the service.

As we head into the autumn, there are a number of things to keep in mind. First, the weather is starting to cool down and the rains will fall more frequently than in the summer. Please SLOW DOWN and pay attention on the slippery roads! We don't want to lose people to preventable accidents.

As many of you may have heard, we have had a number of break-ins recently at Parco Eva. We are working very hard to improve security for our residents. The Dental Clinic is extending hours in orthodontic and pediatric services in order to accommodate school age patients. Beginning Oct. 17, these clinics will operate an extended schedule the first and third weeks of each month, where business hours will be from 8 a.m. to 6:30 p.m.

Dental services offered include general dentistry (routine examination, cleaning and restorations), endodontics (root canals), periodontics (gum specialist), oral and maxillofacial surgery (wisdom teeth removal, maxillofacial and facial surgical procedures), prosthodontics (crowns, bridges, and dentures), pediatric dentistry and orthodontics (braces). Active duty and their command-sponsored family members have priority and receive scheduled appointments. NATO members, retirees and their family members are eligible for routine care on a stand-by basis. Italian News Briefs

Soccer practice on field confiscated from mafia

In a fight against organized crime, the Italian Football Federation scheduled a training session on a field confiscated from a local mafia crime syndicate in the small Calabrian town of Rizziconi. The training session will be held Nov. 13, two days before Italy faces Uruguay in a friendly match. Italy football players normally train in the town of Coverciano, in the outskirts of Florence. The Calabria crime organization called 'ndrangheta is considered more powerful than the Sicilian Mafia and has become one of the world's biggest cocaine traffickers.

Scientists on trial for manslaughter over L'Aquila earthquake

On Tuesday, six scientists and a former government official went on trial for manslaughter. They are accused of negligence and imprudence for allegedly failing to warn people about the devastating 2009 earthquake in central Italy that killed 309 people and toppled the medieval city of L'Aquila and other several towns in the surrounding area. They denied the charges saying it was improbable there would be a major quake after tremors felt by residents six months before the big quake. The earthquake destroyed about 10,000 buildings, leaving tens-of-thousands homeless. The defendants were members of the Serious Risks Commission, a panel whose job is to assess the risks of a major earthquake following a long period of minor tremors. The scientific community said it is very difficult to predict an earthquake, and it is unfair to prosecute the scientists. In 2010 more than 5,000 scientists signed a letter of protest that was sent to Italian president Giorgio Napolitano. The next hearing is scheduled for Oct. 1.

Italian police clash with Tunisian migrants on Lampedusa

On the Sicilian Island of Lampedusa, Italian police clashed with Tunisian migrants who protest-

ed their probable repatriation Wednesday. Late on Tuesday, some migrants set fire to a reception center after they found out that a group of them had been deported to Tunisia. The clashes began after several migrants entered a restaurant during an organized march and threatened to blow it up using bombola gas. Police intervened, and they were pelted with stones and other objects. Citizens from Lampedusa were also throwing stones, and many Tunisians were injured. Since January, tens-of-thousands of Tunisians have arrived on Lampedusa to escape the uprising. Many migrants were moved to reception camps elsewhere in Italy or were repatriated.

Italian parents bring in lawyers to kick out 41-year-old son

An elderly Italian couple resorted to legal help in an effort to evict their 41-year-old son, who doesn't want to leave home. The man has a job and a steady income. He wants his clothes washed and ironed and his meals cooked for him, said his father. The man resisted all attempts to persuade him to leave his parents' home. The couple took their case to the legal department of an association for the defense of consumers' rights in Mestre, near Venice. Lawyers gave the son 10 days to find himself a flat or the case was going to be referred to court with the prospect of more action being taken to evict him. A study revealed that 48 percent of young Italians between ages of 18 and 39 still live under their parents' roofs. Young Italians stay at home because many of them are unemployed or on precarious short-term contracts and cannot afford to pay a loan or rent an apartment by themselves.

Weapon arsenal found near Villa Literno

A weapon arsenal was found in a hole three feet deep in the Villa Literno countryside on Wednesday. Two shotguns, five hundred rounds of ammunition and a Kalashnikov were ready to be used. Police found them in a large cylinder buried an area located under the supervision of a powerful Casalesi clan.

RelayHealth arrives at Naval Hospital Naples

Navy Medicine has rolled out the red carpet for its newest program: RelayHealth, an online, confidential patient/doctor messaging system.

Now from home or even while on vacation, a patient can request an appointment with his or her health-care provider, get test results, request prescription refills or simply ask their healthcare team about a medical concern, completely free and securely.

