



Columbians *win goodwill* soccer match

Columbian Sailors from the visiting Armada of the Republic of Colombia (ARC) Gloria training ship scored a 5-1 victory over a combined squad from USS Reuben James (FFG 57) and Seabees from Construction Battalion Maintenance Unit 303 during a goodwill soccer game at Ward Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on June 9.

The ARC Gloria arrived in Honolulu on June 8, after departing from Cartagena, Colombia 30 days ago. The ship, which was docked at pier 8 at Aloha Tower, left the islands on June 11 and is headed to Japan.

Against the Seabees and Sailors from Reuben James, the Columbians used an aggressive attack to open up a 3-0 lead at the half, before coming back in the second half to score a fourth goal on a breakaway and a final tally on touch pass and kick to the net to take a 5-0 advantage with only a few minutes left in the game.

Engineman 2nd Class Stephen Nanney of the Reuben James booted in his team's only goal just prior to the end of the contest on an assist by Seabee Utilitiesman 1st Class Mauricio Puerto.

"It was kind of a gift," said Puerto about the team's lone goal. "They (Columbians) passed the

ball back to their goalie and he couldn't pick it up. So I attacked it with my feet, and the ball rebounded right to him (Nanney) and he just kicked it in."

Puerto, who lived in Columbia until he was five years old, said he wasn't surprised at the high level of soccer skills displayed by the visitors.

Not only were the Columbians able to consistently find each other with precision passes, but also they were a bit better with their one-on-one abilities.

"I kind of knew that they were going to dominate," said Puerto. "Their foot skills were better than ours. They were definitely a few light years ahead of us."

Gas Turbine System (Electrical) 2nd Class Sean Jones of the Reuben James said that while his team was never able to draw close to the Columbians, he was happy with the way his guys hung in there despite having to play the game on such short notice.

Jones explained that initially, the team was caught off guard by the quickness, speed and overall conditioning of the Columbian sailors.

However, once Jones and his teammates were able to make a few adjustments, he felt that they did a pretty good job of holding their own.

"The first half, we were gauging how well they were as a team," noted Jones. "In the second half,

we were able to make good adjustments by placing the right people in the right spot."

Although Rueben James is 5-5 and the Seabees are 8-2 in the Morale, Welfare and Recreation intramural standings this season, Jones stated that playing against the Columbians was clearly a step above in competition.

However, Jones said that he was also impressed by his teammates for the way they raised the bar on their game in order give the Columbians a good challenge down the stretch.

"It elevated our game a bit," he acknowledged. "I think we did fairly well."

Meanwhile, Nanney said that with a few breaks, he believes that the score would have been much closer than 5-1.

"We just had some unlucky bounces," said Nanney. "I had one shot that hit the side of the netting. Another bounce here or there and we would have had another goal. We had our chances."

Still, even in defeat, Nanney, who shared that he played in quite a few international soccer games back in high school, said that he had a great time playing against the Columbian sailors.

"It was fun," he admitted. "Every culture has a real different game. It's so different from American soccer and personally, I like it."

Waimea student to attend Naval Academy

The journey to success begins with a single step, but it also helps if you are running full speed ahead. Caralyn Broyles of Waimea High School is a runner. Broyles was one of the few students nationwide to be selected to attend the prestigious U.S. Naval Academy (USNA) in Annapolis, Md.

According to the USNA's official Web site, only 1,200 young men and women are selected each year to attend and "among these outstanding young people will emerge the future leaders of our Navy, Marine Corps and the country."

Indeed, Broyles has an exhaustive and extensive resume that highlights just how determined she is to become an officer in the U.S. Navy. Broyles herself possesses a quiet demeanor. Her short stature and unassuming nature coupled with an extremely humble personality and shy smile belies her ferocity in meeting her goals, her determination in being accepted to the academy, and her sustained achievement in excellence.

"The Naval Academy has always been my first choice of colleges," said Broyles, "I applied during my junior year. I like their structure and it was the perfect way

to become an officer and I want to fly. I especially like the history of the Navy over the other branches."

Broyles certainly didn't accomplish her goals by herself. She cited that the motivation received from her teachers, parents and friends helped her when she felt like she couldn't make it.

"I try to do the best in everything I do and I work really hard in everything I do. I've always had people to push me and help me. Sgt. [1st Class Ian] Verassamy, my JROTC instructor, pushed me at school. He would always tell me to never give up, that I'm always better than what I think," stated Broyles.

