



CFAY helps celebrate Japanese history at Tokyo *Jidai Matsuri*

Volunteers from Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) joined 1,600 other participants to celebrate the history of Tokyo at the 20th Tokyo Historical Festival (*Jidai Matsuri*) held every year on Culture Day, a Japanese national holiday observed Nov. 3.

CFAY Chief Staff Officer Cmdr. Emil Salansky had the honor of portraying Commodore Matthew Perry and leading 12 other CFAY volunteers through the parade course.

"I was humbled when I was asked to do this," said Salansky. "To show that, we as Americans, take into consideration every bit of every day that we're here in Japan, the culture, the ceremonies and the traditions that we have with our Japanese friends."

The parade held in Asakusa, the historical and cultural center of Tokyo, began near Nitenmon gate behind Sensoji Temple, the oldest temple in Tokyo, and traversed down Umamichi-dori Avenue and Kaminarimon Gate before finishing near Tawaramachi Station.

The event showcases the incredible history and development of Tokyo over the last 400 years. Participants dressed in intricately detailed period costumes marched to the applause of thousands of spectators lining the streets. Along the way, reenactments of battles and other famous scenes from Japanese history were acted out to the delight of the crowds.

Tokyo, originally named Edo, grew into a city with a population of more than a million residents after Tokugawa Ieyasu established the Tokugawa Shogunate there in 1603. The city was renamed Tokyo, which means Eastern capital, once the Shogunate's reign ended and the emperor took up residence in the Imperial Palace located at the site of the old Edo Castle in the heart of Tokyo.

The American volunteers, dressed in the uniforms of American Sailors of the 19th century, represented Commodore Matthew C. Perry and his men who first arrived to Japan in 1853.

Perry opened Japan up to the west with the signing of a treaty that provided for: peace and friendship between the United States and Japan; opening of two ports to American ships at Shimoda and Hakodate; help for any American ships wrecked on the Japanese coast and protection for shipwrecked persons; and, permission for American ships to buy supplies, coal, water and other necessary provisions in Japanese ports.

CFAY Port Operations Chief Electronics Technician Eric Estanislaw, who is serving his first tour in Japan, was impressed with the festival and was thankful for the opportunity to take part in such an event.

"This is one the greatest opportunities you can have to immediately immerse yourself in the Japanese culture, to learn about them, to let them learn about you, to meet people and to see how friendly Japan really is to the United States," said Estanislaw.

Dispensary reopens for business with ribbon cutting ceremony

After six months of extensive renovations, the United States Forces Japan (USFJ) Employees Health Insurance Association Dispensary at Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) reopened for business with a ribbon cutting ceremony Oct. 22.

CFAY Commanding Officer Capt. Daniel Weed and Public Works Department Lt. Cmdr. Kristian Barton attended the ceremony along with USFJ Employees Health Insurance Association personnel.

The dispensary, known as *Shinryojo* in Japanese, has been providing medical services to Master Labor Contract (MLC) and IHA (Indirect Hire Agreement) employees for many years.

According to USFJ Employees Health Insurance Association's historical documents, the dispensary was opened July 1952 to provide Japanese employees medical services at work.

MLC and IHA employees who have health insurance through the USFJ Employees Health Insurance Association are eligible to see a doctor at the dispensary at minimal cost. It costs 500 yen for a employees covered by the health insurance to receive the service.

The dispensary provides various medical services to Japanese employees from electrocardiogram to health consulting. X-raying is also available once a month.

"Before the renovation, it was very difficult to do an electrocardiogram when some ships were in port because of radio waves coming from the ships. Sometimes we couldn't do testing at all," said Dispensary Clerk Ayumi Abe.

Now the newly updated dispensary has a special curtain to prevent the radio waves. The dispensary has a staff of four including two receptionists and two nurses. Doctors come in on Mondays, Wednesdays, Thursdays and Fridays for a half day.

In addition to the new equipment and facilities, the dispensary incorporates a barrier-free design. Now handicapped persons can access the bathroom. A special entrance to the dispensary for wheeled chaired patients was also added.

