

# SECNAV visits NSA Bahrain Sailors, Marines

**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — The Secretary of the Navy (SECNAV) visited Sailors, Marines and family members at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, April 25-26.

The Honorable Ray Mabus, the 75th SECNAV, was in Bahrain as part of a larger visit throughout the region. He reenlisted six Sailors and presented awards to six Sailors during an all-hands call with Sailors and Marines, April 25. He also met with family members to answer questions, April 26.

Mabus said that he wanted to thank service members for doing such great work to protect the country but also hear family member concerns.

“Everybody serves,” he said. “It’s not just the Sailors; it’s not just the Marines; it’s the whole family that sacrifices and serves this country. By moving [to Bahrain] with the service member, there are certain sacrifices family members make. There are issues they’ve got to deal with and we’re here to try to understand those issues and where we can, give some help.”

Mabus said Sailors and Marines in Bahrain are promoting America’s interests in the region and wanted to stress how important it is and how well the job is being done.

“This is an incredibly important region in the world in the President’s new defense strategy,” he said. “This area is one of the focuses of America and it is critical we continue to do this work in such a skilled way.”

During his visit, Mabus wore jeans and posed for a photo with more than 100 Sailors, Marines, civilians and family members in support of NSA Bahrain’s Denim Day.



# NSA Bahrain hosts Earth Week observance

**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — Members of the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain community helped celebrate Earth Day this year by planting trees and participating in a base-wide trash pick-up, April 24 - 25.

During a weeklong observance, these volunteers also donated their time and energies to help educate and inform others on the importance of protecting the Earth.

Regional Environmental Coordinator Awni Almasri said that NSA Bahrain has been observing Earth Day for years.

"Earth Day is important and it shows that the NSA Bahrain community cares about their host nation and it highlights the importance of environmental protection," he added. "It is important for us but also for future generations."

NSA Bahrain's recycling program has collected approximately 15,000 pounds of aluminum cans and 50,000 pounds of mixed paper each year for the past nine years, Almasri said.

"Military members and civilians are ambassadors wherever they go and they help to enhance personal relations with their host nation," he said.

Almasri said recycling one ton of paper saves 17 mature trees, 7,000 gallons of water, three cubic yards of landfill space, two barrels of oil and 4,100 kilowatt hours of electricity, which could power the average American home for five months.

"We are helping to keep the environment clean by picking up trash on the base," said Master-at-Arms 1st Class Tina Jemison, assigned to the Naval Criminal Investigative Service Middle East Field Office. "Our ships can cause a lot of damage to the environment and by us coming out to keep the Earth clean, we are helping to balance out what we can."

Almasri stated that Americans throw away enough aluminum every month to rebuild the U.S. commercial fleet. One can that is not recycled will still be a can in 500 years.

"We are put on this Earth to take care of it," said Master-at-Arms 1st Class Henry Alderete, Naval Security Force Antiterrorism/Force Protection leading petty officer. "Keeping the environment going, keeping the water clean helps us use our resources wisely and pass these on to our children."

Quartermaster 1st Class William Partlow, assigned to USS Scout (MCM 8), helped to plant a variety of ten species of trees.

"By planting these trees, we are improving life on base," he said. "They provide shade and also add to the appearance of the base for the Sailors."

A total of 123 new trees were planted on NSA Bahrain.

"If people do not take care of where they live, here in Bahrain or back home, quality of life goes down," Partlow said. "It benefits everyone."

"They show a lot of technique. What they do is interesting and it's real, not fake," she said. "The fact that they came out here made me excited about coming to work. It



**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — Members of the Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain community participated in the second annual Take Back the Night, in support of Sexual Assault Awareness Month, April 30.

The Coalition of Service Members Against Destructive Decisions (CSADD) sponsored the event and members of the NSA Bahrain community participated by marching around NSA Bahrain while holding lit candles and flashlights to symbolize unity against violence.

"We got a lot of positive feedback from last year's event and we wanted to continue that effort," said Yeoman 2nd Class Erika Moore, CSADD vice president and

event coordinator.

The first Take Back the Night occurred in the U.S. in Philadelphia in 1975, where a young woman, Susan Alexander Speeth, was stabbed a block from her home.

"Since 1975 to today, Take Back the Night has spread from state to state and country to country," said Moore. "As the history of the event continues to be written, the goal is to end sexual violence for all."

