## Navy celebrates Women's History Month in March

The Navy joins the nation in celebrating Women's History Month throughout the month of March.

Navy commands are encouraged to reflect on the national 2012 theme, "Women's Education – Women's Empowerment," to increase their knowledge and awareness of the contributions women have made both to U.S. history and to the Navy.

Women have served with great honor and valor in defense of our nation since the Revolutionary War. However, women did not become an official part of the service until 1908, when Congress established the Navy Nurse Corps. The first 20 nurses, called the "Sacred Twenty," broke the barriers that eventually paved the way for all women to officially enter naval service.

Nurses remained the only women serving in the Navy until World War I, when the Navy's first enlisted women, known as Yeomanettes, provided clerical support.

In 1942, the Navy launched the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES) program, allowing women to serve outside the secretarial realm in an official uniform capacity.

During World War II, more than 85,000 women served as WAVES air traffic controllers, artists, bakers, couriers, cryptologists, draftsmen, hospital corpsmen, lawyers, meteorologists and translators at naval shore commands across the nation and overseas. Eighty-one nurses were taken prisoner by the Japanese in Guam and the Republic of the Philippines during World War II.

Six years later, congressional leaders recognized the need for women in peacetime armed forces with the passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act of 1948. Opportunities for women in the Navy expanded during the Cold War era, and in 1967 President Lyndon B. Johnson signed Public Law 90-130, allowing women the opportunity for promotion to admiral or general.

In 1974, Alene Duerke, director of the Navy Nurse Corps, became the first female appointed to the rank of rear admiral. Two years later, Fran McKee became the first female line officer to make flag rank.

## Naples CSADD group helps sailors make better choices

Every Wednesday, the Coalition of Sailors Against Destructive Decisions (CSADD) meets to make a positive difference in the lives of junior sailors attached to Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples.

Adm. Mark Ferguson, vice chief of Naval Operations, established CSADD in June 2010 as a peer-mentoring program meant to educate sailors about identifying and avoiding bad choices. The program is designed as a resource for active and reserve sailors, Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) candidates and Junior Reserve Officers Training Corps (JROTC) members to help them better prepare for the consequences of destructive decisions, such as excessive drinking and unplanned pregnancy, according to CSADD's official website.

"CSADD is infectious," said Master Chief Charles Collins, NSA Naples command master chief. "People see these young leaders out

on the streets taking care of our sailors and they too become part of the coalition."

Sailors stationed at NSA Naples gather together weekly to help reduce the chance for destructive decisions by presenting alternatives, said Master-at-Arms 2nd Class Felicia Powers, the NSA Naples CSADD president.

"The best part about this group is the fact that this is run by junior sailors, for junior sailors," Powers said. "Junior sailors know firsthand the issues they really have to deal with, and the best solutions are going to come from the ones experiencing those issues."

During December, a month in which CSADD members focused on preventing drunk driving, the group sponsored an interactive DUI fair called "The Evolution of a Destructive Decision." The performance, which was intended to demonstrate the effects of drunk driving, set up displays in several different rooms showing the various stages of the decision to drive while under the influence.

This is a summary taken from the Navy LIVE blog post following the SECNAV's March 5 speech.



**T**he new defense strategy will put increased responsibilities on the Navy and Marine Corps in the years to come. You are the department's most essential asset, and it is the duty of the department's leadership to do all we can to provide each individual sailor and Marine with the resources to maintain that resiliency."

After a decade of hard and effective fighting in Iraq and Afghanistan, the Navy and Marine Corps Team has proven it can withstand a sustained, high operational tempo. Sailors, Marines and their families must be equipped to continue to meet both the physical and mental challenges of a military career. The 21st Century Sailor and Marine initiative puts together a set of objectives and policies, new and existing, to maximize each sailor's and Marine's personal readiness. This initiative will advance progress by leveraging programs under the following five areas:

**Readiness**

- Reduce suicides and manage stress by providing sailors with the support network, health care, and skills needed to overcome adversity, while training leaders to recognize when sailors need help.
- Curb alcohol abuse and bring down the number of alcohol-related incidents which can end careers and sometimes end lives.
- Reinforce the Navy's zero-tolerance policy on the use of synthetic chemical compounds or designer drugs, including synthetic substances like Spice.

