



Sailors get "Street Smart" with S.A.F.E. visit to CFAY

Stay Alive From Education, Inc. (S.A.F.E.), a Florida based program, visited Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) Dec. 9-11 and presented "Street Smart," a 90-minute program detailing the ghastly, sickening and all too common consequences of driving irresponsibly.

S.A.F.E. Executive Director Vince Easevoli and Assistant Director Joseph McCluan gave 10 presentations to approximately 1,400 attendees over the course of three days. Although there are a number of public service announcements and other programs geared towards influencing young adults to make better decisions when getting behind the wheel, "Street Smart" stands out due to its unique approach.

"We don't go in as authoritative figures; rather, we go in and say if you make poor choices, this is what can happen to you and this is what we have to do as fire fighters to try and save your life," said Easevoli. "A lot of people don't realize everything that happens to them in a crash. They think they're kept in a hospital, in a sterile environment, [take] a couple of pain medications and then they go home."

After taking part in one of their presentations at the Chapel of Hope, Electricians Mate 3rd Class Harvey Anderson believes "Street Smart" was much better than any other training sessions he has seen on the topic. During the program, Anderson volunteered to take the stage and represent an individual who would require emergency care after being involved in a car accident. The program maintained a light and amusing atmosphere while demonstrating the serious procedures and describing the unimaginable pain that Anderson was simulating going through on stage.

"Being up there was awesome. It gives you first-hand experience of what goes on and it taught me a lot," said Anderson. "It's very graphic; it's definitely worth watching because it teaches you the inside of what happens and what goes on when there is a crash and how to avoid that."

CFAY Safety Manager Kristin Hamon thought that the three-day event was a huge success. She first saw the presentation at a safety conference in Norfolk, Va., and believed that the program was exceptional and could be a very effective tool for getting through

to young adults.

"It's good for everybody to hear, but it's especially good for high school and college-aged students," said Hamon. "I would love to get ["Street Smart"] back next year and focus on getting them to the high schools and other bases in Japan.

Yokosuka Sailors dance it up at 11th annual holiday COMREL event

More than 50 Sailors of various commands from Fleet Activities Yokosuka volunteered to join in holiday festivities with the local disabled at the Fureai Christmas Dance Party Dec. 3. The event, sponsored by the Yokosuka Lions Club, was held at Yokosuka's Sogo *Fukushi* (Welfare) Center.

Approximately 140 Japanese disabled people from seven workplaces in Yokosuka attended the 11th annual holiday event. It is the fourth year since Sailors started participating in the event.

After Yokosuka Lion Club Director Osamu Nozawa's opening remarks, the dance party kicked off when participants set off firecrackers.

At the party, Sailors danced with the local Japanese to the pulsating beats of American and Japanese pop music. Sailors interacted with them by showing them new steps and moves.

"It is very fun," said Navy Information Operations Command (NIOC) Yokosuka Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Jonathan Donate who participated in the event for the first time. "Other people from my command had come [to the event] previously and they said they had a fun

time, so I thought I should try it out and come here."

"Sailors have a good sense of rhythm and are not as shy as the Japanese," Nozawa said. "It is great to see them enjoy dancing because it also motivates Japanese people to enjoy dancing."

"They are having a lot of fun. American people like to dance a lot, but apparently, Japanese people like it

too," said Information Systems Technician 2nd Class (SW) Stephanie Avilarosales from USS *McCampbell* (DDG 85). "It was a lot of fun and I really enjoyed sharing with the community. We didn't want them to think that the Navy was just there. We wanted to give back to the community also."

Aside from dancing, participants also played *tamaire*, a Japanese field day event in which two teams throw red or white small balls into a basket situated atop a high pole. During break time, a magic show was enjoyed by the Sailors and their hosts.

"We tend to have the same activities every year, so we planned to add some new features this year," said Nozawa. "For example, we had a *tamaire* game and spent more time with the magic show. We also set up a Santa Claus air balloon in the center of the dance floor. We would like to make this event more interesting to attract more participants."

Nozawa said he wants more people to know about the event. "I would like to make this event even bigger," said Nozawa. "I would like to have more Sailors and hopefully, we will be able to invite Japanese volunteer organizations."

"I will come next year and I will probably bring more people from the ship because this was a very good experience," Avilarosales said with a smile.

