Jazz fest knocks their socks off

The Department of Defense Dependents Schools-Europe (DoDDS-E) Jazz Seminar gave student musicians from around Europe the opportunity to sharpen their musical skills. Naples Middle/High School hosted the 2011 Jazz Seminar, which featured 25 student instrumentalists and eight student vocalists. The students were guided in their work by eight DoDDS-Europe educators from schools throughout Europe and world-renowned jazz trombonist and educator, Jiggs Whigham. The seminar began Jan. 11 with ensemble rehearsal and continued through the week with sectional rehearsals and concerts culminating in a final performance Saturday evening at the school.

Mr. Gary Marvel, director of high school music at Naples, said this festival gave students two important skills. On the musical side, the students were able to perform at a top level with a world-famous musician, giving them the opportunity to see what it takes to succeed in

the music business. On the non-musical side, the musicians learned how important teamwork really is in life: they had to focus on what the ensemble produced in an extremely short period of time, and come together as a harmonious sound. The responsibility and discipline to do this reflected a very high level of maturity on the part of these student musicians. "It's not a question of 'me' at all—it is the team that matters," Marvel added.

Naples had one student musician in the seminar this year, Conner Crosswell, a junior, who plays bass. He said it was quite an experience, "Overwhelming. I needed to practice more before the fest." Despite his misgivings, Crosswell was also on stage for the Friday and Saturday concerts. Crosswell added that if he had it to do over, he would have "practiced non-stop for days and days."

The guest conductor for the program was Jiggs Whigham, a long-time supporter of the Jazz Seminar. He was one of the original founders of the DoDDS-E Jazz festival, when it only included a few schools in Germany. *see JAZZ FEST Page 13*

Italian News Briefs

Food labeling to protect Italian food from fraud

The Italian parliament approved a law on mandatory labeling of food products' place of origin to protect and defend Italian food from fraud on internal and external markets. Italy's Agriculture Minister Giancarlo Galan stated that now Italians can safely buy products because they will know where they come from and the false "made in Italy" food is over. He said the law is yet to be approved by the European Commission, and Italy has to work out origin labeling rules for specific products.

First Italian language test for immigrants

On Monday, Florence hosted the first immigrants' new compulsory Italian language test for people wanting long-term residence permits. A group of 17 immigrants took the test, which was approved by a decree last June to help integration. The test consisted of three-parts: listening and reading, comprehension and the composition of a short text. Migrants must answer 80 percent of the questions correctly to be able to proceed with their long-term residency application. Those who fail can retake the test. On the same day, another group of nine migrants took the test in the city of Asti, in northern Italy. Every year more than 400,000 foreigners register for a long-term residence permit.

Italian Renaissance painter celebrated in colossal exhibit in home town

Melozzo da Forli' was the first Renaissance painter to successfully practice foreshortening and paved the way for great masters like Raphael and Michelangelo, who borrowed much from Melozzo in their own work. Melozzo da Forli' was born and raised in Forli', in the Marche region. The Museo di San Domenico in Forli' is celebrating the famous Italian Renaissance artist with a landmark art exhibit. The exhibit will be the most complete exhibit dedicated to Melozzo and will also show a huge

cycle of frescoes removed from the apse of the Church of Holy Apostles in Rome. The exhibit will display Piero della Francesca's masterpiece "Madonna di Senigallia," which has been restored for the first time in nearly 60 years. Mantegna, Bramante, Raphael and Perugino's works will also be on display. The exhibit runs from January 29 to June 12.

Capri police issue ticket to municipality

Municipal police in Capri received many phone calls from local residents about a car parked for several months along a road where there are traffic and parking bans in place. The car had been abandoned on a road next to the entrance of the local emergency first aid hospital and was problematic for ambulances trying to get in and out. Police found the car was unlocked and the insurance had expired. While they were gathering information on the car's owner, they found out that their office parking garage owned the car. Now, the municipality has received a ticket and it needs to answer for violations on the highway code.