**Safety**

- Aggressively prevent sexual assaults from occurring, support sexual assault victims and hold offenders accountable. The 21st Century Sailor and Marine will not tolerate any form of sexual assault.
- Improve motorcycle safety by closing the training gap with the Military Sportbike Rider Course.

**Physical Fitness**

- Move from a "culture of testing" to a culture of physical readiness by strengthening PRT requirements and providing better nutrition options.

**Inclusion**

- Increase the diversity of ideas, experiences, areas of expertise and backgrounds necessary for the Navy to fulfill the variety of missions asked of us.

**Continuum Of Service**

- Recruit sailors once and retain them for life through flexible service options that provide opportunities for meaningful and valued work across a career, whether in the Navy Reserves or in the civilian workforce.
- Provide tools for life after the Navy to Wounded Warriors and those affected by force-management actions.

## Italian News Briefs

### America's Cup to begin in Naples April 7

The America's Cup World Series begins in Naples next month on Saturday, April 7 with a full afternoon of match racing. The main venues will be on Via Caracciolo and the Rotonda Diaz, as they are the ideal location for an easy landing and are clearly visible from the Posillipo promontory and the entire waterfront of Naples. The event will present a fleet of 11 AC45S catamarans competing on behalf of eight different countries: Italy, New Zealand, China, Korea, Spain, Sweden and the United States. The matchups are determined from the finishing order in the previous AC World Series Fleet Race Championship. Then, on Sunday, April 8 the teams will sail three 15-minute fleet races.

The Championship part of the regatta begins on Wednesday April 11, with seeding races for the Match Racing Championship that will take place Saturday, April 14. Between Wednesday and Saturday, teams will compete in 11 fleet races, including a 40-minute contest to determine the top four finishers who will advance to the Match Racing semi-finals and finals. Sunday, April 15 opens with the AC500 Speed Trial, where each team takes two timed runs down a 500-metre race track. (Speed trials will also be held on Friday). The crew recording the best time is crowned the winner.

Italy is represented by the Luna Rossa team, which will race in the AC World Series for the first time. According to some rumors, popular singer Shakira will perform in a concert to open the race. French brand Louis Vuitton will dedicate a fashion line to the America's Cup with a series of handbags, clothing, shoes and accessories.

### Naples doctors arrested for overcharging patients

Italian police arrested 13 doctors and health officials in Naples, including the head of the orthopedic department of the city's Cardarelli hospital. They are accused of making patients pay thousands of euros in a private clinic for sur-

gery that should have been free at a public hospital through the national health service. Doctors and paramedics have been accused of extortion, abuse of office, forgery and fraud against public administration. In addition, police found that cosmetic surgeries, which are not reimbursable under the national health system, were instead performed at the private clinic and improperly reimbursed.

### "Ghost" homes in Italy number more than 1 million

Italian tax police found more than a million "ghost" homes illegally built in Italy. The homes were found by comparing satellite images with the official land register. Most of the illegally built homes were located in southern Italy around the cities of Cosenza, Salerno and Reggio Calabria. Naples and its province have the highest number of non-registered buildings. Identifying and taxing these properties would boost tax revenues by €472 million, according to the Italian finance ministry. The investigation into "ghost" homes is part of a wide-ranging crackdown on tax evasion launched by the government of Italian Prime Minister Mario Monti.

### American Impressionists exhibit opens in Florence

Florence is hosting an American Impressionists exhibition at Palazzo Strozzi through July 15. The exhibition illustrates the extremely fruitful relationship that American painters established with Florence and other cities in Tuscany between the mid-19th century and World War I. The exhibition is divided into five sections with works by more than thirty Americans artists who worked in Florence, including the famous painter John Singer Sargent and other less well-known artists whose work is being shown for the first time in Italy. Palazzo Strozzi is open daily from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m., and on Thursdays from 9 a.m. to 11 p.m. For more info: www.palazzostrozzi.org.

# Where 'time has stopped'

Local hill town of Sant'Agata de' Goti is bursting with history

The western side of Sant'Agata de' Goti sits flush with the edge of a cliff, forming a wall of buildings that plunges straight down into a ravine.

