Training Air Wing's helm changes

Command of Training Air Wing TWO will change hands today, July 15, at 10 a.m., when Capt. D. Mark Brooks will turn over the helm to Capt. Joseph H. Evans, during a traditional change of command ceremony at the Naval Air Station Kingsville Captain's Club.

Rear Adm. William Sizemore, Chief of Naval Air Training, is the presiding official.

Evans reports to Kingsville from Washington, D.C., where he recently graduated from the National War College with a master of science degree in national security strategies.

Evans, a native of Montana, earned a bachelor of science degree from Montana State University in 1987, and was designated a Naval Aviator in 1989 at NAS Meridian, Miss.

Following flight school, he reported to VA-42 at NAS Oceana, Va., where he qualified in the A-6E Intruder. Upon completion of the Fleet Readiness Squadron, he was assigned to the VA-34 "Blue Blasters" and made one deployment to the Persian Gulf embarked aboard USS Eisenhower (CVN 69). In 1994, Evans was transferred to the VFA-106 "Gladiators" for FA-18 Hornet transition training. He subsequently stayed on with the Gladiators as a flight instructor until 1997.

From April to December of 1997, Evans served as the aide-de-camp to Commander, Carrier Group TWO, aboard USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67), making one deployment to the Mediterranean Sea and to the Persian Gulf.

In 1998, Evans reported to the "Golden

Warriors" of VFA-87 for his department head tour. He served as the operations officer while embarked aboard USS Theodore Roosevelt (CVN 71) for the 1999 deployment in support of Operation Allied Force and Operation Southern Watch. His subsequent shore tour assignment was to the staff of the Commander, Naval Air Forces, U.S. Atlantic Fleet, where he served as assistant air wing training and readiness officer. Following that tour, he attended the United States Air Force Air Command and Staff College at Maxwell Air Force Base in Alabama.

In 2004, Evans reported to the VFA-83 "Rampagers" as the executive officer and assumed command in 2005. Evans completed one deployment to the Persian Gulf on board USS John F. Kennedy (CV 67) in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. His squadron received the Chief of Naval Operations 2005 Safety "S" Award and the 2005 CNO Fleet Retention Award.

Brooks makes final flight at NAS Kingsville

Capt. D. Mark Brooks made his final flight July 7, on the eve of his change of command and subsequent retirement from the U.S. Navy.

He flew a T-45 Goshawk -- "retro-painted" in celebration of 100 years of Naval Aviation.

The flight that marked the end of more than 25 years of U.S. Naval service and a two-year tour as Commander, Training Air Wing TWO.

Brooks was initially trained to fly the training in

the F/A-18 Hornet. Over his career, he has accumulated over 3,900 flight hours, including 3,200 in the F/A-18A/B/C/D, with over 766 carrier landings on 14 different fleet aircraft carriers.

Brooks will turn over the helm of Training Air Wing TWO to Capt. Joseph Evans on July 15.

Brooks will retire from the U.S. Navy on July 19.

From the Bridge

Greetings Team Kingsville,

Let me begin by offering a congratulations and welcome aboard to Capt. Joe "Joe Bags" Evans. Capt. Evans assumes command of Training Air Wing TWO July 15, relieving Capt. Mark "Fingers" Brooks. To Mark and Melissa, NAS Kingsville wishes you fair winds and following seas as you head off to retirement in Alabama.

Now a complete change of topic: traffic violations on board NAS Kingsville. If I were to ask you what you think are the three most common traffic violations issued on the air station each month, do you think you would know the answer? Of the tickets issued by our Security Officers, the majority (98 percent) fall equally in three different categories: cell phone usage, failure to stop and illegal parking. As a matter of fact, we didn't have one speeding ticket on the base last month -- thank you very much and please keep this trend going.

So let's talk about the big three and why they are important. First is cell phone usage. Even in this technological age we live in, cell phone usage on the base is prohibited while operating a moving vehicle. The reason for this is due to the fact that cell phone usage has proven to be a distracter to operating a vehicle and on board the air station. We have plenty of distractions all around us. From pedestrians, to small electric slow moving vehicles, construction, mowers and the like, there is too much activity going on within the relatively confined operational area of NAS Kingsville to risk driving with a cell phone to your ear. Even though cell phone usage is allowed off-base while operating a vehicle that privilege does not apply once on the air station, so hang up your phones while on the base.

Second of the big three is failure to stop at stop signs. I'm not budging on this one either and request that you please make full and complete stops at the posted intersections. The reasons are the same as with cell phone usage, and the numbers of close calls we have witnessed by vehicles rolling through stop signs into the path of other vehicles, including small electric vehicles or motorcycles, is alarming. This base isn't more than a mile from one end of the developed complex to the other, so the need to hurry through an intersection isn't worth the risk to others using the roads as well.