The Japanese Dispensary expects approximately 800 patients a month; however, it varies depending on the day, according to Kimori. "We are going to be administering

influenza flu shot later this month, so we probably will have this amount of people at the dispensary," Dispensary Nurse Yayoi Kimori said.

During the ceremony, USFJ Employees Health Insurance Association Director Nobuaki Nagai presented letters of appreciation to Capt. Daniel Weed and Public Works Department Cmdr. Timothy DeWitt for their help and support in getting the dispensary renovated.

NEX gas prices to be reviewed by wholesaler in December

Responding to requests by the Navy Exchange (NEX) and the Army-Air Force Exchange Services (AAFES), gas prices on mainland Japan will be reviewed by fuel wholesaler Defense Energy Support Center (DESC) early December.

While NEX and AAFES operate the retail gas stations for military personnel and authorized patrons, they have limited discretion in the cost of fuel that is passed onto consumers in Japan.

"DESC is the one who sets the pricing, the cost price to us," said NEX Japan Region Services Operations Supervisor Mike McGriff. "DESC is going to be reviewing their cost pricing Dec. 1."

DESC, whose mission includes providing comprehensive energy solutions in the most effective and economical manner possible to Department of Defense (DOD) installations around the world, is the exclusive provider of fuel for NEX and AAFES in Japan.

In the meantime, efforts are being made to make gas more affordable for consumers in Japan. For example, the NEX is currently selling gas for less money than it is purchased from the fuel wholesaler DESC. "We pay \$4.19 per gallon and we sell it for \$4.06, we lose 13 cents on every gallon," said McGriff.

NEX prices have remained steady while those in the continental United States have declined, but NEX prices remain far below the average cost of gas in Japan. As of Nov. 5, the MSN Japan Web site listed the average price of gas at the pump in Kanagawa Prefecture at \$5.09 per gallon.

This represents a 33 percent savings for authorized patrons at the NEX Autoport. Southern Japan's Kichi Prefecture is home to the highest gas prices at \$5.56 per gallon while Okinawa gas stations are selling for an average of \$4.93 per gallon.

Unlike NEX and AAFES, Japanese gas retailers purchase fuel from private wholesaler distributors and on the open market. They do not have access to fuel purchased from the DESC.

The DESC dates back to World War II when it was created to administer the critical petroleum requirements of the Army and Navy. Throughout the years it has expanded

to include managing the energy needs of DOD facilities and installations in the United States and around the world.

In addition to acting as the wholesale gas supplier for the Navy, DESC awards contracts for electricity services in the continental United States and manages natural gas and coal supply.

Navy announces exciting new changes to advancement system

The Navy recently announced that leadership courses for both first class and second class petty officer selectees would now be conducted by their parent commands. The decision provides significant manpower savings by allowing Sailors to remain with their commands instead of going to ashore learning sites, and also eliminates the requirement to have the required leadership training prior to taking advancement exams.

The Center for Personal and Professional Development (CPPD) launched the new Petty Officer First Class Selectee Leadership Course (PO1SLC) Oct. 1, aimed at providing the necessary tools and information for commands to grow their own first class petty officers. Intended to replace the current Leading Petty Officer Leadership Course (LPOLC) taught by CPPD instructors, the new command delivered training (CDT) allows commands more flexibility in scheduling courses based on their individual schedules, as

well as being able to tailor the curriculum to their specific needs.

The new PO1SLC is intended to replace the current CPPD Learning Site delivering the LPOLC leadership course. The new PO1SLC will be required for all first class selectees from the February/March 2009 exam and all subsequent exams. The course consists of two phases:

- Phase 1 (12 hours total) is required prior to frocking to the new rank.
- Phase 2 (10 hours total) is required prior to being paid for the new rank.

Each command must assign their own instructors to deliver the new course. Each command will be allowed to tailor the delivery of the training to their crewmembers. Naturally, the chief's mess is expected to take the lead in training the future E-6s, with NEC-9502 and/or NEC-9518 qualified instructors being desirable.

The leadership Courses will be available in March 2009 via Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) (it will also be delivered Navywide at a later date). The format mirrors

the E-6 course in length and flexibility of execution. It is also intended to replace the Work Center Supervisor Leadership Course (WCSLC).