Illegal apartments seized in Paestum

Police in Paestum seized four illegal apartments under construction without planning permits near the famous archaeological area where the Greek temples are located. The building was going to be constructed without any authorization not far from the three huge sixth-century B.C. Doric temples that draw thousands of visitors a year. The owners of the building were arrested.

Italian films sets box-office record

Checcho Zalone, a comic actor from Puglia region, released his second movie "Che bella giornata" (What a beautiful day) and hit the Italian cinema all-time box-office record in only its second week of release. After the latest weekend, the movie reached almost €31.5 million beating the record set by Benigni's La Vita e' Bella (Life is Beautiful). Zalone starred in a TV cabaret acting as an odd character based on off-beat southern wedding singers.

Located 65 miles from Naples, the mountain of Monte Cassino rewards visitors with an opportunity to experience both a beautiful historical landmark at the Monte Cassino Abbey and magnificent panoramic views of the Rapido River valley.

Cassino existed as far back as the 4th century B.C. The Romans called it Casinum. Because of its strategic position—on a mountain that rises over 1,700 feet high—the abbey at Monte Cassino has been the target for destruction in numerous wars.

The monastery was founded by St. Benedict in 529 and was one of the greatest Catholic monuments of the world. It was constructed on an Ancient Roman site where a temple to Apollo had once been erected.

In the 580s, about 40 years after St. Benedict's death, the monastery suffered its first destruction. It was sacked by the

Lombards, who wanted to use it as a stronghold against the Romans. The abbey was not rebuilt until 717, only to suffer from destruction again by the Saracens in 883.

During its third lease on life, the monastery entered a period of prosperity and influence, a time when the monks devoted them-

selves to the Benedictine ideal of sanctity through work, prayer and study. However, the Monte Cassino Abbey was destroyed by earthquake in 1349 and sacked again by Napoleon's army during their advance through Italy in 1799.

Safe and secure in Naples

Naples is a beautiful, large metropolitan city. Like all big cities, there exists a criminal element, which is always looking to take advantage of unsuspecting victims. In 2010, NSA Naples Security received 145 reported vehicle break-ins and 35 reported burglaries/house break-ins throughout the Naples metropolitan region. While the data may appear low, it does not reflect the number of unreported incidents. Whether you are a native Neapolitan or you just arrived from the States, there is always something you can do to become a harder target.

NSA Security compiled the following tips to help prevent becoming a victim of property crime:

For Homes:

Criminals will always look for the easiest target. Your goal, therefore, should be to become a hard, unappealing target.

- Ensure that you lock each entrance to your home (i.e. doors, windows, percianas, garage doors, etc.). Whether you are going away for an hour or if you are going to bed, remember to take precautions to lock every entrance to your home. In Naples, the majority of burglaries or house break-in incidents appear to occur during the night hours. If you have an old-style skeleton key lock, ensure that you remove the key after locking the door; crooks can use needle nose pliers to turn the key from the outside to gain entrance.
- Remember to utilize the Home Alarm system if installed. If your home does not have an alarm system, consider having your landlord install one as a pre-condition to renewing your rental agreement. You may also request a Security MIHA allowance through the Housing Office (approved on a case by case basis) in order to install a new alarm or improve the current system. This allowance is granted only to U. S. military members. As of January 1, the Housing Office will only be showing homes equipped with home alarm systems, and the absence of an alarm may hinder new contract signings. Contact the Housing Office at 629-4466 for further details.
- When you depart your home, ensure that you leave the appearance of someone being home, by leaving indoor lighting, T.V. or radio turned on.
- Get to know your neighbors. Having alert neighbors who take notice of suspicious events can be the determining factor in preventing a break-in.
- Designate a secure location for your car and house keys. Several house break-in victims also had their vehicles stolen because they left the keys in an easily visible and accessible location. Thieves have been known to either load your car with your stolen goods and drive off or they come back at a later time to steal your vehicle.
- Consider using diversion safes, which appear to be common household items and are designed to hold valuables (i.e. jewelry or currency).