Last of the big three is parking. There is enough dedicated parking throughout this base that it still boggles my mind as to why there are those that can't seem to find a way to locate one and avoid a parking ticket. There are areas throughout the base where it seems logical that one could park on a spot; however, we have our reasons why you can't. These are related to the safety of the installation due to underground utilities, fire and emergency services access, motor vehicle operator visibility, etc. So I ask all, please park in designated parking spaces only.

The safety of all on Naval Air Station Kingsville is and will be one of my highest priorities. To ensure this safety, my Security Officers will be watching for cell phone usage, failure to stop and illegal parking. Likewise, wear those seat belts as that ticket comes with a pretty hefty fine.

Community Plans and Liaison Officers safeguard mission, community

As residential and commercial developments expand around what were once rural areas, a military installation's mission and existence, as well as the economic well-being of the surrounding communities can be at risk.

While no "one-size-fits-all" approach can prevent or stop growth altogether, Navy Region Southeast Community Plans and Liaison Officers (CPOs) are proving that with the proper planning, adjacent lands can be utilized in ways that are both compatible with the military mission and enhance the value of the neighboring community.

"All military installations attract development," said Navy Region Southeast regional mission sustainment officer Dave Dahl. "A military installation is inherently a major economic driver that attracts employees and businesses, which in turn spawns area development."

Dahl said the CPO's main mission is to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of the public, while supporting the operational mission of the base.

Reporting directly to the commanding officer, CPOs play a critical role in communicating, managing and taking action regarding compatible land use issues that impact the installation's mission.

CPOs are responsible for quickly iden-

tifying possible mission impacts stemming from land use development, and taking steps to find a balanced solution that benefits the Navy and the local community. Although CPOs in various forms have been around since the late 1980s, the role has increased in prominence over the last 10 years, the result of hard-fought lessons learned in places like Naval Air Station Oceana, Va., where homes and businesses sit directly in the path of low-level jet training.

NAS Kingsville's CPO, Glenn Jones, is a retired Navy air traffic controller. He brings a vast knowledge and insight of encroachment issues to the table, and works hand-in-hand with local officials on a number of programs specifically designed to coordinate community growth without affecting military mission accomplishment.

"The support NAS Kingsville receives from the city of Kingsville and Kleberg County is unparalleled," Jones said. "The base is not just another economic driver for the community; it is part of the very fabric that is Kingsville."

"The city and county leaders know that sustaining the Navy's current mission while leaving room for that mission to expand is good for the community. Equally, the base knows that growth and prosperity within the city and county benefits the base. The cooperation NAS Kingsville receives from the community is a large part of what makes Kingsville a great place to train Naval Avia-

tors – and a great place to live."

CPOs start with an Encroachment Action Plan (EAP), which identifies and prioritizes potential compatible land use issues. The EAP gives the CPO a road map to identify stakeholders, reach out to community businesses and city planners, and build partnerships that allow development while protecting the mission of the base and the economic benefits it brings to the community.

In Navy Region Southeast, no two bases are exactly alike, and each of the region's 15 installations has unique mission sustainment challenges. From Georgia to Texas to the Florida Keys, every CPO has to become an expert in the operational needs of the base and the threats to that mission in the local community.

"Two-way communication between the military and our communities is essential to successful and compatible land use and ensuring the long-term health of our military installations," Dahl said. "However, we have a lot of tools to help our CPOs educate the public and work with planners."

Among those tools are Air Installation Compatible Use Zones (AICUZ) studies, which help to demonstrate noise contours and accident potential zones around an in-

stallation airfield, and Range AICUZ, which does the same thing for ranges. These studies help zoning officials protect the health, safety and welfare of the public.

Another valuable tool is the Joint Land Use Study (JLUS), which is run by the city or county and funded by the Department of Defense's Office of Economic Adjustment. The Navy actively participates in these studies, and helps cities and municipalities determine a way ahead for development that will benefit the community without impacting the mission of the installation.

Naval Supply Systems Command echelon III, IV names change

Commander, Naval Supply Systems Command (NAVSUP), is instituting an initiative to provide customers and stakeholders a clearer understanding of the capabilities of all NAVSUP organizations. The names of some of the levels of the organization are changing.

"One NAVSUP, One Enterprise' connects our Global Logistics Support Network construct where each activity executes its mission as a node of the network, vice an individual entity," said Rear Adm. Mike Lyden, Commander, Naval Supply Systems Command.

The new names became effective July 1. Fleet and Industrial Supply Center Jacksonville detachment, located at Naval Air Station Kingsville, is now called NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Center Jacksonville detachment.

