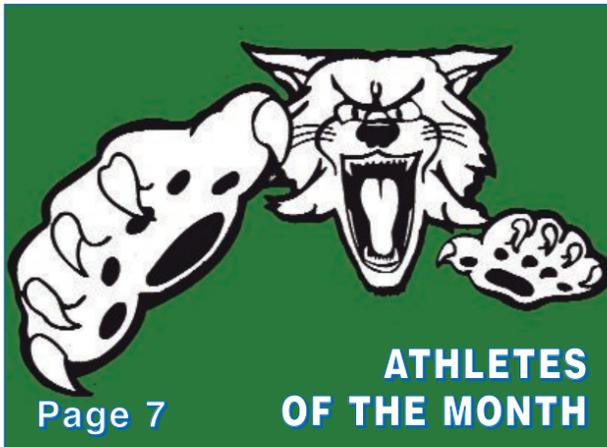

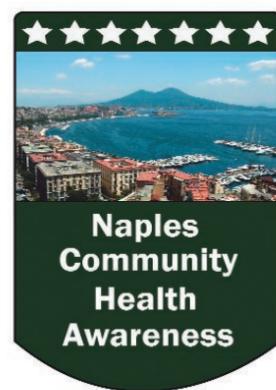

## DoDEA director visits NSA Naples

Dr. Shirley Miles, the director of the Department of Defense Education Activity (DoDEA), visited Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples May 12 and 13 to meet with the faculty and students.

Dr. Miles was in Europe to attend the Commanders Conference in Germany. While in the area, she visited some of the schools in Germany, Naples and Sigonella. "I take advantage of every time I have an opportunity to visit one of our schools," said Dr. Miles.

Dr. Miles was greeted at the front of Naples American High School by the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps (JROTC) who honored her visit with a sword arch. She was then treated to a three course lunch prepared by students from the school's culinary class, while two students from the music program performed for her during the meal.

"I think it's great that we were able to showcase the talent of our students. We were able to give Dr. Miles a glimpse of some of our programs, including JROTC, our culinary class, our music program and many of our other exceptional students," said Sandra Daniels, principal of the high school.

After lunch, Dr. Miles met with a few students from each grade to answer their questions and listen to their honest opinions. "The most fun part of my job is getting the chance to meet with the students and getting their opinions of the school," said Dr. Miles.

Dr. Miles will take all of the information she learned from her visit into consideration to determine if the school is run-

ning as it should be. "During my visits to the school I check the competency of my faculty and staff and make sure everything is going smoothly," said Dr. Miles. "I also like to make sure that the students are not only learning but are also happy, and I'm always impressed with the staff here in Naples and the care and nurturing that the students get."

## Obtaining your Sojourner Permit

Immediately upon transferring to the Naples area, military dependents and civilian employees must obtain a Sojourner Permit, the Permesso di Soggiorno, which means Permit to Stay in Italy.

Italian law requires all foreign personnel working or living within Italy, other than an active duty member under military orders, to obtain a Sojourner Permit within eight days of arrival in Italy.

One of the first and most important tasks for a newly arrived military family member, civilian employee, or civilian family member is to obtain a Sojourner Permit. It is different from a visa, which is merely an approval for entry into the country.

All applicants over 14 years of age must apply in person, as each person's signature is required at the time of application. Part of this procedure is the requirement to fingerprint individuals aged 18 and older.

Nationals of any state of the European Community coming to Italy do not require any visa or Sojourner Permit.

# Captain's Corner

It's that time of the year again: PCS season is upon us and we need to ensure that we make the transition as smooth as possible for our new personnel. As we all remember, moving to Naples means new personnel not only have to learn about a new command, they also have to adjust to a culture very different from their own. Welcome to all the newcomers.

The most important person helping our incoming personnel through this unique transition is the sponsor. Sponsors, I need you to make sure you are taking all of the proper steps to make the move easy for the person you are sponsoring. Supervisors, make sure you are assigning a compatible and available sponsor. If you are a sponsor this summer PCS season, be sure to call the FFSC with any questions you may have for your newcomer and sign up for the Sponsor Training workshop.

