

DLA cuts the ribbon on new loading ramp

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Defense Logistics Agency (DLA) Distribution Bahrain cut the ribbon for a new loading ramp on Naval Support Activity (NSA) Bahrain during a ceremony, June 14.

The new loading ramp, located in the Banz Warehouse area, has space for three trucks to be offloaded at the same time and a shade covering the loading area.

Commander, DLA Distribution Kuwait, Army Col. Shelia J-McClaney, said the ribbon cutting showed the spirit of cooperation that went into making the ramp a reality.

“The ceremony highlighted all the hard work that my Bahrain team has done here with NSA Public Works, the Banz group, DLA Energy and NSA Safety to ensure that we have the capability to support the warfighter here and also provides critical support to Navy Exchange supply operations,” she said. “I salute all the personnel from these organizations and I thank you all for your hard work and attention to detail.”

DLA Distribution Bahrain Transportation Specialist John Dias said the project was initially started due to unsafe conditions.

“DLA took it upon itself to initiate the project to fix the ramp because of the safety of their employees,” he said. “Now it will be very beneficial to all the personnel that use this ramp on a daily basis.”

Acting Director for DLA Distribution Bahrain Yvonne Matthews said to continue essential cargo loading capabilities while repairs were occurring, DLA arranged for a portable loading ramp in October 2011 thus making it transparent to their customers when construction began later that year.

“Currently the primary users of the portable loading ramp are DLA Distribution Bahrain and the Navy Exchange,” she said. “Together, we load and offload thousands of tons of material each month to provide vital logistics support to the Fifth Fleet.”

Dias said the new ramp will be a lot safer for all personnel.

“During the hot weather conditions in Bahrain, the shade definitely helps,” he said. “It will really benefit everyone on this base, all the tenant commands.”

DLA Distribution maintains a network of 26 worldwide distribution centers, an expeditionary distribution capability and an acquisition office that allows them to execute their mission.

NSF Sailors learn to save lives

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Sailors assigned to Naval Security Force (NSF) Bahrain attended a Combat Lifesaver Course on base, June 17-18.

The two-day course given by Naval Support Activity Bahrain Senior Medical Department Representative, Chief Hospital Corpsman (FMF) Michael Walls, taught the students how to render aid to a fallen shipmate in combat conditions.

“The course teaches them tactics if someone gets injured especially in an active shooter scenario or in an attack on the base,” he said.

Students learned how to deal with injuries sustained during active shooter, improvised explosive device, sniper fire and machine gun fire scenarios.

“You need to come up with a plan and get under cover,” Walls said. “Save your life first, then their life. Every situation is different and you need to be able to think on your feet.”

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

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Chaplain's Corner Tasks or Time Off?

A good friend of mine took his family on vacation to Australia's Great Barrier Reef. After a week of snorkeling, beach combing and relaxing at nice hotels his young daughter looked at him and asked if the family could just stay in Australia and continue snorkeling. He really wished they could, but the reality was he needed a job in order to pay for such trips. They had to return home at the end of the trip and resume their normal life. He had a task to perform in the "real world" and snorkeling was not it.

Some people view faith like it is a vacation. They remind me of Peter, James and John in the gospels when they accompany Jesus up a mountain and witness Jesus transfigured. They just want to stay up on the mountain and enjoy the moment, but they had tasks down in the valley to accomplish.

Last month, I had the privilege of hearing Dr. Abouseif, the man who has

been hired to work on Bahrain's highway system. He has a big task in front of him, and he said he was inspired by a quote from the 17th chapter of the Book of John when Jesus said in a prayer to God, "I have completed the task you have sent me." Ramadan Mubarak

Ramadan, the holiest month of the Islamic year, is expected to be observed by Muslims beginning at sunrise on or about July 20 and lasting until sunset on Aug. 18 depending on the time of official sighting of the new moon.