Malicious Spear Phishing E-mails Caution Advisory - Malicious e-mails targeting "navy.mil" network users were detected on One-Net. The e-mails have embedded links to a .zip file containing a malicious executable file, which is a variant of the "Poison Ivy Trojan." The e-mail is designed to make users believe that the attachment was removed by security filters, when in fact, there was no attachment. The malicious content is only delivered if a user unwittingly follows the links in the body of the message. Details of the malicious phishing e-mails are:

- Originators e-mail addresses: nmci.postmaster@navy.mil and postmaster@navy.mil.
- Subject: Nov 08 NNWC Directory.zip was removed.
- The e-mail directs users to click on one of the following links:
 - https://webmail.exceptions.nmci.navy.mil/exchange/nov_nwnc_directory.zip.
 - <https://216.60.119.18/exchange/nov%2008%20nnwc%20directory.zip> or copy and paste a link placed in the e-mail into the address of a web browser.
- Once the user clicks or copies

and pastes the embedded link, a variant of the Poison Ivy Trojan is downloaded to the users computer. This is a phishing attempt and should be immediately deleted. Call One-Net at 243-3883 for more information.

Unauthorized use of Space Heaters – CNFJ Fire Inspectors have discovered a rash of unauthorized use of space heaters throughout the Yokosuka Base community. In accordance with Commander U.S. Naval Forces Japan instruction 11320.23B, "Fire Department permission is required for each specific location where space heaters are to be used. Generally, permission shall not be granted as most base facilities have adequate heating. Portable space heaters shall not be used and are not authorized in base housing." If you feel you require a space heater in your work area, please call the Fire Prevention Office at 243-4637 for more information.

Q: American Red Cross (ARC) provides a dental assistant program. I and many others have taken an interest in this program. As an active volunteer in the ARC office I have learned that the program has been put on hold. Many volunteers have constantly called about the start date of the program and have felt deceived. They have been waiting for months and all we can do is give them the same answer. My manger has sent e-mails and tried to contact the U.S. Naval Hospital (USNH) Yokosuka

Commanding Officer for information but have not received a response. This has discouraged potential and present volunteers, to be involved in the American Red Cross program. Other bases such as Iwakuni offer the program and we would like to know if Yokosuka is going to offer it as well.

A: As Senior Station Manager for the American Red Cross, I have informed people that have contacted our office expressing an interest in the American Red Cross Dental Assistant Program that the program is currently on hold. The Red Cross Dental Assistant Program was placed on hold by USNH Dental Services over a year ago because the dental clinic was short of staff due to some of its dentists going on deployment and transferring. USNH Yokosuka Commanding Officer Capt. Moore and Director for Dental Services Capt. King have expressed a strong interest in getting the program started again. The American Red Cross and USNH Yokosuka are currently exploring the possibility of getting the program started again. We are now in negotiations. If all goes well the program may start again, sometime next year.

Q: With the *USS George Washington* (CVN 73) back in port the number of pedestrians on base has risen. A lot of these pedestrians do not know the "do's and dont's" in regards to pedestrian safety on base. I have seen them walking through the tunnels with the flow of traffic not in the provided sidewalks. A lot of the pedestrians are wearing dark colored clothing which makes it very difficult to see them especially when they walk out into traffic without looking. The community at large, I feel does a very good job looking out for the pedestrians on base. It would be easier and safer if the pedestrians could assist as well.

A: Thank you for your comments and suggestions. Pedestrian safety information is discussed at the Area Orientation Brief (AOB) and monthly Traffic Safety Committee meetings. We will continue to educate people via base newspapers and TV. While it is always a good idea to wear reflective or brightly colored clothing, there is no requirement to do so unless engaged in physical fitness activities. The Safety Office welcomes suggestions and thanks you for taking the time to make our base a safer one!

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Naval Safety Center launches joint service winter safety campaign

The Naval Safety Center (NSC), in conjunction with the Army Combat Readiness Center and the Air Force Safety Center, launched a joint winter safety campaign Dec. 1.

Last year, six Sailors and Marines did not live to see the end of the holiday season because they were killed on the highway. While motor vehicle mishaps continue to be the biggest killer of Sailors and Marines, there are other risks associated with the winter months.

Each service's safety Web site will contain resources such as videos, presentations, articles and posters that can be used in command safety standdowns. The Navy's information is located at www.safetycenter.navy.mil/seasonal/winter08/index.asp.

The campaign contains information on drunk, fatigued and winter driving, as well as winter recreation safety and holiday risk management. The information is designed to be shared with family and friends as well as service members.

"The holidays are a time to celebrate with loved ones, but they are also a time of increased risk," said Col. Mark Vanous, deputy commander of the Naval Safety Center. "More of our Sailors and Marines are on the highways during this time and many are driving long hours to get to their destinations, which increases the odds that tragedy may strike. Risk management can make the difference between coming back to work safely after the New Year or winding up as a statistic."

The joint service winter safety campaign runs through the

end of the winter season.