While we give our incoming personnel a lot of great information at Area Orientation, one thing that often isn't mentioned, or isn't mentioned in time, is the Sojourner Permit. All military dependents and civilian employees must obtain a Sojourner Permit, or "Permesso di Soggiorno," which means Permit to Stay in Italy, and they have to apply for it within **EIGHT DAYS of ARRIVING**. This is extremely important for those family members that do not arrive at the same time as the employee; this often goes forgotten until it's too late. More information is available in this issue of the *Panorama*.

While talking about PCS activities, let's talk about everyone's favorite subject: busses and bus passes. Boarding priority will be given to BQ residents and military/civilian personnel on PCS orders, while residing in the TLA/Capo Inn without CMVRO registered transportation. The bus pass system was put into effect to ensure primary riders are given priority boarding. It is very important that you get a bus pass if you are eligible for one. All others may ride the bus on a space available basis. Priority riders should always show their bus passes when boarding the busses, even if there is plenty of room onboard. We are tracking usage and routes based upon primary patron ridership, so show your passes to show us you're using the bus. Sponsors, please ensure the new arrivals are aware and get their passes.

With the Memorial Day weekend right around the corner, being stationed in Naples affords us the opportunity to take incredible short trips. Check with MWR, ITT and the USO for lists of fun activities, as well as the FFSC and ICR offerings for things to do in and around Naples. The annual remembrance ceremony at the Sicily-Rome American Cemetery and Memorial in Nettuno, east of Anzio, will be taking place on Memorial Day. The Naples military community will have participants in the event, and the Naples Boy Scout Troop will be supporting the preparations of the markers with flags and wreaths. Please plan ahead, enjoy yourselves and travel safely.

We had an unfortunate accident this past Wednesday evening. One of our 8th grade students was injured after being hit by a car after getting off the school bus out in town. ## Italian News Briefs

### First Italian woman priest ordained

On Saturday, the first Italian woman priest will be ordained at All Saints Church, near the Spanish Steps in Rome. The married woman is a member of the Italian Old Catholic Church, a group not recognized by the Vatican. It was founded at the beginning of the 19th century and doesn't accept some doctrines from the central Catholic church including papal infallibility and the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary. The woman, a teacher in Milan with a master's degree in philosophy and theology, had always dreamed of being a priest. She hopes that her ordination will create a debate about female ordination among Catholics since it has been ruled out by the popes, including Pope Benedict XVI.

### Theater at Pompeii reopens June 10

On June 10, the Teatro Grande at Pompeii excavation site hosts a memorable concert conducted by Riccardo Muti, who leads the Luigi Cherubini Youth Orchestra. (Muti has also been the director of the Philadelphia Orchestra and was recently appointed as the music director of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.) The theater was built in the second century B.C. and could hold five thousand spectators. The most important restoration was done with adequate accommodation of 1,800 seats, plus added lighting, barriers and guards, and was completed in full compliance with the conservation of artistic heritage. Conductor Muti said that the reopening and returning to the world of the Teatro Grande at Pompeii was important in the process of relaunching cultural life that aims to transmit the ancient Neapolitan tradition in Naples and Campania. The concert will open with "Romeo and Juliet Overture-Fantasy" by Tchaikovsky and it will end with Beethoven's Fifth Symphony in C minor, op. 67. ### Amalfi Coast mayor gets rid of garden gnomes

The mayor of Furore, a small town located between Amalfi and Positano, has ordered citizens to get rid of garden gnome statues because the statues change the natural environment. Some citizens have vowed to resist the mayor's orders and complained that their statues are located on their properties, and they won't cause any harm to the beauty of the small village, which has a population of 810 people. Some citizens are also willing to pay penalties for having installed the gnomes, but they won't remove them. The mayor stated that those gnomes are illegal and should be torn down.

### Italian police arrest hackers

A gang of hackers was broken up by police in 11 Italian regions Tuesday. Police arrested 23 people. The gang stole about €1 million from the bank accounts of hundreds of Italian and foreign victims. The head of the gang was a former

police informant who set up the organization after he came out of a witness protection program. His brother was a well-known hacker who carried out the fraud while he was under house arrest. The gang was also formed by women who worked at shopping centers to replace checkout payment machines with modified ones that were linked back to the gang's network. The gang had ties to Russian criminals.

### Spending eternity in northern Italy

The city council in Palosco, a small town near Bergamo in northern Italy, announced the selling of the 35-year concessions on six family tombs at a cost of €2,400 each for a two place vault on a first come first serve basis. Officials were surprised to discover some locals had started lining up at 4:30 a.m. The mayor said there was no need for the citizens to ruin their sleep for their favored place of eternal rest. There were some burial slots still available to purchase.

