Seashore Inn receives Adm. Zumwalt Awards for VQ excellence

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY PANAMA CITY, Fla. - NSA PC was one of 18 installations that received the Admiral Elmo R. Zumwalt award for excellence in Visitors Quarters (VQ) management during a ceremony held Nov. 11 at Navy Service Day Training in conjunction with the International Hotel/Motel and Restaurant Conference in New York City.

This is the fifth time the Seashore Inn has been recognized with this award.

“Our greatest strength is our people”, said Housing Installation Program Manager Mark Sokoloski.

“We have a team that is committed to providing the best possible service,” he continued.

Similar to commercial ho-

tel quality rankings, VQ operations are awarded three, four or five-star ratings. Installations that have earned five-star ratings are recognized as Adm. Zumwalt award winners and are the ultimate in Department of Defense lodging operations.

“Achieving a five-star rating is a most significant accomplishment,” Secretary of the Navy Donald C. Winter said in a Navywide message announcing the Adm. Zumwalt award winners. “Bravo Zulu to all managers and staff whose hard work and dedication significantly improved the quality of life of our Department of Defense travelers.”

The 2006 Adm. Elmo R. Zumwalt award winners also include: Naval Station Pearl Harbor, Hawaii; Pacific Missile Range Facility Barking Sands, Kauai, Hawaii; Naval

Station Mayport, Fla.; Naval Base Kitsap, Wash.; Naval Air Station Whidbey Island, Wash.; Naval Station Everett, Wash.; Naval Support Activity Crane, Ind.; Naval Support Activity Annapolis, Md.; Naval Support Activity Washington, D.C.; U.S. Naval Air Facility, Misawa, Japan; Commander, Fleet Activities Sasebo, Japan; Commander, Fleet Activities Yokosuka, Japan; and Commander, Fleet Activities Chinhae, Korea.

Five-star ratings are awarded for the overall excellence of an installation's entire VQ operation, including enlisted and officer quarters, distinguished visitors quarters and flag officer quarters.

The ratings are the result of a thorough and detailed accreditation process which is mandatory for all VQ opera-

New personnel management system values talent

National Security Personnel System Public Affairs

The National Security Personnel System (NSPS) is a new personnel management system that is being rolled out to enable the Department of Defense (DoD) to better meet the na-

tional security demands of the twenty-first century.

The key aspects of NSPS are designed to value talent, reward contribution, and promote excellence; ensures employee performance objectives are aligned to the mission of the activity, DON and the DoD;

increases DON's ability to retain and recruit highly skilled employees; promotes a system in which pay progression is driven by performance and/or attainment of competencies and not longevity; and lastly allows flexibility for meeting mission changes.. The goal of NSPS is to

enhance effectiveness through a simplified personnel management system that improves the way Department of Navy (Don) hires and assigns, as well as compensates and rewards employees. Merit system safeguards, such as protection from discrimination, ensuring merit

based selection, and Veterans preference remains under NSPS. Additionally, employee benefits such as leave accrual, insurance, and retirement will not change under the NSPS.

Pearl Harbor: an indelible image with few storytellers

I have heroes. They are not grand, perfect figures. They could not achieve anything outside the limits of the average person. Yet they chose to do what many did not.

All of my heroes have served this country.

Last year, on December 7, I added a few more heroes to my list of people to admire.

At first I thought that meeting a member of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Association would be like shaking hands with history. Initially they appeared to simply be distinguished older gentlemen.

Then I listened to their stories. They *were* ordinary men who were unwittingly thrown into a pivotal moment in history and lived to tell the tale. Each of their stories was unique, and it left me wanting to hear more. They were able

to share with me something that no history book or movie would ever be able to capture.

Only they know what it was like to be there.

The impact of their personal stories is far more visceral when the man who tells you his story can shake your hand or show you the scars he has from that day. There is no way to can or reproduce that.

My image of the attack on Pearl Harbor, once lifeless, consisting only of textbook images, now became living, breathing, patriotic men who saw that moment as a wake up call for our country.

It is very regrettable that we cannot keep their living

testimony as a perpetual national treasure.

They witnessed the destruction of eight battleships and saw nine other ships severely damaged. They tried to defend 188 aircraft, most of which were destroyed on the ground. They were there when 2,403 servicemen and 68 civilians died. They tended to 1,178 wounded.

Certainly the stories they tell of the ninety-minute attack is compelling, but so are the stories they tell of the efforts to recover and rebuild that followed in the aftermath. They were present for the moment that would rally this nation into supporting the Allied powers in World War II.

Remembering the attack on Pearl Harbor would continue to serve to bolster the troops throughout the war. Today it serves as a reminder that this nation is not invulnerable.

Invariably, when the survivors speak of December 7, 1941, they often connect it to more recent attacks on U.S. soil. It is their sincerest hope that we learn from the events that transpired on December 7.

Their organization is a symbol of America's commitment to preparedness against unprovoked acts of aggression. They are dedicated to insuring that this and future generations remain aware of the events of that day and to never forget that, 'Eternal vigilance is the price of peace'.