The current conflict that the U.S. is entangled in cer-

tainly hasn't deterred Broyles from her decision to become a naval officer.

"I want to make the Navy my career. When it comes to protecting our country - if it means fighting - you have to do it. War is never a good thing, but it comes down to what is right for America," said Broyles.

According to Broyles, she was ecstatic upon her approval to attend the USNA.

"I have a lot of pride for this country. The Navy is the best branch. I was honored when I found out I was selected for the academy. I encourage other students to apply for any academy because it's a great experience to have and it's a big honor to serve your country," said Broyles.

Pearl Harbor All-Stars fall short twice

The Mustang (ages 9-10) and Bronco (11-12) youth baseball teams from Hickam Air Force Base may have been visitors in the Hawai'i Military Youth Athletic Association's All-Star tournament, but it didn't hinder them from capturing both titles at the event, which was held at Lynch Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor from June 4-6.

In winning the Mustang crown, Hickam beat Pearl Harbor, 18-14, on the first day, then went on to defeat the All-Stars from Marine Corps Base Hawai'i, 23-9, before edging out Pearl Harbor, 8-7, in the championship game.

Pearl Harbor got by K-Bay, 33-14, to avoid double-elimination and earn the showdown against Hickam.

Over on the Bronco side, Hickam also ran the table by roughing up Pearl Harbor, 18-1, in its first game, before going on to beat Pearl Harbor, 17-2, in the final.

The Pearl Harbor Broncos defeated K-Bay twice, 10-6 and 14-4, to make it to the championship game versus Hickam.

Hickam beat Pearl Harbor, 17-2, to win the Hawai'i Military Youth Athletic Association's Bronco All-Star title.

In the Bronco title matchup, Hickam quickly jumped out in front by scoring two runs in the top of the first inning.

However, Pearl Harbor appeared up for the challenge, when in the bottom of frame, the team put its first two players on base and went on to tie the game at 2-2 by the end of the inning.

After the Pearl Harbor pitcher threw a scoreless second inning, things began to unravel for the home team, when fielding errors opened the door for a Hickam rally

in the top of the third.

Hickam led off the inning with a single, but two fielding miscues by Pearl Harbor helped the visitors score a run and left players on first and third.

With only one out, the Hickam cleanup batter scorched a line drive past Pearl Harbor's left fielder, which allowed the hitter to round the bases for a three-run homer and extend the team's lead to 6-2.

"That was the turning point," said Hickam coach, Master Sgt. Garrett Kawada. "That lifted the boys'

morale and spirits and everything just seemed to flow from there."

Although he knew that it was a great opportunity to break open the game, hitting a home run was the farthest thing from his mind said the Hickam number four hitter. "I was just looking to get a single. When I saw it go through, I knew I was going all the way," he said.

The drive opened the door for Hickam to gain a commanding 10-2 lead by scoring eight runs in the inning.

"They fully took advantage of our mistakes and, unfortunately, it got our boys to put their heads down. That was the difference in the game," said Bronco All-Stars head coach, Chief Navy Diver Dalbert Rivera, who is with Mobile Diving and Salvage Unit One. "That home run kicked us in the butt, but there's nothing you can do about that."

From there, the game was put squarely on the shoulders of Hickam's 11-year-old pitcher, and he came through with a sterling performance.

In six innings, the young hurler gave up only two hits, one bases on balls and a hit batsman, while striking out 12 Pearl Harbor hitters.

"I was throwing a lot of curves and fastballs," said the Hickam pitcher. "My two-seam fastball was

working really well today. It makes the batters move away from the ball."

Rivera said he was very impressed with the way the Hickam right-hander mixed up his pitches, but was especially blown away by the youngster's velocity.

"A lot of praises to him because he throws hard," said Rivera. "Some of our kids were a little intimidated and it took them awhile to get used to his speed."

Following the team's dominating performance, Kawada noted that he was just surprised at how well Hickam played in a very competitive tournament.

The Hickam coach admitted that the title could have gone to either team, but he was pleased that his boys came out on top.

"We didn't know how the other teams were going to be," said Kawada. "We just practiced them hard, so that they would be ready for whatever they would face."

While the Pearl Harbor Broncos came out on the short end, Rivera said he was equally proud of his boys for giving it their all.

"Some of these kids had only one or two wins during the regular season," pointed out Rivera. "Then they come to this tournament and make it to the championship game."