### Garbage crisis in Sicily

The city of Palermo, Sicily has a two month-long garbage crisis. Angry and desperate residents burned bins full of uncollected garbage in several locations in the city and surrounding provinces protesting against the city's chronic garbage crisis. Sicily's garbage emergency is extremely harmful both to the environment and the health of its citizens, said an Italian government opposition leader for the Democratic Party, Ermete Realacci. There was one metric ton of waste burned by local residents which released up to 1,000 microgram of dioxins in the atmosphere, according to Realacci. He presented questions to the Italian Cabinet and the Environment Ministry urging the government to take rapid action to end the crisis. Realacci also pointed out that Sicily's recycling is less than 7 percent, far below the rates Italy's regions are legally required to achieve. Sicily remains the Italian region with the lowest rate of recycling.

### Italian antitrust authority investigates rising car insurance rates

The antitrust authority in Italy opened an investigation into the hike of car insurance rates. The authority will find out why prices continued to rise significantly despite legislative intervention and regulation aimed at making the sector more competitive. The antitrust authority explained that from 2009 to 2010 the cost of policies rose by an average of 15 percent with increases of 22 percent for mopeds and over 30 percent for motorbikes. Codacons, the consumer rights association, announced that if the antitrust investigation uncovers irregularities or the existence of a cartel, it will move forward with a class action lawsuit against the insurance companies. Two other consumer associations said that in 15 years, from 1994 to 2009, the cost of car insurance rose by 155 percent, which became 170 percent when calculating in the price increase in 2010.

# One man, two years, 365 pizzas

History was made at the Pizzeria Giardino d'Averno Friday, May 14 as Sale Lilly ate pizza number 365.

The now-famous pizza aficionado has been visiting pizzerias all throughout Naples, the surrounding areas and Europe—even as far away as Scotland—on a quest to eat 365 pizzas in two years and, in the process, find the perfect pizza.

"Of all the places to meet Neapolitans," said Lilly, "the pizzeria is the best. Pizzas are made out in the open and it's a very honest experience. The pizzaio's personal reputation is on the line. When you order pasta, it's made behind a wall in the kitchen, and there's no interaction with the chef."

Lilly is actually Lt. Sale Lilly, an active-duty service member stationed here, and his tour in Naples began as many others' do, with a desire to try to local food and do a little traveling. What began as a simple goal of eating at all the pizzerias on his various guidebooks' "top ten" lists has turned into a journey through the world of Italian pizza and the discovery of dozens of small, unknown pizzerias with a lot to offer.

"About a month after I arrived, I had done what I set out to do and I had a lot of the 'best' pizzas," said Lilly. "But there are too many good pizzas for any guidebook to be conclusive about the best. My number one pizza [the Tonnato from Pellone Pizzeria in Naples] wasn't in any guidebook I found. But my number two pizza was."

His restraints are considerable: he cannot repeat the same pizza at the same pizzeria, he must eat the whole pizza (half if it's a pizza al metro), and if the pizzeria offers a pizza bearing the name of the restaurant, he must try it. The result has been a sampling of 365 pizzas from more than 200 pizzerias throughout Europe, all carefully catalogued, mapped and reviewed at [www.pizzasforsale.com](http://www.pizzasforsale.com). He ate 330 of his pizzas inside Italy, and his worst pizza was also his most expensive—30 Euros in Monaco.

"Neapolitans claim to have invented pizza," he said, "and the Margherita was invented here," so he focused most of his attention on Naples and the surrounding area. (The pizza Margherita was invented for the visit of Queen Margherita to Naples, the ingredients intended to reflect the colors of the Italian flag.)

According to Lilly, there are more than 6,000 pizzerias in Naples alone and 12,000 in the Campania

region. "I was able to try a larger sample than any of the guidebooks," he said.

It would take several lifetimes to eat through all the pizzas here, but Lilly's pizza eating days may be numbered, at least for now. When taking his last bite of his last pizza, to thunderous applause, someone in the crowd shouted, "Order number 366!"

Lilly smiled. "It might be a while," he said. Always a Mexican food lover, he "converted" to pizzas because he moved to what he calls "Pizza Heaven."