U.S. Naval Hospital Naples implemented RelayHealth this summer. This new electronic messaging system has provided a convenient way to reach patients when phones are not working properly, telephone numbers are out of date or when voice mail is not set up.

An interested patient must contact his or her primary care manager (PCM) to initiate the registration process. After registration, the patient must send a request to be accepted by his or her provider. Once the PCM accepts the request, confidential messaging may begin.

An exciting and convenient benefit of this Internet-based service is that it is accessible worldwide. Patients can e-mail their doctors when on leave or TAD anywhere in the world and request a medication refill, so it can be picked up when returning to the area.

Another feature of RelayHealth is the ability for a patient to create and maintain his or her own health record. Information, such as medication taken regularly or occasionally, medication allergies, chronic conditions and/or past medical and surgical history, can be updated. Parents can also add their children and ask questions on their behalf. Each adult will need his or her own account for privacy reasons.

RelayHealth has been designed to support patients and medical providers in the Family Practice, Pediatrics and Internal Medicine clinics only.

Implementation of RelayHealth is Navy-wide, so once registered, a patient will remain in the system. Just request to be connected to your new PCM at your new duty station.

Many civilian doctors stateside have invested in this system because it has been shown to increase patient satisfaction, reduce the number of phone calls between patients and providers and save time for the medical office staff and the patient. Disaster preparedness in Naples

Numerous natural disasters wreaked havoc already this year. Planning ahead is the only thing you can do fair Mother Nature's storm. Preparedness is essential to overcome the obstacles that might block your path when trying to deal with any emergency or disaster.

Last week, "Panorama" explained why it is important to have an emergency plan and what to look for in preparing an escape plan. This week, we will look at being prepared for a disaster and what items you should keep in your emergency kit. In the event of a disaster, you and your family may need to rely on yourselves and your own prior planning in case emergency workers cannot respond immediately. Many critical services, such as electricity, water, sewage, phone lines and cellular service, Internet service, may be interrupted.

"Your family will cope best by preparing for disaster before it strikes. One way to prepare is by assembling a disaster supplies kit," said Lt. David Yee, NSA Naples Emergency Management division officer. "Once disaster hits, you won't have time to shop or search for supplies. But if you have gathered supplies in advance, your family can endure an evacuation or home confinement."

Creating an emergency kit doesn't have to be expensive or difficult. Many items may already be on hand and simply require a little effort to pull it all together.

Emergency kit

Gather the supplies listed, as you may need them if your family is confined to your home. Place these supplies in an easy-to-carry

container. There are eight basics you should stock for your home: water, food, first aid supplies, clothing and bedding, tools and emergency supplies, and special items.

Water Store one gallon of water per person per day. Keep at least a 7-day supply of water.

Food Store at least a 7-day supply of non-perishable food. Select compact and lightweight foods that require no refrigeration, preparation or cooking, and little or no water. If you must heat food, pack a can of chafing fuel.

First aid supplies Assemble a first aid kit for your home and one for each car. A first aid kit should include sterile adhesive bandages in assorted sizes, assorted sizes of safety pins, soap, latex gloves (2 pairs), sunscreen, 2-inch sterile gauze pads (4-6), 4-inch sterile gauze pads (4-6), triangular bandages (3), non-prescription drugs (aspirin or other pain reliever, anti-diarrhea medication, antacid, Ipecac syrup to induce vomiting and laxatives) 2-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls), 3-inch sterile roller bandages (3 rolls), scissors, tweezers, needle, moistened towelettes, antiseptic, thermometer, tongue blades (2) and petroleum jelly or other lubricant.

Family members, such as infants and elderly persons, may require other items.

"I have two kids, so I am going to need to bring things that are particular to that situation," said Engineman 2nd Class (SW) Miguel Huerta, assistant emergency management officer. "If you are traveling with the elderly or people that require daily medication, these are things that you are going to have to consider when you are preparing your kit."

Remember to pack formula, diapers, bottles and medications for babies. Adults may need high blood pressure medication; insulin; prescription drugs; denture needs; contact lenses and supplies and extra eye glasses. Don't forget entertainment;

games, cards, crayons and books can help family members cope in stressful situations.

Family documents Keep these records in a waterproof, portable container: military/DOD identification cards, visa, sojourner's permit, birth certificate, naturalization papers, dependent care certificate, household goods inventory, POV documents, wills, powers of attorney, insurance policies, contracts deeds, stocks and bonds, passports, social security cards, immunization records, bank account numbers and credit card account numbers and companies, important telephone numbers and family records (birth, marriage, death certificates).

