Troops to receive full mid-month pay today

All service members will receive their full mid-month pay they have earned in their April 15th paychecks, Pentagon officials said April 11.

"Basically, all active duty and reserve service members will receive full mid-month pay on the 15th of April," Pentagon spokesman Marine Col. Dave Lapan said. "It may be in two separate payments, but on the 15th everyone will receive their full allotted pay."

Confusion arose about the April 15 payday due to the threatened closure of the U.S. government last week.

Officials urge service members to check their end-of-month leave and earnings statements carefully. The normal end-of-month statements will be posted to accounts April 22.

The finance and accounting service has restored access to all leave and earnings statements, net pay advice or advice of pay for service members on the Mypay website.

"The most-current advice of pay will still only show the partial payments for April 1-8," the finance service posted on its website. "This will allow us to make sure we can still process pay for April 9-15 and take steps to ensure it is in bank accounts on the 15th."

New SARC brings awareness to Naples

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month, and Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) has a new Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC) who is helping spread the word to the Naples military community.

Sindy Copeland, a former sexual assault victim advocate, assumed the role of the community SARC in March.

"Being a victim advocate and working with FFSC for over a year in their new parent support program definitely helped prepare me for my new role," said Copeland. "The military community here in Naples is very special, and it's important that we acknowledge that sexual assault unfortunately can happen even within our community. My prior experience as a victim advocate helped tie everything together as far as assuming my new role as the SARC."

Copeland and her team of victim advocates, comprised of both active duty and civilian personnel, plan to spread that awareness via informational tables located within the Support Site food court and on the spine at Capodichino, near the food court atrium. The tables will offer a wealth of information on how to learn about, detect and properly report the crime that

is sexual assault.

"Spreading awareness throughout the community helps us to take care of each other," said Copeland. "The biggest thing we can do as a community is not shy away from the subject of sexual assault, however difficult that may be. Sexual assault doesn't just hurt the person who is affected, it hurts the entire community. It lowers our morale, it takes away from our fleet readiness and takes away that sense of security we strive to maintain here in the military community."

Copeland said the designation of April as Sexual Assault Awareness Month is a great way to not only educate the military community on the dangers of sexual assault, but to introduce herself to the community as the SARC and the goals she has in her new role.

"One of my biggest goals that I want everyone to know is how to properly report a sexual assault and how that process works," said Copeland. "I want to continue the great sense of awareness that Vicki Shepherd, my predecessor, set forth when

she was the community SARC, and continue to address this situation in order to prevent it from happening. It's my goal to continue to train advocates effectively and reach those who may have been affected, so we can help them."

NMCRS extends contribution deadline

The Navy-Marine Corps Relief Society (NMCRS) at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Naples has extended the dead-

line for contributions to its annual fund drive. Service members now have until April 30 to submit contributions through their respective command's NMCRS representative.

"The NMCRS 2011 fund drive was extended to ensure all sailors and marines on active-duty have the opportunity to participate," said Lt. Matthew Gill, the Naples-area coordinator for the drive. "The NSA Naples community has been pulled in many directions by recent events, and it's important to give everyone a chance to help their fellow sailors and marines."

Gill also said that because of the deadline extension, he's hopeful more people will contribute. He also stressed the financial significance of giving to NMCRS.

"We want 100% contact to give everyone a chance to help their fellow sailors and marines," he said. "Historically, every dollar given to NMCRS here has come back as \$1.50 or \$2.00 to this community, so the more we can raise, the more we can help our neighbors right here in the Naples community."

According to its official handout, the NMCRS is a "world-wide nonprofit charitable organization designed to provide financial, educational and other assistance to members of the naval service of the United States, eligible family members and survivors, when in need."

For example, in light of recent events, had there been an actual U.S. government shutdown affecting service members' pay, NMCRS would've been available to help.

"NMCRS was prepared to assist with rapid, short-term, interest-free loans to avoid privation with essential items such as food, gasoline and other necessities," said Margaret Copson, director of NMCRS at NSA Naples.

"NMCRS is about sailors and marines helping sailors and marines," said Gill.

Italian News Briefs

'Queen of apples' grown in Campania

One of the typical and most famous products of the Campania region, besides buffalo mozzarella and pizza, is the "mela annurca" known as the "queen of the apple" for its crunchy and firm texture, juicy and pleasantly acidic flavor and its fragrant fruity aroma. The apple, which is smaller than other types of apples, is solid red and has a high concentration of vitamins and minerals, such as vitamins B and C, and phosphorus, iron, manganese, sulfur and potassium. Because they are rich in fiber, they are particularly suitable to clean cholesterol from the arteries. The "mela annurca" is cultivated in almost all the Campania territories, but its production is mainly in the Caserta and Benevento provinces, like in Valle di Maddaloni and Sant' Agata dei Goti. The apples are picked unripe and cultivated in the so-called "melai," which is made of wood shavings and where the apples are laid down and periodically stirred by hand until they reach their natural red color and are ready to be put on the market. The apple is depicted in paintings discovered in Herculaneum, in particular in the "Casa dei Cervi" (House of the Deer), testifying the ancient bond with the Campania region.

