Football, America's favorite sport, can be more than just a game. It involves crazy tailgate parties, favorite foods and some great play-by-play commentaries by both sportscasters and fanatics.

Each year in February, the frenzy surrounding the sport reaches its peak during the Super Bowl and Pro Bowl games. This month, Navy Region Hawai'i, Morale, Welfare and Recreation (MWR) will provide football parties and events for both families and Single Sailors.

On Super Bowl Sunday, Feb. 4, the Indianapolis Colts and the Chicago Bears will kick off the Super Bowl at 1:25 p.m. At Instant Liberty in Club Pearl, Single Sailors will be able to watch the game on plasma televisions while beverages and food are served. To make the game exciting, Sailors can compete for free giveaways during and after the game. The event is free and open only to Single Sailors.

After the Super Bowl, Pro Bowl fever will be running high at Pearl Harbor and youngsters will be able to get in on the fun. Pro Bowl Cheerleaders will host a free youth cheerleading clinic beginning at 4 p.m. Feb. 6 at Quick Field. NFL's cheerleading professionals will coach and train aspiring cheerleaders of all ages. The clinic is free and open to family members of all active duty and other military-affiliated and Department of Defense (DoD) personnel. Pre-registration is not required and participants should come dressed in comfortable clothing. Participants are also encouraged to bring cameras for photo opportunities.

For the true football fans, an NFL player will be in the house at Beeman Center at 5 p.m. Feb. 8. Patrons will be able to meet a Pro Bowl player and get an insider's perspective on the games and the league. The event is free and open to all active duty and other military-

affiliated and DoD personnel, family members and sponsored guests. Due to the nature of this event, the name of the player will not be known until just prior to the appearance. Fans are encouraged to stay tuned to [www.greatlife-hawaii.com](http://www.greatlife-hawaii.com) for the latest details on who will be appearing.

Single Sailors can make it a day at the Pro Bowl tailgate party and game from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Feb. 10. Liberty will host a tailgate party at the Rainbow Bay Marina (RBM), A-frame pavilion. For \$50, Single Sailors can feast on a wide spread of food, play outdoor activities such as jousting, kayaking and horseshoes, and then go to the game. Shuttles will be available at Liberty In Paradise (LIP) to RBM starting at 10 a.m. Limited tickets are available to the first 100 single Sailors. Deadline to sign up is at 6 p.m. Feb. 7 or earlier if tickets sell out.

Even though the big games will be finished, it does not mean that the football fun ends there. On Feb. 17, the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' cheerleaders' Belated Valentine's Day Dating Game will be held at Beeman Center. To start the event, single Sailors will have their very own social hour with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' cheerleaders beginning at 5 p.m. at LIP. They will be able to meet and mingle with the cheerleaders at this free barbecue. Food will be provided. Sailors should also remember to bring their camera for photo opportunities.

For single Sailors who want to be in on the dating game fun, they can register to be a contestant by calling LIP at 473-4279. Winners will experience a group date later in the evening from 7-9 p.m. at Club Pearl with snacks, billiards and beverages. All active duty and other military-affiliated and DoD personnel can watch as fellow Sailors try to win a date with a cheerleader. This event is an adult-themed event and is open to patrons age 18 years and older. The dating game and the social hour are sponsored by Armed Forces Entertainment and MWR.

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## Searching for a copy of 'Football for Idiots'

It's that time of year again – when fans across the island and throughout the nation will be glued to their television sets for the big game - as Super Bowl XLI plays out. The Chicago Bears and the Indianapolis Colts will go head to head in a match that pits two teams who haven't seen Super Bowl action in awhile - against each other.

I enjoy sports – the competitive spirit, the thrill of it all as the teams meet each other on the playing field, the adrenalin rush when the score is tied or close, and the race to win while in the race to beat the clock.

I even enjoy a good football game – the stomping, cheering and whistling of the enthusiastic crowd as the players charge down the field to make a touchdown - along with the tactics, turns and tumbles that are all part of a hard-fought football contest.

But I have to admit that I don't totally understand the game. Some of the finer points of the game elude me and I have been known to misinterpret some of the plays. (This became readily apparent on those occasions when I have exuberantly stood up, cheered, whistled and clapped – only to find out that the call that was just made was against the team I was rooting for. But I have learned how to avoid this embarrassment – I simply wait until the fans seated around me are standing and cheering before I let my exuberance show.)

But at least I have learned to “talk the talk.” (See how many football terms I have used in this column.) Another one of my more embarrassing football moments was when I innocently asked a male fan, “Where is the dugout?” He immediately choked up with laughter before explaining that “baseball players sit in a dugout; football players are on



the bench.” It didn't seem to me that the “seating arrangements” should be that big a deal, but in my quest to make sure that I can talk the lingo, I filed this away for future reference.

Perhaps one reason that I don't totally understand the game of football is because some of the things that they do during the game just don't make a lot of sense to me. In other words, they defy female logic. As we know, female logic and male logic are just a little different.

Let me give you an example. The quarterback passes the football to the wide receiver. As he grabs the ball from midair, he is tackled by a player from the opposite team. Still clutching the ball, he falls down on the field, the pigskin buried beneath his well-padded form. And suddenly, there is a melee of players, all jumping on top of each other until there is a huge pile of human bodies. Why? I'm told that this is done to make sure that the “ball doesn't get away.” This makes no sense to me. Do they really think that little football can escape once a couple big, brawny football players have jumped on top of it? Does it take all of those players to ensure that the ball stays put? I don't think so.

