


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Naples High School track team takes first place

AFN Naples receives 17 CHINFO Merit Awards Including Broadcaster of the Year, Outstanding New Broadcaster

By the numbers, the production team at AFN Naples was eligible to enter 17 broadcasting categories and will receive 17 of the Navy's Chief of Information Merit Awards for 2009. This includes six 1st place finishes and individual recognition for six producers, in addition to unit awards.

Results were announced in a message released by CHINFO April 2. The service-wide awards are presented each year for excellence in media production.

Ten of AFN Naples' awards were in radio, four in television, one in multi-media campaign, and two were individual awards of particular merit.

The station's senior producer and operations leading petty officer MC2(AW) Julian Olivari was named Broadcast Journalist of the Year, and morning radio disc jockey MC3 Aaron Roe was named Outstanding New Broadcaster.

The unit entry "Master Chief in the Morning" was the Navy's best radio information program. The regional call-in show airs Thursdays at 7 a.m. and features Roe and FLTCM Bradley LeVault.

Olivari had the best radio news report for "BGCA Day for Kids." MC2 Justin Rouse, AFN Naples' production supervisor, had the best radio feature report for "Running Rabbi." "AFN Naples Report," another unit entry, took top honors in the local TV newscast category.

These four entries will automatically advance to the Department of Defense-wide competition in the Thomas Jefferson Awards.

MC2 Jason Behnke's morning radio show was the Navy's 2nd best last year. He has since been promoted to radio supervisor. Roe's afternoon show came in as the Navy's 3rd best. He has since replaced Behnke in the morning time slot.

Behnke also took 3rd place for radio sports reporting for "NHS Wrestling." Roe was recognized for 3rd place in radio spot production for "Movie Card."

NEX customers will receive five-cent credit for using eco-friendly reusable bag

The NEX is initiating a new program to help customers save money and help the environment. Beginning Wednesday, April 21, customers will receive a five-cent credit toward their purchase for each eco-friendly reusable bag used to bag their purchase. Customers may either bring their reusable bag into the store or purchase a reusable bag from the NEX. The five-cent credit program applies to all NEX retail and direct run service facilities where bags are normally provided. It does not apply to our contract operations such as food vendors and mall kiosks that are operated within NEXs. The program also does not apply to disposable plastic bags that are being reused.

International Children's Day celebration

NATO will host the annual International Children's Day celebration, organized by JFC and the MC Naples Turkish contingent and families, at JFC Naples Headquarters April 23 from 9:30 a.m. to 1.30 p.m. at the base soccer field or, in the event of inclement weather, at the NATO Community Center. Italian News Briefs

Italian Government invests in environment

The Italian government approved 300 million Euros (about \$407 million) in incentives to sustain energy-efficient appliances, low pollution scooters, and fast Internet providers which will benefit young people, announced Industry Minister Claudio Scajola. The incentives approved by the government went into effect on April 15 and will continue until the funding is exhausted. These incentives are aimed mostly to renew kitchen appliances and replacing old scooters. The incentives, said Finance Minister Giulio Tremonti are funded from the money recuperated from the fight against tax evasion.

Police Seize mafia assets

Police seized 700 million Euros of assets from the Casalesi clan last week. Assets included apartments, farms, land and a plant. Interior Minister Roberto Maroni announced that this was the largest assets seizure ever done to a mafia clan. The National Anti-Mafia Directorate said the Casalesi clan had been brought down financially. They were finding it hard to pay their members. Italian President Giorgio Napolitano and Prime Minister Silvio Berlusconi praised the operation carried on by the law enforcement officers.

Brazilian soccer star becomes Italian citizen

Brazilian-born soccer player Amauri obtained Italian citizenship during a ceremony held in Turin on Monday. Amauri plays soccer in the Juventus Club and spent almost his entire senior career in

Italy scoring a total of 27 goals over the past two seasons in Serie A. He told reporters he was happy and emotional, and is now proud to be an Italian citizen and if he has the opportunity to wear the Italy shirt, he'll be the happiest man in the world. He is now eligible to play for Italy at the World Soccer Cup in South Africa next June as he has never represented his homeland. Italian coach Marcello Lippi said he'll begin following him, but there's no guarantee that he'll be called up.