New culture minister reveals plans to save Pompeii

The new Italian Culture Minister, Giancarlo Galan, visited Pompeii Tuesday and promised to preserve the 2,000 year-old Roman ruins by finding private sponsors and European Union funds. Last year, several walls and buildings collapsed at Pompeii forcing the resignation of Galan's predecessor, who was accused of alleged negligence in safeguarding Italy's archaeological treasures. The new minister unveiled plans to employ sophisti-

cated 3D laser technology to monitor the state of the ruins, which are in need of constant maintenance. He said the government will allocate about €100 million for work on the site. This money has been designated by the EU for the development of Italy's southern regions. Italy will also apply for an additional €100 million from the EU. Private sector companies will also be involved, but details need to be finalized.

Capri to use DNA to catch pet owners who refuse to clean up mess

The mayor of Capri announced plans to bust irresponsible dog owners by using DNA. The dog population on the island is around 1,000, one dog for every six residents. The mayor said it costs around €5 million a year to keep the island clean, and he won't stand for dog owners who leave behind their dog's excrements. Blood samples for each dog will be filed in a central database, and starting in June, ecological workers will locate the waste and send a sample to a laboratory where DNA will be extracted and compared with the results of blood samples. The fine can be up to €2,000, so watch out!

St. Francis' tomb opens after restoration

Last Saturday, the tomb of St. Francis of Assisi was reopened to the public after a seven-week restoration. It was the first restoration of the saint's crypt since its restyling in 1930. The restoration cleaned away decades of candle smoke and ash to allow the original pink stone to shine through again. The tomb is located in the crypt underneath the lower church of Assisi's famed fresco-basilica dating from 1230, four years after the saint died.

Summertime in Naples for your pets

As the weather is getting warmer, I'd like to talk about some seasonal concerns for pet owners.

The first is leishmaniasis. This is a disease that we don't hear much about in the U.S., but it can be found in many parts of the world, including southern Europe. It is a protozoa (not a bacteria, which makes it harder to kill) that is transmitted to dogs by a mosquito-like bug called a sandfly. An infected sandfly can transmit the protozoa to dogs through a bite. The highest rate of transmission occurs from April through October. If a dog becomes infected, it doesn't necessarily get sick. Only about 40 percent of dogs do get sick six months to six years after being infected, but it can be life threatening. (Note: There have only been a few cases of leishmaniasis in cats.) There is a treatment available, but it is lifelong.

The best prevention available to dogs is to avoid the bite by using a collar to repel the sandfly, such as a Scalibor®. However, a small percentage of dogs may get itchy while wearing the collar. For those dogs, Advantix®, which also repels sandflies—just not as effectively—is recommended. You would need to use it every three weeks instead of every four, while the collar lasts for five to six months.

Another summertime problem I worry about is fleas. There are an abundance of fleas here in Naples—on the Support Site, too. One of the main reasons fleas are such a problem on the Support Site is because people feed stray cats. This is against base regulations, and feeding strays brings not only the strays to the base, it brings their pesky fleas (and potentially other diseases), too. You or your children may walk through the grass where a stray previously was, a flea may jump onto your shoe and then catch a ride inside your home. This can be the beginning of a flea infestation. If stray animals are not fed, they will stop coming to base and will look for food elsewhere. Last summer most of the pets in our homes were being bitten by fleas! Prescription flea prevention is available at the

Vet Clinic, but decreasing the flea population on the base will help eliminate the problem.

Lastly, I want to explain how heat affects dogs and cats. Our pets cannot sweat; the main way they cool themselves is by panting. This can cause dehydration if they do not have access to water—so make sure to bring some water on long walks and hikes. Also feel the ground to make sure it is not too hot. Black cement can be very hot during the day and burn your pet's paws. At home or in the yard, make sure fresh water is always available and that your pet can find a shady area when outside. Never leave dogs on a leash or tied outside by themselves.

Dealing with temper tantrums

What's Happening

Two- and three-year-olds have many skills, but controlling their tempers is not one of them. Tantrums are common at this age because toddlers are becoming independent and developing their own wants, needs and ideas. However, they are not yet able to express their wants and feelings with words. Take comfort in the fact that most children outgrow tantrums by age four.

What you might be seeing

Normal toddlers:

- Love to say, "No!", "Mine!" and "Do it myself!"
- Test rules over and over to see how parents will react;
- Are not yet ready to share;
- Need lots of fun activities, play times and opportunities to explore the world;
- Respond well to a routine for sleeping and eating (a regular schedule);
- Like to imitate grownups and to "help" mom and dad.

What You Can Do

It is often easier to prevent tantrums than to deal with them once they get going. Try these tips:

- Direct your child's attention to something else. ("Wow, look at that fire engine!")
- Give your child a choice in small matters. ("Do you want to eat peas or carrots?")
- Stick to a daily routine that balances fun activities with enough rest and healthy food.
- Anticipate when your child will be disappointed. ("We are going to buy groceries for dinner. We won't be buying cookies, but you can help me pick out some fruit for later.")
- Praise your child when he or she shows self-control and expresses feelings with words.