To facilitate implementation of the new policy, CPPD Learning Sites is standing by with subject matter experts to assist with the leadership course content and instructional methods. CPPD also offers a two-day CDT Train-the-Trainer Course (CDT TTT) which provides designated command trainers with basic skills for lesson planning, instructional strategies, techniques and use of visual aids.

NAVADMIN 272/08 contains information regarding these changes to the Navy's training curriculum. Contact the Center for Personal and Professional Development Learning Site at 243-6123 for more information.

Chief of Naval Operations releases 2009 guidance

The Chief of Naval Operations (CNO), Adm. Gary Roughead, released his Guidance for 2009 Nov. 5.

CNO's Guidance (CNOG) reaffirms his vision, mission, guiding principles and focus areas - refining the scope of his intentions and how they will be measured in 2009 - and reviews the accomplishments of the Navy over the past year.

"Over the past year, we have implemented our Maritime Strategy around the world. This year's guidance will highlight those accomplishments as well as expand on the progress we need to continue to make to remain a dominant force," Roughead said.

CNO said that one of last year's accomplishments was developing a Navy Ethos, a tangible statement of values integral to the Navy's mission accomplishment.

"It distinguishes those of us who serve in the Navy, active and reserve Sailors and Navy civilians, regardless of unit, command or community," Roughead said.


The CNOG reinstates CNO's three focus areas of building the future force, maintaining warfighting readiness, and developing and supporting Sailors, Navy civilians and their families. He said over the past year the

Navy has made significant progress in those areas, setting the stage for continued achievements in 2009.

Some of those achievements include: Deploying of the first guided missile submarines, *USS Ohio* (SSGN 726) and *USS Florida* (SSGN 728), in less than six years from the start of their conversion from strategic service; Embarking nongovernmental organizations and international partners aboard Navy hospital and amphibious ships to provide humanitarian assistance to local populations, treating more than 320,000 patients in Southeast Asia, South America and Africa; and transitioning many short-notice, midtour, temporary-duty individual augmentation assignments to permanent change of station global war on terror (GWOT) Support Assignments (GSA) negotiated in a Sailor's normal detailing window, thereby improving Sailors' ability to plan and develop their careers while balancing family needs and quality of life.

The 2009 Guidance explains Roughead's 18 intentions, refining the initiatives and measures set forth in the 2007-2008 Guidance.

The 18 intentions include global maritime partnerships, leveraging science and technology initiatives to ensure warfighting benefits accrue to future Sailors, and competent and dedicated Sailors and Navy civilians, supported by strong families, being the heart of the Navy as the preeminent global maritime power.

MCPON Campa announces intent to retire from active duty

Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON)(SW/FMF) Joe R. Campa Jr., the 11th Sailor to serve in that capacity, has announced his plans to retire from active duty at the end of his enlisted active obligated service (EAOS), April 1, 2009.

His last day in office will be Dec. 13.

Campa, who assumed the duties July 10, 2006, said he feels an immense sense of pride at the opportunities he's been provided to lead the Navy's enlisted force.

"This generation of Sailors is unlike any other. Our men and women serve a war-time Navy, and I have a deep sense of pride in each one of them," said Campa. "Their values, their effort and their contribution to the defense of our nation continue to humble me. Leading them has been the greatest privilege of my career."

Within three months of taking office, Campa had released a document that would

set the tone and course for his tenure as MCPON. The "Mission, Vision and Guiding Principles for Chief Petty Officers" has been ingrained in the fleet, described by many as a return to deckplate leadership.

Campa systematically emphasized the Guiding Principles as he had them inserted into chief, senior chief and master chief selection board precepts, the Command Master Chief Instruction and, finally, the new evaluation (CHIEFEVAL) for the Navy's senior enlisted force.

"The CHIEFEVAL was always the end state I'd hope we'd reach. But we had to be deliberate," said Campa. "I'm very satisfied that the Guiding Principles will endure because our chiefs and commanding officers can now see them as expectations in black and white."

Campa served two chiefs of naval operations, current Chairman of the Joint Chiefs Adm. Mike Mullen and CNO Adm. Gary Roughead. Roughead, in a message to Navy leadership, said that Campa's legacy will be felt for years to come and that the Navy owes him a debt of gratitude for what he has accomplished on behalf of Sailors around the world.

