

Becoming familiar with a new area or base represents one of the biggest challenges involved in moving. We hope that the information provided in this guide will assist in making your move easier.

We are extremely excited about a new housing program that is enabling us to provide quality new and renovated rental homes for our military families.



BASE NEW LONDON

In 2004, the Navy signed a public private housing contract with a private developer - GMH Military Housing. Under the contract, we privatized over 2,100 older government homes and turned them over to the developer to manage and maintain. In return, the developer is spending nearly \$300 million to construct 540 new homes and renovate another 275 homes for military families.

In addition, the developer is managing and maintaining 525 previously renovated homes, but many of the remaining houses - constructed in the 1960s - are being demolished. When complete, GMH will manage and maintain approximately 1,500 new and renovated homes for government families in eight military communities. Rent and utility costs will be covered by Basic Allowance for Housing.

Groundbreaking on the new homes began in February 2005, and we are now accepting applications for new and renovated single family homes, townhouses and duplexes. In addition to many home amenities, GMH will provide us two new community centers, two swimming pools, 12 playgrounds, and 28 bus shelters. By privatizing military housing, we are able to offer our military families outstanding, affordable homes now... not 10 to 20 years from now as can be the case through military construction programs.

We also take great pride in providing off-duty activities for all members of the SUBASE community. Sometimes this proves a challenge. Just within our military population, we realize the diversity: 65 percent are single, 35 percent are married, 30-40 percent live on base in barracks, 35-40 percent live in the local community; and 25-30 percent live in Family Housing. But we believe we provide a wide range of activities that offers something for everyone.

The Morale, Welfare and Recreation office provides many recreational and athletic activities, for young and not so young. Golf, bowling, outdoor sports, physical fitness ... the list goes on and on. Other agencies provide assistance for child-care, parenting, basic skills for living, budgeting and stress management, educational opportunities, employment assistance, spiritual guidance, legal assistance, new parent support, and a variety of other programs to meet your every need.

As the first submarine base, the significant history and honored traditions of our great Navy and submarine force are reflected in the names of our buildings and streets. Our heritage is also on public display at the Submarine Force Museum and Nautilus Exhibit, located adjacent to the base. I urge you to visit both.

But what makes SUBASE New London "the finest" is the exceptionally talented and dedicated people who carry out our mission - to support fleet readiness by providing quality services and facilities to the submarine community and their families.

For this reason alone, I think you'll find that SUBASE is a great place to live and work!

NAVY'S FIRST SUBMARINE BASE

Naval Submarine Base New London is the Navy's first submarine base and is "Home of the Submarine Force." Every officer and nearly every enlisted Sailor in the submarine force will be assigned here at least one time during a military career, carrying on a tradition that is nearly a century old.

The history of Connecticut, the Navy, and submarines has been intertwined since the middle of the 1800s. In 1868, in an effort to help the Navy transition from sail to steam, the State of Connecticut gave the Navy 112 acres of land along the Thames River to build a naval station. Due to a lack of federal funding, it was not until 1872 that two brick buildings and a "T" shaped pier were constructed and officially declared a Navy Yard. This new yard was primarily used as a coaling station by Atlantic Fleet small craft.

Meanwhile an inventor from Connecticut, John Philip Holland, began tinkering on a 54-foot submersible. In 1899, financier Isaac Rice founded Electric Boat Company and one year later completed Holland's "submersible," considered the world's first practical submarine, marking the beginning of the U.S. Submarine Force.

During World War I and shortly thereafter, Electric Boat received orders to build 85 submarines for the U.S. Navy, starting a ship-building dynasty that lives to this day.

About the same time - on October 13, 1915 - the monitor Ozark, a submarine tender, and four submarines arrived at the Navy Ship Yard in Groton, Conn. With the war effort in Europe and the Atlantic in full swing, additional submarines and support craft arrived the following year and the facility became the Navy's first submarine base.

Although physically located in Groton, the base had its main offices and housing in the larger city of New London, so it was christened as Naval Submarine Base New London.

The conversion came just in time. Soon America was caught up in World War I, and the base rapidly expanded to keep up with wartime demands for

submarines and crews. Submarines were outfitted, serviced and homeported, and more than 10,000 officers and men were trained here for the new "Silent Service."

Following World War I, the submarine force was reduced, but the Navy established new schools and training facilities at the base. Unfortunately, the peace that followed the "war to end all wars" was short-lived. With the start of World War II, the submarine force was strengthened; mothballed vessels were recommissioned; new boats were built; and facilities were added as part of a rapid wartime expansion. Many of the submarines and crews, outfitted and trained at Naval Submarine Base New London, fought and won the war in the Pacific halfway around the world.

Today, Naval Submarine Base New London, located on the east side of Thames River in Groton, Conn., still proudly proclaims its motto: "The First and Finest."

As home port to 18 nuclear attack submarines, a nuclear submarine research vessel, a submarine school, and neighbor to our nation's largest submarine construction yard, nearly all officers and enlisted Sailors will be assigned here some time during their military careers.

The main base occupies more than 687 acres with 160 major facilities, and 11 barracks with 1,652 living units. It supports more than 70 tenant commands including Commander Submarine Group 2, Naval Submarine School, Naval Submarine Support Facility, three submarine squadron staffs, and the housing and support facilities for more than 21,000 civilian workers, active-duty service members and their families. Included are nearly 1,800 to 2,200 students who are going through training here on any given date.



NEWCOMERS' INFORMATION

Pre-planning is essential for newcomers moving to Naval Submarine Base New London, whether for a permanent change of station, or student assignment. An excellent source of information for military moves is the Department of Defense "SITES" Web site. This Web site contains resources for everyone who is relocating from one duty station to another anywhere in the world. The Web site includes a section on planning PCS moves, as well as a section with information on 350 military installations worldwide. Military families are also encouraged to contact the Housing Welcome Center at (860) 694-3851 or toll free at (877) 843-5236 as soon as orders are received. Its staff will help you locate suitable and affordable housing in the local area.

Temporary quarters can be arranged by contacting either the Navy Lodge or the Combined Bachelor Housing Office, which also arranges permanent on-base quarters for single military personnel. Reservations can be made at the Navy Lodge by calling (800) NAVY-INN or (860) 446-1160. On-base visiting quarters can be reserved by

calling the Combined Bachelor Housing office at (860) 694-3416 or DSN 694-3416.

Newcomers are also encouraged to contact their local Personal Property office as soon as possible after receiving orders to arrange shipment of household goods. Once shipment dates are known, you should contact the Personal Property Office at Naval Submarine Base New London by calling (860) 694-3670 to arrange storage or delivery of household goods.

All new personnel should hear from a gaining-command sponsor shortly after receiving orders. If not, contact your gaining unit and ask for your sponsor's name and phone number. Your gaining command should also provide you a mailing address where letters can be forwarded until a permanent address can be established. If not already received, you can also call the Fleet and Family Support Center at (860) 694-3383 to request a Welcome Aboard packet.

ARRIVAL

Naval Submarine Base New London is located on the east side of the Thames River in Groton, Conn. The main gate is located

approximately two miles from Exit 86 off Interstate 95.

By Car - Travel either north or south on Interstate 95 to Exit 86. Turn north at the end of the ramp onto Route 12 and travel approximately two miles to the fifth stop light. Turn left at Crystal Lake Road, and follow it approximately 1/2 mile to the end of the road. The main gate is on your right. Traffic signs, beginning on I-95, provide clear directions to the submarine base.

By Plane - The base is within an hour's drive from two major airports: Bradley International Airport in Hartford, Conn., and T.F. Green Airport in Providence, R.I. A much smaller air field - Groton/New London Airport - is located approximately seven miles from the base.

If driving from T.F. Green Airport in Providence, follow airport signs to Interstate 95. Follow I-95 south to Exit 86 in Conn. If driving from Bradley International Airport in Hartford, take Interstate 91 to Route 9 south, to I-95 north. Take I-95 north across the Gold Star Bridge to exit 86 (a left lane exit). Follow road signs approximately two miles from Exit 86 to arrive at the Naval Submarine Base.

By Rail - An Amtrak train station is located in downtown New London which is regularly served by local cab companies.

By Bus - Greyhound Bus Lines is located next to the Amtrak train station in New London.

All vehicles entering SUBASE must have a temporary base pass or a valid DoD decal. Temporary base passes are issued at Building 500, just outside the main gate, during duty hours and by the gate guard after duty hours. The Pass and ID office is open 6 a.m. to 6 p.m., five days a week. It is closed on holidays.





Parking is very limited on SUBASE. Therefore, it is very important for you to register your vehicle and obtain a Submarine Base New London DoD decal within 30 days after your arrival. You can register your vehicle with the Security Department at either Building 462 or 500.

To register your vehicle on base, you must provide the following documentation:

1. Proof of Ownership - Your vehicle must be registered in your name or your spouse's name, or you must have notarized written permission from the owner to operate/register the vehicle (bills of sale cannot be accepted).
2. Insurance - You must ensure that your liability coverage fulfills Connecticut's financial responsibility laws. Check with your insurance company to be sure. You'll also need your current proof of insurance card which should be maintained in your vehicle at all times in Connecticut.

3. ID Card - You must have a valid military identification or civilian ID card.

4. Inspection - If your vehicle is 10 years old or older, it must pass a safety inspection that meets Connecticut's requirements.

You must properly complete the vehicle forms available at the Pass Office. Call 694-3224 for information or assistance.

Motorcycles - There are a number of special requirements that must be accomplished before riding a motorcycle on SUBASE, including completion of the DoD Motorcycle Safety Course. Check with the SUBASE Safety Division at 694-3739 before bringing a motorcycle on the base.

Vehicle Regulations - The speed limit on most base roads is 15 mph unless otherwise posted. Speed limits in parking lots are 5 mph. As a base driver, you are required to stop for pedestrians. As a base pedestrian, you are required to use crosswalks.

Both Navy regulation and Connecticut law require that everyone wear a seat belt while in a moving vehicle. Children under age 6 or less than 60 pounds need to be in approved child restraints.

Parking - Because there is a critical shortage of parking on base, parking regulations are strictly enforced. All newcomers should read the parking rules and regulation instruction - SUBASENLON INST 5560.N - for the most up-to-date requirements.

If it becomes necessary to tow your vehicle, it will be done at your expense and risk. Damages or charges incurred in the towing will rest solely with the owner.

Traffic Court is held on Wednesday from 9 a.m. to noon in Building 462. If you receive a ticket, you must attend. If you do not attend, you receive an automatic 60-day suspension of driving privileges on SUBASE in addition to whatever penalties you may receive.



Drugs - It should go without saying that the introduction, possession, use, sale or other transfer of marijuana, narcotic substances or other controlled substances aboard SUBASE is strictly prohibited.

Firearms/Dangerous Weapons - Any kind of firearms, explosive devices, compressed air or gas-powered guns, metallic or chain knuckles, blackjacks, billy and folding

knives with blades over 3 1/2 inches in length, all quick-opening knives of switch or spring type regardless of blade length, or any handmade devices which might be used for assault are considered to be dangerous weapons.

You may not conceal or carry upon your person any dangerous weapon, instrument or device or any highly explosive article or

compound on board any Navy station, ship, craft or aircraft or any other place under the jurisdiction of the Navy.

You must register firearms and certain other weapons with the Security Department Armory in Building 462 if you store these weapons in off-base housing. Storage of firearms and weapons is prohibited in on-base quarters and barracks. For additional information on firearms and weapons, contact the Security Department at 694-3777.

Fireworks - Each year, thousands of people throughout the United States are injured by the improper use of fireworks. The Submarine Base Fire Department advises that all types of fireworks are illegal on SUBASE. This includes sparklers, M-80s, cherry bombs, pop rockets and party snap-pers and others that may be legal in the state you're coming from. For everyone interested in fireworks, the base sponsors one of the most extravagant displays in southeastern Connecticut during SubFest.

Emergencies - You'll soon find out that SUBASE has one of the best Security Departments in the state. This department is often thought of as two separate departments, the SUBASE Fire Department and SUBASE Security (police) Department.

These two departments have a very close working relationship with local police and fire departments. By mutual agreement, the SUBASE Fire Department provides assistance to nearby towns. Besides responding to on-base emergencies, it also answers emergency calls in Navy Family Housing, including the Navy Lodge.

The SUBASE Security Department is ready to assist you with any trouble you may have on base. As part of a mutual aid agreement, the Town of Groton Police Department is responsible for law enforcement in off-base Navy Family Housing, while the SUBASE Police Department is available to help you and provide assistance to the Groton Police Department.

If you have any questions or need assistance of any kind, feel free to ask any SUBASE Police Department patrolman. For off-base

police, fire or medical emergencies call 911. For on-base police emergency call 694-3222 and for on-base fire or medical emergency call 694-3333/3334.

CHECKING IN

Each command has its own procedures for checking in. Your sponsor should let you know where to go to officially check into your command.

Submarine School students and staff report in at the quarterdeck in building 499. SUBASE personnel check into the Personnel Support Detachment in Building 83. Normal customer service hours are 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you arrive at the base after these hours, contact the Command Duty Officer at (860) 694-3777 to have your orders endorsed and then report to the Personnel Support Detachment at 8:30 a.m. the next working day.

Sailors reporting to duty units should report to the appropriate squadron duty office, as do personnel assigned to the squadron staffs. Submarine Group 2 personnel report to building 439 (Grenfell Hall). Medical personnel check in at the medical clinic.

Personnel Support Activity Detachment (PSD) Building 83 (2nd Floor) Phone: 694-3135

One of the first stops for all newcomers is the Personnel Support Activity Detachment, located on the second floor of Building 83, in Dealy Plaza across from the movie theater. Here, you officially report for duty, update and verify information in your military records, and apply for travel pay.

