Children visit parents on the job

NUWC's 'Bring A Child to Work Day' draws 370

MIDDLETOWN — More than 370 children had the day off from school April 28, but not from education.

They were the sons and daughters of scientists and engineers at the Naval Undersea Warfare Center Division, Newport, who came to their parents' workplace for the annual "Bring A Child to Work Day."

Between 8:30 and 1 p.m. the children watched demonstrations in various

labs such as Lasers - Remote Detection of Pulse Waveform; Navy Swimmer Defense; The Energy of Sound; and took a tour of the Propulsion Test Facility. These were just a few of the 26 scientific and engineering demonstrations prepared for the kids.

The youths, between the ages of 9 and 17, were given not only the opportunity to get a glimpse of where mom and dad work, but also the chance to experi-

ence some of the numerous scientific projects real world scientists and engineers work on for the Navy on a day-to-day basis, said John H. Woodhouse Jr., Communications Specialist at NUWC.

Adapted from the *Ms. Foundation's* Take Your Daughter to Work Day, Bring A Child to Work Day encourages the full potential, access and participation of a diverse workforce of men and women.

Though bin Laden is gone, many worry, 'What's next?'

WASHINGTON — News of the death of al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden last Sunday drew mixed emotions from those who lost relatives and friends on Sept. 11, 2001, and military families fighting the war on terrorism, according to Elaine Sanchez who wrote the American Force Press article, "Survivors Call bin Laden's Death 'Bittersweet.'"

There is a sense of elation coupled with a sense of caution about what lies ahead, she discovered.

Wendy Duffman, whose brother died in Afghanistan, said she first felt elated when she heard the news.

"I woke up for the first time in four years feeling like my brother didn't die in vain," Duffman said.

However, she also cautioned against complacency. "I don't want people to forget there are others like bin Laden," she said. "The war isn't over. We still have troops in harm's way."

Lisa Dolan called the news "bittersweet." Her husband, Navy Capt. Bob

Dolan, was killed in the Pentagon on 9/11 when Flight 77 struck the building.

"Nothing will bring back my husband and the almost 3,000 men, women and children that were killed on Sept. 11, 2011," she said. "Is there some vindication in the death of bin Laden? Maybe.

"However, I do feel incredibly proud of our military," she continued. "They have sacrificed so much for our freedoms."

After the death of bin Laden in Pakistan, he received a Muslim ceremony and was buried at sea, a senior defense official said Monday in Washington.

The Navy News Service said the religious rites were performed aboard the aircraft carrier USS Carl Vinson (CVN 70) in the North Arabian Sea and occurred within 24 hours of the al-Qaida leader's death, said the official.

"Preparations for at-sea (burial) began at 1:10 a.m. Eastern Standard Time and were completed at 2 a.m.," said the official.

The burial followed traditional Muslim burial customs, and bin Laden's body was washed and placed in a white sheet, said the official.

"The body was placed in a weighted bag. A military officer read prepared religious remarks, which were translated into Arabic by a native speaker," the official added.

Afterward, bin Laden's body was placed onto a flat board, which was then elevated upward on one side and the body slid off into the sea.

The deceased terrorist was buried at sea because no country would accept bin Laden's remains, a senior defense official said.

HURREX 2011 tests NAVSTA for storm readiness

A severe tropical storm that worked its way northeast along the East Coast into southern New England and Narragansett Bay brought destructive winds, widespread area flooding and a tornado to Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport during HURREX/Citadel Gale (CG) 2011.

HURREX/CG 11, the annual Navy-wide hurricane preparedness exercise conducted by U.S. Fleet Forces Command (USFF); and Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC), April 25 to May 3, was designed to prepare the Navy to respond to weather threats to U.S. coastal regions, maintain the ability to deploy even under the most adverse weather conditions, and to plan recovery efforts.

NAVSTA's exercise took place April 25-29 during working hours with no impact on traffic or routine operations.

A simulated tropical storm that was developing in the Caribbean on April 25 prompted CNIC to order the setting of Tropical Cyclone Condition of Readiness (TCCOR) 5 at all Navy shore installations along

the East Coast.

TCCOR 5 represents the onset of destructive winds possible of at least 50 knots within 96 hours. As winds were predicted to gain strength along the track of the simulated storm, the setting of TCCOR 4 through 1 was ordered.

"NAVSTA Newport set and attained their conditions of readiness (COR) during the week long exercise," said Matt Brady, installation training coordinator. Base operations during the TCCOR countdown was business as usual.

By April 28 (TCCOR 2), the simulated tropical storm was downgraded but still struck NAVSTA Newport with 50 or more knot winds. NAVSTA Newport's emergency operations center (EOC) was activated at 8 a.m., April 29 (TCCOR 1).

At TCCOR 1, NAVSTA Newport departments, when authorized by the Commanding Officer, NAVSTA Newport, would operate with essential personnel only in the event of

local severe tropical weather conditions or heavy snowfall conditions.

