
Springfest will also be held on

Hickam bowlers reclaim All-Military championship

After failing to repeat as champions in last year's tourney, the All-Hickam bowling team stormed out of the gate to conquer the field and wrap up the 14th Annual All-Military Bowling Tournament at Naval Station Bowling Center, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on April 8.

In one of the most dominating performances in years, the All-Hickam bowlers led from start to finish and captured nearly every team and individual accolade from the tournament that started on April 5 at Hickam, before moving on to bowling centers at Marine Corps Base Hawaii, Schofield Barracks and Pearl Harbor.

While Hickam barely lost out to the All-Navy team in the final round of last year's tournament, this year's All-Hickam squad left nothing to chance, as the team sported a comfortable lead over the second-place team of retired military veterans heading into the final day competition.

"Basically, we had it locked up before going into today (final round)," said Master Sgt. Chuck Buchert, who led all bowlers in the 24-game tournament with an average of 218 and teamed up with his wife LaRonda to win the mixed-doubles event. "This is great. Last year I was deployed, so I didn't get the chance to participate. Since this is our last year here, I told my wife let's go out with a bang and try to get Air Force back the trophy."

The final tally showed Hickam at the top with a final pin count of 46,772, and was followed by the retirees with 44,273, Army with 43,659, Marines with 40,732, and defending champs Navy rounding out the field at 40,646.

"I don't think we had the team camaraderie that we had last year," said All-Navy team member Cryptologic Technician (Collection) 2nd Class Daniel Theisen about the squad's surprising finish. "We had a couple of key players that were

missing, so it kind of threw everybody off. Derrick's (former team captain Senior Chief Culinary Specialist Derrick Pelekai Jr.) absence played a big role in it."

Besides winning the overall trophy, Hickam also took top team honors for the men's and women's divisions, and individual titles for best men's average (Buchert - 218), women's average (LaRonda Buchert - 201), men's high game (Staff Sgt. Robert Brewster - 300), women's high game (Buchert - 258), and men's high series (Senior Airman Alfred Chock - 768).

In addition, six of the total 10 spots on the All-Military team were filled by the Air Force with LaRonda and Master Sgt. Annette Gagarin on the women's team, and Chuck, Chock, Senior Airman Chad Germano and Staff Sgt. Art Hamabata winning honors on the men's squad.

"This is by far the best female group that I've ever bowled with," said LaRonda about her team-

mates that also included Staff Sgt. Lisa Gibson and Staff Sgt. Rena Sunaoka. "With the four girls, we can kind of like feed off of each other and give each other (advice) on what we can do to adjust. We didn't get upset, kept cheering each other on and worked together."

Although winning the team's second All-Military title in three years was the crowning achievement for Hickam, the highlight of the tournament had to be Brewster's 300 game, which came on final day of competition and was the only perfect of the four-day event.

"I got one lucky break in the sixth frame and after that, I was just coasting," said Brewster, who notched his 16th perfect game in his 18 years of bowling. "This was my first one in six years, so there was a little more nerves behind that one."

In recounting Hickam's outstanding performance, Buchert

said that consistency and teamwork were the major factors in the team's hunt for the title.

To help pick up spares, Buchert said that he and the guys put five dollars in a pot every day and whoever missed the least amount of spares got the money.

Meanwhile, Buchert acknowledged that the team's togetherness was built upon weeks of practice and a fundraiser to pay for the tournament's expenses.

"Everyone helped and picked each other up every time," he stated. "That's all we did was keep each other's spirits up. If one of us bowled bad one day, we just said, 'It's all good. It's a new day.'"



Chosin clips NCTAMSPAC to stay unbeaten

USS Chosin (CG 65) scored single goals in the first and second half to beat Naval Computer Telecommunications Area Master Station Pacific (NCTAMSPAC), 2-0, in a Soccer Intramural League Blue Division matchup at Hickam Football/Soccer Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on April 9.

The victory raised Chosin's division-leading record to 4-0, while the loss handed NCTAMSPAC its first blemish of the season and dropped the team's record to 3-1.