Newcomers should report to PSD during normal working hours on your first duty day. If you arrive during non-working hours, you should check-in with your ultimate duty station and return to PSD the next working day. Single personnel who require accommodations after working hours should check in with at the base Billeting Office in Building 379. The PSD is open for customer service from 8:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Newcomers should bring reporting orders, endorsements, official records, and travel receipts, along with any new information such as local address and phone number, if known. The PSD will then assist you with updating your personnel records, filing your travel claim, verifying your DEERs service records, and arranging any special payments.

The Personnel Support Activity Detachment (PSD) New London, in conjunction with the Customer Service Desk, Scotia, N.Y., is dedicated to providing quality service to over

11,500 active duty personnel and their families throughout Connecticut, New Jersey, New York, and Vermont. It additionally provides various services to thousands of reserve, retired personnel, and survivor annuitants in the northeast region.

Services provided by PSD include pay, travel, service records, re-enlistments and retirements, ID cards and DEERS enrollment. The ID lab is open from 8 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Friday; and from 8 a.m. to 5:45 p.m. on Thursday. It is also open from 9 a.m. to noon on the first Saturday of every month.

After Arrival

- ✓ Contact Personal Property Office to arrange delivery/storage of household goods.
- ✓ Visit Fleet and Family Support Center for "Welcome Aboard" packet and information.
- ✓ Register vehicle(s) within 30 days of arrival on base.
- ✓ Obtain Connecticut vehicle inspection if car is 10 years old or older.

HOUSING

TEMPORARY LODGING

Whether visiting Naval Submarine Base New London for a short stay, or arranging a permanent change of station move, most newcomers need a temporary place to stay. Since the base is located in the heart of New England's most popular tourist area, local hotels and motels are often booked early and are very expensive. A cost-effective alternative is staying temporarily either off-base at the Navy Exchange-operated Navy Lodge, on-base in Visiting Quarters, or at the on-base Groton Chalet Hotel.

The attractive, modern Navy Lodge - constructed in 2004 - provides temporary quarters for military personnel and their dependents, reservists, Department of Defense employees, and retired military personnel.

With 72 units, each apartment includes air conditioning, kitchenette, private bath, and family accommodations. Rooms come equipped with two double beds or one queen-sized bed and will accommodate a family up to four plus one child of crib age. Amenities include a clock/radio, DSL computer connection, hair dryer, dresser/desk, vanity, telephone, cable television, and dining table. The kitchenettes include microwave, stove, refrigerator, sink, cookware, silverware and dinnerware. Room rates, as of 2006, were \$70 per night for a regular room and \$85 for a suite.

Reservations are accepted for all eligible personnel on an as-received basis. Once a reservation is made, it is firm and you cannot be bumped. Military personnel being assigned to the New London Submarine Base on Permanent Change of Station (PCS) orders - or on Temporary Duty - can make reservations at any time. Other eligible personnel can make reservations either 60

days or 30 days in advance of arrival, depending on status. Early reservations are recommended.

Location - The Navy Lodge is located approximately one mile off base, and approximately 1/2 mile from Exit 86 on I-95. From I-95 north or south take exit 86 to CT-12 north. Go left on Pleasant Valley Road. Take a left on Highland Avenue, then a right onto Proteus Avenue. Navy Lodge is on the right.

On-base Visitors' Quarters are reserved through the Combined Bachelor Quarter's Office. They consist of 105 suite-style rooms, all housed in the same building and the Groton Chalet Hotel. Since officers attending the Submarine Naval School are also billeted in Visitor's Quarters, newcomers are encouraged to make reservations through the Combined Bachelor Quarters' office as soon as orders are received.

All visitors' quarters include cable TV, 2 in-room DVD players, free movies and local phone calls, afternoon popcorn and coffee and pastries in the lobby each morning. No smoking in any rooms. Call anytime, (860) 694-3416. Space A travel arrangements can be made five days in advance for up to a three-day stay. As of 2006, room rates for suites are \$24 per night. VIP suites are \$35 per night. Basic housekeeping service (clean, dust, replace towels and linens) is available seven days a week.

Groton Chalet Hotel is a privately-owned hotel located on-base, just behind the Building 379 Visitors' Quarters. Room rates as of October 2006 was \$73 per night.

A certificate of non-availability will only be issued when Visitor's Quarters and the Groton Chalet are 100 percent full.

On-base bachelor housing is available to permanent party personnel, E-6 and below. Eligible Sailors are encouraged to call and reserve on-base housing anytime after orders are received. There are 750 rooms available in buildings throughout the installation. Each unit consists of two bedrooms with a shared entry-way, bathroom and kitchenette. A combination TV/DVD player is available in each room along with a bed, desk and chair, and closet/storage space. A microwave and refrigerator is in every kitchen area. All housing units and buildings are smoke free! Designated smoking areas are available along the outside perimeter of each building.

Permanent Party Officers - There are no single permanent party officer quarters available on base. Single officers are encouraged to contact the Base Housing Office at (860) 694-3851 or toll-free at (877) 843-5236 to find an affordable quality rental property or home in the local community.

Geographical Bachelors - All geographical bachelors must apply for a room. Selection will be determined by a geographical bachelor review board, which generally takes 7-10 days.

Student Quarters - The Naval Submarine School blocks rooms for students attending officer and enlisted courses at Naval Submarine Base New London. The base provides the school 725 rooms in three buildings for students E-6 and below. Each two-person room includes microwave and refrigerator. Student officers are billeted in Visitor Quarters.

One of the biggest decisions for newcomers moving to a new base is finding a nice affordable home, in a great community, with wonderful amenities, and good schools for the children.

Many people who come to Connecticut dream of finding a historic house and settling in behind quaint stone walls. The dream of a Revolutionary War-era farmhouse on a 15-acre lot by the water does exist - for over \$2,000,000. Historic and quaint doesn't come cheap, so what's a newcomer to the area to do?

One of your first calls, after you receive PCS orders, should be to the SUBASE's Family Housing Welcome Center! Its sole mission is to help you find an affordable "home of your dreams," whether it is renting one of our gorgeous new or renovated military houses, or renting or buying a home in the private sector.

Public Private Venture Housing - In order to provide military families outstanding quality

homes within the cost of their Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH), the Navy signed a contract with a private developer - GMH Military Housing - in November of 2004. Under the contract, the government turned over 2,100 existing homes to GMH, with the understanding they would raze many older homes, construct more than 540 new homes, and renovate another 275 homes. GMH is now responsible for managing all of the homes, providing amenities - including two community centers with pools, and playgrounds - and providing maintenance 24 hours a day.

Ground was broken on this \$300 million, six-year project in February 2005, and many of the new and renovated homes are already complete. New military family communities



include single family homes, duplexes and townhouses with numerous amenities including carport/garages, dishwasher and garbage disposals, private patio or deck areas, and lawn care provided by GMH.

Floor plans and photographs and a variety of other information on the various housing areas can be viewed at <https://www.housing.navy.mil>. Most of these military housing areas are located in the local community within two miles of the base.

Families interested in living in a military housing community are encouraged to apply early since there may be a waiting list, depending on the number of bedrooms required. Your Basic Allowance for Housing (BAH) will cover all costs for rent, utilities, basic cable and a Personal Property Insurance policy for personal belongings up to \$20,000. There is no rental deposit fee, but you will be charged deposit and user fees for your telephone and premium cable services. Up to two pets are permitted in Public Private Venture (PPV) housing.

Military families can apply for family housing as soon as PCS orders to Navy Subbase New London are received by submitting an advanced package. If vacancies exist, a limited number of military houses are also available - on a ranked eligibility basis - to active duty bachelors, DoD civilian employees, reservists, and retirees.

Application packages for military families should include the following:

- DD 1746 (“Application for Housing”)
- PCS Orders
- Page 2 (updated record of emergency data),
- Contact phone numbers
- Other pertinent information such as Power of Attorney or Exceptional Family Member Status, if applicable.

The application package can be submitted by fax, e-mail or mail. The mailing address is: Naval Submarine Base New London, Housing Office, Box 23, Groton, CT 06349-5023.

But what can you do if a government house is not available when you arrive at the SUBASE? The Family Housing Welcome Center can help you find temporary housing, and you will still be eligible for “Courtesy Move Entitlements” - a second move at no cost to you. In essence, the Navy will provide you a courtesy move into PPV housing under the following circumstances:

- You must apply for housing and check in with the Navy Housing Office within 30 days of reporting aboard. If housing is not available at that time and you have to find housing in the local community, you will be eligible for a courtesy move into housing when it becomes available after the date you state you are available for housing (based on lease, etc.)
- If you are not eligible for housing when transferring to SUBASE, but become eligible due to a change in status, you must apply for housing within 30 days of eligibility. If housing is not available at the time of application and you have to find housing in the local community, you will be eligible for a courtesy move into housing when it becomes available after the date you state you are available for housing (based on lease, etc.)

Based on current policy, you will forfeit your entitlement to a courtesy move under the following circumstances:

- You fail to apply and/or check in with the Navy Housing Office within 30 days of reporting to your command.

- You fail to apply for housing within 30 days of becoming eligible for housing.
- You are contacted for referral to GMH Military Housing for a PPV home and turn down the home.
- You are contacted for referral to GMH Military Housing and indicate you are going to sign another lease with your landlord but are still interested in remaining on the waiting list for consideration in the future.

When applying for housing bring a copy of your orders, a current Page 2 (Emergency Data Sheet), and your L20 (detaching paperwork) to the Navy Housing Welcome Center. At that time, you will fill out a DD1746 “Application for Housing” if you did not send an advance application via fax or e-mail. A referral counselor will meet with you and, depending on where you fall on the wait list, will either refer you over to GMH Military Housing or out into the community.

It’s very important to note that once you are referred to GMH Military Housing, you have only 24 hours to accept or decline the offer. If you decline this first offer, you forfeit your courtesy move and any future move into PPV housing will be at your own expense. If you decline your first offer, your name is removed from the waiting list. You may go back on the waiting list the next day with that date as your new control date. You are entitled to a second offer. Again, you will have only 24 hours to accept or decline. However, if you decline this second offer, your housing application is cancelled

and your name is removed from the PPV Referral Wait List. You must wait 30 days from the date of this second decline before re-applying for PPV housing. Your control date will be established as of the date of your re-application.

As always, your Navy Housing Office is here to assist you and provide the best possible customer service based on your individual housing needs. Feel free to call the Housing Office if you have any questions. The phone number is (860) 694-3851, or call toll free at (877) 843-5236. The receptionist will direct you to an available counselor.

Housing Referral Services is available in the Housing Welcome Center to help bachelors, military families, and DoD employees find civilian rentals and homes in the local community. Services include:

- Rental Partnership Program (RPP) - an innovative program designed to help service members find affordable, secure, quality off base rental property at their new duty stations.
- Community listings for both rental and sale properties - listing available upon request to fit your criteria.
- Home Buying Counseling - a one-on-one counseling that will assist in providing detailed information/explanations on purchasing a home.

For comparison purposes, the following chart shows average rental and ownership cost in the local area, effective in October 2006:

Our office is here to assist you in finding a home - whether it is renting a privatized home with GMH, or renting or buying a home in the private sector. No matter what you decide, our Housing Welcome Center should always be your first stop!

When moving, military families want to ensure their household goods are transported in a safe, timely manner to their new duty location. This is the responsibility of the Personal Property Office at both your current duty station and the Personal Property Office here.

As soon as you receive PCS orders, you are encouraged to contact the Personal Property Office at your current duty location to arrange for shipment of household goods to your next duty station. Once you have arranged for either temporary or permanent housing near Naval Submarine Base New

London, you then need to contact the Personal Property Office here to arrange for delivery or storage of your household goods when you arrive.

Subase New London's Personal Property Office is committed to provide quality customer service and arrange every facet of your move so that it takes place as smoothly as possible. Whatever your moving needs, we are here to help you. We handle all moves for Navy, Coast Guard, Marine Corps, Army, Air Force and DoD Civilians in Southeastern Connecticut. We provide services in the following areas:

- Setting up a government move
- Setting up a Do-It-Yourself Move (DITY)
- Short or long term storage
- Arranging delivery of your inbound shipment
- Filing a claim
- Providing briefs for deploying units
- Group counseling
- General assistance in planning your move

When you receive Permanent Change of Station, retirement or separation orders, you can schedule your household goods move over the Internet on the "SMART Web" site at: www.smartwebmove.navy.mil.

This allows you to point-click-move 24 hours a day, seven days a week. This system provides you an application module, online counseling, and online entitlement information. When using the Internet, you will need to have available your official orders, dependent documents, and a power of attorney, if required.

For people who like face-to-face contact, the Personal Property Office still provides friendly, trained staff to help you with your move. Just call the inbound or outbound staff or visit the Personal Property Office, located in Building 84 in Dealey Plaza to help arrange your move. The Personal Property Office's hours are from 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you should have a special need, contact the Personal Property Transportation Officer to make other arrangements.

The things that you will need to bring to execute your move are:

- 3 copies of your PCS orders for each type of shipment you are doing (if you are arranging a government move and a partial DITY then it is considered two moves - therefore we need 6 copies);
- Proof of dependents - such as personnel records or current Leave and Earning Statement (LES); and
- Power of Attorney or Notarized Letter of Authorization (if someone other than the service member is arranging the move)

Our carriers/agents (moving companies) require at least five advance working days notice to accept a shipment. Please take this timeframe into consideration when planning your move.

HEALTH CARE

Naval Branch Health Clinic Groton Building 449 Appointments: (888) 628-9633

The primary mission of the Naval Branch Health Clinic (NBHC), located on Naval Submarine Base New London, is to provide the highest quality of medical care to all eligible beneficiaries. The Clinic is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. to 6 p.m. and Saturday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. It is not open on Sundays. The clinic is also open from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on all holidays except Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Year's Day.