In 1976, an International Tribunal on Crimes Against Women was held in Brussels, Belgium, where more than 2,000 women representing 40 countries attended to show their support to end assaults and sexual violence. The movement continued to spread across Europe.

Moore said that one in four women and one out of six men will experience some type of assault in their lifetime.

"There is so much to accomplish in the fight to end sexual violence," said NSA Bahrain CSADD President Cryptologic Technician (Technical) 2nd Class (SW/AW) Nicolas Goodson. "Remember, we are all in this together. No one should have to suffer in silence."

It is the responsibility of everyone to speak up and stop the violence, he added.

CSADD encourages positive social interaction and development of decision-making skills among service members and have hosted numerous events during the month to raise awareness and prevent sexual assault.

# Relocation Seminar helps transferring Sailors

**NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain** — As a step to prepare service members and their families who are relocating, the Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) held a Smooth Move/Check Out seminar at Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain, April 17.

The seminar addressed several relocation matters and things to do before transferring to a new duty station in a series of short presentations.

Integrating a variety of presenters from different departments around the base, the seminar was organized by the FFSC.

“It will help the service members and their family members who are on board move on smoothly to another location,” said FFSC Intercultural Relations Specialist, Sara Albob. “So when they move to a new location they would know in advance what to expect and how to adapt easily to a new environment and that’s very important.”

The seminar answered many questions about how to communicate with sponsors and displayed different procedures for housing check out, personal

property and household goods shipment, transportation and financial management.

Participants were given a chance to discuss their concerns with the presenters and share their thoughts with each other.

“It was actually really helpful because rather than trying to figure out everything on my own, I’m going to be able to do most of it here,” said Chief Personnel Specialist Rita Rivera-Wyers.

A presentation on reverse culture shock was also given to prepare service members psychologically for the move. In some cases, service members find it difficult adjusting to life back home after being used to the host country culture.

PlanMyMove is an online tool on MilitaryHOMEFRONT that can provide information and details needed during relocation.

Information about installations and other concerns such as housing, health care, schools, cost of living, etc. are available on MilitaryINSTALLATIONS and Military OneSource.

FFSC also provides individual counseling for those who are relocating and need personal assistance.

## Safety Reminder from NSA Safety Office

### Personal Stereo Systems

We all love to listen to music, especially in this age of the iPod. For some of us, the louder the music is, the better it is. How does loud music really affect our long term hearing loss? More so than you think. MP3 players, while easy to carry and convenient for music storage, add new concerns about listening to high sound levels for long periods of time.

Any sound level greater than 84 dB(A) for an 8-hour average is considered to be a noise hazard by the Navy. So, we grabbed an audiometer and an iPhone and tested the noise level generated by our favorite LMFAO track. The audiometer registered noise levels between 75 to 90 dB, with a few peaks over 100dB.

Think of the hearing receptacles in your inner ear like blades of grass on your front lawn. If you walk on your lawn one time, those blades will spring back up and be as good as new. But if you get a group of people walking back and forth on your lawn for 8 hours, well let’s just say that you aren’t going to be a nominee for lawn of the week. The same thing is happening to your hearing when you expose the hair cells in the cochlea of your ear to long periods of loud music. Noise damage is cumulative, and the more you expose your hearing to higher intensities of sound, the more at risk you are of noise-induced hearing loss later in life.

Impaired hearing is the most common physical handicap in the industrialized world. I’m not telling you to go home and delete your favorite Flo Rida mix. But the next time you’re at the gym, think about how loud your music is set and ask yourself if it’s worth the damage you might be doing to your hearing.

Established in 1999, Denim Day is intended to increase awareness of sexual assault and victims of sexual assault. Mabus said Denim Day is just one of the ways the Navy and Marine Corps are raising awareness and it gave everybody the opportunity to show their support.

“Sexual assault is one of the worst crimes that we face in the Navy and Marine Corps and it’s something we cannot put up with,” he said. “It is an attack on a shipmate and it’s something that we all have a role in trying to prevent and make sure it has no place in the Navy and Marine Corps.”

Mabus presented Operations Specialist 1st Class (SW) Tasha Malone, assigned to Joint Mobile Ashore Support Terminal, with a Navy Achievement Medal during the all-hands call.

“It makes me feel good to know that our leadership in Washington really does care about the women and men that fight in the Navy,” she said.

Mabus left Bahrain and continued on to visit Sailors and Marines at forward-deployed units operating in the U.S. Naval Forces Central Command area of responsibility.


