## Bronze Star Medal pinned on CENEODDIVE Director of Training

PANAMA CITY, Fla. – The president has authorized an officer at the Center for Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Diving (CENEODDIVE) to wear the Bronze Star Medal for his service in Operation Enduring Freedom.

Lt. j.g. Mike Monroe, the director of training at CENEODDIVE, had his Bronze Star Medal pinned on him by his commanding officer, Capt. Gary Windhorst at the Naval Diving and Salvage Training Center Monday. The medal has the Valor device, which identifies the award as resulting from

an act of combat heroism,

Monroe was nominated before returning from his deployment in Afghanistan by the Commander of Naval Special Warfare Command, Rear Adm. Joseph Maguire.

The Bronze Star Medal is awarded to any person distinguished by heroic or meritorious service while engaged in an action against an enemy of the United States, military operations involving conflict with an opposing foreign force, or while serving with friendly foreign forces engaged in an armed conflict against an opposing armed force.

The citation, read by

WASHINGTON (NNS) - Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Mike Mullen announced June 16 that he has selected Master Chief Petty Officer (SW/FMF) Joe Campa to succeed Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) (SS/AW) Terry D. Scott.

Campa currently serves as the Command Master

Chief for Joint Task Force Guantanamo Bay, Cuba.

“Master Chief Campa follows a legacy of tremendous service by MCPON Terry Scott,” said Mullen. “Master Chief Campa has the Fleet and Fleet Marine Force experience to represent our Sailors not only standing watch at sea and ashore, but also serving in non-traditional missions across the globe. I am looking forward to working with him as we continue to address

the important issues facing our Sailors and their families.”

A native of Lynwood, Calif., Campa enlisted in the Navy June 2, 1980, and completed Recruit Training and Hospital Corps “A” School in San Diego.

Campa was selected to the Command Master Chief (CMC) program in May 1999. His first CMC tour was aboard *USS Curtis Wilbur*


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# Don't be a statistic of deadly holiday weekend

July Fourth is the second deadliest holiday period of the year – just behind New Year's. In 2004, at least 253 people were killed in alcohol-related traffic crashes across America during the Fourth of July holiday period. Of those, 225 fatalities involved a driver, motorcycle operator or non-occupant with a Blood Alcohol Content level of .08 and higher – the legal limit in all 50 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

That is why Naval Support Activity Panama City joins with other national, state and local law enforcement and highway safety officials in working overtime this year to remind anyone planning to use alcohol while celebrating Independence Day that *"Buzzed Driving is Drunk*

With nearly half of all traffic fatalities over the July Fourth holiday being alcohol-related, we are asking everyone to help us get the word out that buzzed driving is indeed drunk driving and that the 'just one more for the road' attitude too often turns into a disaster without the support of

a sober designated driver.

Impaired driving is no accident—nor is it a victimless crime. Too many lives are being lost because too many people still don't understand that alcohol or drugs and driving just don't mix.

Drunk driving is one of America's deadliest problems. In 2004, more than 15,000

people died in highway crashes involving a driver or motorcycle operator with a BAC of only .01 or higher. Of those, nearly 13,000 were killed in crashes where the BAC was .08 or higher.

Alcohol plays a major role in motorcycle fatalities, affecting the skills essential to operate a motorcycle—balance and coordination. In 2004, 41 percent of the 1,672 motorcycle operators who died in single-vehicle crashes had BAC levels of .08 or higher. For fatal crashes in the same year, a higher percentage of motorcycle operators had BAC levels of .08 or higher than any other type of driver.

Much of the tragedy from drunk driving can be prevented by following a few simple precautions:

· Whenever you plan on using alcohol, designate your sober driver before going out, and give that person your keys;

· If you're impaired, call a taxi, use mass transit or

# Hunt appointed as program manager for DJC2

PANAMA CITY, Fla. — Dennis Bauman, program executive officer for C4I & Space, has appointed Stephen Hunt as program manager of the Deployable Joint Command and Control (DJC2) program. Hunt joined the DJC2 program in 2003 as acquisition manager, then served as its technical director and acting deputy program manager before being selected as program manager.

“Steve was chosen from a highly competitive field of excellent applicants. He brings proven management skills and significant program

experience,” Bauman said in announcing the appointment.

The DJC2 program is a Secretary of Defense and Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff, priority transformation initiative that is providing a standardized, rapidly deployable Joint C2 headquarters to Geographic Combatant Commanders. The DJC2 Joint Program Office is co-located in Panama City, Fla. with the program’s government integrator, the Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City.

Hunt’s prior leadership of DJC2 as acquisition manager and technical director was instrumental in positioning the DJC2 program to deliver its first production system to U.S.

Southern Command in fiscal year 2005, just 18 months after the program’s startup. His efforts also contributed significantly to the DJC2 program winning the 2005 David Packard Excellence in Acquisition Award, the highest acquisition award in the DoD.

Hunt has a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering from Virginia Tech, and a Master of Science degree in Science Management from the Florida Institute of Technology.

He is also a graduate of Harvard Business School’s Executive Management Program (PMD 76), and the Naval Sea System Command’s Commander’s Development Program.