The clinic provides a number of services including primary care, sick call, dental, and pharmacy, as well as various specialty clinics to include dermatology, general surgery, immunization, internal medicine, laboratory, ophthalmology, optometry, oral and maxillofacial surgery, physical therapy, podiatry, radiation health, and radiology.

The Naval Branch Health Clinic does not provide life-threatening emergency care or inpatient care. If you have a true emergency (i.e., threat to life, limb or sight) call 911 or go to the nearest emergency room. If on base, call 694-3333 for emergency medical support. Emergency care does not require advance authorization. However, if you are a Tricare Prime patient, you or a family member must call Tricare at (888) 628-9633 within 24 hours to notify your Primary Care Manager about your Emergency Room admittance.

After-hours urgent care requires prior authorization from a Primary Care Manager. Urgent care services are medically necessary services which are required for illness or injury that would not result in further disability or death if not treated immediately, but require professional attention and have the potential to develop into such a threat if treatment is delayed longer than 24 hours. Urgent care conditions include, but are not limited to, sprains, sore throat, or rising temperature.

In an urgent care situation, call the Naval Health Clinic New England Appointment

Call Center, which is open around-the-clock, at (888) 628-9633. The call center staff will contact the Primary Care Manager On Call who will contact you directly. The Primary Care Manager may provide you advice on how to handle your urgent care need; suggest an acute appointment the next clinic day, or authorize urgent care at a civilian urgent care center. There are three network and three non-network urgent care centers in Groton.

Appointment Call Center - All appointments are now scheduled through the Naval Health Clinic New England Appointment Call Center by calling (800) 628-9633 any time of day or night. You may also use the Appointment Call Center to cancel or reschedule appointments, or leave a message for your provider.

This process offers you a quick and easy way to schedule appointments. It provides you more appointment times to choose from, personalized service from specially trained appointment agents, efficient and streamlined service, and direct contact with clinic personnel when needed.


Check-In Time - You need to arrive at least 20 minutes prior to your stated appointment time. If you are more than 10 minutes late, you will see the provider at an earliest convenience, or you may be asked to reschedule. Parking may be limited, so plan accordingly. (Children without appoint-

ments should not accompany family members to appointments due to possible exposure to disease/illness. If you bring a child to an appointment, you may be asked to reschedule the appointment.)

Dress Code - Active duty personnel must be in the prescribed uniform of the day to be seen at our facility unless on leave or in a liberty status.

Eligibility - Listed below are the categories of persons eligible for medical care at the Naval Branch Health Clinic, Groton. When only limited services are available, active duty personnel are given priority, while other beneficiaries are seen on a space available basis.

- Active duty members of the armed forces.
- TRICARE Prime enrollees, active duty family members, retirees and their family members not currently enrolled with USFHP.
- Members of the Commissioned Corps of the Public Health Service.
- Members of the Commissioned Corps of the National Oceanographic and Atmospheric Administration.
- Unremarried widows and widowers of deceased members of the armed forces on a space available basis, who are not enrolled in the USFHP.
- Parent/Parent-in-Law who possess a valid ID card.
- Reservists on active duty or injured while on active duty for training status.



A military ID card must be presented prior to treatment, unless a life-threatening emergency exists. Active duty personnel, retired military personnel and family members 10 years of age or older are required to present a valid identification card.


Sick call is available for active duty members at SUBASE. Submarine School students should call (860) 694-3743 for an appointment and then report to Undersea Medicine between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. Monday to Friday. All other active duty members must call (888) 628-9633 for an appointment at the Naval Branch Health Clinic.

Pharmacy - New prescriptions should be brought to the clinic's pharmacy. In order to fill the prescription, the medication must be on the clinic's formulary (list of medications carried), the patient must be eligible for care at our clinic, and he/she must have a military ID card. Copies of the clinic's formulary are available at the pharmacy for patients and physicians' offices. Physicians can prescribe up to a 90 day supply of medication with three refills at a time. For refills on medications received from other military facilities, bring the prescription bottles and the refill will be ready for pickup the next business day. Prescriptions can also be obtained through the Tricare Mail Order Pharmacy.

To obtain refills, patients should use the Pharmacy's Call-in-Refill System by calling (877) 211-1126. This number is also printed at the top of all prescription labels. Refilled prescriptions are ready to be picked up after three business days. When refilling prescriptions, patients should bring their medication bottles and Military ID cards to the clinic.

Over-The-Counter Medication Program - Select over-the-counter medications are currently available to patients eligible for care at the clinic. Patients are able to receive up to three medications per family per month. There are some limitations as to what can be dispensed due to patient age, pregnancy or sea status.

Dental Program - Recently relocated into their new facility, Building 575, next to



the Naval Branch Health Clinic, dental services are now available Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. The Dental Clinic is closed for lunch from noon to 1 p.m. Sick call hours are from 7 a.m. to 10 a.m. and noon to 3 p.m. weekdays. Call (860) 694-3736 for an appointment.

Tricare is the Department of Defense's health benefits program designed to allow Active Duty family members and retirees and their family members under the age of 65 to choose a medical plan that fits their family's needs. In 2004, Tricare North Region was established for eligible military healthcare beneficiaries in 13 states including Connecticut. To find out more about Tricare, call (877) 874-2273 or visit your local Tricare Service Center, which is located at: 220 Route 12, Suite 6, Groton, CT 02340. Hours of operation are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

The Primary Care Clinic's primary function is to provide care to Tricare Prime and designated SPP (special provisions patient) beneficiaries. Other categories of patients are seen on a space available basis. Tricare Prime patients are enrolled to a specific

primary care manager. In the event that an appointment is not available with the assigned primary care manager, another provider on the team may provide the needed services. Appointments are required for all services except for Prime patient walk-in protocols.

Tricare Prime patients can have the following procedures performed at the SUBASE Clinic as a walk-in patient without having an appointment: blood pressure check, sore throat/throat culture (non-active duty only); suture removal; and urinary tract infection for female patients only.

The current medical facility was opened at SUBASE on April 1, 1974, when it was a Naval Submarine Medical Center. The facility became Naval Hospital Groton in 1983 and then, in 1998, joined with Naval Hospital Newport, and Naval Medical Clinic Portsmouth to be called "Naval Health Care New England." In 1998, inpatient care was discontinued and the clinic became the Navy's first free-standing Ambulatory Surgical Center. On Oct. 1, 2006, under guidance from the Bureau of Medicine and Surgery, the clinic name officially changed to Naval Branch Health Clinic Groton.

Religious opportunities, including worship services, religious education and other special programs, are available for people of all faiths at the two base chapels. Chaplains are located throughout the base and are ready to support the needs of all our people regardless of faith.

handicapping condition. The base's civilian EEO program is administered by HRO and is headed by a deputy for Equal Employment Opportunity. Available services include counseling on EEO complaints, program guidance, and EEO training. Naval Submarine Base New London is a leader in special emphasis programs and hosts several seminars and events each year to coincide with special female and minority group observances. The EEO office is located in Room 109 on the first floor of Building 83 in Dealey Plaza.

Civilian Benefits - The federal government offers civilian employees a comprehensive package of life, health, and retirement benefits. While this package varies depending on an individual's employment status, most civilian employees are eligible to obtain life and health insurance on a cost or shared cost basis. Most employees will also accrue annual leave (vacation days) at an initial rate of a half-day (four hours) per pay period. This increases to six hours per pay period after three years of service and to eight hours per pay period after 15 years of service. Employees also accrue sick leave at the rate of four hours per pay period. Information on benefits available to civil service employees can be obtained at the Navy's Benefits Web site: <http://www.civilian-benefits.hroc.navy.mil>.

Incentive Awards - The objective of the Civilian Incentive Awards Program is to recognize and reward employees for high quality performance of duties, including the submission of cost saving ideas through the Beneficial Suggestion Program. Incentive awards can take many forms, including non-monetary honorary awards and letters of recognition. Monetary awards include one-time cash awards for high quality performance, and permanent increases in basic pay. The Beneficial Suggestion Program is open to all civilians who wish to make suggestions concerning ways to improve work processes or procedures. Beneficial suggestions which are adopted can lead to substantial cash awards depending on the value of the suggestion.

CIVILIAN EMPLOYMENT

Naval Submarine Base New London employs several hundred civilians in a wide variety of occupations. Civilians work side-by-side with our military, staffing our restaurants, fixing our lights, maintaining our utilities, operating cranes, policing our streets, providing nursing care, and conducting research in support of the submarine community. In fact, just about every type of job found in a small city can be found within the borders of the base.

Human Resources Office (HRO) Groton - The Human Resources Office provides a wide variety of personnel services to civil service employees of the SUBASE and is often the first stop for civilians seeking information and assistance on such things as employment opportunities, training programs, and life and health insurance. HRO is located in Room 112 on the first floor of Building 83 in Dealey Plaza. New DoD employees should report in to the Human Resources Office at 8 a.m. on their first duty day.

All applications must be filed online through the Navy CHART (Civilian Hiring And Recruit Tool) system on that Web site.

Workers' Compensation - The Federal Employees' Compensation Act (FECA) is administered by the Office of Workers' Compensation Programs (OWCP) of the U.S. Department of Labor. It provides compensation benefits to civilian employees of the United States for disability due to personal injury sustained while in the performance of duty or to employment-related disease. Benefits cannot be paid if the injury or death is caused by the willful misconduct of the employee or by the employee's intention to bring about his or her injury or death or that of another, or if intoxication (by alcohol or drugs) is the proximate cause of the injury or death. If you are injured at work, immediately notify your supervisor.

Civilian Employee Assistance Program (CEAP) - An employee assistance program is available for civilians who desire help with personal problems, including drug and alcohol abuse. This program is completely confidential and free of charge. Civilian employees may obtain the name and telephone number of the currently-contracted CEAP program by calling HRO at (860) 694-3974. NAFI Personnel Office - The personnel office for Navy Personnel Command (NPC) Non-Appropriated Fund Instrumentalities, more commonly known as NAFI Personnel Office, provides personnel services to managers, supervisors, and employees of the Morale, Welfare, and Recreation Department and

Wherever one travels on base, signs of new construction and modernization are evident. More than \$62 million in new construction programs are now underway or scheduled to begin soon. Projects include construction of a new submarine escape trainer, security improvements to Gates 3 and 5, upgrades to the SUBASE piers to accommodate Virginia class submarines, and a weapons storage facility.

In addition, demolition is scheduled for approximately 39 aging structures ranging from storage sheds and water towers to outdated transient and bachelor quarters. Cost of the demolition programs is scheduled to be recouped in a little more than four years through upkeep maintenance, and utility savings.



Military lifestyle offers unique challenges and opportunities for children whose parents are assigned to Naval Submarine Base New London. Eligibility - Four special off-base programs are available to children of military personnel, DoD civilians, reservists on active duty or inactive duty for training, and DoD contractors. Child Development Homes provide a warm, family setting in which children can participate in developmentally appropriate learning activities, as well as home life experiences. The children are able to build a trusting relationship with a provider who will foster their curiosity and creativity, provide guidance and give them the hugs they need.

Child Development Home Providers must be Navy certified, and state licensed. The certification process is provided through the Child and Youth Programs and consists of basic first aid, CPR, child abuse prevention, child development, activity planning, nutrition, business practices and parent/customer relations. In addition to the provider's certification, they receive monthly unannounced home inspections by the Child and Youth Program director and must successfully complete all required background screenings. Providers are also required to complete monthly trainings to ensure they provide the best possible care to your children.

The School Age Care program provides quality care for children, 5 to 12 years old (enrolled in kindergarten through sixth grade) in a safe and supportive environment. This program offers before and after school care, half-day a.m. kindergarten care; school vacation care; professional development and day care; and hourly drop-in care. Children can also participate in "Camp Ojketan" summer camp. The School Age Care program is a member of the Boys and Girls Club of America, and is accredited by the National After School Association since 2003.

Fees - Fees are determined by your total family income and are based on a sliding scale. Fees are set by Congress, are subject to change each fiscal year and are paid semi-monthly.

Waiting List - A Central Enrollment and Waiting List (CEWL) is kept for patrons seeking care at the School Age Care program. In order to place your child on the waiting list, a Request for Care Form will need to be completed. Forms can be obtained from the resource and referral clerk, located at the Child Development Center at 386 Highland Ave. in Groton, or any SUBASE New London Child and Youth Program. Call (860) 694-5965 for more information. In order to remain active on the waiting list, information should be updated quarterly.

Registration - Once you are offered a spot for your child, you will have 24 hours to accept or decline it. If you accept the position, it will be necessary for you to register your child in the program. This involves bringing your most recent LES and spouse's pay stub along with a military ID card. If you are a single military parent or dual military family, a Dependent Care Plan must also be submitted prior to your child's attending. These forms can be acquired from PSD. You will be required to make a non-refundable deposit, equal to one week's fee, at the time of registration. This deposit can be used towards your child's last week of attendance in the program provided you give proper withdrawal notice. For Camp Ojketan enrollment, an additional registration fee is required.





Transportation - Transportation is provided by van, school bus or foot to Charles Barnum, Mary Morrisson and Pleasant Valley schools. In addition, buses from Fitch Middle School, Sacred Heart and the Regional Multicultural Magnet School pick up and drop off children at the program.

Meals - The SAC Program provides an after school snack for your child. Kindergarten children should bring in a healthy bag lunch from home to eat at the program. Parents are welcome to bring in breakfast for their child in the morning.

The Youth Center conducts numerous programs designed to inspire and enable all young people to realize their full potential as productive, caring and responsible citizens. Programs include open recreation for youths 10-18; instructional classes for ages 1 1/2 up; and Youth Sports (offered through independent parent run organizations - for ages 4-13).

Youth between the ages of 10 through 18 (still enrolled in high school) will be issued membership cards, and have full use of the gym, computer lounge and teen lounge. Activities are scheduled every day and include special events, games, sports and fitness, movies, Boys and Girls Clubs of America activities, community service projects and field trips.