Alitalia is Europe's most punctual airline

According to the Association of European Airlines (AEA) report, Alitalia airline was the most punctual European airline in January. The report mentioned that 84.3% of the Italian private airline departures were on time. Alitalia's punctuality rating was 11 percentage points above the average of the 22 carriers monitored in the AEA report and it was far above giants such as Air France, Lufthansa and Swiss Air Line. According to the Alitalia's director of ground services Gianluigi Di Francesco, Alitalia has also improved luggage delivery making the Italian airline one of the best carriers in Europe for baggage claim. This is the result of organizational changes and investment in automation. Austrian and Scandinavia's SAS were the second most punctual airlines in Europe. Alitalia became private last year with the merger of the flight operations and other services of the bankrupt national carrier of the same name and Air One, which had been Italy's biggest private airline. Air France-KLM took a 25 percent stake in the new Alitalia becoming its strategic partner.

School registration begins April 19

Naples Elementary School and Naples Middle/High School will conduct registration for school year 2010-2011, April 19-30 from 8 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. Children may not be allowed to attend school next year until this process is completed. Please be sure to mark the dates on your calendar.

Registration is a very important process for the schools. It is required that all students register yearly as a means to establish eligibility for tuition-free or tuition enrollment. However, more importantly, we need to be sure that we can establish grade level class enrollments as close as possible to pupil-teacher ratio benchmarks. Therefore, we need exact counts of students returning to our school next year so that we may plan next year's classes.

Registration can be a lengthy process, if not prepared.

Kindergarten students must be five years old or first-grade students must be six on or before September 1, 2010.

Registration packets for new students are available at Naples Elementary School and Naples Middle/High School.

Here are the lists of the necessary documents for registration. All must be in hand to complete registration.

- Central Billing Letter (Payment must be received prior to starting.)

- The Principal must verify and sign the 1030.1 form prior to enrolling the student(s).

- Central Billing Letter (Have them talk to Tiziana) Payment must be received prior to starting.
- Copy of Sponsor's ID card (front and back)

NURSE'S NOTE:

If you are concerned that your child's immunization record is not up-to-date, please stop by the Nurse's Office at Naples Elementary School or go to the Immunization Clinic at the hospital and have them review your child's shot record. (081-811-6282). Please note that students without the required immunization records on file at the school will not be able to register until the records are received. We do not have access to the immunization records at the hospital, so it is the responsibility of the parent to bring the shot records to the school.

If you have medical concerns regarding your child, please bring those to the attention of the nurse at registration. Additional documentation will be required for children with asthma, allergies, epi pens, inhalers and other illness.

McCormick Freedom Project Exhibit Explores First Amendment Issues Impacting Libraries

To most people, the public library evokes images of quiet halls, mountains of books and studious librarians. But libraries can also be the setting for raucous controversy, especially relating to freedom of speech and the First Amendment. Libraries and the First Amendment, a new exhibit at the MWR Libraries provided by the Chicago-based McCormick Freedom Project, explores the library's role in enabling and protecting First Amendment freedoms.

Libraries provide access to information about countless subjects to widely diverse audiences, making occasional controversy almost inevitable. Heated confrontations may occur when public libraries provide information about controversial subjects, allow access to potentially objectionable information, or permit polarizing groups to use their facilities for meetings.

This exhibit, which opened at the MWR Libraries April 11, gets to the bottom of these issues by examining timeless and relevant topics that speak to all Americans. CRAZY HEART, R, For language and brief sexuality. Cast: Jeff Bridges, Maggie Gyllenhaal, Robert Duvall, James Keane (II), Anna Felix. Drama, Musical Performing Arts and Adaptation, 111 min. A worn-down country singer and a burgeoning journalist form an unusual bond in this drama adapted from the novel by Thomas Cobb. His spirit broken by multiple failed marriages, too much time on the road, and too many nights with the bottle, Bad Blake (Jeff Bridges) had started to feel like he was headed down the path of no return. When probing young writer Jean (Maggie Gyllenhaal) digs deep enough to unearth the broken man behind the legend, however, Bad realizes that redemption may not be such a long shot after all. Robert Duvall and Colin Farrell co-star.