Information injects to the EOC were prompted by an exercise white cell.

Response and recovery planning were part of the training scenario.

"The flow of message traffic between police dispatch and the command duty officer to EOC operations demonstrated

good teamwork," said Steve Moore, NAVSTA Newport Emergency Management Officer.

NAVSTA Newport's fire department apparatus was deployed to affected buildings to pump out simulated flooded ground floor areas.

Use of damage assessment teams from NAVFAC/Public Works were part of the response planning.

Medical lab professionals seen critical to treatment

More than 10 billion medical laboratory tests are performed in the United States each year to confirm diagnoses, rule out suspected conditions or monitor treatment. Between 70

and 80 percent of all medical decisions made by physicians are based on test results from a clinical laboratory.



Contemporary China offers opportunities, NWC scholars claim

Professor Lyle Goldstein, Director of the China Maritime Studies Institute (CMSI) at the Naval War College, presented *China, the United States and 21st Century Sea Power: Defining a Maritime Security Partnership* at the latest Eight Bells Lecture held April 28.

This book is the fourth in the series, *Studies in Chinese Maritime Development*, put out by CMSI and the Naval Institute Press.

It is estimated that by 2019, China will equal the Gross Domestic Product (GDP) of the United States and then begin to outdistance the U.S. economy. Militarily, the Chinese continue to improve in technology and weaponry as demonstrated by the development of the J-20 fighter jet, the Don Feng 21A missile, and the Type 094 Jin-class submarine.

While such things can be viewed as worrisome and confrontational, there exists the opportunity to expand and improve U.S.

–Chinese relations on a variety of fronts, the editors said.

The CMSI is well-placed to contribute to the discussions. Their involvement has been through conferences, authoring working papers on a series of topics, becoming a forum for speakers and offering to provide professional development to various agencies, particularly fleet and joint commands.

All of this has the ultimate goal of improving U.S. military relations with the People's Republic of China. Some of the key confidence and security building measures that are being promoted are operational and tactical-level links among units, exchange programs, search and rescue operations, counter-terrorism, environmental stewardship, sea lane security, and disaster relief.

"National Recognition Day for Nurses" was proclaimed by President Reagan in 1982.





all types of military operations.

LCHR graduates were from Armenia, Bulgaria, Gabon, Lesotho, Mongolia, Mozambique and Turkey.

"I will be focusing on the international treaties and advising my country on issues of human rights and international humanitarian law," said the participant from Mozambique, who is his country's officer for international military cooperation between Europe and the Americas.

"We received very important knowledge here that should help us be successful," said a partici-

pant from Bulgaria, adding, "We all want to make the world a better place," he said.

Also graduating from the LCHR program were 10 international military and civilian legal advisers. These participants attended the LCHR course as a component of the Military Law Development Program (MLDP) at DIILS. MLDP participants will receive additional instruction on military justice and international law.

These graduates were from Albania, Botswana, the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Ghana, Latvia, Lithuania, Pakistan and

Turkey.

"This has been a rigorous program for you. You had a lot to think about and discuss with your class members," said Cmdr. Jonathan H. Wagshul, JAGC, director, acting, DIILS.

"I'm confident that you will feel this has been time well spent," he said.

NAVSTA creates channel for Westerly's duck race

WESTERLY – Naval Station (NAVSTA) Newport Environmental, Port Operations and a handful of environmental contractors returned to Westerly early last Saturday to set the race course for the 13th annual Pawcatuck River Duck Race, said Mark J. Rielly, Hazardous Waste/Spill Program manager, NAVFAC Mid-Atlantic, NAVSTA Newport Environmental.

NAVSTA's participation provides the Navy with the opportunity to enhance community relations, and also satisfy one of two mandatory annual exercises to deploy fuel spill containment equipment.

NAVSTA provided 1,200 feet of response boom, one 19-foot Boston Whaler, and one 10-foot Zodiac RHIB boat, besides the labor. It was the 11th year the Navy was involved.

The race of the yellow bathtub toys down the river on the Westerly/Pawcatuck, Conn., state line is a fundraiser for schools and charities. Each duck is numbered and sold for \$5. The first ducks to the finish line win prizes for their owners.

The day started with fun and festivities at Donahue Park, with food concessions, rock wall climb, moon bounce, kids games, face painting and clowns in downtown Westerly and Donahue Park.

At 3 p.m. the main race began when a huge construction payloader dumped 20,000 ducks off the Pawcatuck River Bridge into the fast-moving current. It took less than 3 minutes for the lead ducks to reach a special trap at the finish line.

Over 90 prizes were awarded, including one for the last place duck. The grand prize was a trip for a family of four to Disney World in Orlando, Fla., including air fare, hotel and park passes, or \$2,500 cash.