Instructional classes offered at the Youth Center include:

- Dance (tap, jazz, ballet) for ages 3 and up
- Judo for ages 5 and up
- Gymnastics for ages 6 and up
- Advanced Gymnastics for ages 6 and up (instructor invitation only)
- Preschool Gymnastics for ages 3-5.
- Piano (1/2 hour private lessons) for ages 5 and up
- Parent/Child Gymnastics for ages 11/2- 3 (Parent/Adult must be present in class)

Registration is done on a first come first served basis with pre-registration for existing students prior to regular registration.

The Youth Center reserves the right to cancel a class for which there is insufficient registration. A registration form must be filled out prior to your child's admittance into a class and redone annually every September. There is no limit on the number of classes a child may register for. Register in person at the Youth Center.

Phone registration is accepted for current members, with an application on file, using a credit card. The Youth Center accepts personal checks with Social Security numbers written on the check, cash and most credit cards. There is no reduction in fees for child illness or family vacations. A class will be prorated only if you enter into the class after it is started and there are still spaces available.

New student fees apply for gymnastics, preschool gymnastics and judo. These fees are paid annually and are good from June through May.

Sign-In/Sign-Out Procedures - Children under the age of 10 must be signed into and out of the center at the front desk by a parent for each class. Children 10 and over may sign themselves in and out. Parents should also sign in and out at the front desk if they plan to wait for their child. An adult must accompany children under age 10 if not in a class at all times. Parents are encouraged to wait for their child if they are under 5 years old.

Membership - Each youth who registers with the Youth Center between the ages of 10 and 18 (still enrolled in high school) will be issued a membership card. The membership card will show proof of authorization for use of the club facilities. This membership card is essential for the safety and well-being of each child. With this card, we have means of contacting parents in case of an emergency.

Upon entering the building, youth will show their membership card to the staff at the front desk and also sign in. Youth are required to have the card on them at all times. If a youth comes to the center without a membership card, he/she will be issued a temporary card that can be used for that day only. Only three temporary cards will be issued during

a month; after that, the youth will be issued a new card. Only one replacement card will be issued free of charge. After that, the cost will be \$1.

Sign-ups for community Little League, football, cheerleading, youth soccer and youth basketball also take place at the Youth Center. Although the leagues are independent parent-run organizations, the Youth Center will provide parents pertinent league information.

COMMANDS AT NAVAL SUBMARINE BASE NEW LONDON



USS ALBUQUERQUE (SSN 706)

COMMANDER SUBMARINE GROUP 2

The U.S. Navy's submarine force has the world's most capable submarines, manned by the world's best trained and motivated submariners. During a political or military confrontation, any potential adversary must assume that United States Navy submarines are present and consider the consequences.

Commander Submarine Group 2 exercises command of North Atlantic attack submarine forces administratively assigned, as well as operational control of Atlantic submarine units and other forces when assigned.

The attack submarines are primarily designed to seek and destroy enemy submarines and surface ships. Their other missions range from intelligence collection and special forces delivery to anti-ship and strike warfare.

The Commander of Submarine Group 2 is responsible for Submarine Squadrons 2, 4, and Submarine Development Squadron 12 in Groton, as well as Submarine Squadrons 6 and 8 in Norfolk. Headed by a flag officer, the Commander of Submarine Group 2 also exercises responsibility for the training and certification of new construction and overhaul of ships and crews at Electric Boat and Portsmouth Naval Shipyards.

COMMANDER SUBMARINE SQUADRON 2

The mission of Commander Submarine Squadron 2 is to equip, man and train Sailors assigned to fast attack submarines to ensure that they are combat ready and capable of taking the fight to the enemy. Its submarines are able to bring strength, agility, firepower and endurance to the battlespace like no other platform in the U.S. Navy.

It is the only attack submarine squadron that includes a nuclear submarine research vessel, Submarine NR-1. The mission of this

ship is to gather scientific data from the ocean environment. Since its launch in 1969, NR-1 has been featured in National Geographic, on The Discovery Channel, and numerous magazine and newspaper articles.

NR-1's unique equipment includes retractable wheels used for driving along the sea floor, three viewing windows, 13 low-light cameras, and 15,000 watts of external lighting for underwater illumination. It also carries large and small object recovery systems, a manipulator arm that can be fitted with various gripping and cutting tools and a retractable work module used to deposit or recover underwater equipment.

NR-1 is equipped with sophisticated electronics and computers that aid navigation, communication, object location and identification. Designed to maneuver on or close to the seabed or underwater ridges, it can detect and identify objects at considerable distance and lift objects off the ocean floor. With its extreme depth capability, NR-1 operates well below all other submarines and routinely drives along the ocean floor for up to 30 miles at a time.

Four Los Angeles-class attack nuclear-powered submarines are also assigned to Submarine Squadron 2. All were constructed at the Electric Boat Shipyard in Groton, Conn.

Submarines of the Los Angeles class are the most advanced undersea vessels of their type in the world. While anti-submarine warfare is still their primary mission, the inherent characteristics of the submarine - stealth, mobility and endurance - are used to meet the challenges of today's changing global geopolitical climate. These submarines are able to get on station quickly, stay for an extended period of time and carry out a variety of missions including the deployment of special forces, mine laying, precision strike land attack, or simply deterrence by their perceived presence while remaining undetected.



USS DALLAS (SSN 700)

Los Angeles class attack submarines assigned to Submarine Squadron 2 include:

USS ALBUQUERQUE (SSN 706) - Commissioned May 21, 1983. With a crew of 134 Sailors, this submarine has completed several deployments in both the Atlantic Ocean and Mediterranean Sea.

USS DALLAS (SSN 700) - Commissioned July 18, 1981. With a crew of 134 Sailors, Dallas was initially attached to Submarine Development Squadron 12. She was involved in many essential research and development projects until transfer to Submarine Squadron 2 in September 1988. Since then, she has completed one deployment to the Indian Ocean, three Mediterranean deployments, and seven deployments to the North Atlantic.

USS PHILADELPHIA (SSN 690) - Commissioned June 25, 1977. With a crew of 134, this

submarine has conducted five deployments to the Mediterranean Sea, a deployment to the Western Pacific, five North Atlantic deployments, and an Eastern Atlantic deployment.

USS SPRINGFIELD (SSN 761) - Commissioned Jan. 9, 1993. With a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew, USS Springfield has been deployed to the Mediterranean Sea, Arabian Gulf, and the North Atlantic.

COMMANDER SUBMARINE SQUADRON 4

The mission of Commander Submarine Squadron 4 is to equip, man and train Sailors assigned to fast attack submarines to ensure that they are combat ready and capable of taking the fight to the enemy. Its submarines are able to bring strength, agility, firepower and endurance to the battlespace like no other platform in the U.S. Navy.



USS ALEXANDRIA (SSN 757)

Submarine Squadron 4 includes four Los Angeles-class submarines, two Seawolf-class submarines and two Virginia-class submarines. The Seawolf-class submarine, first constructed in 1989, is designed to be exceptionally quiet, fast, and well-armed with advanced sensors. It is a multi-mission vessel, capable of deploying to forward ocean areas to search out and destroy enemy submarines and surface ships and to fire missiles in support of other forces. Two of the

Navy's three Seawolf class submarines are now stationed at Naval Submarine Base New London. The Navy's newest class of attack submarine, the Virginia-class, was let for contract in late 1998. The Virginia-class fully embraces the new strategic concept. It is the first U.S. submarine to be designed for battlespace dominance across a broad spectrum of regional and littoral missions, as well as open-ocean, "blue water" missions.

The seven attack submarines assigned to Submarine Squadron 4 include:

USS CONNECTICUT (SSN 22) - Commissioned Dec. 11, 1998. Sails with a complement of 140 officers and enlisted crew. USS Connecticut is the second of three nuclear powered attack submarines of the Seawolf class. On June 19, 2001, USS Connecticut became the first completely new class of American submarine to surface at the North Pole in more than 30 years.

USS HARTFORD (SSN 768) - Commissioned Dec. 10, 1994. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. USS Hartford is the second U.S. naval vessel to be named in honor of the city of Hartford. The first - a steam and sail-powered sloop of war - was credited with providing the decisive victory that deterred foreign powers from taking an active role in the Civil War.

USS MIAMI (SSN 755) - Commissioned June 30, 1990. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. USS Miami is the third ship of the United States Navy named for the city of Miami. The first was a side-wheel, double ended gunboat used during the Civil War, and the second was a light cruiser used in the Pacific during World War II.

USS PROVIDENCE (SSN 719) - Commissioned July 27, 1985. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. Providence is the fifth ship in our naval history to bear the name. The first three were sloops and gunboats during the American War for Independence. The original, built around 1770 as the Sloop Katy, was the first ship of the Rhode Island Colonial Navy.

USS SEAWOLF (SSN 21) - Commissioned July 19, 1997, as the first ship of the Seawolf class. Sails with a complement of 140 officers and enlisted crew. USS Seawolf's flexibility provides the Navy with an undersea platform to operate in any scenario against any threat, from under the arctic ice to shallow water.

USS VIRGINIA (SSN 774) - Commissioned Oct. 23, 2004. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. The submarine Virginia is the sixth U.S. Navy vessel to bear the name of the first English colony and the 10th American state.

USS TEXAS (SSN 775) - Commissioned Sept. 9, 2006. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. As the Navy's next-generation attack submarine, the Virginia-class provides the U.S. Navy with the capabilities it requires to maintain the nation's undersea supremacy well into the 21st century. Texas has improved stealth, sophisticated surveillance capabilities and special warfare enhancements which will enable it to meet the Navy's multimission requirements.

COMMANDER SUBMARINE DEVELOPMENT SQUADRON 12

The mission of Submarine Development Squadron 12 is to support the Navy's vision of the future by developing and evaluating submarine tactics, both war fighting and forward presence, and disseminating those tactics to the operating forces.

Using six submarines, it provides operational insight into the development of new technology and equipment.

Submarines used by Submarine Squadron 12 to evaluate tactics and test new technology and equipment include:

USS ALEXANDRIA (SSN 757) - Commissioned on May 21, 1983. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. The submarine Alexandria (SSN 757) is the third vessel to bear a name that is shared by cities in both Louisiana and Virginia.

USS ANNAPOLIS (SSN 760) - Commissioned April 11, 1992. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. Deployments include Northern Atlantic, Mediterranean Sea, and Middle East.

USS AUGUSTA (SSN 710) - Commissioned Jan. 19, 1995. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. Augusta is the fifth ship of the fleet to bear the name Augusta, and named for the capital of the great state of Maine.

USS MEMPHIS (SSN 691) - Commissioned Dec. 17, 1977. Sails with a complement of 134 officers and enlisted crew. Memphis was awarded the Battenberg Cup in 2006. The Battenberg Cup is an award given annually

as a symbol of operational excellence to the best ship or submarine in the United States Navy Atlantic Fleet.

USS SAN JUAN (SSN 751) - Commissioned Aug. 6, 1988. Sails with a crew of 134 officers and enlisted crew. San Juan was the first Los Angeles-class boat to receive a number of improvements to the class's basic design. The forward diving planes have been moved from the sail to the bow and the sail has been strengthened for breaking through ice.

USS TOLEDO (SSN 769) - Commissioned Feb. 24, 1995. Sails with a crew of 134 officers and enlisted crew. Toledo is the second ship to be named for the city in northwestern Ohio.

NAVAL SUBMARINE SUPPORT CENTER (NSSC)

The Naval Submarine Support Center's mission is to centralize administrative and support functions, economize resources and provide a common pool of experts who provide complete functional support to the commanders of Submarine Squadrons 2, 4, and Submarine Development Squadron 12.

The center provides support in the areas of administration, medical, legal, chaplain,

supply, combat systems, engineering, communications, and operations to improve readiness; and performs such other functions as may be directed by higher authority. NSSC is located in Building 87 on lower base.

REGIONAL SUPPORT GROUP GROTON (RSG)

Regional Support Group (RSG) Groton is Command U.S. Submarine Force Atlantic's direct waterfront representative. RSG directs, assigns, and monitors the accomplishment of maintenance on all assigned submarines. This involves long-range planning, coordination of repair activities, and monitoring the execution of work in progress.

NAVAL SUBMARINE SUPPORT FACILITY (NSSF)

Naval Submarine Support Facility (NSSF) New London was established in February 1974. Organized and staffed along the lines of an afloat submarine tender Intermediate Maintenance Activity (IMA), the command employs more than 400 military, 42 DoD civilians, and 297 contractors.

The primary mission of NSSF is to provide direct maintenance support to submarines assigned to Submarine Squadrons 2 and 4, and Submarine Squadron Development 12. Visiting ships are often supported.

The submarine support facility is divided into eight departments: Repair, Weapons, Administration, Safety, Facilities Support Group, Supply, Comptroller, and Information Resource Management. The Repair Department is the largest, accounting for more than 500 positions that encompass approximately 35 repair shops. The capabilities of the Repair Department cover the full spectrum of maintenance operations required by modern submarines.

The Weapons Department stores, tests and issues all tactical weapons, pyrotechnics and ordnance loaded on board New London area submarines. The weapons handled include Mark 48 ADCAP torpedo, Tomahawk Cruise Missile, external countermeasures and ammunition. The highly sophisticated Mark 48 ADCAP torpedo is the primary tactical weapon for the submarine force. The Weapons Department also maintains and operates an armory for small arms storage and provides training for all local area commands through use of its small arms range.

The other six departments combine to provide the necessary support required by the

command and the Groton waterfront. There are more than 100 people - military, and civilian - employed in these departments.