"Any above-average pizza [on my list] was well above average," he said, "and much better than anything I've had in the States." He will be moving on to Virginia this summer, where another adventure awaits no doubt.

With two years and 365 pizzas under his belt, Lilly has learned a thing or two about eating pizza here. His website lists three rules for ordering the best pizza: order pizza after 7:30 p.m.; only eat pizza where there are plenty of Italians; and order the pizza bearing the restaurant's name. "Practice your Italian and get to know your pizzaio," he added. "You'll get better service that way and you'll have a better experience overall."

Lilly's time in Naples is coming to a close, but he has left a legacy and a challenge for the rest of us remaining behind.

"Neapolitans are rightly very proud of their pizza," said Lilly. "And I found that if you take an intense interest in something they're so proud of, you become like family and just have a great experience at the pizzeria and throughout your stay here."

## Move it!

According to the World Health Organization "at least 60 percent of the world's population fails to complete the recommended amount of physical activity required to induce health benefits." The average adult needs at least 30 minutes of moderate to vigorous exercise a day.

If you don't currently workout, start slowly. First, make an appointment with your primary care doctor to ensure that you can exercise safely without any restrictions. Secondly, choose an activity that you enjoy. An example of moderate activity is brisk walking: this is usually an easy place for most people to start.

Here are some other examples from the American Heart Association on how to exercise during your daily routine:

- Do housework yourself instead of hiring someone else to do it.
- Work in the garden or mow the grass. Using a riding mower doesn't count! Rake leaves, prune, dig and pick up trash.
- Go out for a short walk before breakfast, after dinner or both! Start with 10 minutes and work up to 30 minutes.
- Walk or bike to the corner store instead of driving.
- When walking, pick up the pace from leisurely to brisk. Choose a hilly route. When watching TV, sit up instead of lying on the sofa. Better yet, spend a few minutes pedaling on your stationary bicycle while watching TV. Throw away your video remote control. Instead of asking someone to bring you a drink, get off the couch and get it yourself.
- Stand up while talking on the telephone.
- Walk the dog.
- Park farther away at the shopping mall and walk the extra distance. Wear your walking shoes and sneak in an extra lap or two around the mall.
- Stretch to reach items in high places and squat or bend to look at items at floor level.

## FitZone renovation

Capodichino FitZone's ongoing renovation is transitioning into the second phase. The FitZone's three phase renovation project, entering its fourth month, has already drastically impacted the facility's operations and programming, and patrons' workouts, no doubt.

The first phase of the renovation focused on the women's locker room, improving the hot water circulation system and providing a facelift with new flooring, tiling and countertops. The first phase was completed May 7. Working with the Seabees, the FitZone was able to partition the men's locker room during this phase to provide showering and lockers for both genders.

The project's second phase includes the same renovations to be made to the men's locker room. However, with the newly renovated women's locker room it is not possible for MWR to separate the locker room with partitions. In order to continue to provide showering facilities to both genders during the second phase, MWR acquired an external shower/changing facility located between FitZone and Capo Landing for men. Women will have access to their FitZone locker room through the indoor pool side entrance. Women's lockers will also be available for rent very soon. Phase two is scheduled to be completed August 31.

The third phase of the renovation, scheduled to begin Sunday, May 23, includes a complete facelift of the FitZone's lobby area, including electrical modifications, expansion of the cardio area and impressive new countertops and flooring. This will be the most intrusive phase of the renovation, all but closing the FitZone.

So as to continue to meet the demand for fitness on Capodichino, MWR will move the selectorized weight machines, treadmills, ellipticals, stairmasters, bikes, rowers and spin bikes to the Ciao Hall. Group exercise classes will also be held at the Ciao Hall Fitness Center and published in MWR's "8 Days a Week." Also located at the Ciao Hall are two small locker rooms with a limited number of daily use lockers and showers. MWR will continue its towel service to all shower and fitness areas.

The Ciao Hall Fitness Center will open Thursday, May 27. This facility will operate from 5 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and 7:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. Saturdays, until the completion of the third phase at FitZone. FitZone's indoor pool will be open and operating summer hours (5 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday) from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend. Fitzone's basketball court, accessible through the rear entrance (located on the opposite side of the building from the front entrance), will be available for open recreation from 6 to 8 a.m. and 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday. If you have a request outside those hours, please contact FitZone staff at [Naples.Fitzone@eu.navy.mil](mailto:Naples.Fitzone@eu.navy.mil).

