## NDIA holds 11th annual expeditionary warfare conference

PANAMA CITY, Fla. — The National Defense Industrial Association held its 11th annual Expeditionary Warfare Conference in Panama City, Fla. Oct. 23-26.

The conference gathers industry, academia, and defense leadership to network and discuss how the United States and allied expeditionary forces deal with security threats posed by today's global war on terrorism. The Naval Sea Systems Command's Naval Surface Warfare Center, Panama City, helped coordinate the event.

The NDIA Expeditionary Warfare Conference is planned in coordination with the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, the Office of the Commandant of the U.S. Marine Corps (Plans, Policies & Operations), and the Office of the Commandant of the U.S. Coast Guard. NDIA's mission is to provide a legal and ethical forum for the interchange of ideas between government and industry to resolve industrial problems of joint concern.

The theme of this year's conference was "Joint Expeditionary Operations in an Uncertain World." The primary

PANAMA CITY BEACH, Fla. — Sailors and Coast Guardsmen participated in the removal of pedestrian hazards on Shell Island near the jetties Oct. 11.

"Park staff had called asking for assistance in moving obstacles and obstructions in the past," said NSA PC Command Master Chief Mark Fogarty.

The debris in this case was a piece of rusted angle iron and a length of frayed wire rope which had injured a child a month ago, he said.

While the Coast Guard made sure vessels and tourists remained outside the work area, a pusher boat, piloted by EN1 Harold Snider, assistant leading petty officer of NSA PC Port Operations, pulled the angle iron out of the sand by .

The wire rope was buried too deep to be yanked free, said Snider.

"The wires of the cable had unraveled and were protruding from the sand," he said. "It looked like needles coming out of the sand."

"We had to dredge it down to four feet in the sand and then cut it with cable cutters," said NDC Chris Baker, diver at the NSWC Dive Locker.



# Honor the sacrifices of our veterans: vote!

A US Senate resolution has designated the week of November 5-11 as "National Veterans Awareness Week" to emphasize the need to develop educational programs regarding the contributions of veterans to the country.

The resolution recognizes that tens of millions of Americans have served in the Armed Forces of the United States during the past century; hundreds of thousands of Americans have given their lives while serving in the Armed Forces during the past century; and that the contributions and sacrifices of the men and women who served in the Armed Forces have been vital in maintaining the freedoms and way of life enjoyed by the people of the United States.

Veterans Day had its origins in 1938, when an act of

Congress made the 11th of November a legal holiday, dedicated to the cause of world peace and to be thereafter celebrated and known as "Armistice Day." Armistice Day was primarily a day set aside to honor veterans of World War I. After World War II had required the greatest mobilization of soldiers, Sailors, Marines and airmen in

the Nation's history, and after American forces had fought aggression in Korea, Congress amended the Act of 1938 by striking out the word "Armistice" and inserting in its place the word "Veterans." With the approval of this legislation, November 11th became a day to honor American veterans of all wars.

Veterans Day continues to

be observed on November 11, regardless of what day of the week on which it falls. The observance preserves the historical significance of the date and helps focus attention on the important purpose of Veterans Day: a celebration to honor America's veterans for their service, patriotism and willingness to sacrifice for the common good.

NSA PC and its tenants are participating in a number of local Veterans Day observances. On Veterans' Day, which falls on Saturday this year, Capt. Steve Reimers, Commanding Officer of the Navy Experimental Diving Unit, will be speaking at a commemoration at Captain Anderson's Marina at 11:30 a.m. This event precedes an afternoon cruise on the Lady Anderson, free to all active

duty and retired military.

Cmdr. Chris Moore, Commanding Officer of Naval Diving and Salvage Training Center, will represent the Navy in the Panama City Veterans Day parade, which proceeds down Harrison Ave. to the Panama City Marina, that

## New EOD, Navy Diver training commences at Great Lakes

GREAT LAKES, Ill. (NNS) - The Center for Explosive Ordnance Disposal and Diving (CENEODDIVE) has established a new learning site at Training Support Center (TSC), Great Lakes, Ill., where the first class commenced Oct. 19 with a group of 18 EOD students.

The new site was created to conduct preparatory training for Navy Diver (ND) and Explosive Ordnance Disposal (EOD) personnel emerging from Recruit Training Command (RTC), Great Lakes.

"The stand-up of this detachment has been two years in the making and is a critical piece of an overall strategy to

improve the graduation rates of our pipeline students," said Capt. Gary Windhorst, CENEODDIVE commanding officer.

Traditionally, an ND or EOD Sailor would receive training at the Naval Diving and Salvage Training Center (NDSTC) in Panama City, Fla., following boot camp at RTC. By undergoing preparatory training at Great Lakes, however, Sailors who have elected to participate in the ND and EOD special programs will receive a basic introduction to diving physics, equipment, and weapons handling prior to reporting to follow-on ND/EOD training at NDSTC, where they will be required to perform various tasks in an underwater environment.

Windhorst explained that

the new learning site at Great Lakes is now the first course in the ND/EOD "A" School pipeline. The ND/EOD course, which is conducted separately for each rating, consists of 12 days of ND preparatory instruction covering the fundamentals of diving in relation to anatomy and physiology, operational risk management, equipment operations, cardiopulmonary resuscitation, and small arms qualifications.