NAVY OPERATIONAL SUPPORT CENTER (NOSC)

The mission of the Navy Operational Support Center, New London, is to provide mission-capable units and individuals to the Navy-Marine Corps Team throughout the full range of operations from peace to war. The center directs 15 units comprising over 350 Reserve Component personnel who support SUBASE New London tenant commands. From the Naval Security Force and the Submarine Learning Center to COMSUBDEVRON 12 and Inshore Boat Unit 22, the Reserve Component Sailors of this NOSC are highly trained, motivated and fully involved in the Navy mission - support to the fleet ready and fully integrated!

SUPERVISOR OF SHIPBUILDING

Electric Boat Corporation, located in Groton, Conn., has more than a century of experience building submarines, beginning in 1899 with a 54-foot submersible vessel developed by John Philip Holland. During World War I and just after, Electric Boat received orders to build 85 submarines for the U.S. Navy.

Since that time, Electric Boat has continued building submarines for the Navy to include its nuclear fleet of Los Angeles, Seawolf, and now Virginia-class submarines - some of which are currently stationed at Naval Submarine Base New London.

The Office of the Supervisor of Shipbuilding is the liaison between the Department of the Navy and the Electric Boat Corporation. It is the Supervisor's responsibility to administer all contracts, provide government furnished equipment and outfit ships, assure that the requirements of the contracts are fully met, ascertain that satisfactory production progress is maintained, and ensure that the fleet is provided quality warships fully prepared to sail "in harm's way." The Supervisor's office has been recognized by the Secretary of the Navy with the award of a Meritorious Unit Commendation in 1981, 1985, 1989, and 2006.

The history of the Supervisor of Shipbuilding, Conversion and Repair, USN, better known as SUPSHIP, Groton, dates back to 1931. That year, the U.S. Navy and the Electric Boat Company began negotiations for the construction of the USS Cuttlefish (SS 171) at Groton. As a result, the Office of the Superintending Constructor was established on July 11, 1931. Shortly thereafter, on August 1, 1931, the Office of Inspector of Machinery was established. Its responsibility covered the inspection of construction work and the inspection of machinery and materials. Under the joint direction of these two offices, the keel of the Cuttlefish was laid on October 7, 1931, and the boat was delivered on June 8, 1934.

The Office of Superintending Constructor and the Office of the Inspector of Machinery continued until May 11, 1940, at which time their efforts were consolidated into one office - the Supervisor of Shipbuilding, U.S. Navy.

Since the delivery of Cuttlefish in 1934, hundreds of ships have been delivered by the General Dynamics Corporation, Electric Boat Division, under the supervision of this command. Notably included was the first nuclear-powered submarine, USS Nautilus (SSN 571), commissioned in 1954; the first Polaris Fleet Ballistic Missile Submarine,

USS George Washington (SSBN 598), commissioned in 1959; the first Trident fleet ballistic missile submarine, USS Ohio (SSBN 726), commissioned in 1981; the first Seawolf-class attack submarine, USS Seawolf (SSN 21), commissioned in 1997; and the first Virginia-class attack submarine, USS Virginia (SSN 774), commissioned in 2004.

Today, with the completion of Los-Angeles-class, Ohio-class, and Seawolf-class submarines, the command is moving ahead with Virginian-class construction programs awarded by the Naval Sea Systems Command. In 2006, the Navy also awarded Electric Boat a \$13.7 million contract modification for nuclear submarine work. Currently, Electric Boat Company employs 10,500 people between its Groton, Conn., and Quonset Point, R.I., facilities. The latter facility was established in 1974.

SUBMARINE LEARNING CENTER (SLC)

The Submarine Learning Center's (SLC) mission is to create, coordinate and execute the future training and education vision for the submarine force and partner with fleet representatives in defining individual human performance solutions to meet Submarine Force performance requirements

SLC is an integral part of the Navy's Revolution in Training, as implemented by Task Force EXCEL (Excellence through Commitment to Education and Learning). It is one of 14 specialized Learning Centers, whose primary function is to partner with fleet representatives in defining individual human performance solutions to meet Submarine Force performance requirements. Additionally, the SLC will create, coordinate and execute the future training and education vision for the Submarine Force.

The revolution in Navy training presents unlimited opportunities for the Submarine Force to continue to improve upon its unmatched record of training excellence. Through the infusion of training technology innovation, re-engineering of learning methods and the commitment to ensure our Sailors remain the central element in perfor-

mance solutions, the SLC will lead our six Submarine Learning sites in ensuring our undersea warriors are fully prepared to fight and win in the 21st century.

NAVAL SUBMARINE SCHOOL

When the first class of 24 officers began studies for submarine duty in the summer of 1916, the submarine base in Groton, Connecticut was little more than a handful of buildings scattered across the area now known as Lower Base.

By Christmas 1916, the 22 graduates of the first submarine officers' course were heading out for assignments after spending six months in training on submarines, torpedoes, engineering and electricity. Records are sketchy on the nature of much of that training, especially since the bulk of the early trainers were salvage material from decommissioned submarines. Within a year, the submarine officers, and those who followed them through Naval Submarine School, were serving around the globe when the United States entered World War I.

More than 85 years after that first graduation, the Naval Submarine School, Submarine Base, the U.S. Navy and the world have all undergone radical and profound change, but the tradition as the

center for submarine training excellence continues.

From one building on Lower Base in 1916, Naval Submarine School has grown to the largest single tenant unit on SUBASE, with nearly 40,000 Sailors graduating annually from nearly two hundred different courses. From an era when training aids were Mark I Attack trainers and a German-built trainer of unspecified history, Naval Submarine School maintains and operates state-of-the-art trainers costing millions to design and develop. These trainers are vital tools in providing realistic individual and team training for a submarine fleet striving for total inclusion in Joint Vision 2010.

Naval Submarine School course offerings include introduction, apprentice and basic skill level training; encompass initial technical proficiency training and advanced team operator and team training in electronic and combat systems employment, navigation and damage control; and provide mid-career professional growth courses for both officers and enlisted Sailors.

Naval Submarine School also conducts refresher training of all Atlantic Fleet submarines completing construction or overhaul, pre-deployment and training ashore for all submarines of the Atlantic Fleet.



NAVAL UNDERSEA MEDICAL INSTITUTE (NUMI)

The Naval Undersea Medical Institute (NUMI) is responsible for providing training and technical support in undersea medicine, radiation health, and related matters, to meet the requirements of Navy Medicine and to provide technical support in those matters to the United States naval operating forces and activities worldwide.

NUMI is the source of training for submarine force independent duty corpsmen, radiation health technicians, underseas medical officer candidates, and radiation health officers. It also provides the Navy's only Radiation Health Indoctrination Course for officers and enlisted personnel going to a wide variety of billets throughout the fleet. Staff members field calls from military activities all over the world on matters related to radiation health, undersea medicine, and submarine medical administration.

The institute is committed to educational excellence and technical expertise, which will create a learning environment that instills competence, confidence and integrity; foster innovation, creativity, and teamwork; provide graduates whose performance exceeds the expectations of our customers; and make a positive impact on the health, safety, and well being of Sailors and Marines worldwide.

Naval Undersea Medical Institute is the former School of Submarine Medicine, which had its beginning as a division of the Submarine Medical Research Laboratory during World War II. In 1964, the school became a department of the Naval Submarine Medical Center. The name of the school was changed to Naval Undersea Medical Institute in 1973, and in 1975 NUMI was designated as a detachment of

the Naval Health Sciences and Education and Training Command in Bethesda, Md. In 1998, NUMI became a detachment of the Naval Operational Medical Institute, located in Pensacola, Fla.

NAVAL SUBMARINE MEDICAL RESEARCH LABORATORY (NSMRL)

The United States Submarine Service has a long and proud tradition of developing and operating with leading edge technologies. The Naval Submarine Medical Research Laboratory (NSMRL) is a major contributor to integrating these technologies into submarine crew operations.

The laboratory is DoD's Center for Undersea Biomedical Research. Its mission is to protect the health and enhance the performance of warfighters through submarine, diving, and surface biomedical research solutions.

Established in World War II to conduct mission critical studies in night vision, sonar sound discrimination, and personnel selection, NSMRL continues to serve the fleet by taking the lead in undersea human factors, sensory sciences, and operational medicine.

Located on Submarine Base New London, the laboratory's researchers have access to three submarine squadrons; the Navy Submarine School; the Naval Submarine Support Facility; Naval Undersea Medical Institute; and the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics, which builds the nation's submarines.

The laboratory is staffed by a diverse group of psychologists, audiologists, physicians, physiologists, and electrical, biomedical and nuclear engineers. Several colleges and universities are located in the same area, including the U.S. Coast Guard Academy, Connecticut College and the University of Connecticut.

The laboratory's accomplishments continue to be many and varied, and include scientifically based recommendations for submarine rescue procedures, submarine atmos-

phere limits, waivers for clinical medical conditions, advanced sonar system capabilities, diver/sonar safe distances, and symbology for visual displays. NSMRL is at the forefront of operational undersea research and development, as it has been for more than 50 years. Its achievements include:

- Sea Lab 1 habitat project
- Disabled Submarine Escape and Rescue project
- "Rig-for-red" viewing
- Development of the International Orange color (Air-Sea Rescue Red)
- Studies of nitrogen narcosis
- Development of saturation diving and decompression tables
- Performance based screening of color vision
- Personnel screening and assessment for enclosed environments
- Effects of atmospheric constituents on health and performance in enclosed environments
- Underwater acoustic signal discrimination and classification
- Bioeffects of low frequency underwater sound

Arrangements for system validation are conveniently made through Submarine School New London; and sea trials with research products are coordinated through the Submarine Base New London and the Naval Undersea Warfare Center in Newport, R.I.

NAVAL CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIVE SERVICE (NCIS)

The local Naval Criminal Investigative Service (NCIS) office is located in Building 166 and is staffed by 14 civilian special agents who conduct criminal investigations and counterintelligence and counterterrorism cases and operations. Inquiries concerning NCIS support should be directed to the duty agent by calling 694-4686.

The agency traces its roots to an 1882 naval general order establishing the Office of Naval Intelligence to collect information on the characteristics and weaponry of foreign vessels, charting foreign passages, rivers, or other bodies of water, and touring overseas fortifications, industrial plants, and shipyards.

In anticipation of the United States' entry into World War I, the agency's responsibilities expanded to include investigation of espionage, sabotage, and all manner of information on the Navy's potential adversaries. The major buildup of civilian special agents began with the Korean War in 1950, and continued through the Cold War years. In 1966, the name Naval Investigative Service (NIS) was adopted, and in 1969 its special agents became Excepted Civil Service rather than contract employees.

The early 1970s saw an NIS special agent stationed on the USS Intrepid for six months - the beginning of the Special Agent Afloat program. In 1972, background investigations were transferred to the newly formed Defense Investigative Service, allowing NIS to give more attention to criminal investigations and counterintelligence.

In 1982, NIS assumed responsibility for managing the Navy's Law Enforcement and Physical Security Program and the Navy's Information and Personnel Security Program. Two months after the October 1983 bombing of the Marine Barracks in Beirut, the agency opened the Navy Antiterrorist Alert Center, a 24-hour-a-day operational intelligence center. In 1984, special agents began training at the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center (FLETC) in Georgia - the training facility for most other federal investigative agencies, except the FBI.

In 1985, Cathal L. Flynn became the first admiral to lead NIS, which took on the additional responsibility of information and personnel security. One year later, the Department of the Navy Central Adjudication Facility was established and placed under the agency, to adjudicate security clearances. It now maintains over 1.7 million automated records and over 500,000 clearances for the Department of the Navy and the U.S. Coast Guard.

In 1992, NCIS was restructured into a federal law enforcement agency with 14 field offices (now 17 field offices), which control operations at 140 locations worldwide. In 1995, NCIS introduced the Cold Case Homicide Unit.

In 1999, NCIS and the Marine Corps Criminal Investigative Division (CID) signed a memorandum of understanding calling for an integration of Marine Corps CID into NCIS and, in 2000, Congress granted NCIS civilian special agents authority to execute warrants and make arrests.

A growing appreciation of the changing threat facing the Department of the Navy in the 21st century, culminating with the terrorist bombing of the USS Cole in Yemen and the attacks on September 11, 2001, led the agency to transform the Antiterrorist Alert Center into the Multiple Threat Alert Center in 2002.

The threat landscape facing American military forces worldwide continues to evolve at an unprecedented rate. The dangers are more complex, wider-ranging, and more blurred than ever before. NCIS is now called upon more frequently by Navy and Marine Corps commanders to respond to this growing threat, while continuing to fulfill its traditional mission.

NAVY INFORMATION OPERATIONS DETACHMENT GROTON (NIOD)

Navy Information Operations Detachment (NIOD) Groton, formerly Naval Security Group Activity Groton, is located in Building 106. NIOD Groton provides dedicated cryptologic support in the form of equipment installation, system maintenance, and underway maintenance support to units of the U.S. Atlantic Fleet.

NUCLEAR REGIONAL MAINTENANCE DEPARTMENT (NRMD)

The Nuclear Regional Maintenance Department is responsible for the planning, direction and coordination of all repairs, alterations or modifications performed on nuclear machinery, components and associated systems. The department develops and enforces performance standards for nuclear production work, and supervises the development of improved production techniques and engineering methods.

NRMD consists of five groups: Ship Repair, Radiological Controls, Radiation Health, Nuclear Repair Coordinators, and Facilities Maintenance.

SHIP REPAIR is responsible for performing repairs to nuclear systems and components; requisitioning materials and providing technical support for nuclear work; manufacturing custom radiological enclosures; and conducting portable effluent tank, relief valve testing and resin/media exchange evolutions.

FACILITIES MAINTENANCE is responsible for conducting corrective and preventive maintenance in the Controlled Industrial Facility; coordinating delivery of controlled pure water to tended units on the waterfront; and maintaining and issuing test equipment in support of nuclear maintenance on tended units.