Ramadan is the ninth month in the Islamic lunar calendar, or Hijra, and is celebrated as the time when the Quran was revealed to the Prophet Mohammed. Because Hijra is a lunar calendar, it is shorter than the 365-day Gregorian calendar by 10-11 days annually. Each year, Ramadan occurs 10-11 days earlier than the previous year, which allows fasting in various seasons and weather throughout a Muslim's lifetime. Ramadan moves through all the months of the year and takes about 33 years to traverse the entire calendar.

Service members, civilians and their families are expected to observe the customs and practices of Ramadan and are not to drink, chew gum or smoke outside of U.S. Government property during fasting hours from sunrise to sunset.

The last night of Ramadan, or Eid Al-Fitr, marks the end of the period of fasting. Restaurants will reopen and busi-

nesses in Bahrain will return to normal working hours.

Points to consider for non-Muslims during Ramadan:

- Remember that many restaurants will be closed during the day except at hotels. Bars and clubs may open after the fast breaks.
- Expect to see shortened work hours by government and local businesses.
- Dress modestly, even while jogging.
- Coffee shops tend to be crowded in the evening.
- Remember that Arabs are good hosts, so they may offer you refreshments even though they cannot partake. Such offers should be courteously declined.
- Take extra precaution when driving before the fast break.

The Fleet and Family Support Center (FFSC) will incorporate the Ramadan Brief into the cultural presentation during command indoctrination before and during Ramadan for newcomers and any interested personnel. For more information about Ramadan, contact the FFSC at 439-4046.

During their time in CIPP, participants retain their full medical and dental benefits for themselves and their dependents, as well as exchange and commissary benefits. 

NAVAL SUPPORT ACTIVITY, Bahrain — Four U.S. Navy mine countermeasures (MCM) ships arrived in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of operations aboard M/V Tern, June 23.

USS Sentry (MCM 3), USS Devastator (MCM 6), USS Pioneer (MCM 9) and USS Warrior (MCM 10) were transported from San Diego aboard M/V Tern to support a U.S. Central Command request for additional MCM assets in the U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility.

MCM ships conduct operations with coalition forces in order to ensure the continued, safe flow of maritime traffic in international waterways.

The arrival of the MCMs and the additional capability and capacity they provide, offer greater opportunities for cooperation with regional partners.

The MCM ships are scheduled for a seven-month deployment with rotational crews from San Diego to provide continuous manning.

The U.S. 5th Fleet area of responsibility encompasses about 2.5 million square miles of water area and includes the Arabian Gulf, Arabian Gulf, Gulf of Oman, Red Sea, and parts of the Indian Ocean. This expanse, comprised of 20 countries, includes three critical choke points at the Strait of Hormuz, the Suez Canal and the Strait of Bab al Mandeb at the southern tip of Yemen.

Walls put the students' knowledge to the test during the practical portion of the class. Two-man teams came upon a simulated casualty and had to provide care under fire. Walls used water from a fire hose not only as a distraction for caregivers but also as a cooling tool for the students in the 116 F weather.

Security Reaction Force Assistant Leading Petty Officer, Master-at-Arms 2nd Class (SW) Michael Walls, said this type of training gives his team the capacity to take care of each other in those situations they're required to go into without support.

"If we have to enter into a building, we're not going to have that immediate medical care with us and we have to be able to operate independently," he said. "So for my team members to be able to treat their own casualties on site could be the difference between life and death."

Woods, who had previously attended a combat lifesaver course, said this course was more beneficial because it took place in their everyday environment.

"This actually applies to what we do here and it gives us the ability to understand how a scenario may happen and to treat it based on our area of responsibility," he said.

Master-at-Arms 3rd Class Jalic Wiley, assigned to the NSF Training Division, said the class was different than anything she had experienced before. She also said the training was good practice for anyone who had never been in a hazardous duty zone, but that it also applies to duty here in the event of an active shooter or other threat to the base.

"That was good experience for us to practice dragging each other because you're not just going to leave one of your people behind," she said.