# Meet the NSA PC Hurricane Case Manager

Last year Navy Families were challenged with facing disasters they never believed could happen to them. Hurricanes Katrina, Wilma, and Rita affected many Navy Families. In response to these disasters the Navy took a proactive role in ongoing post-hurricane relief efforts along the Gulf Coast region and in Key West, by establishing a support system for its personnel called "Task Force Navy Family".

Katrina alone affected over 18,000 military, civil service and family members. Thousands more were affected by Wilma and Rita. One major part of Task Force Navy Family are the Hurricane Case Managers. Even though Panama City was not severely affected by last year's hurricanes, hurricane victims coming from other installations found assistance

here.

The NSA PC Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) Hurricane Case Manger, Debra Forand, has directly assisted over 300 Navy personnel and families (military and civil service) with information and referrals to the Red Cross, Federal Emergency Management Agency, and other community agencies

since she arrived at the FFSC in October 2006. She has provided guidance and direction on evacuations and Safe Haven locations as well as orders for obtaining monetary reimbursement and assistance. Debra is NSA PC's FFSC Liaison to Navy Family Disaster Assistance, Task Force Navy Families, and Commander, Navy Installations

Command (CNIC).

Now that many of our families are well on their way to recovery, the Hurricane Case Managers and Navy Family Disaster Assistance are looking to the future. Their goal is to encourage Navy and civil service personnel and families to prepare and plan for this hurricane season. Forand's articles and flyers can be seen at the Navy Exchange, or found in the Plan of the Week, among other locations.

Forand has set up a special information site with hurricane information at the Fleet and Family Support Center for use. She also brings important "Lessons Learned" from the other Case Managers at the installations that were

severely affected like New Orleans, Gulf Port, and Key West.

If a hurricane should hit NSA PC to the extent that it affects our service members and their lives, first follow your Command's instructions and then contact Forand. Forand will provide guidance, information and referral about all of hurricane relief needs, including: FEMA, Red Cross, evacuation reimbursement (Safe Haven), and other basic needs (food, water, shelter, special needs, medical, etc.). She will offer on-going case management until all of basic needs are met. Forand can be found at the NSA PC Fleet and Family Support Center, Bldg 304, and reached at 234-4898.



# Scholarship to be established in honor of fallen soldier

PANAMA CITY, Fla. - Florida State University Panama City announced June 14 at a press conference the establishment of the Colonel William W. Wood Memorial Scholarship Endowment in honor of Army Col. William Wood, who, to this date, remains the highest-ranking U.S. officer to be killed during the war in Iraq. Friends and fam-

ily of Wood initiated the effort to endow a \$25,000 scholarship in his honor shortly after his death in October 2005. Scholarships will be awarded to fulltime undergraduate students enrolled at FSU Panama City who are graduates of Gulf Coast Community College and a high school in Bay County.

"I think the most important reason that we want to endow the scholarship is that we as Americans can never forget the sacrifices that are made by soldiers like my hus-

band," Nanci Wood, Col. Wood's widow, said.

"We want to make sure that Bill is always remembered and this is a wonderful way to do that."

Dean of FSU Panama City Dr. George DePuy stated, "We are extremely grateful to Col. Wood's family for their commitment to establish this scholarship. While endowing this scholarship will not make up for the loss of their loved one, perhaps Col. Wood's family will be comforted knowing that because

of him students from Bay County will be able to receive a top-notch education."

Wood, 44, was killed Oct. 27, 2005 while responding to an explosion that killed one of his company commanders. A second homemade bomb exploded, killing him instantly. Wood had recently taken command of the 1st Battalion of the 184th Infantry Regiment, one of three units assigned to the 29th Brigade Combat Team.

Wood attended Rutherford High School in Panama

City where he was a star wrestler. He graduated from Florida State University after attending Gulf Coast Community College. He joined the Army ROTC program while at FSU and graduated in 1984 with a degree in political science.

# NSWC PC personnel watch and save sea turtles

Before many people's alarms go off in the morning, volunteers from Bay County's Turtle Watch Program have already hit the beach relocating dozens of loggerhead sea turtle eggs from a nest that's in a dangerous zone.

Throughout the egg-laying season, May 1 through October 31, these volunteers patrol 17 miles of coastline from St. Andrews State Park to Camp Helen on Bay County's western boarder.


Kennard Watson, a mechanical engineer at the Naval Surface Warfare Center Panama City, became the program coordinator at its inception in 1991.

"One of the great things about Turtle Watch is that you get to do some really neat stuff like relocating sea turtle nests and releasing hatchling turtles into the gulf," Watson said.

He explained that volunteers don't need experience because they take a training class at the beginning of the season.

The watch program is supported by the Bay County Tourist Development Council, which provides funding for the all-terrain vehicles, and hires four surveyors to patrol for new nests.

"The ATV riders check

the beach every morning and report nests to the volunteers who locate the eggs and move them if they're in danger of flooding from surf or storm drains," Watson said.

Annette DeSercey, who is the contract specialist in the NSWC PC Supply Department, has volunteered for the Turtle Watch Program for five years.