BROOKLYN'S FINEST, R, For bloody violence throughout, strong sexuality, nudity, drug content and pervasive language, Action/Adventure, Drama, Thriller and Crime/Gangster 133 min. "Training Day" director Antoine Fuqua takes viewers on a dark ride through the streets of Brooklyn, following three New York Police officers as they wrestle with temptation, loyalty, and duty while attempting to uphold the law and deal with the pressures of the job. Eddie Dugan (Richard Gere) is days away from retirement, but he's been burnt-out for years. Unable to remember why he signed up for the job in the first place, all Eddie can think about is retreating to his fishing cabin in Connecticut, and forgetting the horrors that he's seen during his decades on the job. At the same time, undercover narcotics cop Clarence "Tango" Butler (Don Cheadle) is right in the thick of it. As hard as he tries to quit, however, his superiors always find a way of keeping him on the job. Monte Guaro: A hike around the crater rim

Have you ever been at Carney Park and wondered if you could hike up along the top of the mountain rim that surrounds the crater? Well, you can. There is an extensive network of paths and trails along the rim and on the slopes all around the crater. You can hike all day up there, making a complete 360-degree circuit around the top of the mountain rim, and there are incredible panoramic vistas to be enjoyed at every turn. There are also many great Roman ruins hidden in the woods just waiting to be explored. You just need to know where to look and how to get on the right trails.

The U.S. Navy recreational facility at Carney Park lies within the crater of a long-extinct volcano known as Monte Guaro, which can be subdivided into several areas. The northwestern rim of the crater is called Monte Sant'Angelo, which culminates in the northeast at Punta Corvara. The southern rim of the crater, Monte Barbaro, is the largest and highest part of the mountain, rising to a height of 1076 feet above sea level.

Monte Guaro is one of about 30 craters that comprise the volcanic area known as the Campi Flegrei caldera, the Fields of Fire, just west of Naples. The eruption that created the mountain and crater we see today occurred about 3700 years ago. Monte Guaro occupies a very scenic location on the north shore of the Gulf of Pozzuoli at the northwestern corner of the Bay of Naples.

Because I live nearby, with a view of the Tyrrhenian Sea, I have enjoyed many treks along the trails and sheep paths that crisscross the mountain. And I have marveled at the many stone and brick ruins that lie hidden in the trees and thick underbrush in the woods. Only a few hundred yards from my house is a Roman ruin that I believe is part of a *terme*, or bath complex. In an area just below the western rim, where several trails converge on their way up to the top, are the ruins of many large stone structures that have the look and characteristics of Roman architecture. I have identified the ruins of at least 20 large structures in this area, and I believe many of them must be Roman. There are also many smaller ruins scattered about in the surrounding woods. Clearly, this was an area of some importance in ancient times.

At the top of Monte Sant'Angelo there is a Franciscan Monastery, which looks like a giant gray cinder block as seen from down in Carney Park. The monastery is still in use, and I have had a peek inside at its small but beautiful chapel. Within the enclosed grounds of the monastery are several interesting statues and shrines. Along the rim of Monte Sant'Angelo there are spectacular panoramic views overlooking Carney Park and Naples (with Mount Vesuvius in the distance) and the Baia Peninsula.

Along the north rim, toward Punta Corvara, is perhaps the most interesting feature on the mountain. It is a large underground structure with several chambers, and I believe it is a Roman cistern. This makes sense, as a large cistern to collect rain water would have been needed to supply the settlements on the slopes below. Its vaulted ceilings are up to 10 or 12 feet high, and bats have made this dark abandoned place their home. The cistern is very well hidden, and I only stumbled upon it after a summer fire on the rim cleared away the thick underbrush that concealed it.

From the top of Monte Sant'Angelo, the rocky trail leads down and then back up another steep trail to the top of Monte Barbaro on the south rim of the crater. There are several fumaroles to be found here, as well

as a scenic ruin that I like to think is a Roman temple. The ruin was almost totally engulfed in bushes and high grass when I first came upon it, and I had to hack my way to it with a machete. Far below are the Gulf of Pozzuoli and the Bay of Baia. These waters were once the home base of the Roman fleet, and it is not far-fetched to think that the Romans would have built a temple to Neptune or the four winds on the mountain overlooking the harbor of their fleet. From the top of Monte Barbaro, there are spectacular panoramic views over Arco Felice, Pozzuoli, Capri

and the Bay of Naples.