Crossing a bridge into the city, you pass over a valley carved away by thousands of years of flowing water. On the other side sits a medieval town whose appearance has changed minimally in the past 300 years, besides the addition of a few cars.

The feeling of being transported back in time is one most people associate with the hill towns that dot the countryside in Tuscany and Umbria. Yet this medieval city sits atop an island of rock in Campania's Benevento province, less than an hour's drive from Naples and about 35 kilometers from the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Support Site.

Though the city was built for defense, as is clear from the tightly packed buildings that greet visitors coming into town, inside the historic center the streets open up into spacious piazzas filled with orange trees and local residents enjoying life.

Hundreds of years ago, these open spaces were used by residents to grow crops when the city was under siege and they couldn't leave the city, said Claudio Lubrano, president of Sant'Agata de' Goti's tourism association.

"Today, these piazzas render it very livable," Lubrano said.

Unlike many hill towns in central and northern Italy that trace their history back to the Etruscans, Sant'Agata de' Goti's earliest residents were Samnites, the Italic people who lived in central and southern Italy before the Romans. Historical evidence shows that the Romans had arrived and transformed the town into a Roman colony by the second century B.C.

After the fall of the Roman empire, a colony of Goths settled in the city in 553 A.D., bringing with them the cult of Sant'Agata and giving the city its name. Later, Lombard invaders came to the town, leaving behind geometrically carved column capitals that still can be seen in the city's churches and monuments.

Even a casual stroll along the city's main thoroughfare of Via Roma

brings to light dozens of pieces of Roman and Lombardic buildings that remain a part of the city's architectural landscape. The atrium of the city's Duomo contains columns from the Roman era, while a Roman epigraph from 42 B.C. is built into the cathedral's façade.

Inside the Duomo, which is dedicated to Sant'Alfonso, visitors can descend into a crypt filled with slender columns and Christian frescoes dating back to 1300. Here, one can see column capitals created by the Lombards, identifiable by their diamond-shaped carvings. The delicate columns support an elaborate system of cross vaults that help distribute the weight of the church apse that sits directly above, creating an unusually airy and open underground burial crypt.

Another nearby church, San Francesco, boasts an elaborately painted wood ceiling and painted majolica floor tiles dating back to the 18th century. Legend has it that if

you ring the bell at the top of the church's *campanile*, or bell tower, you'll live to be 100.

Yet the city's charm lies in more than its history and architecture. On Sundays, locals fill the town's piazzas, chatting with friends and playing with babies. Others stroll with their dogs along Via Riello, which runs along the eastern wall of the city and offers spectacular views of the surrounding countryside.

Local shops produce creamy and flavorful sheep's milk ricotta, while the town's wineries are known for making especially good *falanghina*, a local white wine. The *mela annurca*, a special type of apple, is a prized local product.

Carmine Valentino, the town's mayor, said that Sant'Agata de' Goti's rich history, good food, friendly people and peaceful ambiance are what residents value most about living there.

# Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society teaches parents 'Baby Basics'

The Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS) Visiting Nurses program holds a monthly Baby Basics course for expectant mothers and fathers. The class is designed to provide new parents with all the basic information they need to know for their baby's first six weeks.

"We want to give them a basis," said Natatia Depaoli, NMCRS volunteer visiting nurse. "This is especially important for first-time parents."

Some of the topics covered include a baby's appearance after birth, changing diapers, swaddling, bathing, development, skin issues, establishing a schedule, behavior, cues and cries, how to handle a baby with colic, and a variety of health and safety issues. Participants walk away from the class with hands-on experience in basic infant care, informative books on infant development and behavior, and information on services that NMCRS visiting nurses can provide after birth through in-home visits.

The class coordinators and participants at the Feb. 16 Baby Basics class seemed to agree that the greatest takeaway was the peace of mind

that comes from knowing what to expect, as well as having post-birth support from the NMCRS visiting nurses.

"I wish I would have had this class for previous pregnancies — I am still hearing new things," said Jasmine Brown-Whidbee, who has two daughters and is expecting her first boy in April.

Ann Donohue, NMCRS visiting nurse, said that parents who take the Baby Basics class seem to be more prepared for the early stages of parenthood.