The campaign material is intended to provide leaders with the tools they need to educate their young Sailors and Marines, as well as soldiers and airmen, about risks that affect us all. These tools will be updated throughout the holiday season, so NSC recommends checking the Web site often, along with the links to the resources provided by the other services.

USS *Curtis Wilbur* (DDG 54) held its change of command ceremony on the ship's flight deck while in port Commander Fleet Activities Yokosuka (CFAY) Dec. 12. Cmdr. Paul H. Hogue relieved Cmdr. Theodore A. Zobel as *Curtis Wilbur's* commanding officer.

Zobel was in command for 18 months leading the charge through multiple major and bilateral exercises and establishing *Curtis Wilbur* as one of the leading ships in the 7th Fleet.

Guest speaker, Commander Destroyer Squadron Fifteen (DESRON 15) Capt. Mark C. Montgomery, spoke on the impressive command tour of Zobel. Montgomery credited Zobel as a reliable, stand-fast member of DESRON 15 and touted his leading from the front in ballistic missile defense (BMD) and Zobel and *Curtis Wilbur's* continued impact in the area of BMD in the 7th Fleet.

Zobel credited his achievements in command during his remarks, not of just himself but the crew he served with each day. He attributed the continued successes of the *Curtis Wilbur* to the support and patience from family members; yet, the ship wouldn't be as successful without the knowledge that things are being handled at home. He individually recognized the Family Readiness Group, Ombudsman, and CFAY for taking time to assist the families at home while the ship is underway and making Yokosuka a wonderful place to serve.

Zobel also took time to thank all the other commands

in Yokosuka that have supported *Curtis Wilbur* during his time in command. Without the support of the commands throughout the base, *Curtis Wilbur* would not be the mission capable ship she has proven to be. He also thanked his fellow commanding officers in DESRON 15 and Carrier Strike Group Five for their camaraderie and mentorship.

Zobel's career began in Annapolis at the Naval Academy with a bachelor's of science degree in general engineering. His career path consists of tours onboard the *USS McInerney* (FFG 8) as damage control assistant, *USS Mobile Bay* (CG 53) as damage control assistant and assistant operations officer, *USS Curts* (FFG 38) and *USS*

Chancellorsville (CG 62) for his department head tours as chief engineer and *USS Mason* (DDG 87) as executive officer.

Zobel earned a Masters degree in national security and strategic studies from the Naval War College. His personal awards include Meritorious Service Medals, Navy-Marine Corps Commendation Medals, the Navy Achievement Medal and various unit and campaign awards.

Zobel will report to the Program Executive Office for Ships in Washington D.C., where he will support the planning and execution of cruiser modernization.

Hogue assumed command of *Curtis Wilbur* as the 11th commanding officer of the destroyer since its commissioning 14 years ago. Hogue's career began in Annapolis at the Navy Academy with a bachelor's degree in Mechanical Engineering. His career path consists of tours onboard the *USS Gridley* (CG21) as the main engines officer and in *USS Duluth* (LPD 6) as the third division officer. His first department head tour was in *USS Rentz* (FFG 46) where he served as the engineering officer. His follow on department head tour was in *USS Princeton* (CG 59) as engineering officer. Hogue then went on to command *USS Defender* (MCM 2) followed by a tour as flag secretary for Commander 7th Fleet.

Hogue earned a Masters Degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the U.S. Naval War College in June 2008. His personal awards include the Navy Meritorious Service Medal, Navy Commendation Medal and Navy Achievement Medal along with various unit and campaign awards.

Navy Working Uniform details, instructional video announced

The Chief of Naval Personnel released detailed information about the delivery schedule, manner of wear and occasion for wear for the Navy Working Uniform (NWU) Dec. 2 in NAVADMIN 343/08.

An instructional video was also posted on the Navy Personnel Command Web site www.npc.navy.mil/commandsupport/usnavyuniforms/ and on Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) at <https://www.nko.navy.mil/portal/alertscommunity/home/whatsnewonko>.

According to the message, the NWU is intended for year-round wear and shall be the standard working uniform ashore. The NWU will replace working utilities, tropical working uniforms, wash khakis, winter working blue, aviation working green, and non-tactical/environmental usage of camouflage utility uniforms.

The NWU is designed to be worn in sea and ashore environments that do not require special clothing (e.g., flight, flight deck, engine room, etc.). Unless otherwise prescribed by the regional commander, the NWU is authorized to be worn at all facilities on base, while commuting to/from work and home via POV, public transportation and on government/military flights to/from overseas and continental U.S. locations.

Routine stops while commuting are not authorized with an exception for genuine emergencies such as medical emergencies and vehicle breakdowns.