On December 7 we will honor the local members of the Pearl Harbor Survivors Asso-

ciation at the Long Glass Conference Center at 10:00 a.m. During the event members of the Survivors Association honor us by assisting in the presentation of awards and commendations to base Sailors. All hands are invited to attend this event to pay tribute to the sacrifices of these men and to honor their fallen shipmates.



Citizens in support of the Sea Services

NSA PC PAO Staff Report from Navy League Sources

They co-sponsored the Navy Ball, they're playing key roles in community leadership for the commissioning of the Mesa Verde this next summer, and they even sponsor the Sea Cadets. But what is the Navy League, and why do they do what they do?

The Navy League of the United States, founded in 1902 with staunch support from former President Theodore Roosevelt, has evolved over the last century to become the foremost citi-

zens' organization to serve, support and stand with all U.S. sea services - the Navy, Marine Corps, Coast Guard and U.S. - flag Merchant Marine, according to their website at www.navyleague.org.

This organization was founded with a dual purpose; to educate American citizens and elected officials about the importance of sea power, and to support the men and women of the sea services and their families.

When the local rent starts to soar, the Navy League steps up as a supporters of increasing housing allowances. When ships are commis-

sioned, members of the Navy League provide the services necessary to see the job done with community's support.

They boost morale, they award and recognize servicemembers, they host a variety of celebrations, provide assistance to families, and sponsor programs all in support of the Sea Services. Arguably the most important aspect of their organization is to provide education about the needs of the maritime services and the people who serve in them, acknowledging that the Sea Services depend on those that serve to succeed.

Success means ensuring

that the Sea Services maintains superior sea power in order to safeguard U.S. national security, protect American economic interests, and ensures freedom of the seas.

Often Americans may forget the issues involved with being a maritime nation. The Navy League understands that maintaining a secure nation means maintaining sea power. Maritime issues impact every American in vital arenas: national security, delivery of products in a global economy, protection of natural resources and marine environment, curbing the influx of drugs and illegal immigrants, boating safety

issues and more. Additionally, it works to educate elected officials about the needs of the sea services and how critical they are to national security, safety and the global economy.

Blackberry users need passwords; Outlook Web still available

Effective November 30, all Department of the Navy Blackberry users will be required to set and log in with a password when using the device. This is a direct result of the Joint Task Force for Global Network Operations (JTF-GNO) escalation of Information Condition (INFOCON) from Level Five to Level Four.

All Blackberry users will first have to set a password. To do this:

- Select Options > Security.
- Highlight "Disabled." Press the space bar to change this to "Enabled."
- Use the track wheel to select "Change Password." Enter your new password and retype to verify.

- Blackberry passwords:
- Must contain at least five (5) characters;
 - Must include at least

- one letter and one number;
- Must be changed every 90 days;
- Cannot repeat any of the your last 10 passwords; and
- Must be entered when the device is turned on and after unholstering.

Blackberries will time out and lock after 15 minutes of inactivity. You will have to re-enter your password to unlock the device. You will have 10 attempts to enter your password. If you enter an incorrect password after the tenth attempt, you must call the NMCI Help Desk to reset the password.

Outlook Web Access Still Available

Outlook Web Access (OWA) is currently still available for remote NMCI users. Due to the change in INFOCON status, OWA was set to be disabled on November 29. The Department of Navy is working to



provide the necessary security precautions required at INFOCON Level 4, while still keeping access to OWA

available. The INFOCON system represents a structured, coordinated approach to pro-

actively defend DoD Networks. The Commander, Joint Task Force for Global Network Operations (JTF-GNO) recommends changes in DoD INFOCON levels to Commander, US Strategic Command (CDRUSSTRATCOM) based on threats directed at DoD networks. Based upon the recommendation, CDRUSSTRATCOM assesses, and, if necessary, directs a DoD level INFOCON change. INFOCON has five levels of conditions ranging from Five to One where Level One is the highest state of Information Condition Readiness. This escalation of INFOCON Level is not part of an exercise.

These changes affect all DoD networks as outlined in STRATCOM Directive 527-01, available at www.jtfgno.smil.mil.

tions, and includes unannounced validation visits by a Commander, Navy Installations Command (CNIC) accreditation team, as well as specific performance standards for facilities, services and fiscal management.

The CNIC accreditation team visits each naval installation every two years to evaluate VQ operations and determines the overall standards of service being provided to all customers. Over the past two years, 26 Navy instal-

lations have achieved a five-star rating.

At the Seashore Inn, the standards of a five-star rating are considered the minimum operating procedures, said Sokoloski, attributing their success and repeat awards to going beyond the standards.

“There will always be new challenges. We just need to be flexible with our program and provide the same level of service regardless of the challenges we face,” he said.

What advantages does it offer to me? How can DoD implement NSPS when the Court permanently enjoined DoD from implementing certain parts of NSPS? Are wage grade employees covered? What happens to my retirement, health insurance, and other benefits when I convert to NSPS? With more candid performance appraisals, will we get

more complaints and lawsuits from our employees? What kind of support will I receive to handle this?”