"I have noticed that the parents that go through the class have a greater comfort level and familiarity with the basics," Donohue said. "It provides another resource and support, and knowing there is someone available (to help) makes a difference."

Baby Basics is typically offered the third Thursday of each month. To register for Baby Basics, please call the NMCRS office at 081-568-3913. Women continued to make great strides in the 1970s with President Gerald Ford signing Public Law 94-106, which required service academies to admit women by the fall of 1976. With the doors of educational excellence finally open to women, 81 women entered the U.S. Naval Academy's Class of 1980.

By the 1980s, women had reached impressive heights within the Navy. Promotion boards began selecting women for flag rank, including Roberta L. Hazard. She was selected for promotion to rear admiral upper half May 18, 1988, the first woman to be board selected for that grade.

The 1990s ushered in a new era for women serving in the armed forces. During the first Gulf War, women constituted fifteen percent of the naval personnel fighting force in Iraq and Kuwait. In 1994, the repeal of the Combat Exclusion Law allowed women to serve on combatant ships for the first time. Cmdr. Maureen A. Farren became the first woman to command a combatant ship June 10, 1998, when she took command of USS Mount Vernon, an amphibious dock landing ship.

In April 2010 the Navy instituted a landmark change in policy, allowing women to serve on submarines for the first time. The first group of female submariners completed nuclear power school and officially reported on board two ballistic and two guided missile submarines in November 2011.

Women continue to make history in the Navy. Earlier this year the guided-missile destroyer USS Kidd, led by Cmdr. Jennifer Ellinger, responded to a distress call Jan. 5 from an Iranian fishing vessel whose crew said they were being held captive by pirates. Within 24 hours, Kidd assisted in freeing 13 Iranian fishermen and taking into custody 15 pirates.

Today, nearly every naval community is open to women, and female sailors continue to excel in almost all facets of naval duties both ashore and afloat. More than 54,000 active duty women and more than 10,000 female reservists are serving in the Navy, comprising 17.1 percent of the force. The current Navy Total Force includes 34 active and reserve female flag officers and 59 female command master chiefs. Vice Adm. Ann E. Rondeau, current president of National Defense University, remains the most senior three-star admiral in the Navy.

Commands are strongly encouraged to increase their knowledge and awareness of the contributions of women to the Navy and nation by celebrating Women's History Month through programs, exhibits, publications, and participation in military and community events.

## Individual Force Protection Plans

All Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members on official or unofficial travel outside of Italy must complete an Individual Force Protection Plan (IFPP). IFPPs are mandatory if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/Consulate) is not present and the State Department or responsible Chief of Mission cannot extend normal consular protection services to U.S. Citizens.
- Travel includes any of the following countries: Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia, and all Africa Nations.
- Travel is out of Area of Responsibility (AOR) as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii, and U.S. Territories are exempt).

Our overall goal is to provide fire, medical, and security response to all personnel in need. The Emergency Dispatch Center is the call center for all incidents requiring emergency services.



## DISPATCH SERVICES

EDC personnel include members of Air Operations, masters-at-arms and local national Italian employees. Local national employees assist personnel with translation services, dispatching local police forces, Italian fire fighters, ambulances and tow trucks. EDC is used as a call center for fire, medical, and security response teams. All responses not requiring emergency services will be directed to the NSA Naples Command Quarterdeck.

# NCTS Naples celebrates 49th birthday

The month of February marked U.S. Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station (NCTS) Naples' 49th year of "Connecting Warfighters." The history of NCTS Naples can be traced back to February 1963 when the Naval Communication Unit, Naples, was established on the Allied Forces Southern Europe post in Bagnoli. The unit was tasked to provide communications support to shore-based activities in the Naples area.

In May 1968, the name was changed to Naval Communications Station (NAVCOMMSTA) when its mission was expanded to include fleet support for units in the Mediterranean. As its mission continued to expand and sophisticated satellite and computerized communication systems were added, NAVCOMMSTA was re-designated as U.S. Naval Communication Area Master Station, Mediterranean (NAVCAMS MED) in 1976. As one of four NAVCAMs in the world, its mission was expanded to include management of all naval tactical communication assets, systems and circuitry within the Mediterranean communication area.