For Vehicles:

Vehicle break-ins are the most reported crime within the Naples area. The following are several ways to help prevent this crime:

- Do not leave valuables in plain view. Cash, GPS devices, shopping bags, backpacks, etc. all attract the attention of thieves. If you leave a bag in plain view on the seat, regardless of what's inside, a thief may break your window and take it just out of curiosity.
- Minimize the valuables you carry in the car. Hiding GPS devices or gas coupon books in the glove compartment doesn't necessarily keep them safe. That's often the first place a thief will check. It's best to take the GPS with you when you leave the car and only carry as many gas coupons as you will need for that trip.
- Do not leave personal identification documents or credit cards in your vehicle. These documents could be used later to conduct further criminal acts.
- Consider buying a mechanical locking device to place over or around the steering wheel/column or brake to prevent the wheel from being turned.
- Park in well lit areas and along main thoroughfares if possible. Parking in a secure lot or paying an attendant can also add a bit more security to your parked vehicle.

Immediate Actions to take following any incident:

If you experience a home or vehicle break-in or any other incident, you should take the following steps:

- Immediately notify NSA Naples Emergency Dispatch at 081-568-5638 or 5639. If you are experiencing an emergency dial 081-568-4911 from off base or cell phone or, on base, dial 626-4911. Upon contact with Emergency Dispatch, the caller should request that Security's India-Seven (I-7) investigators be notified. I-7 personnel may be dispatched out to the scene of an incident to provide translation and liaison services between the victim and the local Law Enforcement agencies. The victim may be required to file an incident report/denuncia with either the Carabinieri or Polizia.
- To follow up on an incident (regardless of the event), we strongly recommend the victim report into one of the Security precincts (CAPO/Support Site) and file a formal Voluntary Statement with Security. You may be required to produce personal documents; please ensure that you bring copies of your CMVRO paperwork, insurance, Italian translation, stateside driver's license and military/DoD identification. Lastly, ensure that you create an itemized list of the missing items, along with an estimated value of the item(s).

While some of these measures may appear to be excessive, it only takes a lapse in one area to become a victim. Try practicing all of the security measures, because you never know when they will come in handy. NOSC supports higher learning with scholarships

Eligible Naples High School (NHS) students and military community members looking to further their education, without having to spend an arm and a leg on tuition costs, may be able to take advantage of a special scholarship awarded by the Naples Overseas Spouses Club (NOSC).

The scholarship is intended to help fund undergraduate and graduate education expenses at an accredited institution of higher learning or an accredited vocational or technical school.

"The high school scholarships are offered to qualifying NHS seniors beginning an undergraduate degree beginning in Fall 2011," said Mary Hansen, the NOSC scholarship chairman. "The undergraduate and graduate student scholarships are offered to qualifying active duty service members and their dependent spouse or children attached to commands in Gaeta and Naples as of February 15, 2011, regardless of where the spouse or child resides."

All scholarship applicants must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0. "Parents are encouraged to assist students with downloading the application and delivering it after completion. However, the students must answer the questions on the application themselves," said Rachel Schoonmaker, a NOSC Scholarship Committee member.

High school seniors can deliver their application to Naples High School's guidance counselor Celestia Riggs. All other applicants can mail their completed applications through USPS or MPS to: NOSC Scholarship, ATTN: Mary Hansen, PSC 808 Box 342, FPO, AE 09618.

Hansen said all eligible scholarship application packages are reviewed by several committee members, and based on the committee members' recommendations, available funds are divided amongst the applicants based on the overall strength of the application.

Individual awards have historically been granted from \$500 to \$2,000, with a \$5,000 cap for any individual recipient over multiple years.

"The NOSC awarded \$45,000 in scholarships in 2009 and \$60,000 in 2010, and while we would love to see this trend continue, realistically, as a volunteer organization committed to assisting all command-sponsored organizations, there is a limit to our funds," said Hansen.

NOSC is an all-volunteer organization committed to serving the community via social and financial support. "The NOSC raises the money for the scholarships through the Forgotten Treasures Thrift Shop, located at the Support Site," Schoonmaker said.

