

No Tolerance for Sexual Assault in Bahrain

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Members of the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain community recognized Sexual Assault Awareness Month with an anti-violence march and ceremony to help raise awareness, April 12.

The NSA Bahrain Fleet and Family Support Center sponsored the day in support of the Department of the Navy initiative to stop sexual violence and encourage prevention before the assault ever happens.

“Sexual assault is one of the worst crimes ever,” said NSA Bahrain Commanding Officer, Capt. Colin Walsh. “We need to spread the word that it will not be tolerated and send a message to not let it happen.”

If someone is the victim of sexual assault, they may contact Sexual Assault Prevention Response (SAPR) advocates who help victims understand and sort through their feelings and assist with any medical, investigative and legal intricacies.

“Everybody in the Navy, especially the junior Sailors, needs to know that the command will support them,” said Chief Logistics Specialist Carlos Varquez. “I’m here to support Sexual Assault Awareness Month and try to make everybody aware of it because statistics show that these events help [increase awareness].”

Annual Oil Spill Workshop promotes readiness

MANAMA, Bahrain — Commander, Navy Region Europe, Africa, Southwest Asia Detachment Bahrain’s Environmental Department held its annual Oil Spill Planning, Prevention and Response Exercise and Workshop at the Gulf International Convention Center, April 10-11.

The more than 70 representatives from multiple countries, including Bahrain, Qatar, United Arab Emirates, Saudi Arabia, Djibouti and the United Kingdom, came together to openly discuss and develop solutions for the preservation of the marine environment in the Arabian Gulf.

Naval Support Activity Bahrain Commanding Officer, Capt. Colin Walsh, said he was encouraged to see an assembled audience of diverse leaders from all elements of the response community.

“The challenge before us today is to address communication, cooperation and commitment to ensure that the different branches and levels of government, industry and the private sector are working together,”

he said. “Use this workshop to improve your individual plans and organizations so that when the time comes, we can integrate our forces into a highly-focused and efficient crisis management team with a common goal of mitigating any potential disaster.”

The workshop and exercise included presentations from experts such as the Marine Emergency Mutual Aid Center Bahrain and U.S. Naval Facilities Engineering Command Atlantic Division. There were also spill scenarios for the group to work through and discuss.

Regional Environmental Coordinator Awni Almasri said his department tried hard to put together more than 13 spill scenarios for this workshop, which represented oil spills that have a strong possibility of happening in port or in open water within the Arabian Gulf from U.S. Navy, commercial, coalition forces, combined forces and foreign flag ships.

“If there is an oil spill, the response community in the Arabian Gulf is better prepared to promptly organize and respond to mitigate the adverse impact to the environment,” he said.

Although Santiago said Easter events took place in the past, this was the first year that MWR really pushed the day as a community event.

"We want to offer a community/family event at least once a month,"

said Santiago. "I would like to see events like this grow where we can offer fun that's free of charge."

The CYP program offers education and youth services for children from toddlers to teenagers.

The next event will be held April 21 in honor of the Month of the Military Child.

"We are hoping for a large turnout," said Santiago. "We are starting with the Armed Forces Day Run then a free lunch and hosting magician, Jay Mattioli."

Month of the Military Child is a month-long event celebrating the children of service members.

"Sometimes people say there is nothing here to do at NSA Bahrain," Santiago said. "I can say that is simply not the case. We have programs for everyone."

Early completion of overseas screening prevents last-minute screening failures, which could lead to manning gaps

and disappointed families who were looking forward to overseas duty. The purpose of an Overseas Suitability Screening (OSS), per BUMEDINST 1300.2A, is to identify medical, dental, educational and potential duty-limiting conditions or requirements of both service and family members. Completing a screening will ensure that both the family and service member are qualified for overseas, operational duty and remote duty assignments.

The OSS process is required to be completed within 30 days of receipt of orders. Improper overseas screenings can cause significant hardship for the family member, service member and the service member's command. Undue work and family stress could result and even possible early return of dependants or tour curtailment.

