



Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base, Texas

The U.S. Navy has been the host of Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base since the installation was designated a Joint Reserve Base in 1994. Today, NAS Fort Worth JRB is comprised of Army, Navy, Marine Corps, Air Force and Texas Air National Guard commands, along with several non-military tenants that support its 11,000 military and civilian employees. With almost two dozen major and subordinate Navy aviation and shore commands calling NAS Fort Worth JRB their home, the Navy has the most military members assigned to the installation. Marine Aircraft Group 41

Marine Aircraft Group 41, also known as “America’s MAG,” is one of the largest aircraft groups in 4th Marine Aircraft Wing. Unlike other Reserve Marine Air Groups, all of MAG-41’s squadrons are co-located in one area, NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas.

MAG-41’s organic squadrons are Marine Fighter Attack Squadron 112 (VMFA-112), which flies the F/A-18A+ Hornet; Marine Aerial Refueler Transport Squadron 234 (VMRG-234), which flies the KC-130T Hercules cargo plane; and Marine Aviation Logistics Squadron 41 (MALS-41), which is an Intermediate Maintenance Facility with a joint integrated maintenance department of both Navy and Marine Corps personnel.

The aircraft group also maintains two detachments, Marine Wing Support Squadron 473, Detachment Bravo (MWSS-473, Det. B), which is a combat engineer detachment with heavy equipment operators; and Marine Air Control Squadron 24, Air Traffic Control, Detachment Alpha, (MACS-24 ATC, Det. A), which is an air traffic control and radar operations unit.

14th Marines Regiment

When directed, 14th Marine Regiment provides the Marine Air Ground Task Force with a Force Artillery Headquarters in order to command, control, and coordinate Force Artillery delivered fires. On order, 14th Marines assume the civil military operations mission for the MAGTF with focus on coordinating and achieving unity of effort among all forces and non-military organizations participating in stability operations in the MAGTF's battle space.

Currently the 14th Marine Regiment has executed a wide variety of operations and exercises to include: deployment of battalions, batteries, platoons, and detachments in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom (OIF), Operation Enduring Freedom (OEF), Ulchi Freedom Guardian (UFG), and Key Resolve. Every unit has deployed Marines in support of OIF or OEF to this date, while continuing to support community events and Military Funeral Honors for deceased Marine Corps veterans throughout the United States.

The Regiment consists of many units across the nation, with the Headquarters Battery based on board NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas. - *At The Ready!*

10th Air Force

Maj. Gen. Frank J. Padilla is the Commander, 10th Air Force, NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas. His command includes all fighter, bomber, special operations, rescue, airborne warning and control, flying training, combat air operations battle staff, unoccupied aerial vehicle and space units in the Air Force Reserve Command. These units are gained by the Air Combat Command, Air Force Special Operations Command, Pacific Air Forces, Air Force Space Command, and the Air Education and Training Command.

Tenth Air Force, located at NAS Fort Worth JRB, Texas, directs the activities of 13,071 reservists and more than 3,500 civilians located at over 30 military installations throughout the United States.

The mission of the Tenth Air Force is to exercise command supervision over assigned Reserve units to ensure they maintain the highest combat capability in support of national objectives.

With approximately 90 full-time headquarters staff



members, Tenth Air Force acts as the focal point for all matters pertaining to assigned Air Force Reserve units and individuals. With the assistance of 98 traditional reservists assigned, the headquarters monitors and provides assistance to all subordinate units to help resolve problem areas and more efficiently maintain unit combat readiness.

301st Fighter Wing

The 301st Fighter Wing provides Combatant Commanders and Major Commands with the combat-ready Airmen they need to operate our Expeditionary Air Force, fight and win America's wars, and protect our worldwide interests . . . focused on training, mobilization, deployment, and employment.

The 301st Fighter Wing's commander is Colonel Richard Scobee. The wing is equipped with the F-16C+ Fighting Falcon, and has a rich history in the Air Force Reserve dating back to the mid-1940s and continues to make history.





AIR NATIONAL GUARD TEXAS

136th Airlift Wing

The 136th Airlift Wing is one of three flying units in the Texas Air National Guard and is comprised of the 136th Operations Group, 136th Maintenance Group, 136th Mission Support Group, 136th Medical Group, and the 531st Air Force Band.

The 136th Airlift Wing is responsible for organizing, equipping and training personnel for worldwide deployment, provides combat-ready forces to combatant commanders, and

supports the airlift requirements of the Commander, Air Mobility Command with eight assigned C-130H aircraft.

MISSION: To provide highly trained, equipped and motivated military forces for worldwide combat and peacetime tasking supporting the state of Texas and the nation. The flying mission includes short field and dirt strip landing, and airdrop delivery of cargo and people in all weather, day and night. The 136th has participated in nearly every major conflict and

relief operation to include operations in Vietnam, Panama, Africa, Desert Shield/Desert Storm, the South American counter-drug effort, and the Balkans.

ROLES: As a National Guard unit, the Wing has a dual role of serving the state of Texas under the command of the governor during peace time and state emergencies, and becoming part of the active duty forces under the command of the president during wartime or other national emergency.



ARMY RESERVE AVIATION

Army Reserve Aviation is amply represented on NAS Fort Worth JRB by B Company, 90th (Aviation) Support Battalion and the Corps Support Aviation Company. Both units are part of the 11th Aviation Regiment, the Aviation functional command of the United States Army Reserve.

“Baker” Co. is an Aviation Intermediate Maintenance Company whose primary mission is the repair

and refurbishment of Army aircraft and aircraft components. The unit is capable of repairing the UH60A/L Blackhawk, CH47D Chinook and AH64D Apache helicopter in addition to a wide range of aircraft components.

The 90th ASB is a multifunctional support element of the 244th Aviation Brigade, capable of full spectrum support of the Aviation war fighter.

The Corps Support Aviation Company (CSAC) flies C-12 Aerial Reconnaissance Multi Sensor (ARMS) King Air aircraft. The company conducts the Reconnaissance, Surveillance and Target Acquisition mission in support of the ground war fighter. Using the sophisticated equipment on the aircraft the aircrew can identify, coordinate and engage the enemy across the spectrum of conflict.