NOSC donates the proceeds from the thrift store back into the community in other ways, too. Grants are given to NHS clubs and sports, and command-sponsored organizations monthly to offset program costs.

Perhaps no particular destruction of the abbey stands out more than the Battle of Monte Cassino during World War II. The battle began the night of Jan. 17, 1944 and ended on June 4 when the American 5th Army entered Rome. In February 1944, 229 bombers from the 5th Army dropped 1,150 tons of high explosives and incendiary bombs on the abbey, reducing the entire top of Monte Cassino to a smoking mass of rubble in less than 40 minutes.

Cassino was the core of what the Germans called the Gustav Line—a natural mountain barrier made infinitely stronger by the ingenuity of military engineers: a natural river barrier made stronger by steel and concrete fortifications and artificial flooding of the wide valley approaches. Even after the bombing, this position proved difficult to capture, and it wasn't until May that the Germans abandoned the position. After the war, the abbey was rebuilt and reconsecrated by



Today, the interior of the Benedictine abbey is being restored to its former glory. The abbey was once a model for Catholic monasteries in the early centuries of Christianity.

Pope Paul VI in 1964.

There are two military cemeteries honoring the fallen at Cassino. The Polish memorial practically appears carved in the mountainside, and the British cemetery decorates its tombstones with poetry.

The abbey receives a very high number of religious pilgrims among the many tourists who frequent the site every day. Visitors are asked to remain respectful as the abbey remains an active place

of worship and a dress code is enforced. Daily visiting hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. and again from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. Admission is free. Visitors are allowed access to most of the site during regular visitor hours. The onsite museum, which contains extensive historical documentation and artwork, is only open on Sundays during the winter. President Obama proclaims January as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month

A PROCLAMATION

Our Nation was founded on the enduring principles of equality and freedom for all. As Americans, it is our solemn responsibility to honor and uphold this legacy. Yet, around the world and even within the United States, victims of modern slavery are deprived of the most basic right of freedom. During National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, we rededicate ourselves to preventing and ending human trafficking, and we recognize all who continue to fight this serious human rights violation.

Human trafficking is a global travesty that takes many forms. Whether forced labor or sexual trafficking, child soldiering or involuntary domestic servitude, these abuses are an affront to our national conscience, and to our values as Americans and human beings. There is no one type of victim -- men and women, adults and children are all vulnerable. From every corner of our Nation to every part of the globe, we must stand firm in defense of freedom and bear witness for those exploited by modern slavery.

At the start of each year, Americans commemorate the Emancipation Proclamation, which became effective on January 1, 1863, and the 13th Amendment, which was signed by President Abraham Lincoln and sent to the States for ratification on February 1, 1865. These seminal documents secured the promise of freedom for millions enslaved within our borders, and brought us closer to perfecting our Union. We also recall that, over 10 years ago, the Victims of Trafficking and Violence Protection Act of 2000 renewed America's commitment to combating modern slavery domestically and internationally. With this law, America reaffirmed the fundamental promise of "forever free" enshrined within the Emancipation Proclamation.

We cannot strengthen global efforts to end modern slavery without first accepting the responsibility to prevent, identify, and aggressively combat this crime at home. No country can claim immunity from the scourge of human rights abuses, or from the responsibility to confront them. As evidence of our dedication to a universal struggle against this heinous practice, the Department of State's "Trafficking in Persons Report 2010" included America in its rankings for the first time, measuring our efforts by the same standards to which we hold other nations. Looking ahead, we must continue to aggressively investigate and prosecute human trafficking cases within our own borders.