In October 1991, NAVCAMs MED became U. S. Naval Computer and Telecommunications Area Master Station, Mediterranean (NCTAMS MED). Along with a new name came the additional tasks of providing Automated Data Processing systems advice and support to other local commands.

NCTAMS MED also began providing operational direction to Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station, Sicily, Naval Communication Unit London and NCTAMS MED Detachment, Rota.

In September 1996, NCTAMS began a consolidation effort in the Naples area by moving out of the antiquated facilities in Bagnoli and Agnano, and moving into a state-of-the-art communications facility at Capodichino, more commonly referred to as the C4I facility. Following completion of this move in June 1997, NCTAMS began focusing on the assumption of Indian Ocean communications services. On Oct. 1, 1997, NCTAMS MED became NCTAMS EURCENT to reflect the operational responsibility for both the European and central (Indian Ocean and Southwest Asia) areas of operation.

On Oct. 6, 2005 a new chapter was written. NCTAMS EURCENT was disestablished and U.S. Naval Computer and Telecommunications Station Naples (NCTS NAPLES) was created. ## Berlusconi out of office, but still steals the show in Viareggio

Thousands of spectators gathered March 3 at the 2012 Viareggio Carnival celebration to witness more than 30 large and small floats parade along Viareggio's seaside avenue, best known as "La Passeggiata," along with groups of masked revelers. The event this year marked the city's 139th carnival celebration, which is considered one of Europe's best and annually draws huge crowds from around the world. The 2012 Viareggio Carnival's first-prize winner within the first classification of the float competition was "Santo Subito" ("Now Holy") for its "biting satire, dimension, attention to detail and choreography." Designed by French-born Gilbert Lebigne and Corinne Roger, the creation portrayed ex-Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi standing with a halo behind international leaders in cardinal robes. Second place went to "Grandeur" with Prime Minister Sarkozy, whereas third place went to "Flowers in Hell," also known as "Tsunami," which featured kimono-costumed dancers. For the other categories, "Garibaldi fu ferito" ("Garibaldi was wounded") emerged as the first-place winner under the second classification. Furthermore, "Trenitalia" was the first-place winner among the costumed group entries, while "Angels and Demons" was the judges's favorite among the individual types. A magnificent fireworks display highlighted the March 3 celebrations, which paved the way for the "White Night" event that was held the same evening. Sant'Agata de' Goti is also a popular destination for city residents looking to get away from the hectic pace of daily life, he said.

"It makes you return," Valentino said.

### BASIC INFORMATION

You can pick up a guidebook that contains a map and English explanations of major town monuments at either the Church of San Francesco or the city's tourism office, which is located at the north end of the city in Largo Toricella.

You can reach the church of San Francesco by turning left on the main thoroughfare of Via Roma after you cross the bridge into town and following the street for a few blocks. To reach Largo Toricella and the tourism office, continue following the main street until you reach Via Diaz (a little ways past the Duomo) and take a left. Follow Via Diaz a short distance and you will run into Largo Toricella, which is home to a lovely garden that is perched on the edge of the city. Directly across from the garden is the city's Associazione Turistica Sant'Agata de' Goti Pro Loco. The president of the associa-

tion, Claudio Lubrano, is happy to offer tours in-depth tours (in Italian) to visitors, and if your language skills are up to it, you can call him on his cell phone at 338-923-8541 and arrange a guided visit. Largo Toricella connects to Via Riello, a walkway along the eastern edge of the town that provides breathtaking views of the countryside. Make sure to explore the scenic promenade during your visit.

### GETTING THERE

To reach Sant'Agata de' Goti from Naples, head north on the A1 autostrada and take the Caserta

Sud exit. Then follow the Strada Statale Sannitica (SP336), which shortly turns into the (SS265). Keep following the signs directing you to Sant'Agata de' Goti. After a few kilometers you'll pass a large aqueduct, after which you need to keep following the local roads pointing to the town.

To make things easy, you can tell your GPS to take you to the Sant'Agata de' Goti city center. It most likely will direct you to the modern area of the town just west of the Martorano bridge. You can park there and walk about 200 meters into town, crossing the bridge to enjoy the scenic approach into the city; or, on non-market days, you can drive across the bridge and park in a lot on the other side.