MWR has made every effort to continue as many of their current fitness services throughout the renovation as possible. Any changes to times or services provided were carefully calculated to utilize all available resources. MWR researched patron check-in times and patterns, equipment usage patterns and facility security, in order to establish any changes. Staff will continue to monitor all factors and adjust accordingly.

Fitness Forum on Support Site will continue to provide a variety of aerobic classes and open recreation opportunities. Additionally, Carney Park Fitness Yurt has a full circuit of selectorized weight machines available, as well as aerobic classes on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Intramural sports has a variety of sporting opportunities throughout the summer, including sand volleyball, tennis, golf and softball tournaments, in addition to the monthly 5k runs.

Members of the Naples area First Class Petty Officers Association (FCPOA) are role models for junior enlisted sailors. # Naples Public Health Evaluation

## PHE Update

In 2008, the Navy launched a Public Health Evaluation (PHE) in the greater Naples area. The goal was to identify potential health risks as a result of inadequate trash collection, uncontrolled open burning of uncollected trash and widespread dumping of waste, including chemical and other hazardous waste. The PHE is now in its final stages.

*Those new to the Naples area often have many questions about the PHE. Here are some frequently asked questions:*

**Q. Where does the PHE stand at the moment?**

A. The Naples PHE consists of two main phases. Phase I tested more than 160 homes in nine study areas, with an emphasis on places where there are known or suspected waste sites. Phase II sampled about 200 homes in a more geographically balanced approach across the study areas. Phase II results are now in risk assessment analysis and incorporation into the final Phase II report. The final Phase II report is expected to be released by summer of 2010, followed by informational open houses similar to those held last year for the release of the Phase I report.

**Q. I hear some personnel have had to relocate to other homes--what is that about?**

A. In addition to Phases I and II, an additional sampling effort was conducted in the Casal di Principe area as a result of sampling results from Phase I. In this area, unacceptable levels of the chemical tetrachloroethene (PCE), a volatile organic compound (VOC) that could pose health risks, were found in groundwater and soil gas samples. To date, 36 homes have been identified with unacceptable levels of VOCs whose tenants have been told to relocate. The Navy has relocated these residents because PCE vapors may enter the structure through a process called vapor intrusion. When vapor intrusion occurs, tenants can inhale the chemical inside the property. Exposure to PCE can cause adverse health effects. Unfortunately, there are no truly effective steps that tenants can take to safeguard against inhaling PCE vapors, so relocation is the best option. The good news is that there are no immediate health risks to these families.

**Q. New Lease Suspension Zones: What are they?**

A. There are three NLSZs in the greater Naples area: Casal di Principe, Marcianise and Arzano. In a NLSZ, the Navy has suspended the signing of new leases because of health concerns in the area. Before the Navy determines what the future will hold for these areas, it is important that the Navy completes its analysis of Phase II sampling. Right now, the Navy is taking conservative, health protective measures as it works through the Phase II effort.

**Q. How can I be sure if my water is free from bacteriological contamination?**

A. Families and housing inspectors must pay special attention to the cleanliness of water systems at their home to ensure that land-

lords have properly cleaned and sanitized all tanks and water distribution systems. Water distribution systems must be cleaned and maintained at least once every six months to prevent bacterial contamination.

**Q. Landlord provided containerized water: what is it?**

A. An important mitigation measure that should be followed by all personnel living off-base is the use of bottled water for drinking, cooking/food preparation, making ice, brushing teeth, and for pets. To ensure that all personnel have ready access to bottled water, NSA Housing now requires landlords to provide for their tenants containerized water from a Navy-approved vendor. The landlord-provided containerized water program is mandatory for landlords who wish to list their properties with the NSA Housing Office. If a landlord fails to fulfill the water clause in the lease, the tenant should insist on it.

**Q. When will the Naples PHE end?**

A. The goal is to complete the Phase II Final PHE Report by early summer of 2010. Completion means that the Navy has fully analyzed potential health risks associated with the air, water, soil and soil gas in the greater Naples area, as a result of inadequate trash collection, uncontrolled open burning of uncollected trash, and widespread dumping of waste, including chemical and other hazardous waste, and implemented the recommended actions and enduring processes identified in the report.