NUCLEAR REPAIR is responsible for supervising the execution of all phases of nuclear work until the repair and documentation are complete and filed; screening all nuclear jobs to determine the availability of material, personnel and procedures; coordinating the accomplishment of nuclear systems SHIPALTs and A&Is on tended units and in the Nuclear Support Facility; and acting as liaison between RPPY and NSFPY in matters pertaining to the conduct of nuclear work.

RADIATION HEALTH is responsible for providing internal monitoring for personnel; and for occupational radiation exposure control and reporting at the Naval Submarine Base New London.

RADIOLOGICAL CONTROLS is responsible for all radioactive material in the IMA associated with naval nuclear power plants and with general radioactive material used in radiac calibration. It provides for radiological controls and monitoring of all IMA work associated with shipboard nuclear propulsion plant systems and within the Controlled Industrial Facility (CIF). Additionally, the division is the responsible agent for the proper receipt, accountability, stowage and disposal of radioactive material under the cognizance of the Repair Department; and provides monitoring oversight and radiological support for Ship Repair division. It repairs and calibrates radiac equipment; provides radioactive material receipt, transfer and shipping services; and provides multi-channel analyzer and waste curie monitoring services.

SUBMARINE TECHNICAL SUPPORT CENTER (STSC)

Submarine Technical Support Center (STSC) is a group of highly skilled technical experts on a variety of submarine systems. These experts provide troubleshooting support to assigned submarines via distance support and on-site support. STSC also provides a limited amount of repair support.

SUBMARINE FORCE MUSEUM & HISTORIC SHIP NAUTILUS TOUR

One highlight of any trip to the Mystic/New London area is a visit to the Submarine Force Museum and tour of the Nautilus - the Navy's first and only nuclear-powered submarine on public display. Located on the Thames River adjacent to the Naval Submarine Base, the museum and submarine are open to the public daily throughout the summer and six days a week throughout the winter at no cost.

You'll discover the mystery and adventure of the "Silent Service" through the nation's finest collection of indoor and outdoor displays of America's submarine heritage. Inside the Museum are working periscopes, an authentic submarine control room, and extensive models depicting the development of the U.S. Submarine Force.

Then experience the excitement of walking the decks that made submarine history when you go aboard one of the Navy's crown jewels, USS Nautilus, the first nuclear-powered submarine. You will be able to see a torpedo room, attack center and sonar room, officer stateroom, enlisted mess, and radio room. The submarine tour normally lasts about 30 minutes, but there may be some waiting time since only small groups may enter the Nautilus at one time. During peak tourist season, the line to see Nautilus closes at 3:30 p.m. so that everyone in line has an opportunity to go through the submarine before it closes at 5 p.m.

Elsewhere in the museum, you can relax in one of three theaters and enjoy films of submarines past and present. Learn how a submarine operates on an interactive

computer display. Stand in the re-created submarine attack center and hear the sounds of battle beneath the waves. Take a seat at the ship's control panel from the nuclear attack submarine Billfish or peer through one of three operating periscopes. You might even see one of the Navy's newest nuclear submarines going by on the Thames River!

Of course, the most fascinating exhibit for most visitors is the historic submarine Nautilus. Launched in 1954, Nautilus cruised farther, faster, and deeper than any submarine built up to that time. Nautilus set numerous records: world's first nuclear-powered vessel; first ship to go to the North Pole; first vessel to travel 20,000 leagues under the sea. Today, Nautilus is a National Historic Landmark and Connecticut's State Ship.

For those who desire to learn more about a particular submarine or event in submarine history, the museum houses the largest submarine library in the world. The library serves as the repository for the records and history of the U.S. Submarine Force from its beginning to present day. New books, photographs, and documents are being added weekly. The library is open to researchers by appointment.

Location: Take Exit 86 off I-95 and follow the signs; it is less than two miles from the Interstate.

Admission: Free. Hours: Open year round. Summer: May 15 - October 31, daily 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. except Tuesday 1-5 p.m. Winter: November 1 - May 14, Wednesday through Monday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Closed Tuesday. The Nautilus tour is closed the first full two weeks in May and the last full two weeks in October while the submarine undergoes maintenance.

Southeastern Connecticut

Gateway to New England

Picturesque historical villages blend with urban centers, rolling hills, stone walls, graceful shorelines, spectacular fall foliage and diverse attractions to make Southeastern Connecticut a wonderful place to live.

Colonial Settlements Thrive On the Thames

Long before the American Revolution, colonialists were already settling along the same Atlantic coastline, brought by tall sailing ships that are once again on display in historic towns first settled in the 1600s. One inviting spot for these new settlers was a tidal estuary and short river that they named "Pequot" for the Indians who lived in the area.

On the western shore, John Winthrop the Younger laid out a settlement in 1646 which he also named after the Pequot Indians. Perhaps yearning for their British heritage, the citizens renamed the settlement "City of London" in 1658; and the river was renamed the "Thames," after its European counterpart. The city was later renamed and incorporated as "New London" in 1784.

Across the river, another settlement was building up in 1650 as a part of the "City of London," at the site of what is now "Groton." That settlement was incorporated as a separate town in 1705, and was finally incorporated as the city of Groton in 1964.

Other colonial settlements were also springing up around the same period throughout Southeastern Connecticut. Waterford was first settled in 1635 and incorporated as a separate town from New London in 1801. Ledyard was settled in 1635, organized as a parish of North Groton in 1725, and incorporated as a town in 1836. Montville was originally an Indian reservation and was settled by Samuel Rogers from New London in 1670. Stonington was originally settled in 1649 by a company led by William Chesebrough from the Plymouth Colony. Both Connecticut and Massachusetts claimed the town as part of a boundary dispute that was not finally resolved until 1662.

New London is now the county seat for an area encompassing 666 square miles, 21 school districts and nearly 260,000 people in Southeastern Connecticut. Included are villages with a few hundred people, and urban areas such as Groton - the largest city in New London County - with a population of approximately 40,000 residents.

Although only 15 miles long, the Thames River is still the economic heart of the area, serving as a gateway for a Navy submarine base; one of the world's largest shipyards; the U.S. Coast Guard Academy; and commercial harbors.

Southeastern Connecticut is truly a microcosm of New England. Its industry ranges from large employers such as Electric Boat Corporation (Groton) and Pfizer (Groton and New London), to small, single-employee enterprises. Yet, it has miles of beautiful coastline and acres of wooded retreats.

The area offers a wide variety of events throughout the year. Summer brings carnivals, fairs, town picnics, and fireworks displays, to mention a few. In the fall, there are food festivals and Octoberfests. During the holidays, lantern light tours of the Seaport and historic homes add to the festive atmosphere. Spring brings parades, concerts, and the Lobsterfest.

The Garde Arts Center, located in New London, has hosted such renowned performances as Tony Bennett, Itzhak Perleman and Bob Dylan, as well as touring Broadway productions. The Eugene O'Neill Theater Center in Waterford sponsors a wide variety of artistic venues. Each summer, the region is treated to a musical jubilee by the renewal of Summer Music at Harkness State Park in Waterford.

Norwich's Dodd Stadium is home to the Connecticut Defenders, the Double-A affiliate of the San Francisco Giants. The Mohegan Sun Arena is home for the WNBA's Connecticut Sun, a professional women's basketball team. Waterford's Speedbowl hosts modified and mini-stock classes of NASCAR racing. There are sporting activities available for every interest.

For the children - and children-at-heart - nearby amusement parks include Six Flags Over New England and Lake Compounce Family Theme Park. Dinosaur Crossing offers a 50-acre setting for more than 25 life-sized dinosaurs; and Strawberry Park offers a 77-acre campground nestled in a region of lakes, streams and ocean beaches.

Additional information on local events, and discounted tickets for many area attractions, is available from the Information, Tickets, and Travel Office on SUBASE.

Groton, with nearly 16,000 households, is the largest municipality between New Haven, Connecticut, and Providence, Rhode Island. Framed by the Thames River and the Mystic River, Groton is notable for its 40 miles of coastline on Long Island Sound. Both state and municipal parks provide abundant access and views of the water. Groton shares with New London one of the finest natural harbors on the Eastern seaboard.

The three major employers in Groton are the Naval Submarine Base New London; the submarine construction facilities of the Electric Boat Division of General Dynamics; and the Global Research and Development campus of Pfizer, Inc. Other industries in town range from traditional fishing boat fleet to advanced medical supply manufacturing. The recent completion of the University of Connecticut Marine Sciences Center at Avery Point gives Groton a unique place among centers of science and learning. Nearly 49 percent of Groton's employment is in the government sector.

A conning tower, located on Thames Street, commemorates the 52 submarines lost during World War II that are now "On Eternal Patrol." Every month, the flags of the boats lost during that month are flown from the tower. It is also the site of the National Submarine Memorial Wall of Honor that contains all of the names of submariners who were lost at sea.

New London's newly constructed Waterfront Park, located on the Thames River and Long Island Sound, is recognized as a destination point for tall ships and luxury cruise lines, and gives visitors hours of pleasure strolling and taking in the breezes and sun of Southeastern Connecticut.

It is also home to important historic landmarks such as the 1833 U.S. Custom House and Maritime Museum, and acres of public parks. Festivals and special events sponsored by the city are enjoyed by thousands of citizens in each season of the year. The city is presently in the midst of a period of economic revitalization with significant development initiatives underway in the State Pier, the downtown and the Fort Trumbull areas. The most notable result of these efforts is the recent completion of Pfizer, Inc.'s, \$300 million Global Research and Development Headquarters on the city's waterfront.

The historic waterfront is probably best known as home for America's Tall Ship, the Barque Eagle, and the U.S. Coast Guard Academy. The academy is unique among the service academies in that it educates the leaders of a humanitarian force - the oldest life-saving service in the world. With a beautiful campus on the Thames River in New London, the academy provides a four-year bachelor of science program with a full scholarship for each individual. The academy is home port for the U.S. Coast Guard Cutter Eagle, the training ship for future Coast Guard officers.

Mystic, a picturesque seaport that draws thousands of visitors every summer, is truly "a state of mind" that represents historic New England. Mystic is technically a part of Groton and Stonington and, as such, has no government or services of its own. But it does have a 19th century village replica filled with unique shops, a seaport with historic ships, a world-famous indoor and outdoor maritime museum, and a marine aquarium that features more than 6,000 living specimens in 49 exhibits.

Located at the mouth of the Mystic River, the settlement was originally a highly profitable whaling and fishing center that still provides opportunities for commercial and sports fishing to this day. Captain John Mason settled this area, located on a salt water estuary fed by fresh water streams, in 1634. By 1750, shipyards were operating up and down the Mystic River, and it became a major shipbuilding center catering to the whaling and fishing industries.

From 1850 to 1870, Mystic produced a greater tonnage of ships than any other port of equal size in America. But, by the turn of the 20th century, the clipper ship era and wooden boat building ended.

Today, visitors are able to stroll through historic downtown Mystic to shop; explore its side streets and the eclectic architecture of sea captains' homes; and walk along the Mystic River, where large wooden sailing vessels were launched that ruled the oceans of the world.

Weather

Despite New England's reputation for rugged climate, the weather in Southeast Connecticut is quite mild. On average, there are only three days a year when the temperature goes above 90 degrees, and only one day when it falls to 0 degrees or below. Appreciable precipitation, averaging 44 inches per year, can be expected approximately 125 days a year, evenly spread over the months. Summer temperatures can reach 80-90 degrees and winter temperatures average from 20-30 degrees. Snowfall, averaging 34 inches per year, usually occurs between January and March.

Schools

Most cities and towns throughout Southeastern Connecticut operate their own public schools, keeping the system responsive to local needs. As a result, New London County alone has 21 separate school districts, with Groton School District being the largest.

With slightly more than 5,200 students, Groton has 12 public schools, including nine elementary schools, two middle schools, and one high school. Elementary schools teach kindergarten through fifth grade, middle schools teach sixth through eighth grade, and high schools teach ninth through 12th grade. Groton also has three private schools: Pfizer Kids, Sacred Heart School, and Stonington Institute.

Where you live usually determines where your children will attend school. Military families living in Public Private Venture housing near

the base are served by four nearby Groton elementary schools - Charles Barnum, Eastern Point, Mary Morrisson, and Pleasant Valley - as well as Fitch Middle School and Fitch High School. Information on the entire Groton Public School system is available at the following Web site: <http://www.groton.k12.ct.us>. The Web site includes information and forms necessary to register children into the Groton School District. The school district can also be contacted by phone at (860) 572-2100.

The following documents are needed to enroll children in Connecticut public schools: (1) school records; (2) most recent report cards; (3) medical records; (4) immunization records; (5) birth certificates; and (6) a completed physical form. (The Physical Form can be obtained from the Fleet and Family Support Center or the Pediatrics Clinic on base.)

Public school immunization requirements include:

- (1) Diphtheria: Minimum of four doses required for all children 18 months and older. For children 5 years or older, the last dose must have been given no sooner than the 4th birthday.
- (2) Measles Vaccine: PreK must have one dose after the first birthday. Grades K-12 all must have two doses.
- (3) Hepatitis B: Three doses of Hepatitis B Vaccine are needed before school entry for children born January 1, 1994 or later.
- (4) Hemophilus Influenza Type B: Children entering at less than 5 years of age must have received at least one dose of HIB Vaccine.
- (5) Polio: At least three doses of Polio Vaccine.
- (6) Varicella: One dose on or after the first birthday for PreK - 12. All students are required to show proof of immunity to Varicella (Chicken Pox) for entry into 7th grade or beyond.

Connecticut public school enrollment climbed to approximately 577,400 students in 2004, but has been declining slightly ever since. The Connecticut State Board of Education is committed to ensuring that all of the state's preschool-age children, including children with disabilities, are afforded an opportunity to participate in a high-quality preschool program. Such an experience fosters a child's overall development, including literacy and readiness for the public school kindergarten curriculum.

