Navy leader visits Bahrain, discusses 21st Sailor and Marine initiative

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Manpower and Reserve Affairs, Juan M. Garcia III, highlighted the importance of the 21st Century Sailor and Marine initiative while visiting service members stationed at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, March 21.

Bahrain was the third stop in the 5th Fleet area of responsibility for Garcia.

Garcia began the day by joining Sailors for an early morning physical training (PT) session and said that maintaining a healthy lifestyle year round is the focus of today's force.

"We want to move away from a culture of testing, where Sailors cram for their PRT twice a year, to a culture of fitness, where Sailors are fit to fight 365 days a year."

Chief Yeoman Antonio Franklin, U.S. Naval Forces

Central Command's personnel officer, said that working out with Garcia was an unexpected treat.

"With the high operational tempo here in Bahrain, it's inspiring to get the opportunity to meet and PT with someone of his stature. It shows motivational leadership at the highest level," said Franklin.

Additionally, Garcia held an all-hands call where he discussed the future of Navy personnel programs and answered questions about the new initiative, and Sailors' career concerns. Popular topics included: enlisted retention boards, manning, tuition assistance, physical fitness, healthcare, retirement benefits and the perform-to-serve program.

During a time of increasing change to the Navy's budget, national defense strategy and personnel policies, Garcia wanted to let the audience know the reason for the visit.

"I want to dispel any misinformation that you may have heard and give you the ground truth about the future of our Navy," said Garcia. "I'm also here to fill in some details

CNIC Vice Adm. French visits Bahrain, impressed by Sailors' dedication

"Bahrain is a great example of how we move forward, support our Sailors, the families that are here and I am confident that as we move forward, we will continue to make those improvements and it's due to the dedicated folks that work here," said French.

April is Sexual Assault Awareness Month

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Nationally, Sexual Assault Awareness Month (SAAM) is observed in April to raise awareness about and promote the prevention of sexual assault through special events and public education. It is a time to recommit ourselves not only to lifting the veil of secrecy and shame, but also to raising awareness, enhancing prevention initiatives and support for victims and strengthening our response to sexual assault.

The overall theme for the Department of Defense's 2012 campaign, "Hurts One. Affects All. Preventing Sexual Assault is Everyone's Duty," echoes the Department's no-tolerance policy towards sexual assault, which does unconscionable harm to victims and destabilizes the workplace. Each week in April, the following sub-themes will underscore varying aspects of sexual assault and concerted team efforts to eliminate it from our ranks:

- Week 1- *Hurts One* looks at the effects of sexual assault on victims;
- Week 2- *Affects All* focuses on how sexual assault hurts readiness and combat effectiveness of the force;
- Week 3- *Prevention is Everyone's Duty* hones in on bystander intervention and the need for unit level leadership at all pay grades, and
- Week 4- *We will not tolerate it; "Sexual Assault - it's my problem, your problem, our problem"* concentrates on moving forward from just a one month observance to a year-round mission to reduce the number of sexual assaults to zero.

On March 21, Capt. Colin Walsh, com-

manding officer of Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, signed a proclamation declaring April 2012 as Sexual Assault Awareness Month on the installation and throughout the NSA Bahrain community. According to the proclamation, "Preventing sexual assault is a MORAL duty; one that should be taken seriously because it is the right thing to do. It takes leadership and courage to be willing to step in and do the right thing, even when others do nothing! We are family... what would you do to protect your family?" In attendance at the proclamation signing were Cmdr. Kevin Boykin, executive officer and CMDCM Ed Lambert for NSA Bahrain; Carolyn L. McCorvey, Fleet and Family Support Center director; Ann C. Wilson, Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC) and Sexual Assault Prevention and Response (SAPR) Victim Advocates.

The prevention of sexual assault is an all-hands mission. It takes Honor, Courage and Commitment to eradicate sexual assault within our community. Each and every one of us must take an active role in prevention. We must intervene when we observe behaviors that may lead to this crime. It is our responsibility to treat ourselves and each other with dignity and respect. When it comes to sexual assault, there are no innocent bystanders. Sexual assault can be stopped right now today, if no one committed the crime. There are no victims when there are no offenders.

As we observe SAAM this April, remember that prevention is a year-round mission and every day is an opportunity to prevent sexual assault. We can make a difference in our corner of the world.