Although the United States has made great strides in preventing the occurrence of modern slavery, prosecuting traffickers and dismantling their criminal networks, and protecting victims and survivors, our work is not done. We stand with those throughout the world who are working every day to end modern slavery, bring traffickers to justice, and empower survivors to reclaim their rightful freedom. This month, I urge all Americans to educate themselves about all forms of modern slavery and the signs and consequences of human trafficking. Together, we can combat this crime within our borders and join with our partners around the world to end this injustice.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, BARACK OBAMA, President of the United States of America, by virtue of the authority vested in me by the Constitution and the laws of the United States, do hereby proclaim January 2011 as National Slavery and Human Trafficking Prevention Month, culminating in the annual celebration of National Freedom Day on February 1. I call upon the people of the United States to recognize the vital role we can play in ending modern slavery and to observe this month with appropriate programs and activities.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-second day of December, in the year of our Lord two thousand ten, and of the Independence of the United States of America the two hundred and thirty-fifth.

Senior enlisted trainers sought for Officer Candidate School

As Officer Training Command (OTC) began a new year of training tomorrow's Navy leaders Jan. 1, the command is looking to attract a few more senior enlisted trainers to Officer Candidate School (OCS) and several other OTC schools.

Since the Navy established OCS in 1951, officer candidates have been trained by Navy officers and Marine Corps Drill Instructors (DIs). Senior enlisted, or chief petty officers (CPOs), have also played a role in officer training for a number of years. In the 90s, Navy senior enlisted Recruit Division Commanders (RDCs), or "red ropers," were added to the OCS training team.

More like officer candidate commanders instead of recruit commanders, the chiefs, senior chiefs and master chiefs who wear the

red shoulder aiguillettes work with the Marine Corps drill instructors to train and mentor the candidates. OCS would now like to increase its number of senior enlisted trainers.

"We are looking for chiefs and senior chiefs who are physically fit and motivated and want to make a difference in shaping the future of the Navy," said Master Chief Electronics Technician (SW/AW) Matt Anuci, the senior enlisted advisor and OCS red roper at OTC.

Anuci said it is not well-known around the fleet that RDCs, who many people associate with the Navy's only boot camp, Recruit Training Command (RTC), aboard Naval Station Great Lakes, Ill., are also being assigned to OTC.

"We're such a small command (OTC in Newport), and when you think 40,000 recruits go through RTC each year and you are always seeing the red rope of an RDC (more than 600) there, the natural assumption is that's the only place where there are RDCs," Anuci said. "The Navy also sends E-5 and E-6 RDCs to Great Lakes. Newport is totally different because we only have a select few (currently 12) senior enlisted RDCs."

Anuci said that OCS needs senior enlisted RDCs because of "the opportunity to mentor and mold and develop the division-officer-to-chief relationship that is a constant in the fleet."

The Shore Special Program Detailer (PERS-4010D) at NPC in Millington, Tenn., periodically sends out message traffic and announcements recruiting for RDCs at OTC.

In a recent RDC recruiting notice, NPC announced the need for hard-charging Navy professionals to provide RDC (NEC 9508) support at OTC. The announcement described the position as one that prepares OCS graduates for service in the fleet as naval officers.

The announcement (made periodically in LINK Magazine or on the NPC website, <http://www.persnet.navy.mil/ReferenceLibrary/Publications/LinkOnline/>), "looks for E-7 RDCs for OTC to function as senior enlisted technical experts and be responsible for the training, administration, good order and discipline and general welfare of assigned students throughout all phases of training."

Capt. Kenneth Gray, OTC commanding officer, said because the command provides accession training to 65 percent of the Navy's new officers, "the RDCs at OTC have a tremendously positive influence on the newest generations of naval officers; an influence that lasts for decades."

Gray said that during the initial stages of OCS training, the RDCs focus on the militarization of the students and developing their discipline. But over time the focus shifts, and by the end of training the RDCs concentrate on mentoring the students and instilling the confidence and competence in them that they will need as leaders.

Whether a first-time RDC at OTC or a second-tour RDC, all senior enlisted coming to OTC to train and mentor officer candidates need to attend RDC school at RTC. Even if the chiefs had been to the "C" school before, they need to refresh and be updated on any changes to the training of both recruits and officer candidates.

All sailors looking to wear the "red rope" attend RDC School at RTC prior to duty. However, for RDC chiefs going to Newport, the few weeks of shadowing RDCs with recruit divisions at RTC isn't required. These chiefs go directly to OTC and receive a couple weeks of the training that is needed for OCS.