— A Transition, Education and Career Development Fair was held at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain to help Sailors plan their futures after the completion of their service, April 3.

Organized by the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC), the presenters at the fair introduced workshops and career consulting classes for members of the NSA community who plan to either transition out of the Navy, acquire a government position or improve job seeking skills.

On Nov. 21, 2011, President Obama signed the Veterans Opportunity to Work to Hire Heroes Act, proposing tax credits to ensure veterans get a job. This is a continuation of the March 2009 act, when a bill was approved giving mandatory preference for military members and their families applying for federal jobs as well as a series of executive actions to help get veterans back to work.

"A lot of people join the military right after high school," said Quartermaster 2nd Class Carol Flynn, a career counselor at NSA. "The fair intends to help set the Sailors up for the real world by educating them on the wide range of possibilities and specialties available within the federal government."

The 'Ten Steps to a Federal Job' workshop showcased essential steps for making a successful military to civilian transition and the skills required.

Attendees practiced different skill activities, had discussions and learned tips on how to analyze jobs and how to choose the right one.

People who desire a federal job may apply online at USAJobs.com. On the website, applicants can submit resumes, search skill-specific jobs and explore various career opportunities.

Aviation Machinist's Mate 1st Class (AW) Trokon Mason sees himself being very successful based on attending the seminar. He said he plans to utilize the job opportunities offered by the Navy and the numerous options presented.

"With the experience and the knowledge I gained from the Navy and the help I've gotten today, I shall be able to find a great career outside the Navy," he said.

Throughout the day people were also introduced to information about the necessity of positive customer service, practice on interviewing skills and how to write a professional resume.

FFSC has additional programs that will help service members toward transition into civilian life.

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"I'm helping out with the activity to let people know 'it's a crime, don't do it,'" said NSA Bahrain Command SAPR Representative, Chief Hospital Corpsman Jerry Juan. "Hopefully this event will result in more awareness and will help prevent any assault or any individual damage."

NSA Bahrain Sexual Assault Response Coordinator (SARC) Ann C. Wilson said a sexual assault occurs in the United States every two minutes. To punctuate that fact, command representatives blew a whistle every two minutes during the ceremony.

"Today was the official observance of Sexual Assault Awareness Month at NSA,"

she said. "However sexual assaults occur every day and our focus on prevention and awareness should not be limited to this month only. Any day is an opportunity to prevent these crimes."

Without offenders, there would be no victims, she added.

According to Navy policy documents, sexual assault prevention is an important element of the readiness area of the 21st Century Sailor and Marine initiative, which consolidates a set of objectives and policies to maximize Sailor and Marine personal readiness, build resiliency and hone the most combat-effective force in history of the Department of the Navy.

DENIM DAY HISTORY
 In 1992 an 18-year-old in Italy was picked up by her driving instructor to begin a driving lesson. Soon after, she was raped on the side of the road by the instructor. She pressed charges and won her case. The instructor appealed, and the case went to the Italian High Court. In 1999 the court overturned the conviction with a member of the High Court declaring that since the victim wore very tight jeans, the instructor could not have removed them himself, therefore the victim must have willingly participated. Women of the Italian legislature protested the decision by wearing jeans. As news of the decision spread, so did the protest. In April 1999 the state of California established the first Denim Day in the United States.

Summer Heat Safety Tips: "An ounce of Prevention"

Summer is coming to Bahrain, and along with it, the heat. It's important to take the necessary precautions now to prevent heat stress during the hottest months on the island. The best defense is prevention.

Drink plenty of water, hydrate. The human body needs liquids to help regulate temperature. Without enough fluids, we become dehydrated from the summer heat. Do not wait until you are thirsty as this is a sign of dehydration.

Avoid consumption of alcohol and beverages with caffeine before physical activity, including the night before. These beverages act as diuretics which will increase excretion of fluids, leaving you at risk for dehydration.

Don't skip a warm-up just because it's warm outside. Stretch, walk or ride a bike for a few minutes and drink fluids before starting a strenuous physical activity.