Storing your kit

Store your kit in a convenient place known to all family members. Keep a smaller version of the disaster supplies kit in the trunk of your car. Keep items in plastic bags. Change your stored water and food supply at least every six months so it stays fresh. Re-think your kit and family needs at least once a year. Replace batteries, update clothes, etc. Ask your physician or pharmacist about storing prescription medications.

Emergency car kit

Here is a list of the things needed in an emergency car kit: battery-powered radio, flashlight and extra batteries, blanket, booster cables, fire extinguisher (5 lb., a-b-c type), first aid kit and manual, bottled water and non-perishable high energy foods, such as granola bars, raisins and peanut butter, maps, shovel tire repair kit and pump flares.

'Don't Ask, Don't Tell' repealed

Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Gary Roughead, announced to the Fleet Sept. 20 repeal of the 18-year old statute known as "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," allowing gay, lesbian, and bisexual service members to begin serving openly.

NAVADMIN 271/11 is the 15th message in a series informing leadership and Sailors as the Navy moved through planning and training towards the repeal. In this message, CNO explained to the Fleet how this significant policy change will be effectively implemented through command leadership and adherence to Navy's core values.

"I have been impressed with our training, detailed preparation, demonstrated professionalism, and decency of our Navy as we prepared for repeal. You have supported the process admirably and treated all your shipmates with dignity and respect. Thank you for how you have conducted this transition," said Roughead. "I know your superb professionalism will continue in the post repeal environment as our Navy continues to be a positive, inclusive environment for all."

Immediately following that message NAVADMIN 272/11, offered further policy guidance regarding the repeal. The message explained that sexual orientation or lawful acts of homosexual conduct will not be considered as a bar to military service or admission to service academies, ROTC or any other accession program. Accordingly, Sailors who were discharged solely under "Don't Ask, Don't Tell" may apply to reenter the Navy and can expect to be evaluated according to the same criteria and service requirements applicable to all prior-service members seeking reentry.

While the primary focus of repeal has been on changes in the law, some of the most important aspects can be found in what will remain the same. For instance, sexual orientation will continue to be a personal and private matter. Current and future Sailors will not be asked, nor be required to reveal, their sexual orientation.

Standards of conduct remain unchanged. Existing Navy standards of conduct will continue to apply to all Sailors regardless of sexual orientation. Enforcement of standards, including those related to public displays of affection, dress and appearance, and fraternization will be sexual orientation neutral. All members are responsible for upholding and maintaining the high standards of the U.S. Navy at all times and in all places.

The diversity of the force will remain a strength. Success of the Navy is enabled by the diversity of our Sailors, representing many different racial, religious, ethnic and economic backgrounds, and by the expectation that all Sailors will be treated with dignity and respect. Accordingly, there will be no changes regarding the exercise of religious beliefs.

All Sailors, regardless of sexual orientation, are entitled to an environment free from personal, social, or institutional barriers that prevent service members from rising to the highest level of responsibility possible.

CNE-CNA-C6F IG hotline provides means of reporting wrongdoing

Have you ever noticed someone doing something in your workplace that appeared to be in violation of a regulation? Have you ever suspected that someone may be misusing government funds, equipment or other resources for their own profit or advantage? If so, it is your duty as a government employee, military or civilian, to report it. You could report it to your command inspector general (IG); but do you know how to go about doing that? If you are a member of U.S. Naval Forces Europe-Africa/Sixth Fleet (CNE-CNA-C6F), a new command website can help you understand the process.

"We have established our new hotline website here in Naples as a way for all of our employees to report fraud, waste, abuse or mismanagement," Stephen Sale, CNE-CNA-C6F Fleet IG, said. "The hotline enables everyone to participate in the process of ensuring that our command is always doing the right thing when it comes to ethical behavior and the proper use of resources."

As the "conscience of the Navy," the IG serves as an independent and objective command advisor whose support and guidance enables management to evaluate and improve the economy, effectiveness, efficiency, and integrity of command operations and programs. One of the ways the IG provides this value-added service is through the command hotline program, which enables all military and DOD civilian personnel to report incidents of wrongdoing that they observe in the course of their government employment.

To assist personnel in the process of reporting wrongdoing, the new Fleet IG website can be accessed from the Plan of the Week page by going to the "Special Staff" section and clicking on "Inspector General." At this site, personnel can learn about the hotline complaint process and procedure, and they can follow the easy steps that will show them how to properly prepare and file a complaint.

"If there are any incidents of fraud taking place, or if anyone is misusing government personnel or resources, we want to hear about it so it can be properly addressed," Sale said. "Our hotline enables anyone who knows of such matters to report them; and they can do so anonymously

if they so desire."