Individual Force Protection Plans (IFPP) for travel

In accordance with COMNAVREGEURNOTE 3500, IFPP's are mandatory for all traveling Department of Defense personnel and their adult family members if one of the following criteria is met:

- If the destination country or region has a State Department Public Announcement or Travel Warning in effect.
- A U.S. Mission (Embassy/Consulate) is not present and the State Department or responsible Chief of Mission is not in a position to accord normal consular protection services to the U.S. citizens.
- Travel to any of the following locations; Russia, Latvia, Lithuania, Estonia, Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Georgia, Azerbaijan, Turkey, Israel, Lebanon, Albania, Kosovo, Serbia and all African nations.
- Travel out of the EUCOM AOR, as required by AOR Commander. (CONUS, Alaska, Hawaii and U.S. territories are exempt.)

TRICARE to extend dependent coverage to age 26

TRICARE plans to roll out its new Young Adult Program by spring and to provide an option to make coverage retroactive to Jan. 1, to ensure military families don't get left out as the new national health care reform law extends parent's health insurance to their children up to age 26.

The new program will allow qualified, unmarried military children up to age 26 to buy health care coverage under their parents' TRICARE plans through age 26. That's up from the current maximum age of 21, or 23 for full-time college students whose parents provide more than half their financial support.

The fiscal 2011 National Defense Authorization Act President Barack Obama signed Jan. 7, gave the Defense Department the authority it needed to extend TRICARE coverage to young adults, TRICARE spokesman Austin Camacho said.

This ensures benefits extended under TRICARE are in line with those all American families receive under the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act that took effect in March.

"We've been working hard to make sure we could put TRICARE Young Adult on a fast track," said Rear Adm. Christine Hunter, TRICARE Management Activity. "Fortunately for our beneficiaries concerned about health care coverage for their adult children, the law signed by the president includes opportunities for military families to elect this new premium-based plan retroactive to Jan. 1."

Qualified young adults who do not have access to employer-sponsored health care coverage will be eligible to purchase it through TRICARE on a month-to-month basis, Camacho said.

Details about how much those premiums will cost under the new program still are being finalized. But because the 2011 defense authorization specifies that the rates must cover all program costs, Camacho said, premiums will be based on commercial insurance data about the costs of providing care.

Once the new program is in place, Hunter estimated that it could extend TRICARE cov-

erage to several hundred thousand additional beneficiaries.

"The premium allows us to provide the excellent benefit to our military families while responsibly addressing the impact of health care costs on the DOD budget," she said.

Meanwhile, the TRICARE staff has moved into overdrive to iron out the program details: determining eligibility and coverage criteria and costs; designing, testing and implementing the required software and systems changes; updating eligibility databases; and crafting education efforts, Camacho said.

Officials plan to roll out the new program in two phases, first offering a premium-based TRICARE Standard/Extra benefit, Camacho said. Then, later this year, they plan to introduce the TRICARE Prime and TRICARE Prime Remote plan, including overseas options, and the Uniformed Services Family Health Plan.

Once the program is in place, eligible young adults may submit an application and premium payment to the appropriate regional or overseas contractor for processing, Camacho said. Cost shares, deductibles and catastrophic caps will vary, based on the plan selected and the sponsor's status.

Young adult beneficiaries will receive an enrollment card after they buy coverage, and their payment is reflected in the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System, Camacho said.

The new beneficiaries may choose to pay premiums back to Jan. 1, which will entitle them to file claims for any health care costs they have accrued since that date. To do so, officials advise that they save all receipts to ease claims processing.

For adults who need health insurance coverage but no longer qualify for TRICARE coverage, officials advise exploring the Continued Health Care Benefit Program. This premium-based program offers temporary, transitional health coverage for 18 to 36 months.

Coverage must be purchased within 60 days of losing TRICARE eligibility. Information about the program is posted on the TRICARE website at <http://www.tricare.mil/>.