I go trekking on the mountain almost every weekend, weather permitting, if I am not traveling elsewhere. If you would like to come along sometime for a guided tour around the rim, give me a call at 081-568-2964. It's great exercise and fresh air, and the ruins and surrounding views are impressive to see. Be sure to bring a bottle of water and your camera.

APS Gunston Hall arrives in Dakar, starts final phase

USS Gunston Hall (LSD 44), the flagship for Africa Partnership Station (APS) West, along with an embarked international staff, arrived in Dakar, Senegal, on April 6, for the start of the second and final phase of the ship's APS West deployment.

During this phase, maritime professionals from Cape Verde, Equatorial Guinea, The Gambia, Liberia, Senegal, Sierra Leone, Tanzania, and Togo will participate in 20 days of in port and at sea training in maritime safety and security, and a team of U.S., Spanish and Portuguese Marines will be training with the Senegalese Armed Forces in Thies.

"This is the most robust training hub we will have had during this APS mission," said Lt. Cmdr. Tim LaBenz, APS operations officer. "There are a lot of moving parts. We have more than 90 students who speak four different languages and will be partnered into smaller groups for hands-on and classroom-based training. It takes a lot of coordination, but we have a very strong and cohesive APS staff onboard Gunston Hall. Plus, none of this would be possible without the continued support of the crew of Gunston Hall. I've been very impressed with the way they've embraced the APS mission and have been actively working with our African students. It's extremely gratifying to see the entire APS team in action."

A team of maritime experts from a range of fields are also ready to interact with their African colleagues. Small boat operations, maritime law enforcement, maritime domain awareness, port security, fisheries management, combat life saver, basic first aid, and search-and-rescue are some of the topics that will be covered while the participants are embarked.

"The last group of sailors were very enthusiastic and I am really looking forward to working with this next group," said Master-at-Arms 2nd Class John Luther, APS port security instructor, from Marengo, Idaho. "It is going to be challenging having four different languages, but we will work around it... we find ways to get the job done."

As part of the program in Senegal, 17 Navy and Air Force medical personnel will conduct medical outreach programs at Tivouare and Noto Goury Health Centers, providing medical and dental care to local Senegalese communities. The British, Portuguese, Spanish, and U.S. Marines assigned to the embarked Security Cooperation Marine Air-Ground Task Force (SC-MAGTF) and Seabees assigned to Naval Mobile Construction Battalion (NMCB) 7 are ashore to conduct security cooperation training with the Senegalese National Defense Force at the Thies training camp. On April 3, a smaller group of Marines went ashore in Monrovia, Liberia to conduct similar mil-to-mil training.

In addition, the U.S. Naval Forces Band 'Five Star Brass Quintet' will perform at various Senegalese schools, including a concert at the Thies Cultural Center, where more than 300 children are expected to attend.

Sailors from Gunston Hall and APS staff members will also have the opportunity to participate in a community outreach project at Pikine School where a wide range of projects are slated to improve the overall condition

of several on-site facilities. Additionally, 45 pallets of material will be donated through Project Handclasp, including high-nutrition meals, text books, medical supplies and desks that will be distributed to local schools and clinics.

"I'm looking forward to getting out and seeing Dakar," said Engineman Fireman Corry Fishburn, a Gunston Hall Sailor. "While in port I am going to participate in one of the two community relations projects the ship is conducting. I am also plan on taking in some of the country by trying some of the local foods."

Gunston Hall, a Whidbey Island-class amphibious dock-landing ship, is on a scheduled deployment in the 6th Fleet area of responsibility in support of APS West, an international initiative developed by Naval Forces Europe and Naval Forces Africa that aims to improve maritime safety and security in West and Central Africa.