"Obviously, we wanted to be the better team out here," said Chosin striker Culinary Specialist Seaman Christian Diaz, who scored the team's second goal of the game. "We come ready to play every time. We're out to be the No. 1 team in the league."

In the first half, Chosin immediately attacked NCTAMSPAC and flooded its opponent with numerous shots on goal within the first few minutes of play.

The assertive strategy paid off quickly when Chosin Senior Chief Sonar Technician (Surface) Ben Pierson took a pass from the right corner and promptly booted in a goal down the middle of the field for a 1-0 lead.

The advantage held up through the half and midway into the second half until Diaz drove deep into the box, before beating the goalie for Chosin's

second and final tally.

"I don't give up until the whistle blows," said Diaz about his breakaway goal. "I was just going after the ball, saw an opportunity and took it. There is always a doubt you're going to shank it, but you got to over-

come that. You got to see where the goalie is going and go the opposite."

While Chosin was busy pressing the action, NCTAMSPAC was finding it difficult to mount a consistent offense against its opponent's forceful defense.

According to NCTAMSPAC striker Information Systems Technician 1st Class Richard Hopp, the team's attack might have been hindered by the absence of a couple of key players.

"We had a couple of guys on

vacation, so we had guys that we're not as used to playing with during game time," Hopp said. "We weren't aggressive as we usually play. We weren't intense at all. If we had pushed the ball up a little bit more than what we did, I think we would have had a better chance of winning the game."

Sensing that NCTAMSPAC was a little off its game, Chosin went in for the kill.

Diaz said that the team focused on winning every ball and tried to push NCTAMSPAC at every chance it got.

"We kept the pressure on the ball," Diaz pointed out. "We made them chase, so we wore them down real quick. And with that, we had a couple of fast breaks and took advantage of them."

Following the game, Hopp said that the loss shouldn't have a negative effect on his team, as long as the players keep focused on teamwork.

"If we practice better with the whole team," Hopp said, "we should be better come next game."

Meanwhile, Diaz said that although this was his first game with Chosin, he is extremely impressed by what he has seen so far.

Last season, Diaz was a member of the Sea, Air, Land (SEAL) Delivery Vehicle Team-One (SDVT-1) Navy intramural championship squad.

"We're real good," Diaz admitted. "Defenders are doing their job, strikers are taking shots and we're even missing a couple of starters. Our team is legit. We're out to get that trophy."

Joint base Pearl Harbor-Hickam gets 'sex signals'

Service members received a dose of comedy and education during a performance of "Sex Signals" at Sharkey Theater at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam April 5.

"Sex Signals" is a show produced by Catharsis Productions which uses improvisational comedy, education and audience interaction to communicate serious messages about dating, sex and the issues of consent.

"Basically, what we did constitutes a training for sexual assault prevention, but did it in a way that kind of incorporates the audience a lot more. It's a lot of interaction, a lot of improvisation, a lot of humor in trying to use the audience to fuel the conversation about sexual assault prevention, about rape and about kind of breaking down some myths regarding that," said Ben Murrie, one of the two performers of the event.

One of the myths explored was that rape is committed by strangers jumping out of dark alleys when, in reality, rape is usually committed by someone the victim knows.

"It's not the stereotype we think it is and that a lot of times the culture we have kind of supports it, maybe not intentionally, but supports people thinking that behavior's okay," Murrie added.

In one of the scenarios, they demonstrated how mislabeling coercion as consent can result in date rape.

"They definitely talked about consent and the understanding of consent using different scenarios, having them understand the confidentiality reporting, restricted and unrestricted, and looking

at how you can respect one another," said Cazimero-Bactad, the Navy's sexual assault response coordinator (SARC) for Oahu and Kauai.

Cazimero-Bactad said that another concept discussed was bystander intervention.

To demonstrate intervention, the performers distributed cardboard cutouts of red stop signs to the audience and instructed them to hold them up when they felt uncomfortable with the skit.

Murrie, playing the part of a drunken Sailor, proceeded to hit on his co-star Annie Rix, playing the part of a young female at a bar, which played out for several minutes before the audience gave in.