It also seems to me that the referees spend an awful lot of time throwing little white flags all over the field, then running around and picking them up. They also spend considerable time walking up and down the sidelines with tall markers that they jam violently into the ground every few yards. It just seems that all of this amounts to a lot of time lost that

could be better spent actually playing the game. But football is a violent game – maybe these are ways to relieve stress?

And what's with that little “dance” that the players do when they finally manage to run into the end zone (she said, as the language of football just rolled off her tongue)? Is there a reason for it? Does the touchdown not count until the little dance has been properly executed?

And why are there rules against roughing the kicker and roughing the quarterback? Football is a ROUGH game. Aren't they supposed to play rough? Isn't the intent to get a little rough, thereby achieving the end result – to win?

The whole philosophy behind “downs” is also a bit confusing for me. I know that it takes four first downs – but to do what? And more importantly, how can all four of them be FIRST downs? Wouldn't they be first down – second down, third down, fourth down – you can see where I'm going with this.

There's another ritual in the game of football that I don't quite get. Why is it that all of these manly men are constantly patting each other's behinds all through the game? You don't see this ritual in baseball or basketball or soccer – so I think that this is probably something about football rituals or practices that I don't understand.

But I do enjoy a good football game – perhaps I can gain a clearer understanding of the game by reading “Football for Idiots” – and then I will be able to appreciate the finer points of the game.

For all of you fans, enjoy the Superbowl – along with the camaraderie and the snacks that go along with Superbowl Sunday – and have a fine Navy day here in paradise.

# Love is in the air...with Singing Valentines

Love is in the air...and for Valentine's Day, the Singing Valentines from the Sounds of Aloha Chorus will be saying "I love you" in song for sweethearts across the island.

Singing quartets, offering romantic love songs in barbershop style harmony, will visit restaurants, work places, residences, hospitals...you name it - to offer Valentine's Day messages, sent with sweet sentiment from one sweetheart to another.

Of the approximately 70 singers who comprise the chorus, many are active duty, reserve or retired Navy personnel and others represent other branches of the military services. The Sounds of Aloha Chorus is the local chapter of the Barbershop Harmony Society, an international organization that promotes barbershop style singing. For more than 20 years, they have delivered Valentine greetings in song for island residents.

Singers with the chorus volunteer to participate in the annual Singing Valentines project and planning begins in January. Dan Tom, co-chairman of the Singing

Valentine program, is key in putting the singing quartets together for the event which occurs for a handful of days close to the Feb. 14 holiday.

The sentimental, love songs and romantic theme frequently leave not only the recipients filled with emotion and in tears, but affects the singers. "We hear a lot of stories from the quartets who go out to sing," said Hank Drayton, co-chairman of the Singing Valentines and a retired Navy captain.

It's hard to sing if your emotions are making you

choke up. They see that all the time," he explained.

Although ladies are the recipients of many of the Singing Valentine greetings, they aren't just for the fairer sex. According to Drayton, the love songs are also delivered to stern, macho-type guys who may melt by the time the Valentine delivery is finished. He said that these days, there are quite a few ladies who order the Singing Valentines for their significant others.

For example, there was the gal who called and said she had been married just a year

and wanted to do something special for her husband. "We delivered the Singing Valentine to him at his workplace. The gal called back soon after it happened. She said that her phone rang at home, but there was nothing but sobbing coming from the phone. Her husband was too emotional to speak," Drayton recalled.

The Singing Valentines sing two old-fashioned love songs, "Heart of My Heart" and "Let Me Call You Sweetheart," - presented with a silk rose and a card. The endearment on the card reads, "On this special day, may your life be filled with song, joy and love," but a personal greeting can be added.

Sometimes the Singing Valentines are a prelude to marriage proposals. Drayton told a story about one of the quartets that arrived at the Hanohano Room of the Sheraton Waikiki Hotel and asked the master of ceremonies to stop the show so that they could deliver their musical message. "They sang one song and then presented the lady with the card. It said: 'I love you, will you marry me?' At this point, she looked up and found her boyfriend down on one knee with a diamond ring in his

hand. When she said 'Yes,' the entire restaurant cheered," he related.

In addition to singing in situations that are very emotional, there can be other challenges. Drayton talked about one of the more unique situations for a Singing Valentine quartet when they were asked to deliver songs to a lady who was dressed as Vampira in a seductive, low-cut costume. "They had trouble paying attention to the lyrics," he said, laughing.

They have presented Valentine messages in song in a variety of venues, including a worn-out school bus in Wahiawa that had been converted into a lunchroom. They have delivered valentines to multi-million dollar mansions on the slopes of Diamond Head - where money was no object - to a studio apartment in Waikiki with meager furnishings an indication that the person ordering may have been spending a good portion of his small weekly paycheck to send the sentimental greeting to his one and only.

Quartets of Singing Valentines will be delivering

'valentines' from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Feb. 13-14 and on Feb. 9-10 for special events. Orders for the special Singing Valentines are quickly filling up. For those who have their hearts set on sending a musical message to their sweethearts, Drayton recommended getting orders in as soon as possible by calling 262-SONG.

In addition to the Singing Valentine service, the Sounds of Aloha Chorus is involved in a variety of community events, fundraising activities, and other public service venues. The group is actively seeking new singers to make music with the organization. It meets weekly at 7 p.m. on Thursdays at the Ala Wai Golf Course Clubhouse, second floor. Guests are always welcome. The clubhouse is reached from the intersection one traffic light north of Ala Wai Boulevard on Kapahulu. Kapahulu is the street at the Diamond Head end of Waikiki.


