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## Have a safe but spooky Halloween

With Halloween just around the corner, families are scrambling to find or make the perfect costume to celebrate one of America's oldest and most popular holidays.

Celebrated on Oct. 31, the last day of the Celtic calendar, Halloween was originally a pagan holiday

that celebrated the "day of the dead." Once referred to as "All Hallows Eve," this holiday dates back more than 2,000 years.

All Hallows Eve was celebrated on the evening before All Saints Day, which was another day created by Christians to convert pagans. All Hallows Eve traditions included bonfires, parades and people dressed up in costumes of saints, devils and angels.

Today's Halloween customs stem from these early All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day and All Souls Day traditions.

The custom of trick-or-treating is thought to come from a ninth century European custom called "souling." On All Soul's Day, early Christians would walk from village to village begging for "soul cakes," square pieces of bread with currants. In return for the "soul cakes," beggars would say prayers on behalf of the dead relatives of the donors. It was believed that the dead remained in limbo for a time after death and that

prayers could expedite a soul's passage to heaven.

One Halloween custom is dressing in orange and black colors during this holiday. These two colors became official Halloween colors because orange is associated with fall harvest and black is associated with darkness and death.

Another Halloween custom is carving jack o' lanterns. Jack o' Lanterns originated in Ireland where people placed candles in hollowed-out turnips to keep away spirits and ghosts on the Samhain holiday.

According to Irish folklore, the name came from a notorious drunkard and trickster named Jack who tricked Satan into climbing a tree. Jack then carved an image of a cross on the tree trunk, trapping the devil in the tree. Jack later made a deal with the devil, agreeing to let him out of the tree if Satan promised never to tempt him again.

As the tale goes, after Jack died, he was denied entrance to Heaven because of his evil past.

However, he was also denied access to Hell because he had tricked the devil. The devil gave Jack a single ember to light his way through the darkness. To keep it glowing longer, the ember was placed inside a hollowed-out turnip. When the Irish immigrated to North America, turnips were hard to find so pumpkins were used instead because there was plenty in supply.

The history of Halloween has generated an age-old debate of whether or not

holiday is evil because of its pagan ritualistic roots or if it is merely a fun time of year to host theme parties and trick-or-treat.

Despite its controversial origins, Halloween remains the second most commercially successful holiday, with Christmas coming in first. So as children of all ages don their vampire capes and fairy princess costumes this Halloween, let us not forget the interesting historical account of one of America's spookiest holidays.

### HALLOWEEN SAFETY GUIDE

According to Forest City Residential Management, trick-or-treating activities for Navy housing residents will begin no earlier than 6 p.m. and will conclude no later than 8 p.m. on Oct. 31. Children under the age of 10 must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult.

- Trick or treating should be one of the great adventures of Halloween for kids. By making your children's Halloween a memorable holiday, they will have memories to last a lifetime. Below are helpful tips to keep your child safe this Halloween:
- Children should go out during daylight hours only unless accompanied by a responsible adult.
- Plan a safe route so parents know where their older kids will be at all times. Set a time for their return home. Make sure that your child is old enough and responsible enough to go out by themselves.
- Let your children know not to cut through back alleys and fields. Make sure they know to stay in populated places and don't go off the beaten track. Stay in well lit areas.
- Stop only at familiar houses in your own neighborhood unless they are accompanied by an adult.
- Small children should never be allowed to go out alone on Halloween. Make sure an older sibling or adult is with them.
- Instruct your child to never go into the home of a stranger or get into their car.
- Make sure your child carries a flashlight, glow stick or has reflective tape on their costume to make them more visible to cars.
- Let them know that they should stay together as a group if going out to trick or treat without an adult.

# Undeclared La Jolla beats Port Royal in OT

USS La Jolla (SSN 701) overcame five interceptions to beat USS Port Royal (CG 73), 19-13, in overtime in a Morale, Welfare and Recreation Afloat Intramural Flag Football League game at Ward Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 24.

The victory improved La Jolla's league-leading record to 3-0 and kept it as the only unbeaten team in the standings. It was the submarine's second win over a top-three team this season. Port Royal's mark dropped to 3-2.

Cmdr. Douglas Sampson, commanding officer of La Jolla and quarterback of the team, said after its latest triumph, that the sub just might have the best team in the league.

"It's hard to argue with that right now," said Sampson. "I just got to stop finding the other teams' free safety with the ball."

La Jolla opened the game by moving from its own 15-yard line to the Port Royal 20. The drive was aided by two penalties against the Port Royal defense for roughing the passer and pass interference.

Although La Jolla's offense stalled in the red zone, when Operations Specialist 2nd Class Apipol Piman of Port Royal intercepted a Sampson pass in the end zone, the sub's defense quickly returned the favor as Electronics Technician 2nd Class Andre Thomas came up with the first big play of the game.

On second down from the one-yard line, Thomas picked off a pass by Ship's Serviceman Seaman Ross Andrew — QB of Port Royal — and took it to the house for a touchdown.

"I think he (Andrew) thought that I was in a man (man-to-man defense), but I was just sitting in a zone," said Thomas, who would come up with another huge pick later in the game. "The ball just sailed over his receiver and right into my lap.

That was an easy six."

After falling behind at 7-0, Andrew quickly got Port Royal back into the game by fashioning a 65-yard drive to pay dirt in only five plays.

Back on the Port Royal 28-yard line, Andrew went for it on fourth down and

burned the La Jolla defense with a spiral to Information Systems Technician Seaman Drew Saenz, who was streaking down the left side of the field.