Murrie and Rix then explained to the audience that the skit probably should have been stopped earlier.

"The education part of it is so that they can understand really what consent means, so I think it is one of the most important things," said Cazimero-Bactad.

Cazimero-Bactad explained that the goal is to not only prevent people from becoming victims of sexual assault, but also to prevent people from becoming perpetrators of sexual assault.

"The more that we teach them about the safety aspects, about what consent means and avoiding [alcohol] and kind of watching out and having a good safety plan, I think we'll help our Sailors," she added.

Troops to receive full mid-month pay April 15

WASHINGTON (NNS) -- All service members will receive their full mid-month pay they have earned in their April 15 paychecks, Pentagon officials said April 11.

"Basically, all active duty and reserve service members will receive full mid-month pay on the 15th of April," said Marine Col. Dave Lapan, Pentagon spokesman. "It may be in two separate payments, but on the 15th everyone will receive their full allotted pay."

Confusion arose about the April 15 payday due to the threatened closure of the U.S. government last week. Administration and congressional leaders came to an agreement that ended that action late on April 8.

The Defense Finance and Accounting Service had posted "net pay advice" to some service members, telling them what to expect in their accounts.

"Those net pay advice statements were made ... before we knew there was an agreement to fund the government," Lapan said. "When those were posted, they only showed partial payments, but again, everyone will receive their full pay on the 15th for the duty served and it may be in more than one deposit."

Officials urge service members to check their end-of-month leave and earnings statements carefully. The normal end-of-month statements will be posted to accounts on April 22.

The finance and accounting service has restored access to all leave and earnings statements, net pay advice or advice of pay for service members on the Mypay website.

"The most-current advice of pay will still only show the partial payments for April 1-8," the finance service posted on its website. "This will allow us to make sure we can still process pay for April 9-15 and take steps to ensure it is in bank accounts on the 15th."

Intelligence Support Squadron hangs in to tie SDVT-1

Overcoming a shortage of players in the first half, the 792nd Intelligence Support Squadron (792 ISS) dug in to battle a relentless SEAL (sea, air, land) Delivery Vehicle Team-One (SDVT-1) squad to a 1-1 tie in a Soccer Intramural League Gold Division game at Ward Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam on April 9.

The tie has created a traffic jam at the top of the Gold Division with SDVT-1 and the Kunia Gallos all knotted up with identical 3-0-1 records, while the 792 ISS is close behind at 2-0-2.

Against SDVT-1, the 792 ISS started the game with two players less than its opponent, but still managed to hold the SEAL team to only a single goal at the end of the first half.

While SDVT-1 dominated the action in the first few minutes of play, the team's only score came on a kick by Special Warfare Operator 2nd Class Andrew Laphan, who booted the ball into the net from the right wing.

Tech Sgt. Elijah Blackwell of 792 ISS said that despite being shorthanded, he and his teammates did all they could to keep the game close until halftime.

"We just said, 'Everybody play defense and pretend it's a practice game until everybody shows up,'" Blackwell stated. "We were

running a lot and just hoped to get to the ball."

Although the 792 ISS was able to get enough players in the second half, nothing seemed to ignite the team's offense, as SDVT-1 continued to pin its opponents in the backfield.

However, with only two minutes remaining in the game, the 792 got a huge break, when Blackwell picked up a long kick from his goalkeeper and perfectly timed the ball's high bounce to

knock in the game-tying score.

"A lot of times, it's getting late in the game, the goalie takes that long boot right up the middle and the defense miscommunicates and lets it go," Blackwell said. "The ball takes funny bounces."

Eric Gordon, a retired chief machinist's mate who plays for SDVT-1, said that while it was heartbreaking to see the game tied in final two minutes of play, it was just one of those unfortunate things that happen sometimes.

Gordon said that the team was in perfect position to defend against the long kick, but an opening was created when two of his teammates collided as they tried to get to the ball.

"We weren't out of position," he explained. "Two defenders had their eyes on the ball, pulled up at the last second, the ball clipped off and gave them an easy break."