"Kennard encouraged me to get involved with it," said DeSercey, whose boss, Tammy Bair, started volunteering this year after becoming interested in DeSercey's work with the program.

DeSercey and Bair moved a nest a few days before Tropical Storm Alberto but unfortunately the storm washed it out, which, according to DeSercey, happened frequently last summer during the multiple storms.

She explained that when

a nest is below the "wrack line," the point up to which tide reaches, a beach volleyball court or another high-traffic location, the volunteers need to move the nest.

Before moving the eggs, volunteers measure the existing nest then dig an 18 inch-deep hole with the same measurements as the original, DeSercey said, and they place the eggs in the same order as they put them into the new nest.

"The reward of helping protect the nest and knowing the little turtles make it into the water (is my favorite part)," she continued. "We try to help their survivability...when they hatch, we assure they actually get to the water."

Watson explained that the female loggerhead crawls ashore at night and searches for a spot to lay her eggs. She digs a hole with her rear flip-

pers and lays about 100 eggs, each the size of a ping-pong ball. She covers them with sand and crawls back to the water, never returning to the nest site.

A loggerhead will lay about four nests during the course of a season but the survivability rate of the young turtles, which use the moonlight to guide them, is one in 1,000, DeSercey said.

Much of this statistic is attributed to the beachfront development that has led to a huge increase in artificial lights. The lights disorient the hatchlings that crawl toward the brightest light, which comes from the condos and parking lots, and away from the moonlit water where they should be going.

Watson said data collected by Turtle Watch shows that over 70 percent of hatchlings that emerge from nests on Panama City Beach become "disoriented," and most would not reach the water without help from volunteers.

To combat this, Turtle Watch volunteers redirect the confused hatchlings to the water and a Pilot Light Ordinance was adopted in 2002 restricting lighting on five miles of beach in western Bay County.

Watson said hatchling disorientation rates have dropped significantly since

then.

According to Watson, the Loggerhead Sea Turtle was first listed as threatened throughout its range in 1978 and has been under protection of the Federal Endangered Species Act ever since.

"Sea turtles were hunted to near-extinction before laws were enacted to protect them," Watson continued, "Today, one of the major threats to loggerheads is the loss of nesting habitat due to rapid coastal development."

"Collectively, our state supports the second-largest nesting population of loggerheads in the world," Watson said. "Sea turtles nest all along the Florida coast, with the highest nesting activity on the east coast near Melbourne (Florida).

Watson advised, "For those lucky few who encounter a nesting sea turtle, remember not to shine lights on her or take flash photos, as it may cause the turtle to abandon her nesting attempt."

Capt. Robert Fink, said Monroe upheld the highest traditions of the United States Naval Services by his, "zealous initiative, courageous actions, and his exceptional dedication to his duty."

During his deployment, Monroe supported SEAL Team Two in explosive ordnance disposal missions as the force protection officer during his deployment from March to September 2004.

Through those months, Monroe planned, coordinated, and supervised the safe

disposal of more than 2,000 pounds of explosives on around 50 combat missions.

After the pinning ceremony, Monroe said, "It recognizes not just what I did, but what we did as a team... it means a lot to me because of what my brothers (fellow service members) did."

Monroe's team was affected when their shipmate and SEAL, BM1 Brian Ouellette was killed in combat.

"(After his death) we kept our head on a swivel. It heightened our

awareness when it happened so close to us; it really hit home," Monroe said. To commemorate the Sailor, their base camp took on the name Camp Ouellette after his death in May 2004.

According to the citation, Monroe also briefed Coalition and Army Special Forces teams and Naval Special Warfare personnel on the location, identification and avoidance of improvised explosive devices, booby-traps, landmines, and hazardous ordnance items.

He also supervised

the clearance and removal of numerous booby-traps and landmines from housing complexes and roads, eliminating the possibility for enemies to use them against the Coalition Forces.

Windhorst, who pinned some of his Sailors from Desert Storm/Desert Shield with the Bronze Star Medal, was honored to have the opportunity 15 years later to present another well-deserving Sailor with this award.

Along with his deployment during OEF,

Monroe served in Bosnia, and Desert Storm/Desert Shield. He has served in the

Navy for 19 years, 18 of which he has worked in Explosive Ordnance Disposal.

(DDG 54) in Yokosuka, Japan. During his tour, the ship deployed to the North Arabian Sea in support of Operation Enduring Freedom.

He subsequently served as the command master chief of Guam-based *USS Frank Cable* (AS 40).

In March, he graduated from the Naval War College with a Master of Arts degree in National Security and Strategic Studies.

After learning of his selection Campa said, "No matter where we come from before we

put on the uniform, our Navy gives us all the same chance for success. I am proud to serve in an organization that gives us all opportunities for world-class, state-of-the-art training, an education, help with a direction in life, and service with honor.

"There is no way I would be in this position without the help of my shipmates and my friends, and my family. I am humbled beyond words for the opportunity and responsibility I now have been given to serve in this role as

MCPON, and I am determined to make sure our Navy continues to offer such opportunities to the best people our country has to offer," Campa said. "To me, that is the best way I can repay in some small way the help, encouragement and faith all the people who have touched my life have given me."
