



Combined Federal Campaign kicks off on Seabee Center

 The Combined Federal Campaign (CFC) started its campaign season (Sept. 1 to Dec. 15) during the CFC Kickoff at the Colmer Dining Facility on board Naval Construction Battalion Center (NCBC), Oct. 3. With more than 200 charities, the CFC is the largest workplace charity campaign in the world.

The purpose of the CFC is to promote and support non-profit organizations that provide health and human service benefits throughout the country and internationally to improve the quality of life for all. Five of the CFC organizations were at the CFC Kickoff: the Humane Society, Hancock County Food Pantry, Wounded Warrior Family Foundation, American Cancer Society and Gospel for Asia.

"The Humane Society relies solely on local funding and takes in about 12,000 animals a year and it costs more than \$2.6 mil-

lion a year to run the shelter, so we are here to tell people about our different programs to hopefully get their support," said Shelli Skiadou, community engagement manager for the Humane Society of South Mississippi.

The mission of Hancock County Food Pantry is to provide food and personal hygiene products for people living in Hancock County. Volunteers operate the food pantry, and there is no paid staff, so more than 92 percent of the donations are spent to provide food to those in need. Wounded Warrior Family Foundation cares for the family of injured veterans physically, emotionally, psychologically and financially.

"The whole idea of the foundation is family unity, to keep them together so they can move on from this ordeal. By helping their families you are naturally helping the vets," said Retired Air Force Lt. Col. Tom Doane, Founder and Current President of Wounded War-

rior family Foundation.

American Cancer Society provides information, day-to-day help and emotional support to people with cancer, and also invests in cancer research to prevent, treat and cure the disease. Gospel for Asia provides water, food, clothing and comfort to Asian nations. The Gospel for Asia website, <http://www.gfa.org>, notes that the organization has brought aid and hope to some of the most downtrodden people in the Eastern Hemisphere for more than 30 years.

According to CFC Director, Terry Olivier, the CFC goal is to reach out to as many charities as possible.

"Last year almost one million federal employees pledged more than \$272 million to participating local, national and international charities. This is just one more example of Federal employees' commitment to improving the quality of life for all," said Olivier.

Navy Housing Service Centers offer free issue resolution for service members

Bill French, Commander, Navy Installations Command, he stated, "As a Navy leader - and someone who lives in Navy housing - I am committed to ensuring service members and their families have suitable, affordable and safe housing. Recent events pertaining to mold in Navy barracks, and government owned and family privatized housing, indicate a need to more clearly communicate assistance available on all issues, but particularly when pertaining to health or safety issues."

"This is a personal issue for me. I am determined to ensure we are providing the very best housing throughout the fleet - but I also need your help. If you help me by reporting your housing issues, we can help ensure you maintain a house or barracks room that you

can feel proud to say is your home," French added.

"The HSC is prepared to serve as the Sailor's advocate when housing maintenance, health or safety issues arise. For families living in family privatized housing, we can also assist as an independent facilitator to help you and your landlord communicate when there is an issue and assist with coming to a resolution on a dispute," said Corky Vazquez, CNIC N93 Housing Program Manager.

"Our Housing Service Center staff has professional relationships with both the privatization partners and many community landlords," he said. "We want to work with service members and their families to assist them in finding effective housing options wherever they choose to live."

Solar Panels reduce energy consumption on NCBC

Nearly 1,900 photovoltaic solar electric panels are being installed on top of warehouse building 319 on board Naval Construction Battalion Center (NCBC) Gulfport. Once completed, the panels will generate local electricity for base use.

According to Gene Baker, NCBC Gulfport energy manager, the project is part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, which was signed into law by President Obama in 2009. It will also help the base meet its goal of 30 percent reduction in energy consumption by 2015, and comply with two tenants of the Navy's shore energy guiding principles: reduction in energy consumption and implementation of technical solutions.

Baker said that based on

month-to-month comparison NCBC Gulfport is currently at 27 percent energy reduction in

relation to 2003, and on track to meet its 2015 goal.

Site Manager, George Bow-

man, said the power generated would be available anywhere on the base where there is a need for energy. The electricity will decrease the base's need to purchase energy supplied through the local power grid, and annually generate enough energy to power a barracks building.

"The solar panels will generate electricity that we will not have to buy from Mississippi Power, so we are generating within the fence line as opposed to having Mississippi Power deliver us energy, so that is less power we have to buy," said Baker.

