NSA Bahrain observes Women's Equality Day

MANAMA, Bahrain — Service members stationed at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain commemorated the 91st anniversary of the 19th amendment, which granted women full voting rights in 1920, during Women's Equality Day celebration, Aug. 23.

The event was held a few days before the official observance, Aug. 26, which was designated as Women's Equality Day by the U.S. Congress in 1971 to honor the passage of the 19th amendment to the U.S. Constitution.

Hosted by the Multicultural Heritage Committee, the event included a panel of speakers who focused on notable women throughout America's history, such as Amelia Earhart, Opha Mae Johnson, the first woman to enlist in the U.S. Marine Corps, retired Rear Adm. Lillian Fishburne, the first African-American woman promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral, and Rear Adm. Michelle Howard, the first African-American woman to command a U.S. Navy Ship.

Along with an overview of historically significant women, guest speaker, Capt. Maxie Davis, U.S. Naval Forces Central Command communications and information systems department head, shared personal experiences from her extensive military career.

Davis reflected on how a strong upbringing not

only inspired her, but kept her moving forward, overcoming challenges she has faced throughout her time in the Navy.

"There is absolutely no substitute for hard work," said Davis. "If you work hard, your work will be noticed and we, particularly in the Navy, know that the whole is greater than the part. We are at our best and accomplish the most when we draw upon the collective talents of all our people, whether they are male or female."

Women have served in the Navy since 1811, first as nurses, then as Yeomen (Female). In 1942, they served under the Women Accepted for Volunteer Emergency Service (WAVES) program.

On June 12, 1948, women gained permanent status in the armed services with the passage of the Women's Armed Services Integration Act.

Initially, women were assigned to selected non-combatant ships, but their opportunities were broadened in 1994, to include service on surface combatant ships. In 2010, the Navy announced a policy change that allows women to serve on submarines.

Today, there are more than 54,000 active-duty women and approximately 20,000 female Reservists serving in the Navy.

Equal Opportunity Advisor reaches out to Sailors

MANAMA, Bahrain — The Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain Equal Opportunity Advisor (EOA) spoke to Sailors at the Newcomers' Orientation, Aug. 22.

Chief Hospital Corpsman (SW/AW) Nekeia Borders let Bahrain's newest Sailors know the importance of NSA Bahrain's Equal Opportunity (EO) program.

"My goal is to bring more awareness to the program," she said. "I want to make sure Sailors know who their advocates are in helping them achieve their next level of success without feeling there is any reprisal or risk of discrimination or sexual harassment."

This is Borders's first tour as an EOA, but she worked with Command Managed Equal Opportunity (CMEO) and Command Assessment Team programs in the past. As the base's EOA, she's the local manager for command CMEOs and provides their training. She can also provide individual training on topics such as sexual harassment for departments and divisions.

"I'm able to provide training on any topic that falls under the category of discrimination," Borders said. "Any other topics such as

fraternization, hazing, etc. that have the potential to become EO issues are also in alignment with my role as the EOA."

Borders can also help Sailors with mediation.

"If a Sailor just wants a third party to sit in with them and their leadership and discuss a problem, I can do that to see where there is a disconnect," she said. "I want to try to work those issues out and handle them at the lowest level if possible."

Information Systems Technician 2nd Class Traci Ross from U.S. Naval Forces Central Command said it's nice for Sailors to have a face to go with the name.

"If you ever have an issue, it won't be as intimidating to ask for help," she said.

Borders said a lot of times people get confused with leadership issues and don't know what the clear cut difference is between EO concerns and leadership concerns.

"All leadership issues are not EO issues, but all EO issues are leadership issues," she said. "Those are things that we want to make sure we're communicating effectively as leaders. Everybody's a leader, so we need to make sure we are fostering and promoting that up and down the chain."

Detailers review Sailors’ projected rotation dates

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) — Naval Personnel Command announced Aug. 17 that more than 60,000 Sailors will see their projected rotation date (PRD) adjusted as Navy Personnel Command (NPC) implements new Sea Shore Flow enlisted career paths.