For environmental extremes the following modifications are authorized when granted by appropriate authority:

- The NWU shirt may be removed on job sites or in work spaces.
- NWU trousers may be worn unbloused on job sites or in workspaces.
- During the winter or inclement periods, the parka hood is authorized for wear in addition to head gear. Black leather gloves are authorized.

The NWU will be available for purchase via designated Navy Exchange Uniform Centers as follows:

- Dec. 08 - Navy leadership (flag officers, commanding officers/OICs, (9580/9579/9578) command master/senior chiefs, and chiefs of the boat) via Navy Exchange Uniform Support Center at 800-368-4088 or 757-502-7450.
- Jan. 09 - Tidewater
- April 09 - Southeast
- July 09 - Northeast
- Oct. 09 - Capital region
- Jan. 10 - Western/northwest
- April 10 - Gulf region
- July 10 - Hawaii
- Oct. 10 - Europe/Japan/Guam

All existing working uniforms will continue to be authorized for wear until December 2010. Sailors who have not been issued NWUs at recruit training command or purchased NWUs while assigned to an active rollout location must maintain their current working uniforms until

the NWU is available in the area assigned. This policy also applies to Sailors wearing the new service uniform announced earlier in 2008.

Kinnick High School NJROTC cadets have fun at working hard

Uniforms are a common sight on a military base, but when children are wearing those familiar clothes, people are bound to look twice.

"We're kids in uniform on a military base with adults in uniform," said Nicolette Jimenez. "We're always being watched."

Cadet Lt. Nicolette Jimenez is the commanding officer of the Navy Junior Reserve Officer Corps (NJROTC) at Kinnick High School.

Part class, part community service organization, the NJROTC is run like a small military unit complete with platoons and a chain of command.

Each class is organized into a platoon. Naval Science Instructors Kevin Mode and Omar Hasan lecture on military customs, uniform policy and marching. Students take attendance, perform uniform inspections and otherwise run the classes.

"They are the program," said Hasan. "Without the kids, without the students, there is no program."

This year the Kinnick program has 120 cadets. That is smaller than average for

NJROTC but huge for the size of the school.

Any Kinnick High School student can join, "even if you're a senior," Jimenez said.

"A lot of people, it turns out that their parents enroll them in ROTC. They think we're going to whip them

into shape."

But the program works differently, discipline is important but punitive push-ups are rare. Many students who sign on for a semester end up staying.

"They find out that it is worth while," Jimenez said.

A year of NJROTC counts as a career credit, fulfilling the Department of Defense Dependent Schools (DoDDS) graduation criteria. After graduation, many cadets go on to join the military, though not all end up in the Navy. Cadets who spend three or more years in JROTC are eligible to join at a higher pay grade.

"It's not just for the military aspect," Jimenez said, "It's training for life in general. And, it's fun."

NJROTC cadets get to march in the Shimoda Black Ship Festival, compete against other DoDD Schools in the Far East Competition and, on Dec. 6, they went out to sea with the *USS Blue Ridge* (LCC 19).

"It's a great learning experience," said Jimenez.

When adults see NJROTC cadets in uniform Jimenez is confident that second look will be one of approval.

"We're a hardworking bunch of kids," Jimenez said. "More than they know ..., and in the end, we have fun."

SPAWAR brings IT training to FDNF Sailors

Navy reservists assigned to Space and Naval Warfare Command (SPAWAR) units throughout the U.S. hosted information systems technology (IT) training to forward-deployed naval forces (FDNF) Japan Sailors Dec. 1-12 at Yokosuka's Afloat Training Group Western Pacific.

The two-week training, geared toward shipboard information system technicians (ITs), focused on subjects ranging from network switching to Cisco management to information assurance.

According to SPAWAR IT Instructor Chief Information Systems Technician (SS) Douglas Bolton, from Columbia, S.C., the SPAWAR team's combined Navy experience of 180 years, including 170 combined years in information technology, plus the experience they bring from the civilian sector helps create a comprehensive training environment.

Bolton said much of the training comes from input gathered around the fleet.

"What we do is send out a 'needs assessment' form to individual ships and ask them what areas they need training in," Bolton said. "We use that to put together a training module that each ship can join in on whenever it's feasible for them during the two weeks we offer this training."

The training is then organized into a course where Sailors can pick and choose when and what type of training they want. Bolton says that team members even visit ships to accommodate training needs.

"It's all about getting the information out there," said Bolton. "The IT world is constantly changing; there are hackers out there with methods that are constantly evolving, so we as IT professionals in the military have to stay one step ahead of the enemy."