If you cannot prevent the tantrum, here are some tips for dealing with it:

- Say what you expect from your child and have confidence that your child will behave.
- Remain calm. You are a role model for your child.
- Holding your child during a tantrum may help a younger child feel more secure and calm down more quickly.
- Take your child to a quiet place where he or she can calm down safely. Speak softly or play soft music.
- Some children throw tantrums to seek attention. Try ignoring the tantrum, but pay attention to your child after he or she calms down.
- Resist overreacting to tantrums and try to keep your sense of humor.

When your child is having a floor-thumping tantrum, the most important thing you can do is remain calm and wait it out. Do not let your child's behavior cause you to lose control, too.

These tips, which were created with input from experts in national organizations that work to protect children and strengthen families, are aimed at everyone, not just parents who are at risk to abuse or neglect their children. These are helpful tips for parents and caregivers to try to strengthen their parenting skills and their families. For more parenting tips, go to www.childwelfare.gov/preventing/promoting/parenting.

USS Monterey visits Naples

best liberty ports for our deployment."

The Monterey is the first U.S. ship to participate in the European Phased Adaptive Approach for missile defense architecture with NATO members' missile defense capabilities, as well as with the emerging NATO command and control network.

Throughout her deployment, the Monterey will be touring NATO member states and demonstrating the ship's ballistic missile defense capability.

Monterey, homeported out of Norfolk, Va., is on a scheduled six-month deployment in the U.S. Sixth Fleet area of responsibility.

The Ticonderoga class guided-missile cruiser USS Monterey (CG 61) arrived in Naples, Italy, April 10, during a regularly scheduled port visit.

"This is an important port visit for us because we will meet with Vice Adm. Harris and members of his staff," said Capt. James W. Kilby, Monterey commanding officer. "It is significant because many of the exercises and operations we will be conducting will help define the mission for following European Phased Adaptive Approach ships."

Sailors from Monterey also had a chance to get a break from the stresses of Navy life at sea. During the port visit, sailors enjoyed some leisure time exploring the beauty and culture of southern Italy. Some tried to conquer Rome in a day with a guided tour of the Colosseum, Circus Maximus and the Baths of Caracalla.

"This is a good time to pull in, our sailors will get to see Rome, and it is just before Easter, so Rome should be exciting," said Master Chief Keith Mahaffey, Monterey command master chief. "A lot of our sailors have never visited Naples before, and I think that this will be one of our

Unified Protector explained to students

Since March, terms such as arms embargo, no fly zone, boarding and air strikes have been making headlines. And children, especially the children of service members, have taken notice.

To help the kids at JFC Naples understand what is happening in Libya, Lt. Gen. Charles Bouchard, NATO's commander for Operation Unified Protector, assigned some "homework" to his Public Affairs staff.

"Let our students learn about what we do to protect the civilian population in Libya," Bouchard said as he explained the assignment.

Lt. Col. Maurizio De Giorgi, community activities section head, created a presentation, "From the Vesuvius to the Sahara," to brief the students of the International School at JFC Naples HQ in Bagnoli. Students from eighth through twelfth grade had the opportunity to learn the basics of NATO and the United Nations before getting first-hand information about the NATO-led operation Unified Protector. They showed great interest, and of the many questions asked—from politics to international diplomacy and from military to local issues—their main concern seemed to be "When will this operation end?"

NATO strikes further reduce pro-Gadhaffi forces capacity

NATO's Operation Unified Protector continues to dismantle the fighting ability of the Gadhaffi Regime throughout Libya with particular attention to the two cities that are the most threatened, Ajdabiya and Misratah, where recent airstrikes near these two cities have resulted in the destruction of over three dozen Regime tanks and five military vehicles.

"The situation in Ajdabiya, and Misratah in particular, is desperate for those Libyans who are being brutally shelled by the Regime. To help protect these civilians, we continue to strike these forces hard," said Lt. Gen. Charles Bouchard, commander of Operation Unified Protector.

While NATO's operation is focused on destroying the heavy military equipment that poses the most threat to civilians, air strikes are also hitting ammunition bunkers and lines of communication to cut off these forces from their supplies.

"NATO is keeping up the pressure to make the violence stop," said NATO Secretary General Anders Fogh Rasmussen in Brussels. "Since Saturday, we have destroyed 49 tanks, nine armored personnel carriers, three anti-aircraft guns and four larger ammunition bunkers, the majority of these around Misrata and Ajdabiya" he said.

Gadhaffi forces continue to mass large quantities of tanks and other armored vehicles in and around Misrata. Tanks are being placed in the city next to public buildings as shown in a satellite photo released by NATO April 11.

"Despite Gadhaffi attempts to hide behind civilians, we are finding his military hardware in other locations, and we are destroying it with increasing success," said Bouchard. "We know we are having an effect, his forces are showing signs of confusion, but the pressure will remain, and our forces are determined to protect civilians from these attacks."

NATO Operation Unified Protector is mandated under the UN Security Council Resolution 1973 to protect civilians from attack using any means necessary.