**Q. What likely will be the legacy of the PHE?**

A. Until the final report is completed and Navy leadership has reviewed it, it would be speculative to say what the lasting results of the PHE will be. However, many enduring processes are already in place, such as drinking only bottled water; leasing only homes on city water; requiring landlords to provide an approved containerized water service; and requiring landlords to clean and sanitize all domestic water holding tanks and water distribution systems prior to leasing the home, with regular maintenance and cleaning every six months thereafter.

**Q. Whom do I call if I have a question about my health?**

A. Personnel who have questions about their health or the Naples Public Health Evaluation should contact the Environmental Health Information Office at the U.S. Naval Hospital at Gracignano. The phone number is 081-811-6321. At the Environmental Health Information Center, health professionals are available for one-on-one consultations to discuss personal health concerns. They can also provide more information on the PHE.

## Safety Tip

### May is Motorcycle Safety Awareness Month

Motorcycles are vehicles with the same rights and privileges as any motor vehicle on the roadway. One of the most common causes of motorcycle crashes is being cut off by another vehicle. Motorcyclists are vulnerable. Their small vehicles can easily go out of control with changes in the road surface. A spill can mean serious injuries or death for the rider.

*Drivers of other passenger vehicles should always remember to follow these steps to help keep motorcyclists safe:*

- Allow a motorcyclist the full lane width. Although it may seem as though there is enough room in a traffic lane for an automobile and a motorcycle, the motorcycle needs the full room to maneuver safely. Do not share the lane.
- Always signal your intentions before changing lanes or merging with traffic. This allows the motorcyclist to anticipate traffic flow and find a safe lane position.
- Remember that motorcyclists are often hidden in a vehicle's blind spot or missed in a quick look due to their smaller size. Always make a visual check for motorcycles by checking mirrors and blind spots before entering or leaving a lane of traffic and at intersections.
- Don't be fooled by a flashing turn signal on a motorcycle--motorcycle signals usually are not self-canceling and riders sometimes forget to turn them off. Wait to be sure the motorcycle is going to turn before you proceed.
- Remember that road conditions that are minor annoyances to passenger vehicles pose major hazards to motorcyclists. Be aware that motorcyclists may need to change speed or adjust their position within a lane suddenly in reaction to road and traffic conditions such as potholes, gravel, wet or slippery surfaces, pavement seams, railroad crossings and grooved pavement.
- Allow more following distance, three or four seconds, when following a motorcycle so the motorcyclist has enough time to maneuver or stop in an emergency. And don't tailgate. In dry conditions, motorcycles can stop more quickly than cars.
- Two-wheeled vehicles can travel fast, so make sure you can safely pass a bike. Tap your horn lightly, but do not startle the rider.

Allow plenty of space for the bike's wobbly course.

Motorcyclists have responsibilities, too; following the rules of the roadway, being alert to other drivers and always wearing protective gear. They must drive responsibly and never "hot dog." They must do shoulder checks before lane changes and turns. They shouldn't dart in and out of traffic, putting themselves in danger from larger vehicles.

Too often, in a crash, the drivers of other vehicles involved say they never saw the motorcyclist and failed to respond in time. This is no excuse. Too many lives are being lost.

*Help make this the first year in recent years when motorcycle fatalities do not increase. "Share the Road" with motorcycles.*



# Exploring Italy—just dive in

Scuba diving in Italy? You might be a little skeptical. Maybe the thought of finding a dive shop and renting gear in town is a little unnerving, or you just don't know where to start. You're in luck—Lewis Heuermann, a six-year resident of Naples, created an online diving forum to help you navigate the seas.

DivingItalyForum.com began as an e-mail exchange between 12 people in 2009. In less than one month, participation grew to over 60 people. The message was clear: people were interested in scuba diving in Italy, but were overwhelmed by figuring out how to go about it. Lewis quickly realized that he was hitting one of the community's needs and decided to create a free, open forum on the Internet.

