

## Joint program office proceeds to operational tests

PANAMA CITY, Fla. — The Deployable Joint Command and Control (DJC2) program has just received Pentagon approval to deploy its first systems for full operational testing in an upcoming warfighter exercise. Approval of this major program milestone takes DJC2, one of the Secretary of Defense's top technology transformation programs, another step closer to meeting its ambitious goal of delivering its first production systems to the Joint Warfighter in Fiscal Year 2005, just 18 months after program startup. This is the second successful acquisition milestone that DJC2 has achieved in the past 12 months — an extraordinarily short period of time for

a major defense acquisition program.

DJC2 is a Navy-led joint program, which is producing a deployable, scalable, and reconfigurable headquarters command and control (C2) and collaboration capability for each Regional Combatant Commander (RCC). Designed and demonstrated with the Defense Information System Agency (DISA) fielded Global Command and Control System-Joint (GCCS-J) as the C2 software baseline, the DJC2 system is integrated with other unique application software, computer servers, communications and cryptographic gear, "quick-erect" tents, electrical power generation, environmental control equipment, and ancillary of-

## New base chaplain ready, eager to support all

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY — For 11 years, Naval Support Activity Panama City's new chaplain served as an ammunition technician in the Marine Corps Reserves and preached the word of God to Marines during drill weekends. Even though Benjamin Howard, now a Navy Lt. J.G. was not yet ordained and his Marine Corps job had nothing to do with the ministry, Howard felt compelled to get God's word to the Marines.

After Howard earned his theology degree from Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in Wake Forest, N.C., he decided that he wanted to preach to more people. He wanted a bigger audience. So, he joined the active-duty Navy and he is now Naval Support Activity Panama City, Fla.,'s new chaplain.

"I believe that the Lord called me to preach when I was 13 years old and living back in Greenville, S.C.,"

Howard said. "I knew what I wanted to do, but I also wanted to serve in the military so when I graduated high school, I joined the Marine Corps Reserve. I wanted to be a chaplain and as you know, Marines don't have chaplains. So since I wanted to stay around Marines, that lead me to the Navy. Now, I have the chance to preach to not only Marines, but also to Sailors and I am very proud of that opportunity."

Howard will also have the opportunity to reach even farther than the Department of the Navy. With joint services training or serving at NSA PC, in addition to foreign nationals and hundreds of civilians, Chaplain Howard's ministry may take him beyond his expectations.

Before reporting to NSA PC and while at home in Greenville, N.C., he was also a youth pastor and an associate pastor at Crosswell Baptist Church in his hometown.



PANAMA CITY, Fla – Every year since 1979, the President has proclaimed a national observance in May to celebrate the contributions and achievements of Asian and Pacific Islander Americans.

# Residential concerns for safety addressed

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY — Recent concerns over venomous snakes slithering around base housing prompted base officials to make facts known for residential safety.

“There is no record of any venomous snake bite in the Military Family Housing area of the Naval Support Activity Panama City,” said NSAPC Housing Manager Shirley Shoemaker. “Snakes are commonly seen in the housing area after heavy rains like we have encountered in the past few months, but no venomous snakes have been identified.”

Shoemaker said some people mistakenly call all snakes seen near water ‘water moccasins,’ but only the cottonmouth water moccasin is venomous. Most snakes seen along water edges are harmless water snakes. Both cottonmouths and water snakes may be very dark with rough scales, may attain lengths over 4 feet, and can be relatively thick-bodied.

Many species of snakes thrive in residential areas. They are found in every conceivable habitat from salt marshes to freshwater wetlands and dry uplands. Just six of Florida’s snake species are venomous, and only four of these are widespread, the snakes encountered locally are most likely to be nonpoisonous.

“Water snakes are distinguished from poisonous cottonmouths by their behavior and the shapes of their heads. Cottonmouths tend to stay put when encountered, are often coiled and, if sufficiently harassed, will give the open-mouth display that gives them their name,” Shoemaker. “Harmless water snakes are more likely to seek immediate escape when encountered.”

She said if a person is approached by a snake - stand back and observe it. Snakes don’t purposefully position themselves to frighten people. They’d much rather avoid encounters and usually

will flee. Snakes usually bite people only if they are bothered; it’s their only means of self-defense. “Most larger snakes travel in large areas, so one you see in your yard today may be far away tomorrow,” she said. “Do not leave doors cracked open, as small snakes have been known to crawl inside homes.”

fice support equipment.

It is a fully supported and sustained system of systems, complete with a logistics support infrastructure and a 24-hour help desk. This complex C2 system is being produced on a highly aggressive schedule to meet the military's urgent need for a standardized, yet re-adjustable capability that can be rapidly deployed to support a variety of Joint Task Force (JTF) missions. DJC2 provides all the applications and supporting infrastructure that a JTF Commander needs to plan operations, collaborate on viable courses of action, and execute command and control of his/her forces — all from a DJC2-provided command operations center set up in the actual theater of operations rather than from command headquarters.

The DJC2 Joint Program Office in Panama City, Fla., is overseeing the system Design and Development, Demonstration, Testing, Fielding, and Sustainment phases. The Naval Surface War-

fare Center Panama City (NSWC PC) is the prime government integrator of the system in the current increment, the first of three planned increments.

Approval to deploy the system for operational testing was granted by the Office of the Secretary of Defense (OSD) on March 23, 2005. The approval was based on the DJC2 program's successful performance during the system development and demonstration acquisition phase.

"This is truly an amazing accomplishment for everyone involved," Marine Corps Col. Drew Dwyer, the DJC2 program manager, said after last month's OSD approval. "Successful execution of a compressed schedule like DJC2's requires the utmost dedication and perseverance from many DoD stakeholders — military, government, and industry partners. Contributions from every level of government and support from all the Combatant Commands slated to receive

this unique capability were instrumental in making this program a model for future rapid acquisition programs. I am proud of the efforts of all the team members, but especially the dedication and perseverance of the government/industry team in the Joint Program Office and at the NSWC PC."

In addition to achieving two major milestones, in the past 12 months the program has: completed many iterative systems design reviews; tested a prototype in a warfighter exercise; integrated its first production-representative units; conducted several successful developmental tests; and delivered a non-deployable version of the system to its first customer, the U.S. Joint Forces Command, for use in concept of operations experimentation. The program is on schedule to deliver its first deployable production units to U.S. Pacific Command in September 2005, and to declare Initial Operational Capability (IOC) no later than March 2006.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Research, Development, and Acquisition, the Honorable John J. Young, Jr., recently praised the DJC2 program as "a great example" of rapid acquisition in action. "We remain on schedule to deliver this system just 18 months after program start," Young noted in a speech at a February conference of the Armed Forces Communications and Electronics Association, "proof that even in today's acquisition system, we can push the system to work."

"There is an incredible amount of work remaining to complete this effort," Dwyer said. "But I am confident the team will rise to the challenges ahead. We look forward to successful testing this spring and summer as well as delivery to our second customer (U.S. Pacific Command) later this year. It has been very rewarding to be a part of the team working to develop and deliver this 'transformational' program."