Another major initiative by the Connecticut State Board of Education is to increase the number of computers available to all students. In 1994-95, the ratio of students per instructional computer was 9.4 at all levels statewide. By 2004-05, that figure had dropped to 3.6 students per computer for all levels.

As a minimum, Connecticut law requires high school students to complete for graduation at least four years of English, three years each of mathematics and social studies, two years of science, and one year of both physical education and art or vocational education. Many high schools require credits beyond the state minimum. In addition to advanced placement courses, many high schools also offer courses that

provide college credit in such subjects as English, science, history, social sciences, world languages, and the arts.

Within the Groton School District, more than 85 percent of the teachers have master's degrees or above, and they average 17.3 years instructing in Connecticut. Class size is normally 20 or fewer students. Standard Aptitude Test (SAT) scores for the 2004-2005 class averaged 504 in mathematics and 511 in verbal. More than 80 percent of that class went on to higher education after graduating, while 17 percent joined the military.

In 2005, the Groton Public School District and New London Naval Submarine Base received a special award for their ongoing commitment to working together for the future of every child in Groton.

One decade earlier, a local committee consisting of military and school officials was formed to enhance communication on academic and military issues. This successful endeavor led to the organization of the first regional education conference for military and school personnel, which was held in Connecticut in 1996. This quickly grew into a national movement with an international conference taking place in Virginia in 1998.

Local efforts which led to the award in 2005 included a Navy seminar for new teachers, orienting them to the issues of military life and transitions affecting school-age children; an annual volunteer breakfast honoring military personnel who serve in local schools; and the development of partnerships between Groton schools and military personnel.

The award exemplifies the strong ties that exist between the Groton public schools and military community. Partnerships and bonds have been developed for the benefit of the children that will continue to expand long into the future.

Higher education opportunities also abound in the area, ranging from two year institutions such as Mitchell College (New London) and Three Rivers Community Technical College (Norwich), to the University of New Haven (New Haven and several off-site locations), the University of Connecticut (Storrs and Groton) and Connecticut College (New London). Active duty members are encouraged to visit the Navy College on base to learn more about college and tuition assistance programs available to military personnel.

Spouse Employment Opportunities

With a labor force of nearly 35,000 people, and many of the largest employers in Southeastern Connecticut, Groton provides excellent employment opportunities for spouses of Sailors working at the submarine base. More than 48 percent of Groton's jobs are in the government sector, while the majority of the remaining positions are in manufacturing, services, and trade industries.

Military spouses are welcome to do career exploration and receive job search assistance through the Spouse Employment Assistance Program at the Fleet and Family Support Center in Building 83 on base. The employment assistance manager offers services such as the Myers Briggs Type Indicator, resume development and critique, interview training, networking contacts, and the Military Spouse Virtual Assistance program. Job fairs and current job postings are also available in the FFSC's Career Resource Center. A Department of Labor representative is available every Monday and Tuesday afternoon to assist with your job hunt.

Military spouses who relocate with their sponsor under permanent change of station orders are eligible for increased employment assistance through the military spouse preference program. This program provides hiring preference for military spouses to DoD jobs and Non-Appropriated Fund jobs such as in the Morale, Welfare and Recreation office and Navy Exchange.

Many local government contractors and sub-contractors are also looking for workers in facilities and grounds maintenance, security guards, clerks, food service, and building custodial services. Pay is excellent and job openings are competitive. Base contractors often post their job vacancy announcements in the FFSC Career Development Resource Center.

Other area government contractors such as Electric Boat (General Dynamics), Lockheed Martin Aerospace Corporation, and BAE Systems choose not to list job vacancy announcement at the Fleet and Family Support Center, but direct job seekers to their respective Web sites. They often provide employment in technical, industrial, medical and administrative career fields.

The Department of Defense has actively engaged private partners and other government agencies to enhance employment and career opportunities for military spouses. As a result of a partnership with Monster.com, the virtual Military Spouse Career Center, <http://www.military.com/spouse>, was created to provide career networking services and employment information to military spouses.

Our goal through these many programs is to help military spouses find productive, rewarding career opportunities while living in our community.

Area Attractions

A number of area attractions highlight the historic culture of the area, and provide special educational programs for both adults and children. One of the finest exhibits is the Submarine Force Museum and Historical Ship Nautilus Tour, highlighted on page 40 of this guide.

Other historic attractions highlight early Native American history in the area, colonial and maritime living along the New England coast, the American struggle for independence, and steam locomotive and riverboat travel. Since nearly all of the attractions offer special events throughout the year, rotating exhibits, and educational programs, you are encouraged to call or visit their Web site to find out the latest information.

Mashantucket Pequot Museum & Research Center 110 Pequot Trail (Route 214), Mashantucket Reservation

The world's largest and most comprehensive Native American museum and research center offers an array of engaging experiences for young and old, from life-size walk-through dioramas that transport visitors into the past, to changing exhibits and live performances of contemporary arts and cultures.

Four full acres of permanent exhibits depict 18,000 years of Native and natural history in thoroughly researched detail, while two libraries, including one for children, offer a diverse selection of materials on the histories and cultures of all Native peoples of the United States and Canada.

Exhibits let you experience life as it was for Native Americans before and after arrival of early colonialists. By the early 17th century, just prior to European contact, the Pequots had approximately 8,000 members who inhabited 250 square miles around what is now New London County. However, the Pequot War (1636-1638) - the first major conflict between colonists and an indigenous New England people - had a devastating impact on the tribe.

When the Pequot War formally ended, many tribal members had been killed while others were placed in slavery or under the control of other tribes. Those placed under the rule of the Mohegans eventually became known as the Mashantucket (Western) Pequots. By the early 1800s, there were only 30-40 Pequots remaining on the ever shrinking Mashantucket reservation but, by the 1970s, tribal members began moving back hoping to restore their land base and community, develop economic self-sufficiency, and revitalize tribal culture.

The ceremonial groundbreaking for the Mashantucket Pequot Museum and Research Center took place in 1993, in a ceremony marking the 10th anniversary of federal recognition of the Mashantucket Pequot Tribal National. The new facility opened in 1998 and is located on the Mashantucket Pequot Reservation - one of the oldest, continuously occupied Indian reservations in North America - where many tribal members continue to live.

The museum is open daily from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. except for Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years and the day before each of those holidays. Last admission is at 3 p.m. Call (800) 411-9671 for additional information, or visit the museum's Web site at: <http://www.pequotmuseum.org>.

Mystic Seaport Route 27, Mystic (exit 90 off I-95)

Founded in 1929, Mystic Seaport is our nation's leading maritime museum, housing the world's largest collection of historic ships including the Charles W. Morgan - the last surviving wooden whaler in the world. Wander a re-created 19th-century seafaring village which is alive with the sights, sounds and smells of maritime America.

You'll be able to see sailor's working aloft on a square rigger, hear tales of fishing the North Atlantic, enjoy a performance featuring the African heritage of maritime music, and watch a whaleboat demonstration. At preservation shipyard, skilled crews use traditional tools and techniques to preserve the museum's unparalleled collection of historic wooden vessels.

Village exhibits, representing the 1800s and early 1900s, include a boat shed, marine railway, print shop, cooperage, drug store, tavern, school house, church, and many other shops found along the Atlantic coast. Signal flags outside many of these exhibits indicate they are staffed by professional educators of Mystic Seaport who will be able to answer any questions you may have.

Other exhibits take you on a remarkable journey through seafaring lives, past and present; provide a spectacular scale model of the Mystic harbor between 1850 and 1870; and allow you to explore a shipsmith shop - the only manufactory of whaling industry ironwork known to have survived from the 19th-century.

Mystic Seaport is open daily, year-round, except for Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. Summer hours (April to October) are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and winter hours (November to March) are 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Demonstrations and exhibits change with the season, so it's worthwhile to scan their Web site for details at <http://www.mysticseaport.org>.

Mystic Aquarium & Institute for Exploration 55 Coogan Blvd., Mystic (Exit 90 off I-95)

Mystic Aquarium provides a wonderful variety of sea life, ranging from coastal estuaries to Amazon rivers, beluga whales to Steller sea lions, and penguins to dolphins, but what really makes this aquarium unique is its documentation of undersea exploration being performed by Dr. Robert Ballard and his team of scientists and explorers with the Institute for Exploration.

Films and exhibits document Dr. Ballard's efforts to improve submersible technology in order to explore the remains of the Titanic, as well as ancient Phoenician vessels that sailed the Mediterranean Ocean thousands of years ago. Uniting world-class deep-ocean engineers and oceanographers with renown archaeologists and geologists, the institute has pioneered the emerging fields of deep-sea archaeology and deep-sea geology. Their team has already emerged as a leader in design and development of deep-submergence vehicles for scientific exploration.

As a research institute, the aquarium offers a wide-range of age-specific educational programs and tours for students of all ages. For college-level students, it offers a one-of-a-kind, hands-on internship program and a renowned veterinary program.

Mystic Aquarium and Institute for Exploration is open daily, except for Thanksgiving and Christmas. From March thru November it is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. From December thru February it is open from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, and from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on weekends and holidays. Essex Steam Train & Riverboat Railroad Avenue, Essex (Exit 69 of I-95 to Essex)

Return to the glory days of steam from the comfort of a restored vintage rail car, and get an unobstructed view of the unspoiled beauty of the Connecticut River Valley from aboard a three-deck riverboat.

Operated by the Valley Railroad Company, visitors have an opportunity to view the New England countryside by steam locomotive and riverboat from May through October, with varying hours throughout the rest of the year. Special events include fall foliage trips, Santa Specials with Mr. and Mrs. Claus, direct from the North Pole; and the North Pole Express - nighttime steam train rides with live readings of Christmas stories, singalongs, and holiday surprises.

Other events sponsored by the Valley Railroad Company include a guest engineer program, where you get an opportunity to get your hand on the throttle of an 80-ton, coal burning steam engine for an 8-mile, scenic excursion through the Connecticut River Valley; Caboose Weekend, when Friends of the Valley Railroad bring out their bright red caboose for a special fund-raiser; and a three-day "Hot Steam Jazz Festival." The three-deck riverboat Becky Thatcher is also available for evening charters from May through October.

Children's Museum of Southeastern Connecticut 409 Main Street, Niantic (Exit 72 off I-95 2.5 miles)

The Children's Museum of Southeastern Connecticut is an interactive, hands-on, educational opportunity for children up through fifth grade. It is designed to engage, encourage, and challenge children in the arts, sciences, safety, health, culture, and history.

Let your kids climb into a clubhouse in a literary exhibit with mythical beasts, legends and heroes. Don't miss Nursery Rhyme Land for toddlers and the Global Village, a celebration of diverse cultural heritage. The museum has live critters, arts and crafts, a pipe organ, a real two-person research submarine, and many exhibits that change regularly for your enjoyment.

The Children's Museum offers a variety of hands-on, educational programs for children and families. Both on-site and off-site programs are available. On-site programs are scheduled year-round and are created for specific age groups. Off-site programs are held at schools, child-care centers and libraries. The museum also holds Teacher Development Workshops.

The museum is open Tuesday-Saturday from 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Fridays until 8 p.m.; and Sundays from noon to 4 p.m. For more information on specific program topics, fees, and dates, call the museum at (860) 691-1111 or visit its Web site at: <http://www.childrensmuseumsect.org>.

State Parks and State Forests

Eight state parks and two state forests, located in New London County, provide outdoorsmen and women a wide range of activities, including hiking, camping, picnicking, salt and fresh water fishing, swimming, boating, horseback riding, biking, snowmobiling, and cross-country skiing. Two of the parks also have historic forts while one offers tours of a historic mansion.

The Connecticut State Parks' Web site provides extensive information on every park site to include activities available, facilities, history, directions, and fees. The Web site is: <http://dep.state.ct.us/stateparks/>.

Three state parks are located in Groton:

Bluff Point State Park is the last remaining significant piece of undeveloped land along the Connecticut coastline. Jutting out into the waters of Long Island Sound this wooded peninsula, measuring one and one-half miles long by one mile wide, encompasses more than 800 acres. It offers hiking, saltwater fishing, shell fishing and mountain biking, and has a boat launching facility. Parking at the park is free, but because of its Coastal Reserve designation, access to the bluff is by foot or non-motorized vehicle only.

Fort Griswold Battlefield State Park adds a touch of reality to your Revolutionary War history lesson. This is the historic site where, on September 6, 1781, British Forces, commanded by the infamous Benedict Arnold, captured the fort and massacred 88 of the 165 defend-

ers stationed there. The Ebenezer Avery House, which sheltered the wounded after the battle, has been restored. A Revolutionary War museum also depicts the era.

Haley Farm State Park, a 198-acre state reserve, provides hiking, biking and jogging trails through a scenic old shoreline farm. The Haley Farm Bike Trail, which is wheelchair accessible, is part of a 7 1/2 mile town-owned bikeway routed from Mystic to Groton on local roadways. There is no parking fee at the park.

Fort Trumbull State Park, located in New London, offers tours of an 1800s fort, a walking trail, and spectacular fishing opportunities from a one-of-a-kind fishing pier boasting over 500 feet of shore-based access to the major game fish of Long Island Sound. Saltwater anglers will find a unique combination of sport fish, including striped bass, bluefish, and weakfish as they feed on a variety of baitfish found at the mouth of the Thames River. In addition to 24-hour access, the pier offers bright lighting and individual pole holders for angler comfort. Fort Trumbull and its visitor center are open Wednesday through Sunday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. May 21 through Columbus Day. There are no fees for parking or visiting the park grounds. A per person charge applies for the visitor center exhibit and fort tour.