One topic of importance was information assurance (IA). With the increasing threat of individuals and organizations gaining access to Department of Defense information systems, Bolton said ITs have to be aware

of this threat and stressed the importance of IA training.

"IA training is very important and not only to IT professionals, but to every Sailor," Bolton said.

Annually, every Sailor is required to complete an IA training course via the Navy Knowledge Online (NKO) Web portal.

Beside offering up-to-date training in the IT field of expertise, the course also allowed ITs from around the region to come together and share their thoughts.

Information Systems Technician 2nd Class (SW) Daniel Jackson, from Callao, Va., and assigned to *USS George Washington* (CVN 73) says he enjoyed collectively working with his peers.

"Interacting with other ITs from different commands and hearing their thoughts on certain subjects was interesting and it was nice to see what they had to say," said Jackson.

Bolton recommends that commands try to take part in this type of training annually. To request the training, commands must submit a needs assessment form to SPAWAR.

England set to depart

Deputy Secretary of Defense Gordon England announced Dec. 2 that he will not be staying with Secretary Robert Gates in the Obama Administration.

"I congratulate President-elect Obama for retaining Bob Gates as secretary, and I salute Bob Gates for his continued commitment," England said.

"However, it's time for me to leave. When I came into government in early 2001, I anticipated serving for two to four years. After almost eight years, it's now time for me to turn over the reins to a successor. Also, it's most appropriate for the new administration to name its own deputy."

England said he will stay for some time past Jan. 20, if requested, to assure a smooth transition.

Part three: Straight talk on alcohol abuse and alcoholism

According to the Brown University Center for Alcohol and Addiction Studies, more than half of all adults have a family history of alcoholism or problem drinking, and more than nine million children live with a parent dependent on alcohol and/or illicit drugs.

Can a problem drinker simply cut down? It depends. If that person has been diagnosed as an alcoholic, the answer is "no." Alcoholics who try to cut down on drinking rarely succeed. Cutting out alcohol (abstaining) is usually the best course for recovery. People who are not alcohol dependent but who have experienced alcohol-related problems might be able to limit the amount they drink. If they can't stay within those limits, they need to stop drinking altogether.

What is a safe level of drinking? For most adults, moderate alcohol use – up to two drinks per day for men and one drink per day for women and older people – causes few if any problems. (One drink equals one 12-ounce bottle of beer or wine cooler, one 5-ounce glass of wine, or 1.5 ounces of 80-proof distilled spirits.) Certain people should not drink at all, however:

- Women who are pregnant or trying to become pregnant.
- People who plan to drive or engage in other activities that require alertness and skill (such as using high-speed machinery).



For most adults, moderate alcohol use – up to two drinks per day for men and one drink per day for women and older people – causes few if any problems. One drink equals one 12-ounce bottle of beer or wine cooler, one 5-ounce glass of wine, or 1.5 ounces of 80-proof distilled spirits.

- People taking certain over-the-counter or prescription medications.
- People with medical conditions that can be made worse by drinking.
- Recovering alcoholics.
- People younger than age 21.

Is it safe to drink during pregnancy? No, drinking during pregnancy is dangerous.

Alcohol can have a number of harmful effects on the baby. The baby can be born mentally retarded or with learning and behavioral problems that last a lifetime. We don't know exactly how much alcohol is required to cause these problems. We do know, however, that these alcohol-related birth defects are 100 percent preventable, simply by not drinking alcohol during pregnancy. The safest course for women who are pregnant or trying to become pregnant is not to drink alcohol at all.

Does alcohol affect older people differently? Alcohol's effects do vary with age. Slower reaction times, problems with hearing and seeing, and a lower tolerance to alcohol's effects put older people at higher risk for falls, car crashes and other types of injuries that may result from drinking.

Older people also tend to take more medicines than younger people. Mixing alcohol with over-the-counter or prescription medications can be very dangerous or even fatal. More than 150 medications interact harmfully with alcohol. In addition, alcohol can make

many of the medical conditions common in older people – such as high blood pressure and ulcers – more serious. Physical changes associated with aging can make older people feel the effects of alcohol even after drinking only small amounts. So even if there is no medical reason to avoid alcohol, older men and women should limit themselves to one drink per day.

Does alcohol affect women differently? Yes. Women become more impaired than men do after drinking the same amount of alcohol, even when differences in body weight are taken into account. This is because women's bodies have less water than men's bodies. Because alcohol mixes with body water, a given amount of alcohol becomes more highly concentrated in a woman's body than in a man's. (It's like pouring the same amount of alcohol into a much smaller container of water.) That is why the recommended drinking limit for women is lower than it is for men. In addition, chronic alcohol abuse takes a heavier physical toll on women than on men. Alcohol dependence and related medical problems such as brain, heart and liver damage progress more rapidly in women than in men.