"Early in his tour, it was very clear that his intent was to reset the chief's mess and return its members to the role of deckplate leaders. Watching that happen aboard our ships and shore stations has made our Navy stronger and inspired our Sailors," said Roughead. "MCPON Campa's energy and passionate commitment to our Sailors and their families is infectious, and it has swept across our entire Navy. He is a Sailor's MCPON, a MCPON who changed the Navy based on his love of leading Sailors."

New law allows veterans, out of uniform active duty military to salute during national anthem

Veterans and active-duty military not in uniform can now render the military-style hand salute during the playing of the national anthem, thanks to changes in federal law that took effect this past month.

"The military salute is a unique gesture of respect that marks those who have served in our nation's armed forces," said Secretary of Veterans Affairs Dr. James B. Peake. "This provision allows the application of that honor in all events involving our nation's flag."

The new provision improves upon a little known change in federal law last year that authorized veterans to render the military-style hand salute during the raising, lowering or passing of the flag, but it did not address salutes during the national anthem. Last year's provision also applied to members of the armed forces while not in uniform.

Traditionally, members of the nation's veterans service organizations have rendered the hand-salute during the national anthem and at events involving the national flag while wearing their organization's official head-gear.

The most recent change, authorizing hand-salutes during the national anthem by veterans and out-of-uniform military personnel, was sponsored by Sen. Jim Inhofe of Oklahoma, an Army veteran. It was included in the Defense Authorization Act of 2009, which President Bush signed Oct. 14.

The earlier provision authorizing hand-salutes for veterans and out-of-uniform military personnel during the raising, lowering or passing of the flag, was contained in the National Defense Authorization Act of 2008, which took effect Jan. 28, 2008.

Teach your children well

I used to be able to read a map. I could look at a map, and just be able to find exactly where I needed to go. Perhaps it's my vision, and the fact that I need bifocals at my age, but I am no longer able to understand maps like I once did. Looking at a subway map of Tokyo, or trying to find my way on one of the innumerable rail lines here often gives me a headache. I know where I need to go, but I can't quite figure out how to get there.

My daughters are different than myself. They can take a train and just get anywhere they choose. I can take a thick folder with directions, and they can just run! It amazes me to see them as we go through a train station. They just know where they need to go!

Last week we were going to Disneyland by train. This involves a number of changes in different stations, and you have to make sure that you are on an express, because the local will take way too many stops. I had the packet of directions, but as we traveled I realized that I was just slowing my daughters down.

I asked about the ticket counter, but that was the wrong one. We were going through a gate and had passed the right number for the platform we were looking for, but we were in the wrong station. I wanted to know if this was the right track or the right train, and it was. On that long trip I was right about one thing, and that was following a solitary red line going through a station to lead us to the tracks we wanted. That was it for the whole trip.

My daughters have trained themselves through their experience being here in Japan. To be blunt, they're also faster and have better reflexes than I will ever have again. I have an edge in experience and wisdom, but this is rapidly being eroded by their growth and maturity. And this past week I felt more like I belonged on the sidelines watching them, rather than trying to race with them. I was slowing them down, when they were doing all they could to get us where we needed to go.

In Ephesians 6:1 we find these words, "Fathers, do not exasperate your children, bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord." I feel that throughout our lives I have tried to bring them up in the way of the Lord, yet as they age I wonder if I exasperate them? I am afraid that at times, and in the train stations this past week, the answer is "yes". We are to train people, and then let them go to do what they have been trained to do. I have led for a long time, and I am now in the position of having to follow them.

Colossians 3:20-21 says something similar, "Children, obey your parents in everything, for this pleases the Lord. Fathers, do not embitter your children, or they will become discouraged." I don't want my children to be discouraged. I want them to learn and to be able to grow...even when it makes me feel old!

John the Baptist once said that "the one coming after me is greater than I." I feel that way with my children. They are going to be so much better than me in so many ways that it is almost frightening. That is also true of the people whom I mentor and look after in my work.