Once on the website, visitors will find a link that takes them to the Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia IG's online hotline complaint form. The form is intended to be completed online and can be submitted anonymously or with contact information.

"The first thing for a potential complainant to determine is whether his/her complaint is actually a matter for the IG," Sale said. "We investigate matters pertaining to fraud, mismanagement, and the waste or misuse of government resources. It sometimes turns out that the issue a complainant has identified would be better handled by the chain of command, EEO, HRO or NCIS. The procedure we have outlined on our website will help people in making that determination. There is a lot of good information on the site that will help everyone to understand the process, so they will know how to proceed."

Once a complainant determines that he/she has identified wrongdoing by a government employee that falls within the scope of the IG, there are five ways that the matter can be reported. The complainant can (1) call the hotline at DSN: 626-2983 and leave a recorded message or DSN: 626-2964 and speak to the office investigator personally, (2) stop in the IG Office in Admin III at Capo and speak in confidence to the investigator, (3) send an e-mail to the

hotline at ighotline@eu.navy.mil, (4) send documents via regular mail, or (5) use the automated complaint form on the website.

"The person also has to decide if he or she is willing to be identified in making the complaint," Sale said. "If you want to remain anonymous, you can submit your complaint without making your identity known to us. But keep in mind that if you remain anonymous, you must provide sufficient information to make an investigation possible, which includes full names of all the players and as many specific details as you know."

Sale explained that the CNE-CNA-C6F IG website can only be accessed by members of that command. But members of other commands can access the online hotline complaint form from the Region homepage by clicking the "Inspector General Hotline: Report Fraud, Waste and Abuse" link in the "Popular Links" section, and then clicking "Submit a complaint online."

"No matter what command you are with," Sale said, "if you complete and submit that form, it will get to the cognizant IG. I urge anyone who knows about any instance of fraud, any improper use of government resources, or any incident of wrongdoing within the command to report it right away. We need everyone's help in putting a stop to fraud, waste, abuse and mismanagement. But it has to be reported; if we don't know there is a problem, we can't fix it."



Safety tip

Protect yourself against insect bites

1. Wear light-colored clothes. Mosquitoes are attracted to dark colors. Also, you can see ticks more easily on light-colored clothes.
2. Wear long pants and a long-sleeved shirt that has a collar. Tuck in your shirt. You can also tuck your pants into your socks.
3. Avoid thick woods, dense grass, pools and puddles.
4. Check yourself for ticks when you return home. Most are large enough to be easily seen, but some are tiny; so look carefully on your scalp, the back of your neck, behind your ears and under your arms.
5. If the tick has started to bite and is attached, carefully remove it with a pair of tweezers.
6. If you get bitten, treat the area with a topical

To assist with deterring burglars, it is also strongly recommended to have all exterior lights turned on between sunset and sunrise.

There have been some same tactics used by individuals when trying to steal vehicles. The thieves will use various methods to get a target vehicle to pull over, such as flagging down the driver of the target vehicle to make it look like there was something wrong with the vehicle. Once the driver of the target vehicle gets out, one of them will jump into the target vehicle and drive away. Please be mindful that if you do pull over to the side of the road, turn off your vehicle, take you keys and wallet/purse with you and lock your vehicle. Most of the suspects travel in pairs or more. If you do not think that there is something wrong with your vehicle, wait until you reached your destination or have reached the base to inspect your vehicle. Pulcinella, Neapolitan mask

The typical Neapolitan mask of Pulcinella was created back in 1656 by Andrea Calcese, called "Ciuccio" (donkey), who was a tailor from Acerra, a town in the Province of Naples.

The name of Pulcinella comes, most likely, from the Latin, Pullicenus (chicken). Pulcinella is the expression of the poor and abused, and he is always hungry. He seems to be naive, inexperienced and a little slow. But in reality, he is a man of a thousand resources: with his affability he can get out of even toughest situations.

The philosopher, Benedetto Croce, described him as "the image, the caricature, or the ideal of the Neapolitan people."

Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active-duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy. This is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application.

NATIONALS OF ANY STATE OF THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITY COMING TO ITALY DO NOT REQUIRE ANY VISA OR SOJOURNER PERMIT.

As part of the Area Orientation process, the U.S. Region Legal Service Office (RLSO EURAFSWA) assists in the preparation and oversees the acquisition of the Sojourner Permit for all personnel attached to U.S. Navy commands in the Naples area. Army and Air Force personnel stationed at JFC must apply through the Carabinieri at the JFC Provost Marshall's Office, Building L.