“Detailers are currently reviewing Sailors records and making PRD adjustments as required,” said Capt. Michael White, assistant commander, NPC for Career Management. “Once all of the PRD adjustments have been completed a formal notification will be issued and/commands can review their EDVR (enlisted distribution and verification report) for the changes.”

Navy administrative message (NAVADMIN) 2011/11, released July 2011 announced revisions to Sea Shore Flow reflecting the increasingly sea-centric nature of naval service.

Thirty-six ratings have increased sea time, and 18 ratings are now classified as sea intensive. Specific Sea Shore Flow timelines for individual ratings are listed by rating in the NAVADMIN, which can be found at www.public.navy.mil/bupers-npc/reference/messages/Documents/NAVADMINS/NAV2011/

NAV11201.txt.

“Since 2008, the number of sea duty billets has increased, while the number of shore duty billets has decreased,” said White. “The updated career paths provide optimal balance between sea duty and shore duty, enhances stability and improves predictability of the career paths for every Sailor in a sea-centric Navy.”

According to White, Sailors with PRDs prior to May 2012, will not have their current PRD adjusted under the new Sea Shore Flow calculations. Rating detailers at NPC will determine what PRD adjustments all other Sailors will face based on the new guidance and fleet readiness. White says the adjustments will impact 60,150 Sailors and expects adjustments will be complete Sept. 1.

Sea Shore Flow was first implemented in 2008 to replace pay-grade driven Sea Shore Rotation. Sea Shore Flow was made to help ensure proper manning of all sea duty and front line operational billets.

At the same time, it helps to provide a more desirable work-life balance throughout a Sailor’s career by working to offset the often arduous nature of sea duty with predictable periods of meaningful work ashore.

Revised instruction announces changes to Physical Readiness Program

MILLINGTON, Tenn. (NNS) — In order to improve the overall health of Sailors and enhance the administration and execution of the Physical Readiness Program, Navy announced the revision of OPNAVINST 6110.1J in NAVADMIN 203/11, July 12.

The revised instruction will strengthen program compliance, improve physical fitness assessment (PFA) documentation and encourage Sailors to maintain the level of physical fitness required to support mission readiness. This is the first major revision to the physical readiness program since 2005.

"We reduced the instruction to just what leadership needs to know and the rest is contained in the Physical Readiness Program Operating Guide, which will be a how-to manual," said Bill Moore, Physical Readiness Program director. "It will provide information, procedural guidance, and supplementary information."

Several changes are reflected in the new instruction, including the requirement to complete the medical screening process prior to participating in the PFA as well as a reduction of the number of PRT scoring categories to five, ranging from "outstanding" to "failure."

The rules have also changed regarding medical waivers. Sailors granted two medical waivers in a 12-month period will be referred to a medical treatment facility for a medical evaluation board.

In addition, failing the body composition assessment (BCA) is now considered an overall PFA failure and Sailors can no longer request a "bad

day" exception for the BCA and are limited to one PRT retest for a given PFA cycle.

Mandatory administrative separation will continue for Sailors who have failed three PFAs within the most recent four-year period. While the instruction allows for waivers for those with three PFA failures, individuals may still face separation and may be prevented from transferring, reenlisting or extending in-service.

The instruction also stresses that passing the physical fitness assessment is a requirement for continued Navy service and failure to meet these requirements can result in administrative separation processing.

The Physical Readiness Program Operating Guide is now in place, accompanied by an updated version of the Navy Nutrition Guide and Fitness Enhancement Program (FEP) guidance that will reside online at the Navy Physical Readiness web page.

The new guide incorporates policy guidance from OPNAVINST 6110.1H and NAVADMINs 293/06, 277/08, 073/09, 247/09 and 131/10.

"A Sailor can achieve long-term health and fitness by making regular physical activity and a solid nutrition plan a lifestyle priority. That commitment is consistent with Navy Core Values and helps ensure Sailors remain competitive," said Bill Moore, Physical Readiness Program director. "Every Sailor competes to stay and fitness is one component of this process."