In time my own name will fade away, but the ministry will continue in the many lives that I have been blessed to work with. Now none of these people are the Messiah, but they are all human beings seeking to live and grow...and I am not here to slow them down in their growth.

So often, when we look at other people, especially younger or people who are less experienced in an organization than we are, we can become so fully aware of their faults and ignorance that we cannot see their strength and possibilities. We can help someone to grow, but when it comes time for them to leave or lead...we'd rather do it ourselves than trust them to lead us with the knowledge that we've imparted. Sometimes in order to lead we must be led.

It is never about me. It is always about them. My name is not important, but Jesus' name is first above all, and second to his name are the names of those I have been called to minister to.

So I am learning to put up my directions and train maps. I will still look at them, and occasionally understand. But for the most part I will be relying on my daughters to get us through the train system here in Japan. I will be there as a resource to them, but I am no longer going to slow them down. Now may be the time for them to run, and I must graciously just get out of their way.





Heating Season Begins – In support of current Navy and National Energy Polices, Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka has approved a phased

approach to turning on steam heat according to the following schedule:

- Nov. 19-21: Living - Family housing, BOQ/BEQ.
- Nov. 24-26: Common - Retail areas, clubs and schools.
- Nov. 28 - Dec. 02: Office - General office and administration areas.
- Dec. 3-7: Industrial - Warehouses, shops.

Buildings or spaces that utilize electric heating/air conditioning units should turn on their units in accordance with the above schedule. Thermostat settings should be no higher than 68 F or 20 C.

Military Retirees 2009 COLA Rates

– The 2009 cost-of-living adjustment (COLA) for military retired pay, Survivor Benefit Plan (SBP) annuities, social security checks and Veteran’s Affairs disability and survivor benefits will be 5.8 percent, effective Dec. 1, 2008. It will first appear in the January 2009 checks. Service members who retired during calendar year 2008 will receive a somewhat smaller, partial COLA for this year only because they already received a January military pay raise (which also raised their 2008 retired pay). If you retired in 2008, your COLA is calculated as follows:

- Members who entered service before Sept. 8, 1980, and who retired on or after Jan. 1, 2008, will receive a 5.0 percent COLA.
- Members who entered service on or after Sept. 8, 1980 (whose retired pay is calculated on their highest 36 months’ basic pay rather than final basic pay), and retired between Jan. 1, 2008, and Sept. 30, 2008, will receive a partial COLA based on the calendar quarter in which they retired. January through March retirees will receive 5.0 percent; April through June retirees, 3.8 percent and July through September retirees, 1.2 percent. Those who retired after Oct. 1, 2008, will see no COLA this year.
- Members who retire during 2008 will receive full-year COLAs in future years. This is the third year in the last four that the retiree COLA has been higher than the pay raise for currently serving troops. The two are never the same because they are based on different things and have different purposes. Military pay raises are based on private sector pay growth, as measured by the Bureau of Labor Statistics’ Employment Cost Index (ECI). Their intent is to ensure military pay is kept reasonably comparable to private sector pay, to allow the services to compete successfully for manpower over time. Retired pay COLAs, on the other hand, are cost-of-living adjustments that track to inflation, as measured by the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Their purpose is to ensure that whatever purchasing power a member’s retired pay represented on the date he or she left service isn’t eroded by inflation over time.



"This community relations project was a fulfilling experience since we were given the chance to interact with the children on a much more personal level," said Seaman Josue Reyna.

In addition to the service project, Sailors also enjoyed the "Meals in the Home" program with local families, sponsored by the American Women's Association (AWA). Under this program, Sailors had an opportunity to enjoy a home-cooked meal in a relaxed atmosphere, and the families learned about the Navy and shipboard life.

"You guys put in a lot of hard work," said Harwell. "Next time we'll come around and we'll do it again. We definitely plan on building a relationship with you guys, you know, make it a regular thing."



CFAY Town Hall meetings offer residents opportunity to be heard

Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) conducted Town Hall meetings in Negishi, Ikego and Yokosuka during the month of October. The following is a list of topics and issues raised by the residents at the meetings and answered by CFAY Commanding Officer Capt. Daniel Weed:

- The new community center is nearing completion. The center will house the base library, the chapel, the Fleet and Family Service Center and a designated space exclusively set aside for the Area Orientation Brief/ Intercultural Relations Center (AOB/ICR). It is expected to open in March 2009.

