'Yellow Wings' will soon soar over Kingsville T-45 Goshawk displays pre-WWII paint scheme with yellow wings, black tail

Two T-45 Goshawks recently painted aboard Naval Air Station Kingsville are not displaying their standard orange and white colors.

They are sporting pre-World War II tactical aircraft paint schemes, which featured a color coding system. This era of Naval Aviation was commonly referred to as the "Yellow Wings" era.

"Prior to World War II, Squadrons were divided into six sections denoted by color," said Capt. Rich Dann, Executive Director of Centennial Staff. "Also, different tail colors represented different carrier assignments."

One of the trainers has been painted with a black tail indicating the aircraft was assigned to USS Wasp (CV 7). Black section markings indicate the aircraft would have been assigned to the squadron's fourth section. That T-45 will be flown here, aboard Naval Air Station Kingsville, by Training Air Wing TWO student Naval Aviators.

"The jet is looking great," said Capt. Mark Brooks, Commander, Training Air Wing TWO. "I'm looking forward to seeing the final roll out."

Dann stated that each of the nine training command aircraft that are being painted

will be unique. The paint schemes will demonstrate a cross-section of how Naval aircraft had once been painted.

"The paints being used are the correct colors for the specs used 'back in the day,'" he added.

He emphasized these historical paint schemes are being applied as the aircraft come up to existing maintenance periods and must be repainted anyway.

"The intent is to use the aircraft to teach Naval Aviation heritage in a unique way. Each Centennial aircraft will carry a fact sheet about the paint scheme for teaching purposes," Dann added.

The "retro-painting" is one facet of activities being planned celebrating 100 years of Naval Aviation.

The Centennial of Naval Aviation kicks off in January 2011, with a variety of events to be held throughout the year, including tactical demonstrations, air shows, flyovers and art exhibits.



Overall, the NAS Kingsville Lifeguards took first place in the Olympics. Brian Cobb also received second place in an open 50-meter swim. There were 24 contestants from four pools who competed at the Olympics.

officers. She is an active member of the First Class Petty Officers' Association, in which she holds the position of secretary.



Team Kingsville edges defending champs for Navy Ball Golf Tournament title

A double eagle on the par-5 16th hole proved to be the margin of victory in the 2010 Navy Ball Golf Tournament, played at L.E. Ramey Golf Course July 30.

All players in the field had a chance to win a 2010 Mercury Mariner, courtesy of Eddie Yaklin Ford of Kingsville, if they could get

"Skipper Mac carried us all the way around the course," Ratliff said. "I'll bet he's tired."

Volunteers from the Navy Ball Committee worked the event, which helps raise money to offset ticket prices for junior enlisted personnel at the Navy Ball.

Melissa Brooks, secretary of the Kingsville Navy League and wife of Training Air Wing TWO Commander Capt. Mark Brooks, handled tournament sponsorship.

"I think all the sponsors who played really had a good time today," Brooks said after the awards ceremony. "It has been a lot of work getting this [tournament] together, but knowing that everybody had a great time makes it all worth it."

BUPERS uses new system for message delivery

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) -- The Bureau of Naval Personnel (BUPERS) and Navy Personnel Command (NPC) announced they are transitioning to a new message system.

According to NAVADMIN 249/10, all unclassified message traffic from BUPERS and NPC, including permanent change of station orders, will be sent via command e-mail through

the Official Information Exchange (OIX). This change is a result of Navy ending support for the Defense Messaging System (DMS).

"This process should be transparent for the Sailors in the Fleet," said Capt. Brian Wenger, NPC assistant commander for Business Operations and Comptroller. "The important thing is for commands to set up their command e-mail in the OIX system," as outlined in the NAVADMIN.

To create as transparent a change as possible, BUPERS is fielding a new system called Government Official Information Exchange System (GOES). The internal system will act as a router for all BUPERS official information into OIX. All commands that have set up command e-mail with OIX will receive message traffic from GOES. GOES also supports Sailors stationed in non-Navy billets such as those in Individual Augmentee assignments.

As the Navy transitions to OIX, assistance is available to commands to minimize impact to their receipt of message traffic.

GOES will continue to deliver information to BUPERS On-Line so users will still be able to access messages posted there.



A Unique Addition To The Summer Grilling Menu



GRILLED PINEAPPLE WITH PASSION FRUIT BUTTER

Pineapple, green leaves still attached
3 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted
3 tablespoons Passion Fruit Sauce (see box)
2 tablespoons chopped toasted cashews

Prepare a medium fire in a charcoal grill, or preheat a gas grill to 350 F. Using a large knife, quarter the pineapple lengthwise and cut out the core, leaving the green leaves on. Mix the melted butter and passion fruit sauce together. Grill the pineapple on one cut side until golden, about 5 minutes. Turn the fruit and brush the cooked side with the passion fruit butter sauce. Grill the other cut side for 5 minutes, then brush with more of the sauce mixture.

To serve, place the pineapple quarters on an attractive platter and pour the remaining sauce over the top. Garnish with the cashews. Each person should take a quarter and slice the fruit away from the skin.

**As an alternative to the cashews, try toasted coconut flakes.*

PASSION FRUIT SAUCE

Makes about 1 1/2 cups: 2 passion fruits • 1 cup sugar • 1 cup water

Halve the passion fruits, and then scoop out the pulp and seeds. Discard the skin. In a medium saucepan, combine all the ingredients and bring to a boil, then reduce the heat to a simmer. Cook, stirring occasionally, until the pulp is soft, about 15 minutes. Set a sieve over a bowl and press the pulp through, then discard the seeds and solids left in the sieve. Let the strained sauce cool to room temperature before using. Store in the refrigerator in a tightly covered container for up to 2 weeks. Bring back to room temperature before serving.