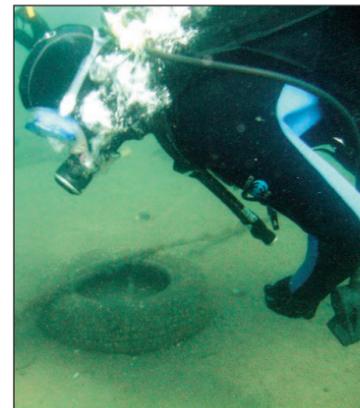
"Diving is a naturally social activity," Lewis said. "You shouldn't have to pay to be part of a group. Diving and the people you meet while diving can help you with the cultural transition." He has been in Naples with his family for six years, and for the first four years, he did not dive because he did not even know that it was possible to do so.

As a certified rescue diver, Lewis tries to be the best dive buddy that he possibly can be, and he used that same philosophy when launching DivingItalyForum.com. For him, maintaining the website and moderating the forum is both relaxing and fun, and allows him to

help out members of the community.

When you visit DivingItalyForum.com, you are in good company. You'll meet people with a variety of experience from people who have never dived before but are thinking about giving it a try to PADI-certified (Professional Association of Diving Instructors, the world's leading training organization) instructors who might be willing to certify you over a few weekends. You can post your own queries, meet people who share a common interest and find yourself a dive buddy. Fellow divers share their own experiences and often post open invitations to join their future diving trips. Dive shop owners weigh in with their own expertise to help you find rental equipment or explain the conditions of a dive site that interests you. Divers also leave feedback on their recent adventures posting information about the temperature, visibility, conditions and the wonders they experienced under the sea.

## Where to go, how to get there

For current the conditions and water quality of each region of Italy, Lewis directs you to <http://www.tutelamare.eu/home.jsp>. Tute La Mare is an environmental website that Italy established to monitor the seas. For local conditions, click "Environment and Weather" in the navigation bar and locate Naples on the map. Then, you can look up the current sea quality (high, fair or poor). This site is available in English and Italian.

In the Naples area, water quality concerns are drawn from human and chemical waste. Lewis explained that while there is trash in the water in some places like Pozzuoli, oftentimes nearby sites are clear. For example, Baia is a great place for your first local diving experience. The water is clean, visibility adequate and the depth is only about 20 feet. You can view archaeological ruins including columns, statues, mosaic floors and even a Roman anchor. There is also a small amount of volcanic activity underwater.

If you are looking to get out of town, head down to the Amalfi Coast. The water is clear and diving provides the opportunity to see so much—from starfish and barracuda to tuna and moray eels. You can spend hours swimming through the underwater caves and arches. Beaches and campsites are nearby.

To visit a paradise not too far away, catch the ferry from Formia to the pedestrian-only island of Ventotene. The crystal clear waters invite you to watch hundreds of schools of fish and lobsters and crabs. This is a great site for beginners—many of the dive shops offer intensive weekend-long certification courses in English led by fully licensed and experienced staff—as well as advanced divers and everyone in between. All diving equipment can be rented onsite, but you are more than welcome to use your own personal equipment. Landlubbers can relax on

the black volcanic sand beaches, hike the cliffs or wander around the town.

## Helping the environment

In order to preserve sites like Ventotene and Baia, Lewis encourages all divers to consider their environmental impact and more importantly, their responsibility to it. He believes that divers should raise environmental awareness in their local neighborhoods. He shares his diving stories with his neighbors who are as surprised to learn about the treasures of the sea as they are about the trash underwater, especially the amounts of plastic coffee and water cups.

Lewis reminds all divers not to take anything from the sea and to "just leave bubbles," although, he and other divers break this rule during cleanup day. In 2009, divers removed the trash from the water around the island of Nisida. This year, Oceanus invited them to participate in International Cleanup Day, hosted by the Project AWARE society ([www.projectaware.org](http://www.projectaware.org)), in the local Naples water. Oceanus is a non-profit organization that "is mainly focused on promoting and developing several research projects aiming at the preservation of the aquatic ecosystems and environments, as well as the protection of the aquatic species under increasing threat." (Visit <http://oceanus.it> to learn more.) In the spirit of respect and partnership, International Cleanup Day will improve the quality of the water, strengthen relations with local Italian divers, educate divers and family members about the international impacts of pollution, and demonstrate to the community that divers are ambassadors of the ocean.

## Dive in

"Diving is an awesome outlet providing the opportunity to put the cell phone down and enjoy the quiet. It's technically and mentally challenging," Lewis explains.

To dive in and make the most of your time in Naples, visit DivingItalyForum.com, and prepare to get lost to the ocean and its wonders.