- The new AOB/ICR format will be extended to five days and will start in December. The reason for the extension is to allow for walking and bus tours and to address the specific needs of the diverse population of the CFAY community. The new format is a direct result of feedback from members of the community who believed AOB/ICR could and should be expanded and more tailored to better fit single sailors, civilians and family members who each have different needs and concerns upon joining CFAY.

- Chili's restaurant will begin offering breakfast in December.

- The Festival of Trees event will be held Dec. 5.

- The issue of child care availability was raised. Capt. Weed encourages community members to volunteer and encourage qualified members to volunteer to take on positions with the Child Development Center or to take on the responsibilities of providing child care from their homes.

- All residents of the Yokosuka Naval Base are strongly encouraged to return stray carts to the Navy Exchange.

- The CFAY supervision and curfew policy applies to all military members, civilian employees and their family members assigned to or visiting CFAY, Negishi, and Ikego Housing Areas. Children under the age of 12 will not baby-sit other children, including their siblings. Baby-sitters under the age of 16 may supervise until midnight but are not allowed to sit all night. In addition, all children under the age of 18, unless accompanied or supervised by their parent or designated adult guardian, will remain off the streets and out of the public areas from 10:30 p.m. to 5:30 a.m. daily. However, curfew hours on Friday, Saturday and holidays are extended to midnight to 5:30 a.m. high school seniors. Organizers of special events that may result in children returning during restricted hours will inform base security of such events. Additionally, children ages six and older may transit to and from school without adult supervision. Children under the age of six must be escorted to and from school by a child/adult at least 13 years old. Parents who have questions about this policy may contact the Family Service Center director at 243-6716.

- The CFAY dress code applies to all military members, civilian employees and their family members and is strictly enforced.

- There has been concern from residents regarding the cost of gasoline onboard CFAY compared to the retail cost of gasoline in the continental United States. All gasoline is purchased from the Defense Logistic Agency (DLA). The cost now is \$4.19 a gallon and the retail is \$4.06. The price may be adjusted in the beginning of December, but until a new price is set at DLA, the current price of gasoline will remain the same.

- All residents are reminded to contact the Public Works Department (PWD) trouble desk by telephone at 115 if climate conditions are unsatisfactory in their homes, work spaces, schools or places of business around the base and housing areas.

- All residents are reminded to disembark their bicycles when crossing cross-walks and to only cross the street at designated street crossings.

- The current situation that does not allow locally hired personnel to utilize on-base legal services to obtain powers-of-attorney and other legal services that residents may not be able to obtain elsewhere while stationed overseas will be looked into.

- The natatorium at Purdy Gym will be opened from 7 to 9 p.m. through January in order to measure the usage of the facility and determine whether or not it will remain open past 7 p.m. in the future.

Additional questions raised at the Town Hall meetings are addressed below:

- Could the small signs that state "Headlights must be turned on in tunnels" posted at the top of the entrance to the tunnels be made larger and relocated to where they can be seen better? Both "Y" and Japanese license plate vehicles drive through the tunnels without turning their lights on. - *Headlights should always be on in the tunnels. This is taught in the licensing class. We will ensure the contractor who teaches the licensing course clarifies tunnel locations. We will also assess the feasibility of relocating signs by conducting surveys and publicize more. Head lights are also required to be on when visibility is reduced to 50 meters or less. A good rule of thumb is if your windshield wipers are on, so are your lights.*

- The speed limit on two of three streets around the high school is 15 km. I think the same speed should be placed between the high school and Main Street, possibly even for specific times, such as the lunch hours. This is a very busy area, especially during the lunch hours with students and adults alike. - *This was also brought up during the last Traffic Safety Committee meeting. Safety will conduct a survey around the Main Street Food Court on Clements to determine the appropriate speed. We have also contacted Kinnick High School staff to provide crossing guards if feasible during lunch hours.*