Rocky Neck State Park, located in East Lyme, offers 160 camping sites in both open and wooded settings, saltwater fishing and swimming, picnicking, and hiking. The camping season runs from May 1 to Sept. 30. Clear waters and stone-free beaches with expanses of white sand make it ideal for swimming. Bounded on the west by a tidal river and the east by a broad salt marsh, Rocky Neck was known to both Indians and colonists as a place with abundant fish and wildlife. Today, the osprey is a frequent early summer visitor. In the fall, cranes, herons and mute swans wade among cattails and rose mallow. Seasonal changes provide opportunities to fish for mackerel, striped bass, blackfish and flounder. There are separate weekend/holiday and weekday parking fees, as well as camping fees, at the park.

Harkness Memorial State Park, located in Waterford, offers tours of an early 1900s mansion, set on 230 seaside acres along Long Island Sound. The Roman Renaissance Classical Revival-style mansion has 42 rooms, along with carriage house. Lush gardens flank the mansion on both the east and west lawns, and an Alpine rock garden adds to the beauty and splendor of the seaside panorama. The mansion is open for tours weekends and holidays from Memorial Day to Labor Day weekend. The first tour of the day starts at 10 a.m. and the last at 2:15 p.m. There are separate weekend/holiday and weekday parking fees at the park.

Hopeville Pond State Park, located in Griswold, provides 80 camp sites, along with freshwater pond fishing, swimming, hiking and bicycling. The camping season begins in mid-April and ends Sept. 30. Facilities include boat launch, picnic tables and bathrooms. The park is located along the Pachaug River that was once a major fishing ground for the Mohegan Indians. Later colonialists build a sawmill, gristmill, and woolen mill at the site. There is a weekend/holiday admission fee and a campsite fee at the park.

Day Pond State Park, located in Colchester, offers trout fishing in a stocked pond, swimming, hiking, and picnicking. The pond, which is the central feature of the park, was originally constructed by a pioneering family to turn a large waterwheel that powered the family sawmill. Park visitors today will find only stone foundations as reminders of those colonial times. There is a weekend/holiday parking fee at the park.

Pachaug State Forest, located in Voluntown, is the largest state forest in Connecticut, encompassing 24,000 acres that are open for camping, hiking, fishing, horseback riding, boating, and winter sports such as cross-country skiing and snowmobiling. The Pachaug River, running from Beach Pond to the Quinebaug River, runs through the center of the forest. Old cellar holes and miles of stone fence winding through the woods give evidence that the entire forest was once farmed or pastured.

There are two main recreational areas in the Pachaug State Forest. The

Chapman Area offers year-round activities, and includes off-road camp sites, backpack camp sites, and horse camp sites, all available on a first come, first served basis. Three separate trail sections pass through this area. Beachdale Pond, located in this area, is stocked with trout and has natural bass, pickerel and bullhead fishing. The Green Falls Area has 18 wooded campsites that are available from the third Friday of April until Sept. 30. Four hiking trails pass through this area that also offers fresh-water fishing, picnicking, and hunting. Picnic areas and boat launch sites are available at both areas. Camp site fees are charged at both locations.

Nehantic State Forest, located in Lyme, is the first state forest in New London County. Purchased in 1925, the land is mostly covered with a second growth of hardwoods with a number of good trout streams in the forest. The state forest is open from 8 a.m. to sunset and offers hiking, swimming, and picnicking. A boat launch is available. There are no fees at Nehantic State Forest.

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
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

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GENERAL INFORMATION

EMERGENCY WARNING SIGNALS

YELLOW ALERT-A steady blast of 3 to 5 minutes duration by SUBASE whistle. This will indicate attack is probable and personnel are to report to designated shelter areas. Verbal instructions may be given for additional action to be taken.

RED ALERT-A warbling tone on SUBASE whistle for a 3 minute duration. This will indicate attack is imminent and personnel will seek immediate shelter. DO NOT try to go to designated shelter area unless they are very close. Find the best shelter available and use it.

RADCON ALERT-A series of 9 short blasts 3 times in succession will be sounded on the SUBASE whistle. This indicates a Radiological emergency or drill in progress. Take cover in the nearest building or shelter.

GENERAL SECURITY ALERT-A series of 2 three second blasts on the SUBASE whistle every five seconds for three minutes will be sounded. Follow instructions announced over SUBASE PA system.

ALL CLEAR SIGNAL-3 short blasts on SUBASE whistle of 3 minute duration. Verbal instructions will be passed when warranted.

EMERGENCY NUMBERS

SECTION I - CONTROLS

A. COMMAND CONTROL It is the responsibility of all Commands to inaugurate whatever controls necessary to assure nonabuse of official telephones.

B. UNOFFICIAL/PERSONAL CALLS Are defined as those made or received primarily for the benefit of the individual concerned rather than for the benefit of the Government. The following policy is established with reference to unofficial calls:

1. Unofficial or personal local calls to surrounding areas MAY NOT be made from an official telephone, unless it meets the criteria of SECNAVINST 2305.11. Pay stations are provided throughout the area for all other unofficial calls. (SECNAVINST 2305.11 Refers).
2. Incoming unofficial calls to official telephones should be discouraged since they tie up official trunk lines which are urgently needed for official government traffic,

C. SECURITY

1. The discussion of classified material over the telephone is prohibited.
2. Operators are not authorized to divulge operational information regarding probable schedules, movements, arrivals, or departures of any unit of Forces Afloat. For official ship arrival information dial extension 4616.

D. MONITORING

1. DOD telephone communications systems are provided for the transmission of official Government information only and are subject to communications security monitoring at all times. Subparagraph 5c of SECNAVINST 2305.10 requires that all users of DOD telephone systems be specifically advised.

USE OF TELEPHONE SYSTEMS CONSTITUTES CONSENT TO MONITORING.

SECTION II - LONG DISTANCE CALLS

A. OFFICIAL LONG DISTANCE CALLS

1. The Secretary of Defense has directed that stringent administrative action be taken to reduce the current requirements for telephone services, that commands initiate procedures necessary to restrict the use of electrical communications systems, and provide for a post transmittal review of long distance calls as a command rather than a communication function. Pursuant to these directives, the use of telephone service for long distance calling will be restricted to matters of such urgency that no other means of communications will suffice. Long distance calls will not be authorized when use of letter or the Navy's message system may be SUBSTITUTED in lieu thereof.
2. A period of indoctrination of newly assigned personnel is recommended in the proper use of telephones prior to placing long distance telephone calls. All long distance calls placed on DSN or WATS will be placed station to station and should bear the scrutiny of a commercial toll call.

B. LONG DISTANCE SYSTEMS

1. DSN - USE DSN ON ALL CALLS TO DOD ACTIVITIES. LONG DISTANCE CALLS WILL BE LOGGED IN ACCORDANCE WITH COMSUBLANTINST 5400.4.
 - a. *General.* DSN is the principal long-haul voice communications network within the Defense Communications Systems. DSN provides non-secure direct distance dialing service worldwide through a system of Government owned and leased automatic switching facilities. The purpose of DSN is to handle essential command and control, operations, intelligence, logistic, diplomatic, and administrative traffic.

GENERAL INFORMATION

- b. Use of DSN: (Refer to OPNAVINST 2305.13)
1. Will be authorized for only official communications.
 2. Will be restricted to:
 - a. Only those calls that are essential requiring a timeliness that cannot be obtained by other means and would stand the scrutiny afforded a commercial toll call.
 - b. The minimum time required to accomplish the official business and will not normally exceed five minutes.
 - c. The use of graphic, facsimile, or nonsecured voice-data devices only when approved by the Chiefs of the Military Services and heads of DOD agencies or activities. Voice data facsimile and graphic service in DSN will normally not exceed a continuous transmission time of 15 minutes nor a total transmission time of one hour during normal business hours.
 3. Will not be authorized for:
 - a. Direct or indirectly used by a non-appropriated fund activity (clubs, exchanges, and other unofficial activities) provided telephone service at post, camp, station, or base level except when approved by the Joint Chiefs of Staff.
 - b. Calls within an installation, metropolitan area, or those confined geographical areas where existing Government provided local telephone service is adequate.
 - c. Unofficial/personal calls.
 - d. Off-net extension of calls into the commercial system at a distance PBX/PABX, except where such extension has been previously approved by the local authorities controlling the switchboard.

C. DSN User Trouble Assistance. When trouble is encountered by users while utilizing DSN, the following procedures should be taken:

1. Retain the circuit connection and report the trouble immediately to the local operator via another telephone.
2. Give the details of the DSN troubles as follows:
 - a. Your extension number and location.
 - b. The DSN number and location of the called party.
 - c. Brief description of trouble and the time it occurred. Items requiring repair (such as frayed cords and broken telephone parts) are not DSN troubles and should be reported to the telephone Supervisor at extension 3832.

D. Commercial. Toll Calls are billed by the telephone company at the PREVAILING rate on a monthly basis.

SECTION III - AFLOAT PHONES

A. Afloat phones are installed for official government business only. Telephones installed onboard ship are governed by the same directives applicable to all other official telephones served by the telephone system. Commanding Officers are responsible for instituting positive control of all telephones installed on their ships to prevent use of such phones for unofficial purposes.

SECTION IV - REQUEST FOR TELEPHONE SERVICE

A. All requests for telephone service shall be submitted via an authorized official of the activity using Exhibit 1A. Sufficient notice is required by the telephone company to schedule the work and to order necessary material and equipment. Therefore, requests should be submitted as far in advance as possible of the date the service is desired. The following timetable is provided as a guide:

1. One to five telephones involved - approximately 14 workdays
 2. Six to ten telephones involved - approximately 20 workdays
- Major changes/improvements to user's existing telephone system must be approved by the Commanding Officer, Naval Submarine Base New London.

B. Programming changes, i.e., change phone number, class of service, call pickup, hunting, etc., are performed by the Telephone Communications Office (Building 77).

C. Changes other than those requested on the form cannot be made without the approval of the Commanding Officer, Naval Submarine Base New London. The telephone company's installer is not authorized to make changes to any order.

D. Special equipment (i.e. speaker phones, key-sets, etc.) may be requested on a telephone request, but it must include justification and or funding.

GENERAL INFORMATION

SECTION V - TELEPHONE OWNERSHIP

A. Reporting Trouble with a Telephone During normal working hours (Monday thru Friday 0730 - 1600) call the Telephone Manager at extension 3832 and provide the following information:

1. Number of telephone in trouble
2. Building, Room and Deck
3. Nature of trouble
4. Point of contact for telephone number in trouble
5. After hours, weekends and holidays call the Communications Watch Officer at ext. 3619 or 3864 and provide the above listed information.

SECTION VI - DIALING PROCEDURES

A. Always Listen for Dial Tone Before Dialing a Number

1. *Dial "8" for DSN network plus 7 digit number in CONUS, add area code for OCONUS.
2. *Dial "9" for off-base calls (CONUS) wide. Dial "9" and 7 digits for local Connecticut. Dial 9 - 1 - Area Code and seven digits for CT toll. Dial 9 - 1 area code and seven digits for CONUS wide access. NOTE: Facilities are maintained within the Department of Defense for the most economical and efficient placing of long-distance calls. To keep cost at a minimum, military departments must ensure that only official calls of short duration be made over Department of Defense facilities.

B. Personal Calls. Navy telephones will be used for official calls only. Public telephones have been installed throughout SUBASE NLON for personnel convenience. Unauthorized, fraudulent and/or misuse of the telephones will result in disciplinary action.

C. DOD Official Telephone Credit Card Users.

1. Telephone credit cards are intended for official use when the authorized credit card holder is away from their permanent duty station and has a requirement to place and official call.
2. Credit cards will not be used by DOD officials to make calls from their permanent duty station.

D. Standard Features

1. Call Forwarding. To temporarily redirect all calls, first dial the call forward code "**2" then you'll hear a dial tone. Dial the extension or phone number where calls are to be sent. You'll get a confirmation tone, then hang up. To cancel call forwarding, dial the call forward cancel code "#2" and listen for the confirmation code.

2. Transfer. To send the present call to another number, press "R" or flash the switchhook. You'll get the recall dial tone (three short tones followed by a dial tone). Dial the number to which the call is to be transferred. If you stay on the line, the call will be transferred when you hang up your phone.

3. Conference Calling. To add another party to a call, press "R" or flash the switchhook. You'll get the recall dial tone. Dial the number of your third party. You can discuss the call privately with the third party at this time. If the line is busy or there is no answer, press "R" twice or flash the switchhook twice to return to the original party. To put everyone on the call, press "R" or flash the switchhook and announce the call. Conferences up to 6 participants can be made through the use of a Switch Feature called MeetMe (trademark) Conference Bridge. To add this permanently assigned feature, you must use a TSR form to order.

4. Call Pickup. To answer a call placed to your pickup group when your phone is idle, dial the pickup code "*7".

5. Send All Calls. To send all calls (except priority calls) to coverage, dial the send all calls code "*3" and wait for the confirmation tone. Then hang up.

SECTION VII - TELEPHONE DIRECTORIES

A. Telephone directories are provided as an aid to good telephone service and are the property of the U.S. Government. Directories are classified as "FOR OFFICIAL USE ONLY" and are limited in number. Removal of directories from the naval complex is not authorized.

B. Changes to this directory shall be submitted AS THEY OCCUR to Communications Officer, Box 200, Bldg. 138, Naval Submarine Base New London, Groton, CT 06349-5000.

SECTION VIII - SERVICE DURING AN EMERGENCY

A. Use of Telephones.

DO NOT USE YOUR TELEPHONE DURING A GENERAL EMERGENCY OR A CONDITION OF DISASTER, EXCEPT FOR EMERGENCY OFFICIAL CALLS. Do not call the Base Operator for information concerning the conditions of the emergency as this information will not be furnished.

SECTION IX - PAY STATION SERVICE

A. All requests shall be directed to the Navy Exchange Officer, Box 21.