Solar panels are a good fit for NCBC Gulfport due to the large number of flat-roofed buildings on the base. Baker said that unlike other renewable energy sources, such as wind or water, solar panels are virtually maintenance free.

"There is very little maintenance required on them [solar

panels], so aside from the capital costs it is pretty much free energy generation."

The project does have an 80-year payback, but according to Baker that cost could be reduced significantly over the years if energy prices rise as forecasted. He went on to say that the panels are already proving more efficient than originally rated, which will also bring down the payback costs.

The panels are scheduled to be installed and generating electricity by the end of the year, which will reduce the base energy consumption, but Baker still encourages people to do their part in reducing energy usage.

"This [solar panel installation] in and of itself is not what is going to help us meet our goals, it's everybody doing what they can to reduce energy by turning off computers, turning off the lights, turning off copiers at night."

Smoke Testing Sewer Lines . . . NAVFAC South-

east and NCBC Gulfport are performing an evaluation of the NCBC Gulfport sanitary sewer system. Beginning Oct. 15 and tentatively ending by Nov. 2, AH Environmental Consultants will be conducting a SMOKE TEST survey to assist our inspection crews in locating breaks and defects in our sewer system. The smoke you see coming from the vent stacks on houses or holes in the ground is NON-TOXIC, NON-STAINING, HAS NO ODOR, WHITE TO GRAY IN COLOR, AND CREATES NO FIRE HAZARD. We advise home owners to pour a gallon of water into each drain trap of floors, sinks, showers, and tubs prior to our testing. If smoke enters your building it is likely that sewer gases may also be entering your home or business. The smoke should not enter your building or home unless you have defective plumbing or dried up drain traps. If smoke does enter any building please notify the NCBC Gulfport Public Works Trouble Desk at 228-871-2244. If smoke enters your residence contact Balfour Beatty at 228-863-0424.

"Nine-fifteen at the Park and Ride lot on Wonderwood Drive," she interrupted my pathetic ramble.

"You got it!"

I arrived 20 minutes early, and sat desperately waiting to spot her mini van. When she arrived, I bolted from my car as if it had burst into flames.

"Hi!" I yelled and waved across the parking lot, startling her out of her morning haze. For the next hour, we did what military spouses do so well – analyzed, pondered, proclaimed, opined, pontificated, empathized, chastised, gossiped and even listened a little bit, all under the guise of exercise. I thoroughly enjoyed myself.

Back in the parking lot, my new friend suggested that we make the outing our new Thursday routine. I eagerly agreed, and nearly skipped back to my car with a goofy grin.

On the drive home, I thought, Finally, a real friend. I can't wait for next Thursday. I wonder if she'd want to meet Tuesday, too... maybe that's too much. I'll scare her away. Hmmm. Come to think of it, maybe I came on too strong. I think I did most of the talking. Why do I always do that? She was probably wondering if I'd ever shut up. I'll bet she'll call and cancel because she thinks I'm an annoying blabbermouth....

I pulled into my driveway and looked at myself in the rear view mirror. Not only did I realize that my bangs had fallen into that unflattering middle part that made my face look like a full moon, it also occurred to me that this had all happened before.

Suddenly overwhelmed with that bizarre déjà vu sensation, I tried to recollect the past. I soon realized that I'd had the same internal

conversation with myself in 2008, 1998, 1996, 1994 and 1993 – basically, every time the military has ordered us to move.

After every move, you busy yourself with setting up your new life – new house, new schools, new doctors, new dentists, new music teachers, new church, new pizza place. But once new routines are in place, there's nothing left to do except live.

I don't care whether you live in Poughkeepsie or Prague, boredom eventually sets in. You find yourself dawdling on the internet, ignoring housework, and eating too much. You put on work out clothes, but never make it to the gym. You call your husband even though you know he can't chat. You write long e-mails to old friends who are too preoccupied to write back. Even the family dog, has no good gossip to share.

You are bored out of your mind.

As I fixed my bangs in the rear view mirror, I remembered the story of Christopher McCandless, a young man who disappeared "Into the Wild" (the name of the book by Jon Krakauer) to live free from obligations and relationships. After spending over three months utterly alone, he realized that he had been wrong about life all along. Days before he died of starvation trying to make it back out of the wild, he wrote, "Happiness is only real if shared."

Remembering the quote helped me understand why I always get a little pathetic every time we move, and although I'm in no danger of starving anytime soon (quite the contrary in fact,) I realized that everyone needs a good friend or two to nourish the soul.