- Are there plans to redo the bus stop signs, specifically where the times are posted for the buses? Many of these parts of the signs are faded and some are partly non-existent. I believe they are some type of sticker placed onto the sign. Also, I think the bus stop numbers do not match the route map. - *The Public Works Department will survey all bus stop signs and replace them as required. We will also verify that bus stop numbers match the route map. Additionally, will work with CFAY Safety as requested to replace, alter, move, etc. signs to support traffic safety requirements.*

- When driving from the commissary towards the library by car, there is a beginning school speed zone sign, but no sign showing the end of the school speed zone, is there a plan to put a sign up for this? Also in regards to these signs, the time periods of those that are up do not match. At least one sign says it ends at 3 p.m. and another says it ends at 3:30 p.m., which is correct and is there a plan to fix this? - *The Safety Office just finished a survey of this area with the assistance of CFAY Security. Changes to be implemented are correcting the signs to 3:30 p.m. and delineating the appropriate zone. The Safety Office is currently working on the plans and designs.*

- It seems that every time a bazaar is held in the Fleet Recreation parking garage the mirrors that are to help traffic see others coming up or down the ramps get moved around. I think that it should be part of the take down of everything before the garage is reopened, that these mirrors are checked for their proper angles. Is this possible? Also, there are several warning lights that do not light off as you proceed through the garage. - *We will work with the Navy Exchange to ensure the parking garage mirrors are returned to the proper angles after events. We will repair all non-operational lights.*

- What are the bicycle riding rules here on base? Are they to be ridden on the road, sidewalks or bike lanes? Are they to be ridden or walked in the crosswalk? Does your helmet have to actually be buckled when you wear it or can it be unbuckled? It seems to me that many bike riders; American or Japanese, adult or child; do not know the rules or maybe choose not to follow them. Is there a handout given when bikes are registered on base or perhaps given at AOB/ICR? - *Commander Fleet Activities Instruction COMFLEACTINST 5800.2F specifically addresses bicycle regulations. Per the instruction, bicycles shall ride on the extreme left side of the road unless riding in the bicycle lane on King Street and Howard Street. Bicycles shall be ridden on the sidewalk in the tunnels on Howard Street and the rider shall yield the right of way to pedestrians. At no time is riding a bicycle on the street in tunnels permitted. Bicycles shall be walked across all crosswalks when crossing traffic. Riding a bicycle in Gridley Tunnel is not authorized. A bicyclist may ride on the sidewalk as long as they yield to pedestrians. A bicycle may also be ridden into traffic and is permitted to make turns with traffic provided they use their hand signals. All bicyclists shall wear ANSI or CSPC approved helmets and the chin strap must be properly fastened under the chin. Security tickets violators. Bicycle regulations are distributed when someone purchases a bike at the NEX and during registration. The Safety Office also distributes bicycle regulations in English and Japanese at the monthly Traffic Safety Committee meetings for our fellow workers.*

- Ever since the USS George Washington (CVN 73) got underway, I have tried to watch the base Channel 12 news but it seems that the same program has been playing every time I turn on the TV. - *Channel 12 Programming is currently being upgraded due to a new system. The local news, Yokosuka Report, is aired three times a day at 8 a.m., noon and 6:30 p.m. and the Commander's Corner monthly call-in show is aired at 11 a.m. and 5 p.m., to ensue that it's viewable for both working and nonworking community members as well as their family members. In between these airings is the informational slide show that is extremely important to the CFAY community.*

- What can be done about the abundance of Kanto Stripes newspapers left in front of vacant units? - *Kanto Stripes will be contacted and informed of occupied units.*

For Toms, the experience was definitely worth the risk of possible nausea and upset stomach.

"It feels great to know that I won it," Toms said wincing uncomfortably. "But something is definitely not feeling right."

