Naval Support Activity Panama City, FL - A new Navy research, development, test, and evaluation facility, funded by a Florida Defense Alliance grant, officially opened on Panama City Beach on October 13th.

This facility is located at one of four sites operated by the Naval Surface Warfare Center, Panama City (NSWC PC) along the beach for controlling and monitoring research tests and Naval exercises in the Gulf of Mexico. The eastern most beach site, near the entrance to St. Andrews State Park, was chosen because it is the least subject to further encroachment. A ribbon-cutting ceremony for the new building was held to commemorate the occasion, when Bay County turned the keys to the building over to the Naval Support Activity Panama City.

"This is more than a building," said

John Auzins, senior systems test and evaluation engineer at NSWC PC. "It's more of a partnership between the county, state and test and evaluation community."

NSWC PC applied for and received a grant from the Florida Defense Alliance to build the new Coastal Test Operations Center to expand test range command and control capabilities. The \$759,400 grant provided for construction of a new command and control center that will improve the Warfare Center's ability to perform its research, development, test, and evaluation mission.

The Florida Defense Alliance, an initiative of Enterprise Florida, was created in 1998 to ensure that Florida, its military bases and their host communities, efficiently support and enhance Department of Defense transformational initiatives. The grant for the new facility is the first awarded to the naval activity



We are expecting seven ships in total: mine hunters and mine countermeasures vessels *USS Avenger*, (MCM1); *USS Warrior* (MCM 10); *USS Blackhawk*, (MHC 58); *USS Robin*, (MHC 54); *USS Cormorant*, (MHC 57), and two Canadian MCDVs, *HMCS Summerside* and *HMCS Moncton*.

This is definitely one of the biggest exercises yet, with the most ships we have seen at our

Also during this week, a group of approximately 20 foreign naval attaches will be touring the base and visiting several tenant commands. These foreign visitors are the liaisons between our CNO and his counterparts representing the navies of the world.

For several reasons, not the least of which is that every person on this activity should be an ambassador for visitors from the local area or the other side the world, whether or not they have a few stars sprinkled on their collar. "Here in the state of Florida we're fortunate that we have a governor who really understands the value of the military and is very supportive of all military installations," said Larry Dantzer, president of the non-profit Bay Defense Alliance, a local organization that works with the Florida Defense Alliance in the grant submission process.

Bay County engineer John Alaghemand managed the construction project, working closely with NSA Public Works head of engineering and planning Harold Stansberry and Robert Arnold, NSA engineer in

charge of the project. Dantzer recognized retired NSA deputy Public Works Officer Don Green and NSWC test engineer Dennis Wilson as being instrumental in the early phases of the project. Dantzer thanked Kolmetz Construction Company, the prime contractor on the project, for holding to the bidding price through the complex process of transitioning funds.

Florida's military bases are highly valued by the nation and by Florida's communities, with defense-related spending directly or indirectly responsible for \$44 billion, or 9.8 percent, of Florida's gross state product.

Recognizing National Disability Employment Awareness Month

On September 30, 2005 President George W. Bush proclaimed October as National Disability Employment Awareness Month. The month of October marks the 60th anniversary recognizing the employment of people with disabilities.

In 1988 Congress designated October as National Disability Employment Awareness Month. Yet there had been a long effort before 1988 to make the public aware of issues related to disability and employment.

It first began in 1945 when Congress enacted a law that declared the first week in October of each year as "National Employ the Physically Handicapped Week." By 1962, the work "physically" had been removed so as to acknowledge the employment

needs and contributions of individuals with all types of disabilities.

How are individuals with disabilities represented in the national workforce? A 2004 National Organization on Disability-Harris Survey came up with some answers. It found that 35% of working-age people with disabilities are working. Compare this to 78% of those without disabilities that are working. Of the individuals with disabilities that are unemployed, two-thirds of the respondents would like to work but could not find jobs.

What has been done since 1988 when congress designated October as National Disability Employment Awareness Month to make progress in employment for people with disabilities? In 1990, President George H. Bush signed into law the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). The purpose of the ADA was to reduce the barriers for those

that have a disability. The ADA also provided for the elimination of discrimination based on disability in the workplace and in the community. It is illegal for an employer to discriminate against an applicant for employment or an employee based on their disability.

In the recent administration of President George W. Bush a New Freedom Initiative has been established. This initiative is designed to expand access to assistive technologies, education and opportunities for people with disabilities so that they can integrate into the workforce. President Bush also signed into law the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act. The purpose of the Disabilities Education Act is to prepare people with disabilities with the education needed for the job opportunities that are available.

The Department of Labor, Office Of Disability Employ-

ment Policy, provides a variety of information that is pertinent to employees and employers regarding issues related to an applicant or employee with a disability. The web site is located at <http://www.dol.gov/odep/pubs/publicat.htm>. Information provided by the Department of Labor and laws such as those enacted by Congress are instrumental in providing the protection and the opportunities to people with disabilities so that they can

pursue jobs based on education, skills and experience that are needed for the job. However, it is also up to each individual to change attitudes that are not consistent with the law or that are not consistent with looking at the capabilities of an applicant or employee that is not based on their qualifications. People with disabilities make an important contribution to what comprises a diverse and highly qualified workforce.