"Our name changed but our mission remains the same, to deliver combat capability through logistics. We continue to provide

the same quality services and support to our customers," said Lt. Cmdr. Samuel Betancourt, site director of NAS Kingsville's Fleet Logistics Center detachment. "The name change better reflects our capabilities and the full range of services we provide to our customers."

The other Echelon IV activities are also being called "NAVSUP Fleet Logistics Centers."

The new names for the NAVSUP Echelon III activities are: NAVSUP Weapon Systems Support (formerly Naval Inventory Control Point - NAVICP); NAVSUP Business Systems Center (formerly Navy Supply Information Systems Activity - NAVSISA); NAVSUP Logistics Operations Center (formerly Naval Operational Logistics Support Center - NOLSC); and NAVSUP Global Logistics Support (Formerly Commander, Fleet & Industrial Supply Centers - COMFISCS). Evans' next tour was split between the Office of the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and the Office of the Secretary of Defense. He specifically served as the principle Deputy to the chairman's legislative assistant and subsequently as the director of Senate affairs for the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Legislative Affairs.

Evans has more than 3,000 flight hours and 550 arrested carrier landings. His personal decorations include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, three Meritorious Service Medals, the Air Medal with Combat "V" (one individual, three Strike/Flight), the Joint Service Commendation Medal, five Navy Commendation Medals, three Navy Achievement Medals as well as various unit, service and campaign awards.

Brooks reported to Training Air Wing TWO in January 2009 as deputy commander and assumed command on July 2, 2009. Since he has been at the helm, the Wing flew 70,500 hours completing more than 59,900 sorties while designating 268 aviators. Brooks rebalanced student time-to-train and entitlement time, saving the Navy more than \$20 million. He also initiated contract modifications resulting in improved aircraft availability, saving the Navy more than \$2 million annually.

Brooks' awards include the Defense Meritorious Service Medal, two Meritorious Service Medals, Air Medal (two strike flight awards), Joint Commendation Medal, and several personal, unit and campaign awards.

Capt. Brooks is retiring to Pell City, Ala.



Navigating Solo

What happens on the World Wide Web, lasts forever

Once upon a time, in the U.S. Navy, there lived a squared-away Sailor who worked hard, obeyed his chain of command, and made a difference in his command and local community.

This Sailor loved to make people laugh, knowing that happy people work better together and that laughter is considered the best medicine. So, when he saw his shipmates doing something "funny," he tried to capture it on his cell phone and then share it with others. He'd usually post the photos on his Facebook™ page and videos on YouTube™.

This squared-away Sailor knew that Navy regs state that Navy personnel are encouraged to responsibly engage in unofficial internet posting about the Navy and Navy-related topics.

He thought his postings were "responsible" – he wasn't sharing work products or anything classified.

But, is this the best thing to do?

Is it right to put a photo on the World Wide Web that shows your shipmate doing something in an unsafe manner or making an inappropriate gesture? Is it right to "tag" the photo with your shipmate's name?

Key word here is "responsible."

Navy personnel who posts content on social networking sites, blogs or other internet-based capabilities should ensure that the content is accurate, appropriate and does not compromise mission security or success. The regs also recommend that Navy personnel be mindful about the non-department related content they post since the lines between personal and professional lives often "blur" in the online space.

You know, once you place something online, you lose control of it – there's no taking it back. And, the entire world will have access to it.

Would you like your image – that makes you look goofy – posted for the world to see? Would you like your image "tagged?"

Probably not.

Military personnel should be aware that the internet is often used to gain information for criminal activities such as identity theft. Unsavory people can use different sites and piece together information to impersonate others. Besides stealing someone's identity, they can steal someone's passwords and compromise Navy networks.

So, when you use social media, be mindful of releasing personal information that

Feds Feed Families

Food drive goal: 50 pounds a box per month

The Department of Defense set a goal to accumulate 733,800 pounds of non-perishable food items to distribute throughout food banks on a local level, nationwide.

"We have a great opportunity to help give back to our community and to all the communities nationwide," said Lt. Mark Haley, NAS Kingsville Chaplain. Tooth Socket Bone Grafting – Keeping Your Options Open

When a tooth is removed, nearly 50% of the bone will shrink away. This is bad news if you may want to replace the tooth with a dental implant someday. If the lost tooth is in the front "esthetic zone", it is particularly difficult to get the best fit without bone grafting. This relatively simple procedure is usually done at the time of extraction. An artificial bone material is placed in the socket and specially packed and sutured. This allows your bone cells to grow in quicker and denser with almost no natural bone loss. Sometime later, the site is evaluated for either a dental implant or a fixed (cemented) bridge. In either case, the fit and longevity will always be better. 