With the game even at 1-1, Blackwell said that the team did everything it could to get off the

field without a loss.

"Once we tied it, we just said, 'Let's hold it here,'" Blackwell admitted. "We deserved that much."

While SDVT-1 had numerous opportunities to score, Gordon said that players on the team are still struggling to get on the same page. The SEAL team has only a few returning players from last year's Navy intramural championship squad.

"That (mistakes) comes with this team being so different than it was last year," Gordon said. "We lost two defenders, three midfielders and two forwards. We're working with a whole new group of players, so we're still working on getting that cohesion."

The lack of familiarity also affected the team's offense, Gordon said, which had plenty of shots on goal, but couldn't seem to put the ball away.

Still, although Gordon said that he was disappointed about not being able to put the 792 away, he feels pretty good about the team's current place in the standings.

"We were a little disappointed that we weren't able to put a second one in, but a tie still keeps us close to the top," Gordon noted. "We missed some golden opportunities to put the game out of reach, but this is probably the best thing that could have happened to us. This game reminds us that if you don't put a 100 percent effort on the field, you're not going to win."

Navy SEAL team handcuffs Brig hitters

Sea, Air, Land (SEAL) Delivery Vehicle Team-One (SDVT-1) pitcher Machinist's Mate 1st Chris Brohamer allowed two runs over seven innings and smacked a three-run homer late in the game to help SDVT-1 cruise past Navy Consolidated Brig Miramar (NCBM), 14-2, in an Ashore Intramural Softball League game at Millican Field, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, April 12.

The SEAL team built an 11-1 lead going into the top of the seventh inning, before Brohamer bashed an offering from Brig pitcher Culinary Specialist 1st Class Pete Eala to the right-field fence and circled the bases for an inside-the-park round-tripper.

"I was looking for anything that I could drive," said Brohamer about his prodigious poke. "It was a good line drive that got by."

Although the home run capped off an impressive day at the plate for SDVT-1 hitters, the game seemed to be well in hand by the time

Brohamer stepped into the box.

In the first inning, SDVT-1 got off to a fast start when the team batted around the order and scored six runs on six consecutive singles and

two walks. "It was really big," said Brohamer about the team's early cushion. "It just set the mood for the whole team, so it put us in the right direction."

The team continued its

small-ball attack to build its huge lead. Of the squad's 18 hits, only two other hits, a double and triple in the top of the fourth, went for extra bases.

While SDVT-1 appears

to have a couple of hitters that can deliver the occasional long shot, Brohamer said that the team would primarily attack its opponents by spraying the ball all over the field.

"Base hits, if you bunch them in a row, you're going to score runs," Brohamer said. "We try for line drives as much as we can."

Meanwhile, as SDVT-1 batters were busy putting runners on base, Brohamer seemed to have his way with Brig hitters in tossing five shutout innings.

Using a floating knuckleball as his main weapon, Brohamer gave up only eight singles through seven innings and allowed single runs in the bottom of the third and seventh frames.

"I was just throwing it inside and outside - anything to keep them off-balance and change it up," Brohamer explained.

On the flipside, Brig hurler Eala said that he was having trouble finding his rhythm on the mound - especially in the first inning.

Although Eala settled down to hold SDVT-1 scoreless in the second, fifth and sixth innings,

the Brig pitcher said that the team just couldn't muster enough offense to put pressure on its foe.

"We needed to back it up with runs, but we couldn't consistently get runners," Eala said. "We need more reps. Hopefully, we can get some practice and get our hits going. If we can do that, we should be fine."

Despite falling to a 0-2 record after losing to SDVT-1, Eala said that he believes that the team will turn things around very quickly.

"It could happen starting with the next game," he stated. "This is the first time that most of us have played together. So we're still trying to get a feel for each other and figure out who is strong at where."

The win by the SEAL team, Brohamer said, only adds fuel to the squad's high expectations for the season.

"Hopefully, we'll win as many games as we can and win the whole thing," said Brohamer, whose team raised its league record to 2-0. "As long as we make good throws and keep hitting, we should be able to do it."