Sailors unite to prevent suicide

The Navy rolled out a new Suicide Prevention poster series Dec. 2 that encourages Sailors in distress to reach out for help and encourages shipmates to look out for each other.

"Sailors helped design the posters and determined what the messages would be," said Lt. Cmdr. Bonnie Chavez, Behavioral Health Program manager for the Navy. "They were passionate on how to best help each other and represent the sense of community in the Navy."

The series consists of four posters that became available in December through normal supply channels. The themes of the posters range from, "How many Sailors does it take to save a life? Just one." to "Got Big Problems" showing a group of Sailors working together, demonstrating that suicide prevention is an all hands evolution.

Recognizing the signs that a shipmate is in crisis is the first step and then taking the appropriate action is how anyone can save a life.

"If people remember to ACT- Ask, Care, Treat," said Chavez, "They will be on the right path. Don't be afraid to ask someone if they are thinking of taking their own life. Care enough to let the person know that suicidal feelings are temporary and that depression can be treated and then get help. Treat – take them to an emergency room or walk-in clinic, don't leave them alone, take action, remove items such as guns, stockpiled pills, ropes, and sharp objects," said Chavez.

Most people give some warning of their suicidal intentions to a friend or family member. Take all suicide threats seriously. To find out more information and to see a list of the warning signs go to www.suicide.navy.mil.



FISC operations officer reflects on postcards from past

Editor's Note: This is part two of a two part series.

While aware since childhood that his great-grandfather John Howard Rockenbaugh steamed with the battleship *USS Minnesota* (BB 22) as part of the U.S. Navy's Great White Fleet, U.S. Fleet Industrial Supply Center (FISC) Yokosuka Director of Operations Cmdr. Eric Bach said it wasn't until the approach of the 100th anniversary of the fleet's visit to Yokohama that he really began to recognize both the personal and historical significance of the event.

"So, here it was," Bach said, "The 100th anniversary of this great, global American fleet's visit to Yokohama, Japan in 1908. That, in itself, is a remarkable piece of history. But to share that same event as family legend as well – it makes you think."

"I mean," Bach continued, "look out my [office] window: that's a nuclear-powered aircraft carrier out there. Now imagine: 100 years ago, there were coal-fired U.S. Navy battleships with wooden decks steaming into the bay not too far from here."

Sitting at his desk, a family portrait of his Japanese wife and two children smiling nearby, Bach said, "I'd like to think my great-grandfather would have been floored if he knew the future."

Still, what remained elusive and vexing for Bach, were the exploits of his great-grandfather.

"What did he think? Did he like Yokohama? What did he do?" Bach asked rhetorically. And then, in answer, he said, "His postcards barely tell us anything. They reveal where he was, but not how he felt about it."

But there are clues: according to Bach, there is enough of a historical shadow to make out a little of his great-grandfather's figure. "For example, we have his enlistment and discharge papers; they tell a little bit of a story. He served in the Navy from 1907 to 1909, and his discharge papers make reference to a tattoo," Bach said with a bit of a smile. "Plus, it was said that some of the ships of the Great White Fleet carried mascots and legend has it that *Minnesota's* mascot was a bear." Again, the rest remains a mystery of history. "We can only piece so much of it together," Bach said.

Bach says his great-grandfather went on to work for the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad line and retired after 40 years, and as family lore says never looked back at his Navy experience. But he did set roots in Maryland and bequeath generations of family who remained devoted to American History.

Bach reflects on his history and insists it is more coincidental than not that he chose to serve the same Navy as his great-grandfather. But does the Naval Academy graduate know for sure? For generations his family was devoted to history, as his father participated in Civil War reenactments popular in the southern Maryland and Virginia areas where Bach grew up. Bach himself says he was determined by age seven that he wanted to attend the U.S. Naval Academy.

In the end, the question remains: is it possible that, while John Howard Rockenbaugh may not have left many indelible images of his Navy life for his future family members, did his legacy nevertheless influence at least one great-grandson to choose his own path for the future, a path that eventually intersected with Rockenbaugh's past?

"I don't know," Bach said, "but, I do realize now that even the smallest events in life, may have some significant meaning for future generations."

SRF-JRMC hosts JMSDF officer exchange program graduation ceremony

Ship Repair Facility and Japan Regional Maintenance Center (SRF-JRMC) Yokosuka hosted a graduation ceremony for two Japan Maritime Self-Defense Force (JMSDF) graduates of the JMSDF exchange training officer program recently at the Yokosuka Officers' Club. This exchange program has fostered friendship and camaraderie between the JMSDF and SRF-JRMC for more than 21 years.