Recycle to conserve energy and natural resources

- If you change your own motor oil, recycle the old oil. One gallon of used motor oil when recycled yields the same amount of refined lubricating oil—2.5 quarts as 42 gallons of crude oil.
- Don't dispose of your dead car battery. Recycle it. The typical car battery contains 18-20 pounds of lead-acid, a toxic substance that can cause serious adverse health effects if not disposed of properly. Contact your local government for recycling sites.
- Buy recycled products.
- Use a mug for coffee at work and home rather than a disposable cup.
- Purchase long-lasting, durable items rather than disposable ones.
- Use rechargeable batteries instead of disposable batteries.
- Start a compost pile.
- Buy the economy size of products when feasible. You will probably save money, and it will reduce the number of containers being thrown away.
- Buy products that have the smallest amount of packaging materials.
- Request that your name not be sold to mailing list companies. The average American receives an amount of junk mail each year that is equivalent to 1.5 trees.
- Recycle your old newspapers. If everyone in the United States recycled one-tenth of their newspapers, we would save about 25 million trees every year.
- Recycle your old glass bottles. The energy saved from recycling one glass bottle will light a 100-watt bulb for four hours.
- Choose returnable bottles instead of throwaway bottles when you have the option. Disposable (throwaway) bottles consume three times as much energy as reusable, returnable bottles.
- Recycle your old tin cans when you can. Recycling and reusing the material in tin cans reduces related energy use by 74 percent; air pollution by 85 percent; solid waste by 95 percent; and water pollution by 76 percent.
- Recycle your old aluminum cans when you can. When you toss out one aluminum can you waste as much energy as if you'd filled the same can half full of gasoline and poured it onto the ground.
- Recycle your old plastic soda bottles, milk bottles, detergent bottles, and whatever other plastic your community accepts for recycling. These can be used to produce a variety of items, including other detergent bottles, plastic lumber, fiberfill sleeping bag insulation, and clothing. Twenty-six recycled plastic soda bottles can make one polyester suit.
- Use a mulching mower to mow your lawn. You'll do your lawn good by putting the lawn cuttings back into the soil and you'll eliminate the need to dispose of these cuttings. The cuttings will serve as a mulch, retaining moisture in the soil, and are a natural fertilizer.

Safety Tip

Emergency Preparedness: Are You Ready?



Preparing for an emergency requires a bit of effort, but it's time well spent. What if an explosion, a landslide or a flash flood forced an evacuation of your neighborhood before you got home from work? Would you know where to find your family? Do you know the emergency plans for your children's school? And at work, do you know your role in your company's emergency response plan? When you prepare for an emergency, you can reduce some of the stress and anxiety experienced by yourself and your family members during a difficult time. Here are some tips to help you prepare for an emergency, at work and at home:

At Work

- Learn about the hazards of your workplace. Do you know where to find a chemical's MSDS (material safety data sheet), a safety shower or an emergency shut-off switch?
- Know how to get out alive. Study the company's evacuation plans and memorize two ways out of every area of your workplace - without an elevator. Note the number of doors and workstations between you and the exit so you can find your way out in the dark, if necessary. You should also know the designated meeting place and reporting procedures for personnel after an evacuation.
- Note the location of the fire extinguishers and learn how to correctly use them.
- Know where to find the first aid kit and how to contact employees certified to provide first aid.
- Post emergency phone numbers by your workstation, as well as the address and exact location of your workplace.
- Keep with you your identification, contact numbers and any necessary medical information.
- If you have a disability or condition that might interfere with your ability to exit quickly, inform your supervisor.

At Home

- Pack a disaster kit twice. Keep one kit in the home and a miniature version in your car.
- Create an evacuation plan of your home. Review it with your family and practice it at least once a year.
- Designate an out-of-the-area relative or family friend to be a contact - the family point person.
- If family members are separated during an emergency, they can call the point person and leave or retrieve messages.
- Pick two meeting places, one in your neighborhood and one far from home in case the neighborhood is evacuated.
- Talk to your children's schools about emergency plans. Make sure they have your contact information and know who is authorized to pick up your child if you can't get there yourself.

Preparing for an emergency can not only reduce the stress experienced during an emergency, it can also make family members feel more in control of their safety. And during times of chaos, a little control is very powerful.