E-8 Associate Degree Initiative to Begin with FY2011 Selection Board

PENSACOLA, Fla. – The Navy is announcing an educational initiative designed to encourage senior enlisted personnel to seek degrees to complement their Navy training and experience. Beginning in fiscal year 2011, an associate degree or equivalent that is rating-relevant will be a prerequisite for advancement to senior chief petty officer for active and Reserve personnel. This initiative is part of the Navy's evolving Human Capital Strategy and is an integral component of the Professional Military Education (PME) Continuum, which supports post-secondary education as a means of preparing Sailors for the highly technical 21st century Navy.

"As the Navy continues to develop

high-tech capabilities and reduce the size of its workforce, Sailors will be called upon to perform in new and challenging ways," said Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy Terry D. Scott. "Adapting to these challenges will require Sailors to have a strong educational foundation - both professionally and personally. Degree programs that focus on rating-relevant education will better prepare Sailors to face those challenges in the operational environment by capitalizing on existing military training and experience."

"When Sailors begin working toward their degrees they will discover the value of their Navy training and experience," said Vice Adm. Gerry Hoewing, Chief of Naval Personnel. Most will find they are more than half way to the degree based on their accomplishments already," he added.

Adding the associate degree initiative a prerequisite for advancement to senior chief has been in the works since the PME Continuum was announced in NAVADMIN 263/04. Before making the final decision, however, Navy officials worked to develop the right plan to phase the program into practice.

Recognizing that some Sailors may have already begun to pursue their post-secondary education goals and that the civilian skills of Reserve component Sailors may support the Navy mission, Navy officials have established the following exemptions that satisfy the new policy for Sailors who have completed, or are enrolled in degree programs prior to Oct. 1, 2006:

- A) Sailors who currently have an associate degree or higher.
- B) Sailors who are enrolled in any

associate degree program and complete all requirements before Jan. 1, 2008.

C) Sailors who are enrolled in any baccalaureate degree program and complete at least 50 percent of degree requirements before Jan. 1, 2008.

Sailors may elect to enroll in a rating-relevant baccalaureate degree program from an accredited institution in lieu of an associate degree, but must complete a minimum of 50 percent of the degree requirements to be eligible for FY 2011 E8 selection board and beyond.

"Selected Reserve Sailors have an additional option to satisfy the degree requirement," said NETC Force Master Chief Mike McCalip. "With the exception of Full-Time Support (FTS) Reservists, Reserve Sailors may satisfy

OPNAVINST 1752.2A is the official guideline for the management of the Navy Family Advocacy Program (FAP), whereas, The Department of Defense (DOD) and Secretary of the Navy (SECNAV) have similar instructions. Domestic Violence is any form of spouse and/or child abuse or neglect.

Spouse and child abuse has a negative effect upon military readiness, effectiveness, and good order and discipline. This is a leadership issue! Commanding officers will undertake a continuous effort to reduce and eliminate child and spouse abuse at every level of the command. When suspected child or spouse abuse by a service member comes to the attention of the members commanding officer, he or she will take prompt action to include holding the member accountable for his or her behavior. Additionally, commanding officers shall undertake measures to prevent further violence to the victim(s), and promote victim safety.

The Naval Support Activity, Panama City has a well-established

Family Advocacy Program to both prevent and hold offenders accountable for domestic violence. Each tenant command has an assigned FAP representative who answers directly to their commanding officer concerning FAP issues. Dr. Bill Cavitt, NSA PC, is the FAP Program Manager who will guide the investigation and reporting of any form of Domestic violence (not to interfere with Security, NCIS, DCF or Local Police). His job is to ensure that proper FAP procedures are followed and timely reports are made.

The command FAP Reps are responsible for gathering facts, making service member

available and following through on Case Review Committee (CRC) recommendations. Dr. Cavitt will work very closely with command security, medical, chaplain, NCIS, housing, and commanding officer representatives concerning FAP issues. The designated FAP command representatives are:

the requirement by obtaining either a rating-relevant degree or a degree relevant to their civilian occupation.”

A visit to the nearest Navy College Office will help Sailors get started on their degree program, according to McCalip.

“The Navy College Program Distance Learning Partnerships (NCPDLP) offer a number of rating-relevant degree programs at colleges throughout the country to help Sailors earn their post-secondary degrees,” McCalip said. “These Servicemembers Opportunity Colleges (SOC) apply the greatest amount of the American Council on Education (ACE) recommended credit that the Sailor has already earned from Navy training and experience, and they accept considerable credit by examination. They also provide

distance-learning opportunities and significant flexibility to complete degree requirements inside or outside the classroom.”

To further assist Sailors in pursuing a degree, the Navy developed an education degree roadmap for all Sailors and made it available through Navy Knowledge Online (NKO). Sailors using the roadmap will first verify their existing academic transcripts contained in their Electronic Training Jackets (ETJ) on NKO.

Since the new requirement does not go into effect until the selection boards for FY-11 convene, Sailors have adequate time to prepare themselves, according to McCalip. “Sailors actually have until November 2009 (at the beginning of fiscal year 2010) when the eligibility of time-in-rate candidates

will be validated for fiscal year 2011 selection boards,” explained McCalip. “This is an element of the PME Continuum. As Sailors become more senior, advanced education will provide them with more strategic perspectives, and develop more effective warfighting, management, and business practices.