The two graduates, Lt. Hidenori Mizuno and Lt. j.g. Hidekazu Nakatani, from Yokosuka Repair and Supply Facility, completed two and a half months of training at SRF-JRMC. They participated in a technical research project and enhanced their English language skills through various training and practice.

During the training period, the two graduates studied ship maintenance processes using U.S. Navy methods. Before reporting to SRF-JRMC, both Mizuno and Nakatani said they were afraid that they could not communicate effectively with officers and civilians at SRF-JRMC due to the differences in life styles between Japan and America, and no past interaction with the Americans.

Nakatani said "I think every working area at SRF-JRMC has a relaxed and lively atmosphere which allows the opportunity for personnel to easily exchange opinions about their business."

Mizuno said "I felt that employees of SRF-JRMC make an effort to conduct safely and correctly every single operation or project in accordance with maintenance work orders, because I had many opportunities to see and hear briefings and operations of individual shops and offices during the period of training."

SRF-JRMC Training Officer for the JMSDF officer exchange program Lt. Luc Delaney, commenting on the main purpose behind the training program said "two things; first is to share ideas on maintenance between ourselves and the JMSDF forces, and [second], it also promotes camaraderie between us and our Japanese hosts. The JMSDF officers spent a considerable amount of time speaking to everybody in our office and working with SRF-JRMC personnel from different shops and codes."

Mizuno also had opportunities to join parties, events and recreation at SRF-JRMC and saw supervisors and

other leaders actively exchange their opinions and thoughts about business and personal matters.

"Facilities, equipment, and a physical distribution system for ship repair at SRF-JRMC are at full capability and individual technical skills are at high levels," said Nakatani. "So we, JMSDF, want to understand and own similar systems and facilities by all means in the future."

Nakatani focused on the maintenance of the gyrocompass and combat systems in the U.S. Navy for his graduation topic. The gyrocompass is similar to a gyroscope to find true north at sea. Nakatani mentioned that modernized ships at the JMSDF are equipped with groups of small and large circuit card assemblies for navigation and combat systems, and that JMSDF has been looking for measures that handle mechanical difficulties and periodic maintenance. "The JMSDF conducts 'time based maintenance,' which means that the number of maintenance periods is more than the U.S. Navy, because JMSDF has fewer ships than the U.S. Navy," said Nakatani. "But the U.S. Navy maintenance systems are based on 'conditioned based and reliability centered ones,'

which provides them with increased operational availability because of short scheduled maintenance periods."

Mizuno's main focus was on the maintenance for the gas turbine system for his graduation topic. "JMSDF has faced financial issues and needs to find out more effective maintenance methods and reduce their maintenance costs," said Mizuno. "JMSDF conducts replacing of assemblies for the gas turbine system in accordance with previously setting schedules." He also said the U.S. Navy maintenance system for the gas turbine is based on replacing or repairing parts when they do not meet required inspections and they are broken down, and that ensuring condition monitoring of the gas turbine system around the clock while ships are at sea."

The two JMSDF officers stated that the 10 week training flew by fast and was fruitful and the topic was fully completed within the short period, and that military members, civilians and Japanese employees at SRF-JRMC gave us a lot of support and cooperation.

SRF-JRMC、海上自衛隊交換士官制度の卒業式を行なう

先ごろ米海軍艦船修理廠及び日本地区造船統括本部(SRF-JRMC)主催による海上自衛隊交換士官研修制度の卒業式が横須賀基地の将校クラブで行なわれた。この研修には海上自衛隊(JMSDF)より2名の士官が参加していた。

約2ヵ月半に渡る研修を通じて横須賀造船補給所の水野秀紀1等海尉と中谷秀和2

等海尉は、技術研究プロジェクトの実行を目的にSRF-JRMCに配属され、研修と実践を通して英語の力を磨いた。研修制度はこれまで2年以上にわたり、SRF-JRMCとJMSDFの友好関係を育んできた。

研修の間、水野1等海尉と中谷2等海尉は米海軍が管理する艦船修理の体系、手段や方法を研究し、そこで得た知識を卒業論文にまとめ、今回の卒業式で発表した。

水野1等海尉と中谷2等海尉の2人が

SRF-JRMCに配属される以前は、英語でSRF-JRMCの将校や軍属の人たちと上手くコミュニケーションが出来るかどうか心配であり、また、日米の生活習慣の違いに対する適応に不安もあったと話した。