- Why are taxis not available from Yokosuka to Ikego? I had a medical emergency and went to the Emergency Room in an ambulance. When I was finished at about 3 a.m., I had a hard time getting a taxi home. I had to take a base taxi from the hospital to the main gate then walk outside the gate to find an off base taxi to take me to Ikego's main gate. That taxi dropped me off at the main gate and I had to walk the rest of the way home? - *In the future, please call the Yokosuka Command Duty Officer (CDO) for an emergency situation like the one described. The CDO will figure out a way to get you and your family home even if it means Security will drive you.*

- What can we do about the high temperatures and ventilation problems in housing units when the air conditioning is shutoff to prevent excessive heat from cooking or the smelling of cigarette smoke from other residents? - *Residents should speak with the Public Works Officer in regards to their units and this issue and he will handle each situation on a case by case basis.*

- Is there any way to sign up for MWR events without going to Yokosuka in person all the time? For instance, I wanted to sign up for a massage, but I was told I had to do it in person. - *Yes and No. For some things please utilize our MWR Office in Ikego or our Web site. However we are not currently allowed to do e-commerce on our network infrastructure. When this is allowed we will be happy to offer it.*

- How can we pay for youth events online without going to the payment center? - *MWR is in the process of developing a Web site to take payments online but cannot implement it until approval for e-commerce is authorized by Commander Naval Installations Command (CNIC).*

- What can we do about teenagers leaving trash near the skateboard area? - *Each and every resident is responsible for the community. If we do not take care of the area utilized; it will be secured until it is kept cleaned.*

- What can we do about the rude children riding the Home to Work (HTW) bus? - *Contact Security immediately. Security will begin to keep a track of repeated offenders for future reference for possible Civilian Administrative Forum (CAF) or debarment.*

- Can we enlarge the signs on the Home to Work (HTW) bus to prevent mistakenly getting on the wrong bus? - *The signs will be enlarged.*

- How many times do we return the skateboards back to those violating the rules of riding a skateboard without using a helmet? - *Security must allow the parents to pick up the skateboard, but will keep documentation on repeated violators for possible Civilian Administrative Forum (CAF) or debarment.*

- Why are parents not being held accountable for their children's action in regards to breaking rules, bullying other children and being rude on the Home to Work bus? - *Parents can not be held accountable for the actions of the children, but after creating documentation for*

repeated offenders; the parents will be called into his office for consultation and warning of debarment.

- Can we obtain video surveillance on the bus or in any location that will help Security catch repeated offenders? - *The matter will be investigated.*

- Who do we call when bullying starts on the school ground and then finish out in the community? - *The school principal should handle all matters on the school ground and base Security will handle it off school grounds.*

- How do we handle rude parents when being challenged on the playground for correcting their children? Most of the parents leave their children unattended. - *All residents should utilize Security and please continue to be courteous and have integrity in all decisions. Parents are encouraged to take an active role in developing a neighborhood watch comprised of all parents.*

- What is the status of the playground in Negishi? - *Playground equipment is on order and the Housing Office is planning to start set up in February 2009.*

- Why doesn't the Yokosuka Middle School have an after school activities bus? - *Our middle school interscholastic programs are very limited and, as a result, are not resourced to accommodate an activity bus. Our middle school teams are linked with the high school teams so that we can take advantage of the infrastructure of officials, transportation to competition and sometimes coaching. We participate in some cases, only as exhibition and travel on a space available basis.*

- Does the Home to Work buses return to Yokosuka after they drop off people in Negishi? - *No, they are parked in the Negishi Public Works Department/Housing Office compound.*

- Are yard sales allowed in Negishi? - *Yes, but you need to get permission first.*

- Can local hired civilians still rent a house on Negishi Base? - *Yes, but it is up to the parent command and availability of units.*

- Can more education/off duty education be offered on Negishi Base? - *We need to know more details on what people want. In the meantime, University of Maryland classes are offered in Negishi.*

- When will the new doors/fences be complete for the houses in Negishi? - *The project is in progress. There are three phases. Phase one is done, phase two is currently ongoing and phase three will be expected to start in the forth quarter.*

- Can we get an after hours gas pump established? - *The cost to do this will be about \$50,000. The decision was made to do this in the future in Ikego upon closure of Negishi.*

- Can we get a high capacity washing machine in the laundry facility in Negishi? - *The design is complete. The machine has been purchased. We are currently waiting for funding to install the correct voltage.*

- Which off base taxi company can come on base? - *Currently it is the Kanagawa Kojin Taxi Company and Asahi Taxi Company. Asahi Taxi Company may end soon as they mentioned returning their vehicle/driver passes at the end of the year.*