"We're providing the tools for success so that the candidates who have volunteered for these special programs are fully prepared for the follow-on dive school training," said Senior Chief Explosive Ordnance Disposalman (EWS/SW/SS) David Hall, officer-in-charge, CENEODDIVE Learning

Site, Great Lakes.

The course is divided between classroom instruction and practical training, requiring each student to pass a 1,000-yard swim test using mask, fins and snorkel and a 2,000-yard sidestroke.

"All the training takes place above the surface of the water," explained Hall.

Existing facilities are being used to accommodate the new learning site, including the gymnasium indoor swimming pool. ND and EOD students will also receive training on the firearms training simulator at the Great Lakes police department as part of the weapons familiarization portion of the curriculum.

Additionally, Sailors in the ND rating will receive an introduction to engineering via a 20-day curriculum at the

Basic Engineering Common Core School at the Center for Naval Engineering Learning Site, Great Lakes, prior to commencing the course.

The EOD and ND ratings are considered a part of the Navy's special programs. Candidates must pass a pre-screening test for eligibility, which consists of a 500-yard swim completed in less than 14 minutes, 42 pushups and 50 sit-ups in less than two minutes, six pull-ups and a mile-and-a-half run in less than 12 minutes and 45 seconds.

Following completion of the preparatory course, Sailors will continue ND/EOD training at NDSTC (70 days for ND ratings and 40 days for EOD ratings) where they will receive their first dose of underwater instruction, including instruction in scuba diving.

## Navy to hold scoping meeting for Atlantic Fleet Active Sonar Training Environmental Impact Statement

The Department of the Navy would like to invite the public to a scoping meeting November 9 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m. at the Marriott Bay Point Resort 4200 Marriott Drive, Panama City Beach, Florida.

The purpose of the "open house" type meeting is to receive public comment on the Navy's intent to prepare a combined National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) Environ-

mental Impact Statement and Overseas Environmental Impact Statement (EIS/OEIS) to evaluate the potential environmental consequences associated with mine warfare (MIW) and antisubmarine warfare (ASW) active sonar training exercises along the east coast and Gulf of Mexico.

The Notice of Intent (NOI) announcing the EIS/OEIS was published in the Federal Register, September 29.

The Navy is initiating the scoping process to identify public concerns and local issues

that should be addressed in the EIS/OEIS. Various displays, handouts, and subject matter experts will be on hand to discuss the project.

Federal, state, and local agencies and interested persons are encouraged to provide comments to the Navy to identify specific issues or topics of environmental concern.

The Navy will consider these comments in determining the scope of the EIS/OEIS.

areas of focus for NDIA's 2006 conference were: Technology Challenges in an Uncertain World; Warfighting Challenges in the Littorals; Force Structure Uncertainty; and Joint Interoperability of Unmanned Systems in Expeditionary Warfare.

The Hon. Donald C. Winter, secretary of the Navy, addressed the conference on Oct. 25 after visiting the Naval Support Activity Panama City. He had breakfast with 12 Sailors at the Seashore General Mess and got a first-hand look at projects underway at NSWC PC.

Winter spoke about how expeditionary warfare has been and will continue to be a core mission of the U.S. Navy and Marine Corps and also

talked about how the nature of expeditionary warfare will change and leverage the skills of Sailors and Marines – much more than even the leveraging of our technology.

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Lt. Gen. James E. Amos, Commanding General, Marine Corps Combat Development Command, was the opening night speaker at the convention. Amos discussed the threats facing our national security in the next 15 years being a complex mixture of rising regional pier competitors and states that are going to sponsor terrorism.

Other speakers included Vice Adm. John K. Morgan; Deputy Chief of Naval Operations for Information, Plans and Strategy (N3/N5); Vice Adm. Terrance T. Etnyre; Commander, Naval Surface

Forces; Maj. Gen. Thomas Benes; Director, Expeditionary Warfare Division, OPNAV N85; Rear Adm. William Landay; Chief of Naval Research; Vice Adm. John K. Morgan; Deputy CNO for Information, Plans and Strategy (N3/N5); Vice Adm. Terrance T. Etnyre; Commander, Naval Surface Forces; Rear Adm. Mike Lefever; Former Commander Expeditionary Strike Group; and Barry Dillon; Executive Director, Marine Corps Systems Command.

While Snider attributed the bulk of the labor to the assistance of the Dive Locker Sailors, Baker commended the Port Ops LCPO on his ability to run the show.

Leading Chief Petty Officer of Port Ops BMCS (SW) Robin Abrahams ran a safety/operational risk man-

agement brief prior to departing to ensure a safe and smooth evolution.

These pieces of metal were more than likely used in the construction of the jetties years ago, said Abrahams. After years of erosion by the sand they come up and cre-

ate a hazard for those walking on the beach, he said. Although most of the immediate hazards were removed, the source of the debris is the material used to construct the jetty itself, he continued, so as time and wave action break down the material, more debris will likely appear.