Saenz caught the ball in stride at the La Jolla 20 and motored in the rest of the

way for a touchdown. Port Royal converted its point-after to tie the score.

La Jolla's next two drives were cut short on interceptions by Port Royal's Culinary Specialist Seaman Earl Henderson and Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Lance MacNiven.

Still, Port Royal wasn't able to capitalize on the turnovers as its offense was stopped on four downs on one drive and failed to punch it in from the La Jolla 10-yard line just before the half.

Following the break, La Jolla put together its longest drive of the day as the team covered 50 yards in seven plays to go back out in front at 13-7.

On fourth and goal from the 11, Sampson came up with a clutch pass when he found Storekeeper 2nd Class Ricky Daignault in the end zone for the score. The lead didn't last long, as Port Royal stormed back with six points of its own by going 65 yards on just five plays to tie the score at 13-13.

The big play came on third down and 12 to go for a first when Andrew dropped back and threw a bomb right into the arms of Information Systems Technician 3rd Class Byron Brown, who hauled in the toss and crossed the goal line.

After both teams failed to score any more points during regulation, La Jolla won

the toss and received the ball in overtime for the first set of downs at the opponent's 10-yard line.

On the first play from scrimmage, Port Royal got the ball back when MacNiven snared his third pick of the day off Sampson.

Instead of falling apart, the La Jolla defense stiffened and stopped Port Royal on four downs — ending the drive on an interception by Electronics Technician 2nd Class Brandon Johnson. Two plays later, Sampson hooked up with Daignault for the go-ahead touchdown.

Port Royal had one more opportunity to tie the score and go for a win, but Thomas recorded his second pick of the day to secure the victory.

"I'm frustrated, but I tell everybody that we need to keep our composure," said MacNiven, who is also the head coach of Port Royal. "That (La Jolla) is the only undefeated team in the league and we gave them a run for their money."

Meanwhile, Sampson credited the La Jolla defense and the camaraderie of the shipmates for keeping the team in the game against a strong Port Royal squad.

"I had a horrible game, but our defense has been playing amazing all year," said Sampson. "Our team is very close. Just like when we're at sea, when somebody is not having a good day, we step in to help the other guy."

- **The Shop** 580 Dillingham Blvd., Honolulu
- **The Mall Café** 80 South Hotel St., Honolulu

This "off-limits" list remains effective indefinitely and must be retained until issuance of an updated notice.



# Pearl Harbor Titans stand tall over Hickam Lions

The Pearl Harbor Titans evened their record at 2-2 by defeating the Hickam Lions, 6-0, in a defensive battle during a Hawai'i Military Youth Athletic Association (HMYAA) Pee Wee Division (ages 11-12) flag football game at Quick Field at Naval Station Pearl Harbor on Oct. 24.

The HMYAA is an inter-base youth organization that includes teams from Pearl Harbor, Hickam Air Force Base and Marine Corps Base Hawai'i.

The teams were deadlocked in a 0-0 tie at halftime, but the Titans were able to pull out the victory on a catch-and-run that covered 65 yards for a touch-down with only 2:38 left in the game.

"It was frustrating, but I told them to just stick with the plays and we'll be OK," said Storekeeper 1st Class Robert Cartwright of Naval Computer and Telecommunications Area Master Station (NCTAMS), who is in his first season as head coach of the Titans. "It took us awhile, but we finally scored."

While the Titans were having trouble on offense, their defense was busy doing its part to keep the Lions off the scoreboard.

During the matchup, the Li-

ons penetrated deep into Titans' territory on several occasions, but were turned back each time.

The biggest stop by the Titans defense came just before halftime when the Lions, from their own 21-yard line, connected on a bomb that placed the football on the Pearl Harbor two-yard line.

After the Lions' first two passes fell incomplete, the Titans came up with a huge play when the defense forced an interception to end the threat.

"That was real big," noted

Cartwright. "He (the player that made the interception) was over the center at nose guard when the play began. From there, he was able to move out and step in front of their (Lions) receiver.

That was real good."

In the second half, the Titans defense made another strong goal-line stance after the Lions set up shop on the Pearl Harbor four-yard line on an interception.

The Lions QB missed a golden opportunity when he under threw a pass to a receiver that was wide open on the right side of the end zone. Two more incomplete passes ended the drive for the Lions.

"I make sure that we run a 3-2 defense, which is a basic scheme in flag football," explained Cartwright about the team's prowess in stopping its foes. "As long as our kids are protecting the goal line, they'll stop them every time."

Master Sgt. Anthony Hall, head coach of the Lions, said that while the Titans were tough on defense, playing without the services of its starting quarterback hampered Hickam.

"Our number one guy was doing a scout retreat so we were trying out a new quarterback," said Hall. "We're still working on our catching, but having a new quarterback out there really hurt us."

The Titans started their game-winning drive after taking over on downs at their own five-yard line.

Using a double-quarterback

set in its backfield on the first play from scrimmage, Pearl Harbor forced the Lions defense into single coverage, which set up the biggest offensive play of the day.

The Titans completed a pass to an open receiver and once he got past his defender, it was clear sailing to the end zone.

"I told our receiver that we were going to get him the football and it worked," said Cartwright.

Although Hickam saw its record fall to 1-3 with the loss, Hall said that the Lions are improving with each game and should turn things around real soon.


"The last two games have been real nail biters," said Hall. "I'm very pleased. The boys are really stepping up."

Meanwhile, Cartwright said he believes that the Titans are moving in the right direction.

"We lost the first two, but now we've won two in a row," said Cartwright. "Our kids are beginning to understand and execute the plays. That's the biggest thing right now."