「どの職場も雰囲気明るく活気があり、意見交換も積極的に行なわれていました」と語るのは中谷2等海尉。

水野1等海尉はこう話した。「研修期間中、多くのオフィスで説明を受け、現場での作業を見学する機会が多くありました。その中で、SRF-JRMCの従業員が、仕事を着実に安全に進めているように感じられました。」

そして研修生の世話役であるルーク・ドレイニー大尉は、この制度の主な目的は、第1にSRF-JRMCと自衛隊の間で艦船整備についてのアイデア・知識を共有出来ることだということ。「第2にそれらを分かち合うことにより、SRF-JRMCと日本の皆さんの友情や仲間意識をより強く高めあうことが出来ることです。自衛隊の士官たちは我々の職場の従業員と会話をし、有益な時間を過ごしていた事は勿論のこと、SRF-JRMCに所属する現場や異なる部署の従業員と一丸となって作業・任務の遂行を成し遂げました」とドレイニー大尉。

水野2等海尉は、パーティー、公式行事、娯楽行事の席で、監督者、他の指導者たちが、業務や個人的な事柄について積極的に意見や考えを交換する場を目にする機会を持てたと言う。

「艦船修理用の設備、物流が充実しており、個々の技術力が高いレベルにある。是非、海上自衛隊も将来的にこのような施設を所有したい」と話したのは中谷2等海尉。

中谷2等海尉は卒業論文の題材を米海軍のジャイロコンパスとコンバットシステムに焦点を当てた。ジャイロコンパスとは航海中に方位の真北を確認する為のジャイロスコープの機能に似たものだ。

中谷2等海尉は、近代化されたJMSDFの護衛艦はレーダーを始めとした戦闘システムの為の大小各種の電子回路を装備している、故障発生時や定期的な整備のための様々な対策が模索されていると言う。

「JMSDFでは艦船修理に部品や装置を一定期間で交換する『定期交換整備』を行っており、更に我々の艦船数は米海軍が保有する艦船数より少ないので交換整備の実行数が多い。しかし米海軍の整備システムは計器や装置の状況とその信頼性を整備の基にしています。よって整備期間も短く、艦船の即応性が増します」と中谷2等海尉は研修を振り返る。

ガスタービンシステムの整備が卒業論文の題材としたのは水野1等海尉。彼によると、JMSDFは財政上の問題を抱え、効果的な整備方法の模索や整備経費の削減が必要とされている。JMSDFではガスタービンシステムの部品を前もって決められたスケジュールで交換する。

「米海軍のガスタービン整備システムは、部品や構成要素が検査基準を満たさない場合や壊れた場合に交換もしくは修理を行い、更に航海中は24時間システムの状況をモニターすることを確実にこなしています」と水野1等海尉は語った。

水野1等海尉と中谷2等海尉は10週間の研修はとても早く大変充実した研修で、短期間で卒業論文を完成でき、SRF-JRMCの米国人、日本人従業員から多くの御支援、協力を得たと述べた。

Local Boy Scouts earn highest rank in scouting

Yokosuka Troop 35 Boy Scouts Matt Cuilik and Xavier Canlas, earned the rank of Eagle, the highest rank in scouting and were recognized for their accomplishments during a ceremony attended by Commander U.S. Naval Forces Japan Rear Adm. James Kelly Dec. 10.

The troop has advanced eight scouts to the rank of Eagle this year. Many scout troops advance only one scout every few years.

"[Eight] in a year says a lot about our troop and a lot about our community," said Kelly.

Scout Master Kim McCann thinks two more scouts will be ready to advance next quarter.

Most scouts spend almost a decade earning the Eagle rank. "It takes a lot of perseverance, a lot of dedication and a lot of working with others," said Kelly.

According to Cuilik, The hardest part about earning Eagle was the service project. "In order to advance to Eagle we had to perform a service project approved by the troop committee and the district advancement committee," Cuilik said.

For his project, Cuilik refurbished the area around the statue of Mary behind the Chapel of Hope. "I go to church there and I saw it out there," Cuilik said.

Cuilik painted the area, refurbished the benches, and otherwise updated the space.

Canlas also chose to fix up an area he spent a lot of time in, the Ikego campground. "I usually go out there camping," he said. He noticed that cars ignored the posts that marked the camp sites. At each of the twelve sites, Canlas set up a pair of posts wrapped in bamboo. Between them he strung a rope to keep out vehicles.

Both scouts were helped in their projects by junior scouts from their troop. "Some of the younger guys need service hours," Cuilik said. "So they help out."

The journey toward Eagle was a little more difficult for Cuilik because of all the moving his family did. Over the years, he has been a member of four different Boy Scout troops.