Wear a hat, sunglasses and sunscreen to minimize the affect of the sun's rays on your body.

Wear lightweight clothing made from fibers that can breathe. By doing this, your skin releases moisture that evaporates from your body, aiding in the cooling process.

Seek exercise paths and areas with shade for your exercise activity to keep you cool. Walk or jog on grassy vs. concrete or asphalt surfaces to minimize impact on knees and ankles.

Move to an air conditioned space, to allow the body to cool down. If you need to be outside in the hotter months, be sure to rest often in shady areas.

Develop habits now. Don't let the heat sneak up on you. Begin developing habits now that will result in sufficient hydration for the summer months.



Welcome to the 3rd Quarter Naval Criminal Investigative Service Crime Reduction Campaign, an effort to increase awareness and eradicate the growing opportunities to exploit and abuse children. One of most prevalent forms of child abuse today is the violation of children through pornography.

Victims of Child Exploitation generally fall into the following categories:

- Are poor or living on the street
- Are exploited via hobbies or jobs
- Feel unloved or unpopular
- Spend much time alone or unsupervised
- Are victims of emotional and physical neglect
- Are isolated from their peers
- Most victims are female between the ages of 6 – 12

According to the latest online victimization research, approximately one in seven youths online (10-17 years old) received a sexual solicitation online. 4% received an aggressive sexual solicitation – (were asked to meet with the solicitor, called them on the phone, sent money or gifts.) 34% received unwanted exposure to sexual material. Only 27% of these exposures were reported to a parent or guardian.

Some indicators that a child is a victim of sexual abuse might be observed regressive behavior, disturbed sleep patterns, promiscuity, age inappropriate interest in sexual material, acting out and a sudden decline in school performance. Sexual abuse in children has severe and long lasting psychological effects including anxiety, depression, guilt, acting out and sexual dysfunction.

Be aware that NO state in the U.S. permits the possession of child pornography. Possession of Child Pornography is a felony violation prosecutable under Article 134 of the UCMJ. Federal and state statutes apply for non-military perpetrators.

Child Pornography is a real and pressing problem that exists on a local, national and international level. If you have any information regarding individuals with possession or transfer of illegal child pornography or to schedule a more detailed command brief, please contact your local NCIS office. Additionally, always remember to report any contact information or circumstances that could pose a threat to the security of the U.S. personnel, resources, classified information or controlled unclassified information to the Naval Criminal Investigative Service.

The mission of the Human Resources Office (HRO) is to administer Human Resources Management programs for U.S. civil servants and Foreign National employees of the Naval Support Activity Bahrain. HRO provides consultative advice and guidance to various commands and activities in the following program areas: position management and classification; recruitment and staffing; labor management advisory services; Equal Employment Opportunity Program; employee development; employee relations matters; and benefit entitlements.

Family members who will be accompanying active duty military or DoD civilians to Bahrain on orders should anticipate limited job opportunities onboard the installation. When vacancies do become available, a majority are clerical in nature, cashiers, food service personnel, sales clerks, and recreational aids. The wages vary, but many are as low as \$5.85 an hour. Family member applicants must be U.S. citizens and command sponsored to be eligible for U.S. Federal Positions. Non-US spouses of DoD civilians and Active duty military are eligible to apply for foreign national positions. A resume must be submitted for each job you in which you are applying. Please review each individual announcement carefully for instructions.

Military spouses are given preference in hiring. A clear understanding of military spouse preference regulations is essential to conducting an effective job search.

Spouse Preference

Under the Military Family Act of 1985, as amended, DoD activities are required to provide "preference" in employment of spouses of relocating members of the U.S. Armed Forces (including the Coast Guard). The basic purpose of such preferential treatment is to enhance family satisfaction in order to positively impact on military readiness and retention.

Alternative Employment

Alternative employment opportunities may exist on the economy however you will need to acquire information from individual sources and obtain information about Bahrain government's sponsorship requirements.
