

PEARL HARBOR HISTORIC SITES *free to military personnel, families this Memorial Day*

Admission to all Pearl Harbor Historic Sites will be free this Memorial Day, May 25, for active-duty, reserve, auxiliary and retired U.S. military personnel and their family members. This extends to all service branches - Navy, Army, Air Force, Marines, Coast Guard and National Guard.

Qualified visitors must present a valid military I.D. upon entering the historic site or sites of their choice. Applicable sites include the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum and Park, Battleship Missouri Memorial and Pacific Aviation Museum - Pearl Harbor. (The USS Arizona Memorial and USS Oklahoma Memorial, both operated and maintained by the National Parks Service, do not charge general admission.)

The Pearl Harbor Historic Sites provide a powerful historical journey unlike any other, an experience that has grown far beyond that of a single day. These memorials and museums carry forth the legacies of several of our nation's most treasured icons, enduring tributes to the valor and sacrifices of our veterans during a time when the future of our nation and the world truly hung in the balance. Memorial Day, traditionally observed on the last Monday of May, commemorates all fallen U.S. men and women who gave their lives in military service to their country. Its origins began as a tribute to Union Soldiers during the

American Civil War. Following the First World War, the observance was expanded to include those who died in any war or military action.

WWII Valor in the Pacific National Monument USS Arizona, USS Oklahoma and USS Utah Memorials

The USS Arizona, USS Oklahoma and USS Utah Memorials are part of the newly designated WWII Valor in the Pacific National Monument. These three ships' memorials honor and commemorate all members of the U.S. Armed Forces and civilians who gave their lives to their country during the attack on Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941. Visitors to the USS Arizona Memorial take a shuttle boat operated by the U.S. Navy. Visitors to the USS

Oklahoma Memorial should take a shuttle bus from the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum to Ford Island.

The USS Arizona Memorial Visitors Center is open daily from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free. Tickets are issued on a first-come, first-served basis. For more infor-

Pacific Aviation Museum - Pearl Harbor

The Pacific Aviation Museum - Pearl Harbor, a private, non-profit organization, occupies the WWII hangars and control tower on Ford Island that still bear the scars as our nation's first aviation battlefield. Giving visitors a front-row seat to the Pacific Theater and presenting aircraft and their stories, the museum illustrates how aviation turned the tide of the war. The Pacific Aviation Museum - Pearl Harbor is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. General admission is \$14 per adult and \$7 per child ages 4-12. USS Bowfin Submarine Museum and Park

Adjacent to the USS Arizona Memorial Visitors Center, the USS Bowfin Submarine Museum and Park, operated as a private, non-profit organization, is dedicated to the sacrifice of more than 3,500 submarine personnel lost in World War II. This gallant band of brothers, comprising less than two percent of the U.S. Navy, sank more

Big inning rallies SUBPAC past Shipyard

The Commander Submarine Force U.S. Pacific (COMSUBPAC) softball team known as the Force scored seven runs in the top of the fifth inning to rally past Shipyard, 16-9, in a Morale, Welfare and Recreation ashore intramural game at Millican Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on May 1.

The contest was the marquee game and nightcap of four matchups at Millican Field, and was a battle between two of the top five teams in the league.

With the win, the Force improved its record to 6-1, while Shipyard saw its mark fall to 6-3.

Although Shipyard would eventually fall, through the first four innings the team gave the Force all it could handle in a game that resembled a skirmish between two heavyweights slugging it out round by round.

Up first, the Force broke out the big bats, as Boatswain's Mate 2nd Class Arthur Saldana blasted a shot that traveled more than 300 feet and out into the left-field parking lot for a two-run homer.

"I'm a pull hitter, so I like everything on the inside," said Saldana, who bats right handed. "Personally, on this level, I don't like to walk."

In the bottom half of the first, Shipyard, aided by an error and two walks, came back to score three runs and had the bases loaded with only one out.

However, Saldana put

an abrupt end to the inning when he made a diving catch on a blooper to left and threw a strike to second base to double up the runner and end the inning.

"I gave it my best," said Saldana about his catch. "These guys expect a lot from me, so I always try

and give it 110 percent."

The Force retook the lead in the second by scoring three runs of its own, but lost the advantage when Shipyard answered with three runs in the bottom of the inning.

The big blow came when Machinist's Mate 1st Class Josh Ehlers of

Shipyard connected for a double to drive in two runs with one out.

Ehlers got the chance to hit for the RBIs after an infield error by the Force put men in scoring position at second and third.

While Shipyard's hitters were coming up with clutch hits, the Force

helped its adversary stay in the game by committing five fielding errors.

According to Force shortstop, Electrician's Mate 2nd Class Jake Alicuben, the team's fielding blunders were a result of players having to adjust to new positions.

"I wouldn't call it an off

night, but we usually field well," noted Alicuben. "We were missing some players, so we had a lot of substitutions and players moving around."

Shipyard increased its lead to 7-5 after scoring a run in the bottom of the fourth. But after that, the Force quickly turned things around in a hurry.

In the top of the fifth, the Force batted around the order and punched out six hits while touching home seven times to go out in front by a score of 12-7.

"Mentally, we started off slow," admitted Lt. Cmdr. Dave Anderson, who pitched the entire game for the Force. "Some guys that weren't hitting started hitting. Everybody did his part. It worked out well."

Shipyard came back to score two runs in the bottom of the inning, but the Force put the game away with four runs in its next turn at-bat.

Ehlers said that although the loss was disappointing, he believes that Shipyard proved that it could hang with the top teams in the league.

"We always had a good approach to the season, so this isn't going to change anything," said Ehlers. "We're still going to try and win it all at the end."

Meanwhile, Saldana said that the game versus Shipyard should help the Force become a better team down the stretch.

After all, said the Force left fielder, the team has already proven that it has the ability to come from behind and win against a tough team.

"If we're down, we push each other to win," said Saldana. "That's why we're here, to win and make the command look good."


Fitness and Wellness Fair will be held at Ward Field


